Rotarians celebrate year's successes at RI Convention

The more than 24,000 Rotarians from 131 nations who attended the 92nd RI Convention in San Antonio, Texas, USA, this week left for home rejuvenated by a meeting that was equal parts inspiration, education and fellowship.

"Every Convention has its particular flavor that reflects the people and culture of the country where it is held," 2000-01 RI President Frank J. Devlyn said in his welcoming keynote address. " San Antonio is unique in that we have both the flavor of Texas, USA, as well as the flavor of Mexico."

The two most popular fellowship opportunities were the ticketed events, Saturday's Night in Old San Antonio, a Mexican-style fiesta and a Texas Ranch Party and Rodeo attended by more than 6,000 Rotarians. Hundreds more accepted invitations to the homes of local Rotarians during Monday's Hospitality Night.

On Sunday morning, more than 1,000 Rotarian volunteers gathered to plant about US\$75,000 worth of flowers and ornamental plants at the base of the landmark Tower of the Americas as a permanent gift to the host city and a tribute to Past RI President Paulo V.C. Costa, who died in April 2000.

The RI Convention and related events included several "firsts," among them the first-ever Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) International Convention, held at a nearby college campus just before the RI meeting. Also this year for the first time, the Rotary International Institute that preceded the convention was open to all convention participants and not limited to Rotary leaders.


The important issue of membership growth and retention received considerable attention, capped by the good news that Rotary club membership as of 15 May stood at 1,187,112, a gain of 24,531 members since July 2000. During Tuesday's plenary session, President Devlyn and W. Gary Romp, chairman of the 2000-01 RI Membership Development Task Force, recognized the winning districts and clubs from the 21st Century Challenge, a yearlong incentive campaign to boost membership worldwide. The top district was District 3160 (India), which under the governorship of P. Baskar Reddy gained more than 700 new members. Forty-nine other districts also were recognized for their success in growth, along with each district's top large eradication campaign. and small club.

President-elect Richard "Rick" D. King hammered home the membership message in his address on Wednesday, noting that the Challenge winners were "in the minority." "It has been estimated that 90 percent of the Rotarians in the world have never sponsored a single new member." he said. "This is a tremendous challenge. We must keep Rotary healthy internally if we are to meet our global mission. If we do not build for the future, we are destined to become a relic of the past."

Other speakers Wednesday included RI's incoming president-elect, Bhichai Rattakul, of the Rotary Club of Dhonburi, Bangkok, Thailand. "I know that I am following a path that has been lovingly forged by the selfless and magnificent efforts of our current and past leadership," he said in a heartfelt acceptance speech.

Praising Rotary's leadership and pioneering efforts in the global campaign to eradicate polio, keynote speaker Dr. Gro Harlem Brundtland, director-general of the World Health Organization (WHO), said: "Your commitment of time and funds have directly led to incredible progress in polio's eradication. You have in fact led the effort from the beginning, from a pilot project in the Philippines in 1979, to the official launch of PolioPlus in 1985." In recognition of the role played by Rotarians to address the plight of the estimated 610 million people with disabilities worldwide, President Devlyn presented RI's highest award, the Rotary Award for World Understanding and Peace, to Dr. Pramod Karan Sethi, a retired orthopedic surgeon who invented the "Jaipur foot," an artificial limb, that has given new hope to millions of amputees in hdia and other developing countries.

The convention received considerable media coverage, which included daily stories in the San Antonio Express-News and more than 30 segments carried by dio and television outlets in Texas and Mexico. National and international news services also used the convention to report on the polio

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Kukio Development

At Kuki'o today the pattern of family gatherings continues. One can share in a long history that encompasses evenings by campfire, playing music and talking story among family, eating the day's catch after the boats have been hauled onshore at sunset, or sipping a cool drink with friends in the shade of a deep lanai at Hu'ehu'e Ranch. Casual traditions of beach camp-outs, upland treks, or day-long fishing trips find form today as Kuki'o's beach and canoe club, trail rides, and activities centered around the anchialine ponds.

The dramatic landscape of Kuki'o - the biting blue of the ocean, the rugged lava fields, the sweet breeze that blows over upper grasslands - remains unchanged and Kuki'o is a living space where the boundaries between outdoors and in become blurred. Families have access to what this landscape has always provided: the opportunity to let your snorkeler's fins slip soundlessly below the surface of a glassy-flat sunrise sea; the chance to paddle a kayak steadily, exploring every crink in the black shoreline with patient curiosity; a quiet moment on the beach to contemplate the beauty of the calm horizon. Farther upland, you can ride on horseback through pastureland, breathing the cooler, crisp air at this higher elevation.

The natural beauty of Kuki'o continues to calm and inspire in a world whose pace has grown ever faster. The sweep of dark, rugged earth running to a flat expanse of blue conveys a sense of eternal peace, a tranquility still reflected in the lifestyle of the place. And as Springer notes, "That expansiveness, I think is part of the experience that makes the visit to this place unique. But it also enriches and provides therapy for those of us that spend far too much of our lives looking at a view plane that is the arm's length between our eyes and the keyboard and a liquid crystal display."

Literacy and Numeracy

Combating illiteracy has been an emphasis of Rotary International since 1986 — and for good reason. UNESCO estimates that a quarter of the world's population is illiterate. Millions more are functionally illiterate, without the reading and writing skills necessary for everyday life. The United Nations has identified illiteracy as a major obstacle to economic, political and social development.

RI's literacy emphasis is intended to educate Rotarians about the problem, encourage clubs to sponsor and support literacy efforts, enlist the aid of Rotary Village Corps, Interact and Rotaract clubs, and to develop Rotary projects addressing a full range of literacy issues, including primary and vocational education, teacher training and functional literacy.

Two valuable resources are available to assist Rotarians and others interested in learning about illiteracy and taking steps to attack this wide-spread problem:

The Literacy and Numeracy Task Force comprises Rotarians whose mission is to promote the effective teaching of functional literacy and numeracy in developing nations.

The handbook, *Rotary Promotes Literacy* (Publication No. 601), is designed for those interested in undertaking or supporting literacy efforts in their communities. It offers an overview and suggests ways to get involved, including examples of model Rotary projects and a wealth of Rotary and public resources. The handbook is available for download from this site or can be ordered from the RIOrder Desk in the USA (telephone: 847-866-4600 or fax: 847-866-3276) for US\$1.

Rotary clubs are addressing the problem of illiteracy at the local, national and international levels. Some examples:

- Through Rotary's <u>World Community Service</u> (WCS) program, the Rotary Club of Tijuana Oriente, Mexico, built a three-room school with assistance from Rotary clubs in San Juan Capistrano and Dana Point, California, U.S.A.
- In India, the Valanthalai Rotary Village Corps, sponsored by the Rotary Club of Jaffna, established a mobile library.
- In an effort to promote early childhood development, the Rotary Club of Masterton South in Wel-

lington, New Zealand developed a project to provide new mothers with a childrens book, information on local library services and the encouragement to begin reading to their children at an early age.

 <u>The Rotary Foundation</u> also provides grants that support literacy projects.

support literacy projects. The Rotary Club of Biddeford-Saco, Maine, U.S.A., used such a grant to refurbish a school for destitute children of Cidade Nova, Brazil, a poverty-ridden city in a vast garbage dump on the outskirts of Natal.

In South Africa, where black children who speak the vernacular need to learn standard English, the Rotary Club of Sandton donated tape recorders, typewriters and personal computers to the South African "Write to Read" literacy program.

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"Customer-centric" Business Environment

The Rotary Club of Kona speaker on July 19, 2001, is Karen Leland, management consultant and author of "Customer Service for Dummies" and "Online Customer Service of Dummies". Karen, a part-time resident of Hawaii Island, will be speaking to the Rotary Club on how managers, senior executives and business owners can make their business environment 'customercentric'.

Some of Leland's clients include: American Express, AT&T, IBM, Xerox, Oracle and Marriott Hotels.

Karen will give you the six strategies that any company can adopt in order to create a world class service organization. She will point out that it costs five times more to attract a new customer than to retain a current one. Her topics

will include:

1) The six critical areas for becoming a customer driven company

2) How to differentiate between the in-focused and customer focused company

3) Evaluating your company's current customer centric focus

4) How to get all levels of your company involved in service improvement

5) Moving beyond platitudes of service excellence to real change

Report on Council on Legislation

It was a distinct pleasure and honor to serve as your representative to the 2001 Council on Legislation. 523 voting representatives from 65 countries, the current Rotary International President and Board of Directors, Past Directors, Directors -elect and past and future R. I. Presidents attended the meeting in Chicago.

Rotarians from around the world submitted 1,350 proposals to the Council for consideration. Many were set aside as deficient or defective, while others were combined and consolidated with similar proposals, leaving 622 Enactments and Resolutions to be discussed and voted upon by the Council. Of these, 54 Enactments and 44 Resolutions were approved, the rest having been withdrawn or rejected. The use of electronic voting for the first time in a Council on Legislation enabled the Council to complete its work on time, despite having more than twice as many proposals to consider as any previous Council.

Attached is a short summary of the more significant Enactments. I would encourage you to share this information with your incoming President and Directors, and consider publishing some of the material in your club bulletin. The Enactments will become effective July 1, 2001 and will be sent to you in booklet form in the very near future. Toward the end of the year, your club will receive a revised and updated Manual of Procedure.

The actions of this historic Council on Legislation will have a long-lasting effect on the way in which we serve as Rotarians. Although there were many Enactments and Resolutions that were rejected, it is likely that they will resurface and that the face of Rotary will continue to change. The effect of the approved Enactments will be to encourage greater flexibility and diversity in how Rotary clubs and their members go about the business of community service. We have adopted measures ensuring gender equality in membership recruitment, simplifying definitions of membership, easing the transfer from one club to another and provisions for clubs to determine make up policies at weekly meetings. This is a great step forward for the bright future of Rotary.

Enactments

Enactments are actual changes to the Rotary Constitution and Bylaws and will be included in the new Manual of Procedure.

Membership. Additional Active, Senior Active and Past Service types of membership have been eliminated, leaving two types of membership, Active and Honorary, while retaining the classification principle. Also removed are the territorial and classification restrictions for members who retire and for members who have three or more years of service and who change residence or place of business. Clubs are lim-

ited to five active members per classification or 10% of their active membership in any one classification, whichever is greater. Members who are retired will not be included in the total number of members from a classification. Senior Active members who are exempt from attendance requirements, will now be Active exempt members, with no change to the rule of 85 (years of service and age) exempting them from attendance requirements.

Transfer of Membership. Transferring Rotarians or former Rotarians may be proposed as active members in the new club without the consent of members in the new club who hold the same classification. The former club is allowed to propose the transferring or former Rotarian for active membership in the new club.

Club Locality. The term "Territorial Limits" and its restrictions are eliminated and changed to "Locality". This provides that clubs may be established in the same locality or surrounding area as one or more existing clubs. The only test now will be whether sufficient classifications exist in the "locality". Existing clubs will no longer be able to refuse to relinquish or share territory with a proposed new club.

New Model Rotary Clubs. The R. I. Board is authorized to establish pilot projects to admit or allow the reorganization of up to 200 clubs into R. I. without requiring that their club constitutions be in accordance with the R. I. Constitution and Bylaws. These pilot project clubs would be allowed under these rules for a period not to exceed five years. Upon conclusion of the pilot projects, the constitutions of all clubs admitted into membership or permitted to reorganize, shall be the Standard

Rotary Club Constitution in effect at that time. **Termination of Membership**. The automatic provisions for termination of membership for failure to attend 60% of regular meetings, or to pay dues as specified has been removed. Each club

The club board may establish reasons which it considers to be good and sufficient for excused absences.

Cancellation of Meetings. The club board may cancel up to four meetings a year, but not more than three in succession. Meetings may also be cancelled in the event of the death of a club member.

Gender. The provision whereby single-gender clubs may be established is deleted and limitation on membership based on gender is specifically prohibited.

Honorary Membership. Honorary membership is allowed to continue until such time as the board terminates such membership. It does not have to be approved by the board each year. Honorary members now have the right to visit other clubs without being the guest of a Rotarian.

The Standard Rotary Club Constitution. The Constitution has been revised and simplified without changing its substance. The enactments approved by the 2001 Council on Legislation which affect the Standard Rotary Club Constitution will be included in the revised Manual of Procedure.

Dues to R. I. Each club will now pay \$1.00 each year for each of its members. in additional per capita dues to defray the costs



Rotary in Cyberspace

Excerpted from the RI Website and The Rotarian Magazine, June 2001



As the Internet revolution gains momentum, Rotarians are preparing to make the most of cuttingedge technology.

by Wayne Hearn Rotary founder Paul Harris often pondered the impact of technology on society in general, and this organization in particular. Writing in the 1940s, he described how "great steamships bridged the seas to advance understanding and good-will sponsored by Rotary." He looked ahead to predict that Rotary conventions soon would

assemble under "skies full of planes from all the cities of the world."

"Nothing but good can come of such meetings of men united in the common ideal of service," he observed of the enhanced communication opportunities made possible by technology.

If only Paul Harris had lived long enough to see the advent of e-mail, the Internet and the World Wide Web — there's little doubt he quickly would have recognized their potential to help

Rotarians more effectively carry out RI's humanitarian mission.

It is in that spirit that modern Rotary has embraced cyberspace in a major way over the past several years, culminating with an ambitious, and ongoing, upgrade of the Rotary Web site (www.rotary.org). A complete, user-friendly redesign was unveiled in February, and several important new applications are scheduled to debut 2 July, with more planned for the near future. Likewise, hundreds of clubs and districts, acting independently, have launched Web sites and are aggressively making the shift from hard copy to mouse-click as they conduct the business of Rotary.

A strong proponent of electronic communication, President Frank J. Devlyn has led by example, becoming the first pres ident in Rotary history to set up a Web site (www.frankdevlyn.org), which he uses to interact with Rotarians worldwide and keep them informed on his philosophy, programs, speeches, travels and other Rotary-related developments. It also provides links to an array of other useful sites, including those of the current RI task forces. In addition, he has launched a monthly electronic newsletter, President Frank's E-Express.

President-elect Richard D. King also has set up a Web page, accessible via the RI site (www.rotary.org/president-elect). Devlyn's Webmaster, Rotarian Harriett Schloer, a member of the



- The program should not include a direct request for money from our members, but can include information on how our members can be of help if they so choose.



Membership Development Ideas

Ideas that have worked for other Rotary Clubs

- The Rotary Club of Duluth Harbortown, Minnesota, USA (District 5580) credits its 18% increase in membership during 1997-98 to its efforts to involve as many people as possible in its activities family, spouses, and friends.
- The Rotary Club of Oshkosh Southwest, Wisconsin, USA (District 6270) attributes its 20% increase in membership in 1997-98 to its visibility in the community. The club partners with a local school and its community activities and enthusiasm have prospective members knocking at its door to join.
- The Rotary Club of Mysore West, India (District 3180) realized a 15+% increase in membership during 1997-98. One of its strategies is to invite potential members to participate in a service activity of the club. This allows them to become familiar with the club and its members prior to committing to membership.
- The Rotary Club of Parana, Argentina (District 4960) increased its membership by more than 35% last year by keeping its meetings on a tight schedule and inviting family members to club activities whenever possible.
- The Rotary Club of Santa Maria, Brazil (District 4660) inducted 14 new members last year with no terminations (a 42% increase). They conduct their meetings on a tight schedule, beginning and ending at a specified time; their club programs are established two months ahead of time; and they celebrate their members' accomplishments.
- As a means of attracting visitors and publicizing its own presence in the community, the Rotary Club of Hamet, California, USA is holding a series of special meetings, each targeting a different profession or group in the community as a potential source for me mbers. At each of these meetings, the club will honor a member of the target group.
- The Rotary Club of Whitehall/Bexley, Ohio, USA uses its major fund raiser as an opportunity to seek out potential members. When the club approaches local businesses for contributions to its silent auction, it also invites the owners/managers to come to a club meeting as a guest.
- District 5110 (California; Oregon, USA) has a Golden Nugget Program which provides assistance to clubs with a membership of less than 20.
- One of our past task force coordinators suggests listing your Rotary club in the local telephone directory under the "Rotary club of...". The listing is inexpensive and one club reports adding two new members, who had recently moved to its town, as a result of their listing.
- The Rotary Club of Driffield, Humberside, England, had excellent results from a Guest Evening. A list of potential members was drawn up and 40 invitations sent out. More than a third of the invitees attended the meal and information evening and eight of those joined the club, with 4 more expressing interest in joining.
- At a meeting of the Rotary Club of Cincinnati, Ohio, USA, a threepage list of open classifications awaited the members sitting at each table. The list included the names of local companies which could provide potentials to fill these classifications. At each table one of the members of the club's membership development committee reviewed the open classifications and ways to fill them. As a result, more than 150 potential new members were identified, and it

only took three minutes out of the meeting agenda. Each of the potential members will be contacted by a two-person team comprising a member of the membership development committee and the Rotarian who identified the potential member.

- The Rotary Club of Trenton, Ontario, Canada, reads a series of unfilled classifications at each meeting. Members must be listening because 20 new membership proposals have been submitted in recent weeks.
- The Rotary club of San Diego, California, USA, continually revises its classifications roster, employing senior active and past service types of membership whenever possible. It also assigns quotas in the club — board members are each charged with bringing in one new member and each of the various committees must enlist one to three new members. The club recently erected a membership tree which visibly credits sponsors for each new member proposed.
- The Rotary Club of Clemmons, North Carolina, USA (District 7690) has achieved an annual growth rate of approximately 30% through an innovative program: The club divides its members into four groups and each member is asked to propose a prospective new member during one of the four quarters of the Rotary year. This keeps the emphasis on membership development in the spotlight for the entire year and also allows the club committees time to process the steady stream of proposals.
- A Rotarian from England suggests that an easy source for a classification survey of your community can be found in your local telephone book. Most telephone books contain a list of the businesses

found in the community; some even have an index to make life easier.

- Clubs suffering from low membership might benefit from District 5150's (California, USA) "Operation New Charter". Working in unison, several clubs in the district spurred each other to increase their ranks to a minimum of 25 members. When the goal was met, the clubs held a joint party.
- District 9920 (Australia) used its district membership committee as a roving resource to aid clubs. The committee held its monthly meetings at various Rotary clubs in the district. By sitting at different tables during the meal, each committee member was able to give advice and offer assistance.

"We either grow or begin to die," President King tells RI conference

Rotary International President Richard "Rick" D. King's first presidential conference of the year played to an enthused capacity crowd of 541 Rotarians from 76 districts and provided a strong boost to Rotary's Global Quest, the ambitious membership growth campaign launched in July. At the end of the 10-12 August meeting in Toronto, Ontario, Canada, Rotarians left the Hilton Toronto committed to specific me

ronto committed to specific membership goals for their districts, with targeted net in-

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creases ranging from 4 percent to 49 percent.

If all 54 districts that set goals at the conference succeed, the result would be a total membership increase of more than 18,000 Rotarians, a 13 percent hike over their current combined membership. And if the same growth rate is applied to all 103 districts within the conference's "catchment area" roughly, eastern Canada

and the United States east of the Mississippi River — the total net gain would approach 30,000 members.

President King minced no words in describing the seriousness of the membership issue during his opening keynote address. "I believe the organization is at a critical crossroads," he said. "Over the last 12 years, 1.3 million people have left Rotary. We like to think that we were gaining membership every year, with the exception of three recent years in a row, but the truth of the matter is that we've been losing members from existing Rotary clubs for a dozen years. And but for those few new clubs (chartered) every year, we would be in a very sorry state, like many organizations similar to Rotary. And so we either have to do something about it, or we will begin to die."


Kenneth R. Boyd, chairman of the Membership Development Executive Steering Committee, outlined Rotary's Global Quest, which calls for each club to bring in one new member every month to achieve a net annual gain of five members and for each district to develop three new clubs each year. "Why are we doing this?"

Boyd asked. "Most people believe that it is just a numbers game, but that is not true. We are doing this to increase the humanitarian effort throughout the world. We need more hands to help solve the problems that exist as president King said, because, 'Mankind Is Our Business.'"

Rotary Foundation Trustee Chairman Luis Vicente Giay explained that a net gain of five new members per club translates into an additional US\$8 million for the Foundation annually. "The benefit of all of this will be

great for our organization, but the ultimate beneficiaries will be those who are served by a strong Rotary Foundation. They are the reason Rotary must grow."

The emotional highlight for many was a plenary session, "Why I Joined Rotary," which featured deeply personal testimonials by Past RI Director Robert A. Coultas and four grassroots Rotarians. Three of the presenters — Chris Delaney, Bill Ester, and Robert Thomson talked about how Rotary participation helped them cope with disabilities and serious health problems. The event also included special presidential recognition of three new Ontario clubs and their charter members: Bracebridge-Muskoka Lakes, Wellington South and York.

Membership Development Ideas

RI Committee explores strategies to attract young members into clubs



During a two-day meeting at RI World Headquarters, Evanston, Illinois, USA, the 2001-02 New Generations Membership Development Committee explored and discussed various strategies to attract young business and professional men and women into the ranks of Rotary. The committee was established to develop a plan of action and approach for the recruitment of younger members into clubs.

Coming from nations as far afield as South Africa, Australia, Russia, Mexico, Germany, and the United States, 11 committee members explored the opportunities for professional and business networking, social interaction, community service, and international cooperation through the 30,000 Rotary clubs in more than 160 countries and geographical areas of the world. The committee members, who ranged in age from their mid-20's to mid-40's, proposed, argued, and discussed new ideas to invigorate Rotary, communicate its mission, and make it relevant within the context of current social and business pressures and changes. They expressed a strong desire to perform worthwhile services to improve communities, relieve human suffering and bring cooperation among people of various nations.

"Joining Rotary is life-altering," said Jared Brown, who works in commercial development in Clearwater, Florida, USA, and currently is the local administrative leader for the 42 clubs and 2,042 members in the Clearwater area. "I think Rotary has so much to offer for my generation as

well as the next." Commenting on the widely held view that young people are not interested in joining service clubs such as Rotary, Susanne Wetzel of the Rotaract Club of United Nations, New York, said, "It's not that young people don't want to serve, they just don't know what's available." Originally from Germany, Wetzel explained that in many parts of Europe Rotary club membership is cherished as a status symbol and many young people consequently think that they don't fit the picture of a Rotarian. "[But] Rotary has lots of potential. Rotary should offer lots of different clubs - some with a younger membership, some with an older membership."

"The trick is to figure out how to get someone to give Rotary a chance. All you can do is to challenge them to give it a chance. After a while, they'll realize it's a tremendous organization," said Andrei L. Danileko, a 34-year-old Russian Rotarian, who is founder and president of the non-profit International Fund Russian Farms. "It's critical for people of my age group to get involved. The Global Quest should go on no matter who is president. New membership is part of Rotary's life. Once we reach 1.5 million members, I don't want the priority to shift. RI should never be satisfied by its numbers."

Weighing in on this issue, RI President Richard D. King said, "Worldwide, our membership is growing. We are continuing to look to young business and professional men and women to take roles of leadership in the future. As societies and communities' needs change, Rotary will change to meet those needs."



While on a three-day visit to District 1360, Rotary International President Richard D. King met with the president of Iceland and many of the island nation's 1,100 Rotarians. With a population of 280,000, Iceland has one of

the world's highest ratios of Rotarians per capita.

"President Rick's visit has been very valuable for Icelandic Rotarians and it ties us more closely to Rotary International," said Past District Governor Jon Hakon Magnusson. "The last RI president who came here was Bill Huntley in '94."

Throughout his visit, the RI president talked about Rotary and humanity and what Rotarians can do to help improve the standard of living for underprivileged communities around the world. "As the world's oldest service organization, Rotary must lead the way in making service relevant to the needs of 21st Century communities," he told Rotarians in Iceland. "The Global Quest is the cornerstone of our efforts to

invigorate Rotary. So I encourage you to seize every opportunity to grow in numbers and to be even more involved in community affairs locally and internationally."

On 18 August, President King met with Iceland's President Olafur Ragnar Grimsson at Bessastadir, the official presidential residence. The two leaders discussed issues related to service and Rotary's efforts to create a better world. That night, some 100 representatives from 18 of



An impressive 10 percent of Iceland's Rotarians are women and President King acknowledged the important role they play in strengthening the Rotary family. In addition, President King visited Thingvellir, site of the world's oldest parliament, established by Viking settlers in 930 AD. Among the many World Community

in Iceland are the provision of hospital supplies and equip-

ment to the University Children's Hospital in Vilnius, Lithuania; funding for rehabilitation and medical care for indigent World War II veterans in Parnu Estonia; the supply of computer equipment for disabled children in Parnu, Estonia; and the provision of equipment and renovations for a children's home in Sao Paulo, Brazil.

Extension!

Creating a new Rotary Club is another way to expand our ranks. Extension may not be the best way to describe the formation of a new club, but it is the term RI uses. The creation of a new club was usually prompted when an existing club found its classifications filled, or the venue too small, or the meeting time or day did not suit potential members.

A new community often provides the opportunity for a new Rotary Club such as Kapolei on Oahu. Forming new clubs are not normally the primary focus of a membership drive. But club extension is an essential part of Global Quest. Each District Governor has been asked to expand their district by adding three new clubs. I was pleasantly surprised that my club presidents immediately identified a number of new club possibilities. Kauai is talking about a breakfast club. The big island is looking into a new breakfast club in Waikoloa.

Maui is even talking about sponsoring a new club on Molokai. The potential of a club in the Kalihi area on Oahu is a strong possibility. Each of these new clubs require a sponsor club (usually from the neighboring area) and a few hard working Rotarians willing to gather and guide the initial group of interested residents through a series of information meetings. The next step is to form a provisional club where meetings are more formal and follow the usual Rotary Club format. RI requires a provisional club to have at least 20 members before they can submit for their Rotary Club charter. I've asked our provisional clubs to set their charter goal at 25 to 30 to ensure they will have adequate members and resources to conduct their

Interact

Interact is an international organization of service and Rotaract is a Rotary-sponsored service club for social clubs for young people of secondary school age that fosters leadership and responsible citizenship and promotes international understanding and peace. The name was created by combining the words "international" and "action." Interact clubs are sponsored by Rotary clubs as a program of Rotary International. Rotary clubs provide guidance and inspiration, but the Interact clubs are self-governing and self-supporting. Clubs take a variety of forms, both single-gender and mixed as well as large and small. The membership base of a club can be drawn from the student body of a single school or from two or more schools from the same community. Each year, Interact clubs complete at least one community service project and at least one project that furthers international understanding and goodwill. hteractors develop a worldwide network of friendships through exchanges with local and overseas clubs. Along the way, Interactors develop their leadership skills and initiative while meeting new friends. Through their service activities, Interactors learn the importance of:

developing leadership skills and personal integrity

- demonstrating helpfulness and respect for others
- understanding the value of individual responsibility and hard work

The first Interact club was initiated in 1962 by the Rotary Club of Melbourne, Florida, USA. Two months later, the first Interact club outside the United States was established in Tanjore, India. Today there are more than 6,650 Interact clubs in some 103 countries and geographical areas, making Interact a truly worldwide phenomenon.



There will be other vessels and the tow will take 12 to 15 hours. The 'tail tug' connection will be transferred to cables to bulldozers on shore which will allow tugs offshore to maintain the 60 tons of continuous tension required during the 24 to 36 hours while the pipe is

flooded and sunk.

Tom will bring you up-to-date on the three to four days, beginning October 5, that it will take to accomplish all of this.

Rotary International President Richard D. King has also sent out a special message to the victims of the attacks on behalf of all the world's Rotarians. "At this early stage, we do not yet know what losses our own Rotary

"These events demonstrate all the more the importance of keeping our organization growing and thriving. Where Rotary exists in the world, there is a greater chance for peace. By swelling the ranks of Rotarians dedicated to peace, we can further strengthen Rotary's mission to foster international understanding and goodwill."

Long-term exchanges usually last for an academic year, during which the student lives with more than one family and attends school in the

host country. Short-term exchanges vary from several days to several weeks. They often take place when school is not in session and usually do not include an academic program. Short-term exchanges usually involve a stay with a host family, but they can also be organized as international youth camps, which bring together students from many different countries.



October is Vocational Service Month



The changes occurring in today's workplace — continuing expansion of new technologies, the shifting role of women in the work force, the effects of economic slowdowns — are all combining to revolutionize business. As business leaders, Rotary members share their skills

and expertise through Vocational Service.

According to Rotary's classification principle, members join Rotary as the representative of their particular business or profession. This gives Rotarians the dual responsibility of representing their vocation within the club and of exemplifying the ideals of Rotary within the workplace. The essence of Vocational Service is the importance of high ethical standards in all professions, the importance of all vocations and the opportunity to contribute one's vocational talents to address the problems and needs of society.

Early Rotarians were often instrumental in setting up local organizations that functioned as, or became, better business bureaus. Other clubs established boards of mediators to promote industrial peace between employers and their workers and among businesses. Today the focus of Vocational Service has expanded from individual vocational excellence to providing service within the workplace and to the community.

Vocational Service can be performed in many areas:

- Vocational Awareness: giving classification talks and conduct tours of members' businesses.
- Vocational Awards: recognizing vocational excellence and high ethical standards.
- Career Development: using members' professional experience to advance employment; developing and supporting apprenticeship programs; organizing career-planning programs in schools; and retraining adults for new vocations.
- Vocation at Work: generating new jobs within the community; working with retirees; addressing drug, alcohol and literacy problems in the workplace; creating vocational opportunities for the dis-

abled; developing and implementing HIV/AIDS education and policy; and promoting high ethical standards.

Ethics: leading conferences and panel discussions for community members on ethical issues facing the community; holding group discussions for students where they apply the <u>4-Way Test</u> to case studies.

Focus on Ethics

From the founding tenets of the Object of Rotary to the values expressed in the 4-Way Test and the "Declaration for Rotarians in Businesses and Professions", the promotion of high ethical standards in the workplace has been a central theme of Rotary throughout its history. As these recent examples indicate, the issue is at the heart of many Rotary club and district projects:

- Ethics was the focus of a panel discussion sponsored jointly by the Rotary Club of Alexandria, Virginia, USA, and T.C. Williams High School. The four Rotarians on the panel each gave a 15minute presentation on ethics in hiring practices; ethics in sales; loyalty in the workplace; and employer/employee relations. A lively discussion followed where students questioned the panelists on topics presented.
- In the Philippines, District 3810 held a 4-Way Test Day as a way to promote its message and highlight the start of Vocational Service Month. Streamers, posters, billboards, calendars, and stickers bore the 4-Way logo and concepts. In addition, a ceremony was held. The event signaled the start of Vocational Service month for the district.
- The Rotary Club of Anchorage East, USA, held an Ethics Conference to increase awareness of ethics issues. The conference provided tools for resolving ethical conflicts and for developing support of ethical business practices in the community.



Report from Jay Antonio in Brazil

Jay Antonio, Rotary Club of Kona Exchange Student

I arrived in Brazil on August 9, 2001. I was toured around Florianopolis the capital city of Santa Catarina. I began school the first week I arrived and enjoyed it. I was fortunate to attend a trip to Sao Paulo with other exchange students my 2nd weekend in Brazil.

I began a Portuguese language class the second week. I practice with my schools football team. I teach an English class to students, and I have taken a few Judo classes. I am currently taking Capueda classes, both famous in Brazil.

There is an October Fest currently happening. It lasts one week, there was a fair, and there is music and food.

I attended a Rotary meeting and another Exchange student presented her farewell report. I spoke a little at the Rotary meeting, but only said a few words.

I did 2 presentations recently of Hawaii at an English school in the city. I am currently preparing another presentation for the end of the month. Most people have been interested in Hawaii. I was

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interviewed by my school about my exchange. There were some people interested in my point of view of the bombing in New York.

So far I have been to Sao Paulo and Florianopolis twice. I went to Cambodio another city before I went on my trip to Sao Paulo. In Sao Paulo we went to an art museum and a memorial museum.

In school I am studying Brazilian History, Biology, Math, English, Art, Physics, Chemistry, Portuguese, Geography, Philosophy, and Sociology. My Portuguese class has helped me improve my lack of Portuguese and I am slowly increasing my communication skills. I can somewhat understand a conversation but not every detail.

My host family is very nice. My parents are great, and my siblings are enjoyable and nice to be around. My counselor has been helpful when he has been needed. Rotary members are very

Welfare to Work Scholarships

For several years, the Rotary Club of Fort Collins (Foothills), Colorado, USA, has helped single mothers obtain a vocational education so that they can find jobs and no longer depend on government assistance. The club wanted to offer scholarships to those who most needed the funds and targeted community-college students.

Once the club began the scholarships program, it discovered that many applicants were single mothers and tailored selection criteria to fit their needs. To receive the US\$1,000 scholarship, an applicant must show a strong desire to achieve self-sufficiency, have earned strong grades, and plan to accomplish specific goals.

Applicants also must be willing to speak at occasional Rotary club meetings on how the program has had an impact on their lives and their careers.

Each school year, the Rotarians award at least four scholarships. An annual community fundraiser generates money for the awards. Successful recipients include one graduate who used her aquaculture degree to start a fish breeding business and another who acquired a corporate management job.

Career Guidance Week

catuba Noroeste, Brazil, organized a Career Guidance Week. Professionals from a variety of different fields shared their knowledge with local high-school students, helping them to decide on the vocations they wished to pursue.

Vocational Service often overlaps with Community Service and means working with Rotary-sponsored organizations, such as Interact, Rotaract and Rotary Community Corps. Issues such as environmental protection, the elderly, disabilities, drug and alcohol abuse, and HIV/AIDS impact the workplace. The workplace can also be an avenue for increasing awareness about such issues. Interact and Rotaract clubs can serve as a link to the younger generations. Through Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA), young people can receive intensive training in leadership and professional development.

Pooling resources with other organizations in the community can increase potential of a project. Other organizations may be able to give additional insight into the needs in the community and provide project ideas. Many needs are most easily addressed by providing funding to existing organizations. However, involving the members of the Rotary club in a handson, concrete manner in community service activities, whether it be giving a talk on your profession in your club or providing hours of mentoring help throughout the year, can give even greater satisfac-

A new vision for the next generation A Joint Program offered by Ocean Futures Society and Kona Family YMCA, October 18, 2001

We believe that environmental education should be expanded to address responsible stewardship of natural resources and how to live more sustainable. The Hawaii Ambassadors of the Environment Program uses experiential education with frequent excursions into the marine and terrestrial environments to address these issues.

Students are introduced to the natural wonders of Hawaii's marine and coastal environments and their residents through slide shows, skin diving / free diving excursions. They will focus on issues of biodiversity, the unique characteristics of the region, human impact and resource management. They will participate in long-term monitoring and restoration programs to be created in conjunctions with local groups already involved in such programs.

In addition, students will be shown important principles of biological an ecological sciences and how they relate to ecosystem sustainability. Students will be challenged to compare how a marine community functions to how their own communities back home operate, exploring which is more sustainable and why. Sustainable characteristics of human communities will be demonstrated and experienced in the camp's solar collectors, solar still, composting toilets, composting toilets, recycle programs, gardens, integrated systems and efficiency programs.

Infused into the weeklong process will be opportunities for students to learn more about themselves and others through positive risk taking. Students will be presented with personal challenges that range from group initiatives that reguire individuals to work together to activities as diverse as to rock climbing and hiking and other related "challenge" activities to problem solving sessions that stress interconnections. Students will be given a real world simulation and roleplaying exercise in which they will have to reconcile a hypothetical development in terms of economic and environmental sustainability.

An important theme running through the entire program will be "Everything is Connected." Activities and discussions will focus on the fact that the land and sea are connected, that humans are connected to nature, that people are connected to other people and that the present is connected to the future.

By providing an adventurous learning environment we aim to create maximum opportunities for social, emotional, and academic growth. Students will be encouraged to share their new skills and knowledge when they return home. All participants will receive guidance and resources to help empower them as Ambassadors Of The Environment and participate in the search for sustainability.

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Black Pearl Oysters Grown in West Hawaii

Dr. Dale Sarver. President of Black Pearls. Inc., October 25, 2001

Black Pearls, Inc., is in the business of farming pearls and developing new technol- Islands, and Kiribati, to ogy for producing larger and higher quality pearls. BPI began in 1992 as a small research and development company at NELHA in Kona, focusing on hatchery and production growout technology for the Hawaiian black-lip pearl oyster. This successful technology has led to projects in many areas of the Indo-Pacific including the Cook Islands, French Polynesia, Australia, Thailand, Philippines, Kiribati, Midway, Kuwait, Marshall Islands, and various islands in Hawaii. The company has a commercial black pearl farm in Majuro, the main atoll of the Marshall Islands, and an associated farm in the nearby atoll of Arno. It is also involved in silver-lip pearl oyster farms in Thailand and Australia, and is working with pearl farms in the Palawan Islands in the Phil- veloping the first black pearl farm in Hawaii, ippines, and in Manihiki Atoll, Cook Islands.

BPI maintains a strong applied research section that is supported by a combination of private and public sector funding sources. The company has been awarded over a dozen competitive research and development grants from the National Science Foundation, Sea Grant, Land Grant, US Department of Agriculture, National Marine Fisheries Service, and the Hawaii High Tech Development Corporation. They have also provided consulting services to the governments of Kuwait, Cook

the South Pacific Forum Secretariat and to private pearl farm companies, on how to best develop their pearl farming options. BPI is also involved in a joint venture (Pearl Development Group, L.L.C.) with a group of medical biotechnology researchers (Aquabio Products Sciences, L.L.C., Luna Pearl Company, and various consultants and advisers) to apply modern biological and materials science technology to improve the quality, size, and value of cultured pearls. This has resulted in rapid advances in some areas of seeding technology and commercial products, some of which are now on the market (PDG Apha®, PDG Beta®, and nuclei coatings).

BPI is currently in the process of deusing the native Hawaiian black-lip pearl oyster. The farm, off the reef runway in Honolulu, represents the first application of Hawaii's new ocean leasing law. BPI is also developing another pearl farm off Unualoha Point, just north of Keahole Point in Kona. The focus of the presentation today by BPI President Dr. Dale Sarver and Vice President Mr. Neil Simms, will be on BPI's proposed new offshore fish farm off Unualoha Point in North Kona.

Microsoft to launch a new line of cars (Just for Fun)


At a recent COMDEX, Bill Gates announced the launch of the new line of Microsoft cars, with the following features:

- 10. Occasionally for no reason whatsoever, your car would lock you out and refuse to let you in until you simultaneously lifted the door handle, turned the key and grab hold of the radio antenna.
- 11. GM would require all car buyers to also purchase a deluxe set of Rand McNally road maps (now a GM subsidiary), even though they neither need them nor want them. Attempting to delete this option would immediately cause the car's performance to diminish by 50% or more. Moreover, GM would become a target for investigation by the Justice Department.
- 12. Every time GM would introduce a new model car buyers would have to learn how to drive all over again because none of the controls would operate in the same manner as the old car.
- 13. You'd press the "start" button to shut off the engine.

The Hawaii Rotary Youth Foundation (HRYF) was founded in 1976 by Maurice J. "Sully" Sullivan during his year as Rotary's District Governor in Hawaii. The HRYF merit based scholarships are awarded to qualified high school seniors in Hawaii planning to pursue a baccalaureate degree. The foundation utilizes a three level selection process. Our club can sponsor up to four qualified candidates to the island level. All qualified island candidates are presented to the final (state) selection committee. Scholarship recipients receive \$3500 for mainland colleges, \$1500 for neighbor island schools and \$1000 for going to school on their home island.

The First scholarship, awarded in 1977, was granted in the amount of \$3500. Since its inception the HRYF, through the continued support of the Sullivan family and

The Hawaii Rotary Youth Foundation was founded in 1976 by Maurice J. ullivan during his year as Rotary's overnor in Hawaii. The HRYF merit holarships are awarded to qualified pol seniors in Hawaii planning to purthe generous Rotarians of Hawaii, has awarded over \$2,245,730 to 741 graduating Hawaii high school seniors, including \$66,000 to 24 Kona students. This year 95 scholarship recipients from four islands will share \$294,000 to ward their higher education.

In memory of "Sully", a Maurice J. Sullivan Scholar Award has been established to recognize one outstanding individual who is awarded \$5000. This year's scholar Kay M. Fukunaga from St. Anthony High School, sponsored by the Rotary club of Maui is attending Stanford and has a GPA of 4.35 with a SAT of 1460.





November is Rotary Foundation Month

The Rotary Foundation

The Rotary Foundation of Rotary International is a not-for-profit corporation that promotes world understanding and peace through international humanitarian, educational, and cultural exchange programs.

The Rotary Foundation is supported solely by voluntary contributions from Rotarians and others who share its vision of a better world. Contributions to the Foundation's Annual Programs Fund are invested for three years, with interest being used to cover all administrative costs. Fully 100 percent of every dollar donated supports program expenditures three years later. Gifts to the Foundation's Permanent Fund are invested, with only the earnings being used to support programs.

The Foundation was conceived as an endowment fund in 1917 "for the purpose of doing good in the world." Although The Rotary Foundation was formally established in 1928, significant contributions were not received until 1947, when the death of Rotary founder Paul Harris generated an outpouring of support. Since that time, more than US\$1.168 billion has been spent on Rotary Foundation programs.

PolioPlus

Eradicating polio, a top Rotary prior-

ity, requires the immunization of every child in the world. As a result of the efforts of Rotary International and its partners, one billion children have been immunized against polio since 1987. Rotarians will celebrate the certification of a polio free world by the year 2005, Rotary's centennial year.

Through The Rotary Foundation's PolioPlus Program, Rotarians will have contributed a half billion US dollars to the eradication effort. Of even greater significance has been the hundreds of thousands of local volunteers mobilized by Rotary clubs around the globe for polio eradication activities. Rotarians in non-polio endemic countries have stayed involved in eradication efforts through PolioPlus Partners, an initiative that provides tools and supplies to countries where polio remains a threat.

Rotary is the key private sector partner in this international health effort. Public sector partners include the World Health Organization (WHO), UNICEF and the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC).

Humanitarian programs

The Rotary Foundation's Humanitarian Programs support a wide range of international service activities. Organized by Rotary clubs in at least two countries, humanitarian grants support projects that provide health

care and supplies, clean water, food, job train-

ing and education -- particularly in the developing world.

- The most widely used program is Matching Grants, which makes one-time awards to match contributions raised by clubs and districts for projects involving Rotary clubs in two or more countries. Each year, The Rotary Foundation award in excess of 2,000 Matching Grants
- Large-scale Health, Hunger and Humanity (3-H) Grants support sustainable projects that improve health, help alleviate hunger, or enhance human development. 3-H Grants normally range from \$100,000 to \$500,000 and fund projects from one to three years. 3-H Planning Grants provide funds to plan and design new 3-H projects.

Other Rotary Foundation programs include: **Carl P. Miller Discov**ery Grants, which provide funds for travel and related expenses incurred by Rotarians in exploring and planning new international service projects; **Grants for Rotary Volunteers** which cover travel costs and expenses for Rotarians, Foundation alumni, and Ro-

taractors who volunteer their services and professional expertise in another country; and **Rotary Peace Programs** which partially subsidize international conferences that focus on conflict resolution and ways to enhance the search for peace. Grants are also available to support international projects in non-Rotary countries and for disaster relief efforts.

Educational Programs

The Rotary Foundation Educational Programs promote international understanding and peace through scholarships and cultural exchanges.

Rotary Peace Scholarships - The Rotary Centers for International Studies in peace and conflict resolution work to-

ward...Mediation, Conflict Resolution, and Peace where there is war, Understanding where there is disharmony, Food Security where there is hunger, Health Care where there is disease, Education where there is disease, Education where there is environmental degradation, Sustainable Economic Development where there is poverty. This is a two-year master's level program. In 2001-2002 70 Rotary peace scholarships will be awarded.

The Ambassadorial Scholarships Program sponsors some 1,200 scholars each year to study in a country other than their own. It is the largest privately sponsored international scholarships program in the world. While abroad Rotary scholars act as "ambassadors of goodwill," giving presentations about their homeland to Ro-

tary clubs and other groups. The Foundation awards one year and multi-year scholarships, three-to-six month cultural scholarships for language study and three-to-nine month vocational study/training scholarships.

The Rotary Foundation's **Group Study Exchange (GSE)** Program pairs Rotary districts in different countries to send and receive professional, non-Rotarian study groups. In teams of five, participants travel to another land to meet with professional peers to experience the host country and culture.

Rotary Grants for University Teachers to Serve in Developing Countries are awarded to faculty members to enable them to share their expertise in a part of the world where it is most

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The History of Thanksgiving

and Parliament, so they traveled to America to build a prophesied "Holy Kingdom." Others followed them in later years.

The cold, damp trip on the Mayflower took 65 days, and one person had

died when land was finally sighted on November 10, 1620. After landing, the travelers worked out The Mayflower Compact, which guaranteed equality and unified the "Saints" and "Strangers" into Pilgrims. Plymouth, off Cape Cod, was a bountiful harbor named by Captain

John Smith in 1614. But the cold, snow and sleet of that first winter killed more than 60 of the group.

On March 16, 1621, an Indian man, Samoset, walked into Plymouth and called out "Welcome!" in English. Plymouth stood on the site of Patuxet, an older Wampanoag Indian village. Samoset had left his native home with an English explorer. In England, he had met Squanto, a native of Patuxet and a member of a different Wampanoag tribe. Squanto had traveled to England with his friend, the English explorer John Weymouth.

When Samoset and Squanto returned to Patuxet, they learned that the entire village died from an illness early English slavers had left behind. Because of their deep friendships with English explorers, they decided to help the new settlers. Squanto taught the Pilgrims how to

cultivate corn and others vegetables, build Indian-style homes, use fish for fertilizer, dig and cook clams, get sap from maple trees, etc. He also brought them deer meat and beaver skins.

The Pilgrims built their new church of logs. Seeing that nearby Algonkian tribes held thanksgiving festivals, Captain Miles Standish, the Pilgrim leader, invited Squanto, Samoset, Massasoit, the Wampanoag leader, and their families to join them for a harvest celebration, probably sometime in mid-October.

The Indians brought 90 relatives to the three-day celebration. Realizing the Pilgrims were unprepared for such a large group, Massasoit asked his men to get more food. So the Indians supplied most of the food - deer, wild turkey, fish, beans, squash, corn soup, corn bread and berries. The Pilgrims and Indians played games, ran races, and demonstrated their respective skills with the bow and arrow and musket.

Massasoit and Standish made a peace and friendship agreement, giving the Pilgrims the place once known as Patuxet. Within a few years, however, their descendants were killing one another in what came to be called King Phillip's War.

In following years, the Pilgrims ran short of food. Pilgrim Governor William Bradford proclaimed a day of fasting and prayer, and the rains came. To cele-



brate, on June 29, 1676, Bradford declared a day of thanksgiving. The custom of an annually celebrated thanksgiving continued. During the American Revolution, the Continental Congress suggested a day be set aside for thanksgiving. New York State adopted Thanksgiving Day as an annual custom in 1817. In 1863, President Abraham Lincoln appointed a national day of thanksgiving.

Today, the fourth Thursday of November, is set aside to be thankful for the blessings to our nation, a place of diversity, freedom and hope for people who have lived here many generations or for those recently arrived to our shores.





A message from President Rick

My Colleagues in Service:

At the Presidential Conference in Bucharest, Romania, which took place two months ago, I heard an address by Dr. Andrei Aubert-Combiescu, chairman of the Polio-Plus Committee in Romania and charter president of the Rotary Club of Bucharest in 1992. He said that there had been recent reports of new polio cases in Bulgaria, which had been traced to refugees from northern India who had entered Bulgaria. Today, people are traveling all over the world in increasing numbers, moving across borders legally and illegally. They bring with them a host of challenges, not the least of which is the possibility of the spread of many diseases. It's a small world.

The tragic events which took place in the United States on 11 September 2001, also point to the oneness of our world. No nation is

immune from the diseases of hate and misunderstanding. People from many countries were killed in that tragedy. We've been told that much of the attack was planned and executed by means of modern communication technology — the ability to communicate all over the globe in a matter of seconds. It's a small world.

On my desk at Rotary World Headquarters in Evanston are thousands of letters of sympathy and condolence as an aftermath of those September events. Many express sorrow, and the wish that Rotary will do something really effective to make this small world safer, healthier and more peaceful.

Rotary can make a difference. It is not by accident that in an age of increasing globalization, Rotary's core program this year is called "Rotary's Global Quest." It is an ambitious undertaking to take Rotary to every corner of the world and into the hearts and homes of more people than ever before. It is a campaign to enhance Rotary's public image, its reputation as peacemaker and problem solver. It is an effort to make every Rotary club more effective in productive service and in training and educating every member to be a more committed and dedicated Rotarian. It is a global thrust to accomplish — in a more competent manner — the Business of Mankind.

Dr. Albert Schweitzer, a Rotarian, was right. He

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
wrote in 1960 that when he first heard of Rotary, he said to himself, "Now — they are beginning to do what is necessary for the future!"

Why is the American Flag Folded 13 Times?

Have you ever noticed on TV or at military funerals that the honor guard pays meticulous attention to correctly folding the American flag 13 times?

I've known how the 21 gun salute was determined by adding the individual digits of 1776, but only recently learned why the flag was folded 13 times when it is lowered or when it is folded

and handed to the widow at the burial of a veteran. Here it is:

The **first** fold of our flag is a symbol of life.

The **second** fold is a symbol of our belief in eternal life.

The **third** fold is made in honor and remembrance of the veterans departing our ranks who gave a portion of their lives for the defense of our country to attain peace throughout the world.

The **fourth** fold represents our weaker nature, for as American citizens trusting in God, it is to Him we turn in times of peace as well as in time of war for His divine guidance.

The **fifth** fold is a tribute to our country, for in the words of Stephen Decatur, "Our Country, in dealing with other countries, may she always be right; but it is still our country, right or wrong."

The **sixth** fold is for where our hearts lie. It is with our heart that we pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States Of America, and to the Republic for which it stands, one Nation under God, indivisible, with Liberty and Justice for all.

The **seventh** fold is a tribute to our Armed Forces, for it is through the Armed Forces that we protect our country and our flag against all her enemies, whether they be found within or without the



The **eighth** fold is a tribute to the one who entered into the valley of the shadow of death, that we might see the light of day, and to honor mother for whom it flies on Mother's Day.

The ninth fold is a tribute to womanhood; for it has been through

their faith, their love, loyalty and devotion that the character of the men and women who have made this country great has been molded.

The **tenth** fold is a tribute to the father, for he, too, has given his sons and daughters for the defense of our country since they were first born

The **eleventh** fold, in the eyes of a Hebrew citizen represents the lower portion of the seal of

King David and King Solomon, and glorifies in their eyes, the God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob.

The **twelfth** fold, in the eyes of a Christian citizen, represents an emblem of eternity and glorifies, in their eyes, God the Father, the Son, and Holy Spirit.

When the flag is completely folded, the stars are uppermost reminding us of our nation's motto, "In God We Trust."

After the flag is completely folded and tucked in, it takes on the appearance of a cocked hat, ever reminding us of the soldiers who served under General George Washington, and the sailors and marines who served under Captain John Paul Jones, who were followed by their comrades and shipmates in the Armed Forces of the United States, preserving for us the rights, privileges, and freedoms we enjoy today.

There are some traditions and ways of doing things which have deep meaning. You have seen many flags folded in the past several weeks, and now you know why.



Proper Display of the American Flag



1. When the flag is displayed over the middle of the street, it should be suspended vertically with the union to the north in an east and west street or to the east in a north and south street.



2. The flag of the United States of America, when it is displayed with another flag against a wall from crossed staffs, should be on the right, the flag's own right [that means the viewer's left --Webmaster], and its staff should be in front of the staff of the other flag.



3. The flag, when flown at half-staff, should be first hoisted to the peak for an instant and then lowered to the half-staff position. The flag should be again raised to the peak before it is lowered for the day. By "half-staff" is meant lowering the flag to one-half the dis-

tance between the top and bottom of the staff. Crepe streamers may be affixed to spear heads or flagstaffs in a parade only by order of the President of the United States.



4. When flags of States, cities, or localities, or pennants of societies are flown on the same halyard with the flag of the United States, the latter should always be at the peak. When the flags are flown from adjacent staffs, the flag of the United States should be beinted first and lowered last. No such flag or person

hoisted first and lowered last. No such flag or pennant may be placed above the flag of the United States or to the right of the flag of the United States.



5. When the flag is suspended over a sidewalk from a rope extending from a house to a pole at the edge of the sidewalk, the flag should be hoisted out, union first, from the building.

6. When the flag of the United States is displayed from a staff projecting horizontally or at an angle from the window sill, balcony, or front of a building, the union of the flag should be placed at the peak of the staff unless the flag is at half-staff.

7. When the flag is used to cover a casket, it

8. When the flag is displayed in a manner other than by being flown from a staff, it should be displayed flat, whether indoors or out. When displayed either horizontally or vertically against a

wall, the union should be uppermost and to the flag's own right, that is, to the observer's left. When displayed in a window it should be displayed in the same way, that is with the union or blue field to the left of the observer in the street. When festoons, rosettes or drapings are desired, bunting of blue, white and red should be used, but never the flag.



9. That the flag, when carried in a procession with another flag, or flags, should be either on the marching right; that is, the flag's own right, or, if there is a line of other

flags, in front of the center of that line.



10. The flag of the United States of America should be at the center and at the highest point of the group when a number of flags of States or localities or pennants of societies are grouped and displayed from staffs.

11. When flags of two or more nations are displayed, they are to be flown from separate staffs of the same height. The flags should be of approximately equal size. International usage forbids the display of the flag of one nation above that of another nation in time of peace.



12. When displayed from a staff in a church or public auditorium on a podium, the flag of the United States of America should hold the position of superior prominence, in advance of the audience, and in the position of honor at the clergyman's or speaker's right as he faces the audience. Any other flag so displayed should be placed on the left of the clergyman or speaker (to the right of the audience).



13. When displayed from a staff in a church or public auditorium off the podium, custom and not the flag code hold that the flag of the United States of America should hold the position of superior prominence as part of the audience, in the position of honor at the audience's right.



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Don't You Just Love Engineering?

The U.S. standard railroad gauge (distance between the rails) is 4 feet, 8.5 inches. That is an exceedingly odd number. Why was that gauge used? Because that's the way they built them in England, and the U.S. railroads were built by English expatriates.

Why did the English build them that way? Because the first rail lines were built by the same people who built the pre-railroad tramways, and that's the gauge they used. Why did "they" use that gauge? Because the people who built the tramways used the same jigs and tools that they used for building wagons, which used that wheel spacing.

So why did the wagons have that particular odd spacing? Well, if they tried to use any other spacing, the wagon wheels would break on some of the old, long distance roads in England, because that was the spacing of the wheel ruts.

So who built those old rutted roads? The first long distance roads in Europe (and England) were built by Imperial Rome for their legions. The roads have been used ever since.

And the ruts in the roads? The ruts in the roads, which everyone had to match for fear of destroying their wagon wheels, were first formed by Roman war chariots. Since the chariots were made for (or by) Imperial Rome, they were all alike in the matter of wheel spacing.

The U.S. standard railroad gauge of 4 feet-8.5 inches derives from the original specification for an Imperial Roman war chariot. Specifications and bureaucracies live forever. So the next time you are handed a specification and wonder what horse's butt came up with it, you may be exactly right, because the Imperial Roman war chariots were made just wide enough to accommodate the back end of two war horses.

Thus we have the answer to the original question. Now for the twist to the story. When we see a space shuttle sitting on it's launching pad, there are two booster rockets attached to the side of the main fuel tank. These are solid rocket boosters. or SRB's. The SRB's are made by Thiokol at their factory in Utah. The engineers who designed the SRB's might have preferred to make them a bit fatter, but the SRB's had to be shipped by train from the factory to the launch site. The railroad line from the factory had to run through a tunnel in the mountains. The tunnel is slightly wider than the railroad track, and the railroad track is about as wide as two horses' rumps. So, a major design feature of what is arguably the worlds most advanced transportation system was determined over two thousand years ago by the width of a horse's butt ! Don't you just love engineering?



Rotary leader praises Hawai'i as top district

He sang, he cracked wise, he chided members who have become "bankrupt in the business of Rotary" and more than once he got choked up — but mainly Rotary International President Richard King came to praise.

Speaking at a workshop and dinner at the Hawai'i Convention Center yesterday, King congratulated the Rotary's District 5000 in Hawai'i for leading the nation in the Global Quest membership campaign.

"This district has become one of the best in the Rotary world," King said.

The group's Hawai'i district governor, Hal Darcey, said Rotary, like most service

organizations, experienced a decline in membership in recent years — 35,000 desertions internationally in the year 2000 alone.

But King took office as president last summer and Rotary has gained some 44,000 members worldwide in recent months. "And our district is leading the United States in growth," Darcey said. "We are up 11 percent in this district. Everybody else is up by 4 or 5 percent."



The Hawai'i district has about 2,300 members. With the straightforward goal of "doing good in the world," Rotary tackled such issues as violence, drug abuse, hunger and illiteracy. Rotary International has more than a million members, men and women, in 163 countries. The most grandiose goal is the eradication of polio by 2005 — for which it has spent half a billion dollars.

King spoke about its latest effort at last night's dinner: Rotary's role in combating global terrorism. "Rotary is involved in the establishment of seven centers throughout the world which we call the Rotary International Centers for Peace and Conflict Resolution," he said. "They are at seven major universities."

> King said Rotary had selected 70 scholars — 10 at each university — to be fully supported in the two-year master's degree program.

King, a California attorney, and his wife, Cherie, spent the last six months traveling to 48 countries. They decided to kick back in Waikiki for two days before flying to Nigeria tomorrow.

King was applauded, cheered, and at one point pelted with dozens of inflated plastic globes.

"I have had people throw tomatoes at me before," he said. "But this is the first time I've ever had the world thrown at me."



He received a BA from Reed College in Portland Oregon in 1989 and a MS degree in Fisheries from Oregon State University in 1994. Before joining BIAC, Michael had done scientific research on abalone in Oregon and California and worked at a commercial abalone farm in California.

Michael and his wife Sallie have recently completed construction of their home in Kailua-Kona and are expecting their first child in May. Michael and his staff are in the process of completing a 10 acre expansion of BIAC's abalone production facilities at NELHA and ramping up abalone production and sales. BIAC currently sells California Red abalone locally in Hawaii and exports to the mainland US and Japan. In summer of 2002, BIAC will start selling native northern Japanese abalone into Japan and China.

BIAC is a privately owned company and has options on 50 additional acres of land for development in NELHA HOST Park. Michael will talk to the rotary club about the

background of the company, abalone culture, and his future plans for development in Hawaii.

How Old Am I ???

One evening a grandson was talking to his grandfather about current events. He asked what he thought about the shootings at schools, the computer age, and just things in general.

The granddad replied, "Well, let me think a minute ... I was born before television, penicillin, polio shots, frozen foods, Xerox, contact lenses, Frisbees and the pill. There was no radar, credit cards, laser beams or ball-point pens.

Man had not invented pantyhose, air conditioners, dishwashers, clothes dryers, well the clothes were hung out to dry in the fresh air and man hadn't yet walked on the moon. Your grandmother and I got married first-and then lived together. Every family had a father and a mother, and every boy over 14 had a rifle that his dad taught him how to use and respect. And they went hunting and fishing together.

Until I was 25, I called every man older than I, 'Sir'--and after I turned 25, I still called policemen and every man with a title, 'Sir.' Sundays were set aside for going to church as a family, helping those in need, and visiting with family or neighbors.

We were before gay-rights, computer-dating, dual careers, daycare centers, and group therapy. Our lives were governed by the Ten Commandments, good judgment, and common sense. We were taught to know the difference between right and wrong and to stand up and take responsibility for our actions. Serving your country was a privilege; living here was a bigger privilege.

We thought fast food was what people ate during Lent. Having a meaningful relationship meant getting along with your cousins. Draft dodgers were people who closed their front doors when the evening breeze started. Time-sharing meant time the family spent together in the evenings and weekends-not purchasing condominiums. We never heard of FM radios, tape decks, CDs, electric typewriters, yogurt, or guys wearing earrings.

We listened to the Big Bands, Jack Benny, and the President's speeches on our radios. And I don't ever remember any kid blowing his brains out listening to Tommy Dorsey. If you saw anything with 'Made in Japan' on it, it was junk. The term 'making out' referred

to how you did on your school exam. Pizza Hut, McDonald's, and instant coffee were unheard of.

We had 5 and 10-cent stores where you could actually buy things for 5 and 10 cents. Ice cream cones, phone calls, rides on a streetcar, and a Pepsi were all a nickel. And if you didn't want to splurge, you could spend your nickel on enough stamps to mail 1 let-

ter and 2 postcards. You could buy a new Chevy Coupe for \$600, but who could afford one? Too bad, because gas was 11 cents a gallon.

In my day, 'grass' was mowed, 'coke' was a cold drink, 'pot' was something your mother cooked in, and 'rock music' was your grandmother's lullaby. 'Aids' were helpers in the Principal's office, 'chip' meant a piece of wood, 'hardware' was found in a hardware store, and 'software' wasn't even a word. And we were the last generation to actually believe that a lady needed a husband to have a baby.

No wonder people call us "old and confused" and say there is a generation gap and how old do you think I am????"

Pohakuloa Training Area (PTA) is located on the island of Hawaii between Mauna Loa, Mauna Kea and the Hualalai Volcanic Mountains. It extends up the lower slopes of Mauna Kea to approximately 6,800 feet in elevation and to about 9,000 feet on Mauna Loa. The training area is about midway between Hilo, on the east coast and the Army landing site at Kawaihae Harbor. The area is the largest DOD installation in Hawaii.

The training site can be reached from Oahu be either direct military helicopter or fixed wing flights to PTA or by using commercial airlines to either Hilo or Kona. from Hilo or Kona the site is reached by using Saddle Road. The distance is approximately 40 miles to both towns. The Saddle Road is frequently closed to the public due to poor surface conditions caused by storms and heavy military vehicles. In preparation for large scale training exercises at PTA, the ground forces are flown to Hilo and

transported over Saddle Road. Supporting equipment and vehicles are transported from Oahu by ship or barge to Kawaihae and driven to the site. A tank trail parallels much of the Saddle Road. These movements involving personnel, equipment and light vehicles could ideally be accomplished by flying directly to PTA; however the 3,700 foot Bradshaw Air Field runway is inadequate to accommodate large transport aircraft such as the Air Force G 141's.

The PTA consists of 108,863 acres, of which 24,048 are leased by the Army from the State of Hawaii. The remaining land is ceded and includes the impact and range areas and a portion of the west maneuver area. The leased areas include the northern maneuver areas and the support complex.

My Colleagues in Service:

Businesses spend millions of dollars each year on public relations and advertising. The purpose behind this major inves tment is to create a brand image — an identity in the minds of the buying public. No bus iness can stay in business very long unless people know about it. Creating a good public image is a vital part of any successful business plan.

For many years, Rotarians did not think it was essential to "advertise" their service efforts. The prevailing view was that our good deeds would speak for themselves. But today, Rotarians realize the importance of having people know who we are and what we do. It is abs olutely essential to our growth and productivity in the future. Both the RI Board of Directors and the Trustees of The Rotary Foundation of RI are committed to enhancing Rotary's public image. Each group has set up a substantial budget

for public relations and advertising campaigns.

As I travel the world, I am thrilled at the number of young

business people who have joined Rotary this year. We often hear the argument that Rotary is not relevant to the "younger" generation. But when I ask many young people what prompted them to join Rotary, I usually get the same two responses: "Someone asked m e!" and "When I found out what Rotary is doing in the world, I wanted to be a part of it."

In other words, Rotary is relevant to today's young professionals. Rotary makes a difference not only in the lives of those we serve, but even more so in the life of each Rotarian. But we must tell people who we are.

I once asked past RI Vice President Dave Smith to give me a succinct definition of PR. Dave, who spent his entire professional career in public relations, replied, "Do good deeds, and tell people you've done them."

Rotary has successfully performed good deeds for nearly 100 years, but we have hidden our light under a bushel for far too long. We want to win the competition for membership growth. Maximum Mobility

Rotarians join forces with the nonprofit Wheelchair Foundation to offer freedom and self-reliance to people with disabilities worldwide.

Some offers are just too good to ignore, such as when philanthropist Kenneth Behring, chairman of the nonprofit Wheelchair Foundation, last year invited Rotarians to join his campaign to assist the underprivileged. Behring, an honorary member of the Rotary Club of Foster City, Calif., USA, promised to personally match every dollar Rotarians contributed to his effort to supply wheelchairs to people in need. It was the kind of deal no one turns down.

"My goal is to work with Rotary, so that we can go throughout the world and make it a little bit gentler, and a little bit kinder Đ make it a world that, maybe when we leave, is a little bit better than when we came," he explains

The cooperative relationship has since led to an RI World Community Service Project that has changed the lives of disabled people — and Rotarians — around the world. But it really began as little more than an afterthought for Behring, who had been involved in various humanitarian projects for years. When he first brought wheelchairs to Romania in 1999, it was simply to fill extra cargo space on a jet stocked with donated canned food. But when he personally delivered the chairs to a rehabilitation hospital, he witnessed what it means to be immobilized by disabilities in a developing nation — and wheelchairs immediately became his priority.

"I found out that in Third World countries, people who are immobile are discarded," Behring told Rotarians during a panel dis-

cussion in San Antonio during the 2001 RI Convention. "They have no life. They have no hope. They have no future. They are put in the back of a little hut and given their meal a day, and for all purposes, people just kind of wish they would fade away or die." In Romania, and on subsequent trips to Africa and Vietnam, Behring saw that restoring mobility improves a person's life almost instantly. With physical independence comes a renewed sense of personal pride.

As Behring coordinated more donations, he learned of the overnairs worldwide. The World Health Or-

ganization estimated in 1999 that at least 25 million people needed wheelchairs, but more recent studies indicate the number may be as high as 130 million. In June 2000, Behring pledged U.S. \$15 million to launch the California-based Wheelchair Foundation. He also proposed a lofty goal: Provide one million wheelchairs by 2005.

A seasoned businessman, Behring did not enter the venture alone. In the months before the launch, he assembled a board of advisers from around the world. The panel includes RI President Richard D. King and 2000-01 RI President Frank Devlyn. Devlyn's involvement eventually led to donations of chairs to every state in Mexico, as well as to 18 other Latin American countries. That turned out to be the first step toward creating a working relationship

approved by the RI Board of Directors, one that continues to gain momentum.

A look at the numbers quickly shows why the relationship between the Wheelchair Foundation and

Rotary International shows so much potential. It's simply good business. "Rotary clubs already were raising money to send wheelchairs to different parts of the world, but they were paying extremely high rates," explains Chris Lewis, fundraising director for the Wheelchair Foundation. Heavy-duty wheelchairs suitable for the rough conditions of developing countries cost about U.S. \$375, plus shipping. However, by dealing directly with manufacturers and shipping only in quantities of 240 or more, the Wheelchair Foundation pares down the cost to about U.S. \$150 per wheelchair. Says Behring: "There will be the days that you can lift that child who has never moved or that adult who is not able to get around and put them into a wheelchair. Give them that hope. Give them a little future. If you do that, you will know you have achieved something."



Rotarian Grant, who has helped deliver chairs to Mexico and Central America, knows that feeling well. On a recent trip to Honduras, he hauled chairs up rugged footpaths to an isolated mountain town where more than 40 people with disabilities were waiting for their lives to change. Just as Behring discovered halfway around the world in Romania, the effort, however arduous, is more than compensated by the impact when the wheelchairs are received.

"You wonder whose life is being changed more," Grant says, "the person receiving the wheelchair, or the person who's down on their knees adjusting the footrest."





Often the appropriate people to represent the club with respect to each key function are club committee chairpersons. It is also critical that the club secretary and club treasurer attend. Before accepting office, club presidentselect and club secretaries should be required by their respective clubs to pledge themselves to attend the district æsembly.





Kona Community Hospital Brings Technology to Treat Kidney Stones

Kona Community Hospital, with \$30,000 in assistance from the Kona Rotary Club, recently purchased a \$400,000 mobile lithotripter, enabling the treatment of patients' kidney stones locally. Previously it was necessary to travel to Honolulu for this treatment. The technology, called lithotripsy is the first line of treatment for kidney stones. "This is a wonderful machine", said Dr. Jon Lattimer, Urologist with Kona Community Hospital.

"It is the most modern non-invasive kidney stone m achine in the state. This joint pro- able to go home the same day ject should be a model for cooperative ventures in the future. We are very thankful for the community effort that made it possible." Lattimer said. The first patients were treated today. The new Storz Modu-

lith SLX Transportable Lithotrip-

ter uses "extra corporeal shock wave lithotripsy" (ESWL) for the treatment of kidney stones. Surgical intervention is eliminated and discomfort is minimized. The location and depth of the kidney stones are calculated using imaging technology. Once pin pointed, the kidney stones are pulverized by the safe, yet powerful shock waves produced by the lithotripter. After treatment these small fragments can be passed easily. The procedure is complete within an hour.

Typically, patients are and resume normal daily activities in 24 hours.

Until recently, lithotripsy machines, which require a state-approved certificate of need, were limited to Honolulu. A cooperative agreement between Kona Community Hospital, Hilo Medical Center and Community North Hawaii Hospital brings the technology to the Big Island. Currently, the mobile l ithotripter is located at KCH. The machine will be shared between these three Big Island medical facilities.

Bringing lithotripsy to the hospital is another step in the hospital's dedication to provide services locally. "Over the last year we have increased the services and technology available in our area. Lithotripsy is a high tech program that is a great convenience for our patients. It's a perfect example of KCH and the community working together to meet the health care needs of West Hawaii," said Rotarian Ira F. "Lynn" Walton, III, CEO of Kona Community Hospital.







Our GSE team made a super presentation at the conference and we had a chance to meet the incoming Team Leader and several members who are scheduled to visit Hawaii later this month. You will be delighted with this contingent from District 3360, Chiang Mai, Thailand. We hope each of you have a chance to host and get to know our Thai friends. We were given guided tours of the sights around Phitsanulok and Sukothai. We were then driven to Uttradit, the home province of DG Nid. Once again, we were given guided tours in private cars and shown the

sights and highlights of this region. Then on to Chiang Mai with stops along the way to meet more Rotarians and eat, drink and celebrate our friendship.

We ran into our GSE team at several meetings along the way and were very proud of their enthusiastic emersion into the Thai culture. They seemed to thrive on the cuisine and fellowship. Our Thai friends were eager to share their culture in every aspect and our team felt right at home.

Their club presentation included short bios and overviews of Hawaiian history, culture, business and demographics. They chanted, danced the hula and concluded with Aloha Oe. They were a hit everywhere they went ... and made us proud. Check out their website at

We met with the coordinating director, Dr. Pattariya Jarutat, from the Sirindhorn National Medical Rehabilitation Center to find that they only received three c ontainers (about 750 chairs) to date and were reluctant to allow us to distribute chairs to the Chaing Mai Rotary District 3360 from that shipment. We were able to assure them that we (District 5000) have purchased a full container of 240 wheelchairs and in conjunction with District 3360, would like this container sent to the Northern get the container. 

Education and public outreach have been the mainstay of island extension programs in the effective transfer of relevant environmental information and technology. A high priority for Hawaii Sea

Grant Extension Service has been to work with other partners, public and private, to implement programs addressing issues such as environmental health and sustainable development. Hawai'i Sea Grant Exten-

sion Service continues on-going programs in educator training, curriculum development and dissemination, and community outreach.

In West Hawaii, there is an understanding and commitment to establish sustainable marine and coastal resource management along the Kona Coast through programs such as *ReefWatchers*,

Rotary Youth Exchange presents tremendous opportunities for fun and growth – not only to the youth participating in the exchanges but also to the HOST families who share their homes with these wonderful young people. We always have difficulty recruiting families to host exchange students, but those families that do agree to participate are invariably glad that they did so. We need to find some families in our community that are willing to benefit from this experience.

A town like Kona, which has a higher

than average cost of living and is spread out over a large area without public transportation presents unusual difficulties to host families. For that reason, our club provides host families with a sizable stipend of \$200 per month (twice that recommended by Rotary International) to ease the burden of the extra transportation and living costs. This will probably not cover all the expenses of having an extra teenager in your home, but it definitely makes it easier.



Rotary leaders meet with mainland China officials, Rotarians

Rotary International President Richard D. King led a delegation of top volunteer leaders of Rotary on a successful mission to the People's Republic of China on 26-30 March. Hosted by China's Vice Minister for Civil Affairs Li Baoku, the delegation traveled to the mainland to see the status and progress of the proposed legislation that will allow NGOs such as RI to exist in China and to explore opportunities for Rotary to expand its humanitarian programs in the country.

"We were briefed that this piece of legislation has already been put out in the field for discussion and will shortly be brought before the National People's Congress, China's parliament," said RI General Secretary Ed Futa, who was part of the

delegation. "Our visit demonstrates to the Chinese government and officials that we are serious with our China initiative; that we have a consistent goal; and that China is high on our priority list."

The delegation also included RI Director Keith Barnard-Jones, Past RI Directors Dan Mooers and Robert A. Coultas, Membership Development Executive Steering Committee Chairman Kenneth R. Boyd, Past District Governor Jon Grant, and Rotarian Christopher Bramsen, Denmark's ambassador to Spain.

Formerly his country's ambassador to China, Bramsen

was instrumental in arranging the historic November 2000 visit by a delegation of senior Rotary leaders to mainland China, led by then RI President Frank J. Devlyn. Bramsen continues to play a critical role in RI's contacts with China.

Vice Minister Li told the delegation that he was impressed with the work of the provisional clubs in China, especially with the Gift of Life program that is providing a new lease on life for Chinese children with heart ailments. The minister encouraged Rotary to work with the Chinese government in providing healthcare, education, and other services to underprivileged children, seniors, and the disabled.

President King extended an invitation to Li and other government representatives to visit RI World

Headquarters and U.S. Rotary clubs to gain a broader perspective on the activities and grassroots structure of Rotary.

In addition to visiting with members of the provisional Rotary clubs of Beijing and Shanghai, the Rotary delegation met with the beneficiaries of the Gift of Life program and their parents and delivered 200 wheelchairs, donated through a project cosponsored by Rotary clubs and the Wheelchair Foundation, to a city near Shanghai.







Club Assembly: Youth Exchange

Polio partners report on success, obstacles in path to eradication

The Global Polio Eradication Initiative, led by Rotary International, the World Health Organization, UNICEF, and the CEF, said security and access issues in many countries con-U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), reports that 2001 saw some powerful strides in polio eradication with a record 575 million children under the age of 5 vaccinated in 94 countries.

To date, 537 polio cases had been reported last year worldwide—down from 2,979 in 2000—though that figure may in-

crease slightly. The number of polio-endemic countries also dropped from 20 in 2000 to 10 in 2001. This represents a greater than 99.8 percent reduction since 1988, when polio paralyzed more than 350,000 children in 125 countries.

Synchronized National Immunization Days in West Africa and Central Africa contributed greatly to this success. Two rounds of immunization campaigns in Afghanistan and Pakistan in September and November reached 35 million children.

"We have the polio virus on the run," said Dr. Steven Cochi, director of the CDC's global immunization division.

Despite the progress made, Global Polio Eradication Technical Consultative Group (TCG), which just completed its annual review of the initiative earlier this month, warned of two obstacles that jeopardize the success of the entire effort: armed conflicts, which prevent access to children in remote areas during immunization campaigns, and a US\$275 million funding gap.

Dr. Marie-Otelia Costales, senior health advisor, UNItinue to pose problems for immunization workers.

The TCG found that the greatest threat to the eradication initiative is to close the \$275 million funding gap for the initiative, which dropped from \$400 million in the past year, thanks to contributions from Canada, the United States, Japan, the Netherlands, and the United Kingdom, among others.

> RI's new campaign, Fulfilling Our Promise: Eradicate Polio, aimed at raising \$80 million to help fill that gap, will be officially launched in June at RI's 93rd annual Convention in Barcelona, Spain.

"If we raise this money now, we will be saving all of humankind from this disease for all Rotary International time, and that's priceless," said Foundation Trustee Chairman Luis Vicente Giay.

> At a 16 April press conference at the Press Club in Washington, D.C., USA, representatives of the partner organizations leading the Global Polio Eradication Initiative reiterated that countries should not falter in their will to continue at tacking the disease.

Dr. John Sever, RI PolioPlus Committee, said at the briefing that Rotary will work together with the initiative to "do everything in our power to make sure nothing derails this effort."



If you are ready for the challenge and the rewards of living in another land as an exchange student, then you are ready to discover new worlds through Rotary's Youth Exchange program.

Each year, local Rotary disticts and clubs worldwide arrange thousands of international Youth Exchanges for high school-aged students. A primary goal of the program is to foster world understanding by way of intercultural exchange.

There are two principal types of exchanges: **Long-term exchanges** usually last for an ac ademic year, during which the student lives with more than one family and attends school in the host country.

Short-term exchanges vary from several days to several weeks. They often take place when school is not in session and usually do not include an academic program. Short-term exchanges usually involve a stay with a host family, but they can also be organized as international youth camps, which bring together students from many different countries.

Older students, ages 18-25, may participate in a **New Generations Exchange**. These exchanges are from three-to-six weeks in duration and may be organized for individuals or groups.

Student Selection

It is standard practice for local Rotary districts and clubs to screen youth interested in



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What is Group Study Exchange (GSE) ?

Goals and objectives

The Group Study Exchange (GSE) program is a unique cultural and vocational exchange opportunity for young business and professional men and women in their initial years of professional life.

The program is designed to develop professional and leadership skills among young people to better prepare them to address the needs of their communities and an increasingly global workplace. Group Study Exchange participants follow an extensive and rigorous program of international travel and participatory activities involving:

Vocational activities, which provide opportunities to observe vocations as practiced in another country, while impacting their longterm careers through participation in an organized program of study, discussion and vocational visits, thereby allowing for a reciprocal exchange of ideas in their respective fields, which ultimately will benefit all communities involved;

Cultural experiences, which allow participants to study another country, its people and institutions through experiences in an organized and meaningful host program, and to promote an appreciation of cultural diversity worldwide;

Fellowship opportunities, which encourage team members and hosts to meet, communicate and live with each other in a spirit of fellowship and goodwill; to consider each other's problems, aspirations and community concerns; and to foster lasting friendships and international understanding; and Rotarian involvement, which offers Rotarians specific, practical and meaningful opportunities for International Service by providing young, formative professionals an experienced perspective of their vocation in another country and culture. Furthermore, to offer Rotarians the opportunity to participate in the process of sending, receiving and sharing educational experiences of study teams that will enhance the worldwide mission of Rotary.

What is Group Study Exchange all about?

Depending on your point of view, life experiences, philosophy, etc., the an-

swer to this question could be rather obvious, or it could seem more vague. To be sure, it is many things to many people. Its purpose can be more or less clearly stated, but its effect on, or its value to, an individual is determined by the participant. For most of those who take part, however, the experience is a life-altering one.

Over the past 50 years, knowledge of other cultures has increased at a rapid pace, and perhaps we are more knowledgeable and open-minded than previous generations. But no nation or culture is immune to misconceptions and prejudices, nor to the debilitating and sometimes tragic consequences that often result. And maybe now more than before, as the world grows ever smaller, do we need to increase our knowledge about people from other countries.

Likewise, obviously, we need to share our own cultures. But a Group Study Exchange is much more than simply comparing notes on religion, politics, vocations, recreation, philosophy, etc. It is a tool to help us raise ourselves and the world community to a higher level of international understanding, goodwill and friendly relations. From its beginning in 1965, this unique program has been a success. It has provided inspiring vocational, educational and cultural experiences for professional men and women. With good planning, goal-driven design and active participation of dedicated Rotarians, a GSE can be an exceptional educational experience for both the visiting GSE team and the local Rotarians. Moreover, a GSE can serve as an excellent tool for fulfilling a district's International Service goals by integrating it with other Foundation programs or Rotary International Areas of Emphasis.

A renewed commitment to creativity and quality

In recent years, districts have explored many innovative ideas regarding the GSE program. The Trustees recognized this desire for innovation and flexibility as an opportunity for the GSE program to achieve its full potential. Furthermore, with the continual growth in GSE participation, the Trustees determined that quality implementation of the GSE program is vital in order to

support the integrity of both the program and the Foundation.

As a measure to support this need for

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creativity and quality, the Trustees recently completed a comprehensive review of the GSE program. With the help of many experienced Rotarians, program alumni and external consultants, the Trustees have made a number of dynamic program changes. Districts are encouraged to view these recent decisions as "new exchange opportunities" for those participating in the GSE program. The limits of GSE are bound only by the limits of your district's imagination.

The Rotary Foundation pays for . . .

• the least expensive transportation for each team's travel from a common point of departure within (or nearest to) the sending district to a point of entry within (or nearest to) the host district and return between the same two points.

 additional costs which may result from an unavoidable cancellation of tickets for team member(s) or team leader unable to accompany the team and the subsequent reissuing of tickets for alternate team member(s) or alternate team leader.



International Service: The Philippines Safe Water Project

Information Provided by Jerry Coiner, International Service Chair

The International Service Committee of the Rotary Club of Kona has elected to support a project developed by the Rotary Club of Honolulu Sunrise. The project would install a small-scale water purification facility in a slum area of Metro Manila. This unit would be sited at a clinic or school to provide free access to pure water to patients and young children, who are most in need of it and are at greatest risk from exposure to contaminated drinking water.

The Rotary Club of Makati (a part of Metro Manila) will provide local implementation support to the project. The total project cost is ~\$10,000. Honolulu Sunrise received commitments for \$8,000 from various sources, including Honolulu SunriseThe water purification unit that will be supplied to Manilla has already been in India (4 units), Western Samoa (4 units at the National

Hospital), Samoa, and is currently being shipped for installation in Cambodia. Will is going to forward additional information on the purification unit before the IS Committee meets next week.

Project Descriptoin:

Rotary Foundation selected as recipient of Gates Award for Global Health

The Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation on Monday [20 May] announced its selection of The Rotary Foundation of RI as the recipient of the 2002 Gates Award for Global Health. The US\$1 million award recognizes Rotary's leadership and impact in the field of public health, most notably its efforts to eradicate polio by 2005.

The Gates Foundation commended Rotary for contributing more than \$462 million toward polio eradication and mobilizing more than one million Rotarians to help immunize more than two billion children against polio in 122 countries. It also lauded Rotary for its health and welfare projects around the world, including a revolving loan program to help women in Uganda break the link between AIDS and chronic poverty, a project to provide free tuberculosis screening and treatment for children in the Philippines, and a major educational campaign to reduce the incidence of parasitic disease that reached more than 2.4 million children with more than 350,000 being treated for parasites.

"The Rotary Foundation is truly deserving of recognition for its exemplary achievements in the field of global health," said Bill Gates Sr., co-chair and chief executive officer of the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation. "I've seen Rotary volunteers in action and they do tremendous work. We should never take for granted the generosity and hard work of people in communities everywhere who volunteer their time and resources to make a difference in the lives of children and families in both developing and developed nations."

Gates Sr. will present the award to Luis V. Giay, chairman of The Rotary Foundation Trustees, during the annual conference of the Global Health Council in Washington, D.C., on 30 May.

"We thank the Gates Foundation for recognizing

the important role that Rotary plays in the effort to improve the health of men, women, and children worldwide," Giay said. "Rotary receives this award with great humility, but we are so proud that this honor recognizes the critical role civil society plays in the fight to give people in developing nations access to effective immunizations and health care. We also believe that the award will help raise awareness of the crucial need to eradicate polio now, when we have the opportunity."

The Gates Award for Global Health annually recognizes an organization that has made a major, lasting contribution to the field of global health. Criteria for recipients include extraordinary contributions toward progress in the knowledge and practice of health in low-income societies; demonstrated leadership; an established record of achievement; innovation in program design; organizational capacity; collaboration with others; evidence that contributions have been adopted across geographic and organizational boundaries; and substantial impact on health around the world.

The first Gates Award went last year to the Centre for Health and Population Research in Dhaka, Bangladesh. The Centre pioneered the discovery and development of oral rehydration solution, which today saves the lives of 2.5 million children every year.

Based in Seattle, Washington, the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation is dedicated to improving people's lives by sharing advances in health and learning with the global community. It has an endowment of \$23 billion.

The Global Health Council, which administers the award process, was established in 1972 to identify priority world health problems and to report on them to governments, the media, and nonprofit organizations.



District 5000 Conference

About 500 Hawaii Rotarians and their spouses and guests enjoyed a great annual District 5000 Conference at the Hilton Waikoloa this past weekend. The conference was highlighted by a group of inspirational speakers including Past Rotary International President Cliff Dochterman, who was the personal representative of current RI President Rick King and presented three major speeches over the weekend - without repeating one of his rapid-fire and very funny jokes! - and Capt. Gerald Coffee, who eloquently described his experiences as a POW in Vietnam for seven years and how his pride in being an American pulled him through those difficulties.

Other great presentations came from Dr. Jon Grant, the Rotarian most responsible for the partnership between Rotary and the Wheelchair Foundation, who presented a great inspirational video about the work of the wheelchair foundation, and Past District Governor (in California), Dr. Joe Serra, who showed spectacular slides eloquently describing the successes of RI's Polio Plus project and showing aspects of his own personal involvement in re-habilitating polio victims in Malawi and elsewhere.

Rotary Youth Exchange, headed by our own Mike Gardner, and the Group Study Exchange teams (the one that went from Hawaii to Thailand and the team we met last week that came here from Thailand) also made great presentations to the

Conference. These programs show some of the best aspects of our great international organization!

A large part of the plenary sessions at the conference were taken up with presentations of awards for achievements during this past Rotary year. The Rotary Club of Kona did VERY well in this regard! Awards are given for each size group (small (<40), medium (41-69) and large (>70)), giving Kona a slight

advantage as one of the smaller of the "large" clubs. In many ways, however, it is difficult to compete with really large clubs such as the Rotary Club of Honolulu, with almost 400 members, but we did well in several categories.

In the avenue of service awards, the Rotary Club of Kona was judged the best large club in the district in Community Service! Congrats to Kathy Damon and her very active team!

We were also second for large clubs in Club Service, for which we all owe thanks to Bev Fraser and her very large and active team!

One especially important aspect of of Club Service this year has been Membership, because RI President Rick King has made the "Global Quest" to increase membership a major cornerstone of his

program. Under the inspired leadership of our Membership Chair, Tina Clothier, the Kona Club won the large club Dudley Pratt award for the largest net gain in membership during 2001-2002! This is truly phenomenal since we lost an unusually large number of members (eleven) this year. We also came in second, to Honolulu, in gross number of new members for the year. Thanks to Tina and her team for all the hard work recruiting new members!



20 Reasons to become a Rotarian



My Colleagues in Service:

Rotary develops character and brings out the best of the human spirit. It teaches people ethics, humanity, cultural awareness, people skills and the desire and ability to serve others. Rotary creates a more positive environment for promoting world understanding and peace.

Rotary always benefits two people. The child who is sick, who is hungry, who is thirsty, who has no

clothes. No shelter, no education, no future, no hope . . . that child is the beneficiary of Rotary's outreach. That child is Rotary's business.

But another benefit comes to the Rotarian — the one actually providing the service. The Rotarian grows and fulfills the real reason for his or her existence, which is to serve others. The Rotarian becomes an emotionally and spiritually healthier person, a better professional, a better father or mother, a better citizen, a better human being.

Yet there are millions of men and women around the world who are Rotarians at heart but who have never joined because of one simple reason — they haven't been asked. We must ask them now! Ever since the tragedy of 11 September, there is an urgency to our quest. There is a greater need for Rotarians and Rotary clubs than ever before. One night I sat pondering at my desk in my den, wondering why I was a Rotarian. I came up with 20 answers to the question: Why join Rotary? They are:

1. Friendship: In an increasingly complex world, Rotary provides one of the most basic human needs; the need for friends and fellowship.

2. Business Development: Rotary consists of a cross section of every business community.

3. Personal Growth and Development: Membership in Rotary continues one's growth in human relations and personal development.

4. Leadership Development: Rotary is an organization of leaders and successful people. Serving in Rotary positions is like a college education in leadership.

5. Citizenship in the Community: The average Rotary club consists of the most active citizens of any community.

6. Continuing Education: Each week at Rotary there is a program designed to keep one informed as to what is going on in the community, nation and world.

7. Fun: Rotary provides fellowship, social activities and fun in service.

8. Public Speaking Skills: Rotary develops confidence and skill in public communication.

9. Citizenship in the World: There are few places that do not have a Rotary club, which results in instant friends around the world.

10. Assistance when Traveling: Rotarians who travel can quickly find a doctor, lawyer, hotel, dentist, etc., through Rotary's network.

11. Entertainment: Rotary offers conferences, conventions, assemblies and institutes that provide entertainment in addition to Rotary information, education and service.

12. The Development of Social Skills: Every week, members have an opportunity to develop their people skills through Rotary's meetings, service activities and social functions.

13. Family Programs: Rotary provides one of the world's largest Youth Exchange programs; programs for high-school and college-age students, opportunities for spouses, and activities to assist family members in the development of values.

14. Vocational Skills: Every Rotarian is expected to contribute to the development of his or her vocation.

15. The Development of Ethics: Rotarians practice The 4-Way Test, which governs one's ethical standards. Rotarians are expected to be ethical in business and personal relationships.

16. Cultural Awareness: Virtually every country, culture, religion, race, creed, political persuasion, language, color and ethnic identity is found in Rotary.







History of Father's Day (a belated Happy Father's Day) Received Anonymously via Email

Sonora Dodd, of Washington, first had the idea of a "father's day." She thought of the idea for Father's Day while listening to a Mother's Day sermon in 1909.

Sonora wanted a special day to honor her father, William Smart. Smart, who was a Civil War veteran, was widowed when his wife died while giving birth to their sixth child. Mr. Smart was left to raise the newborn and his other five children by himself on a rural farm in eastern Washington state.

After Sonora became an adult she

that made all the parental sacrifices and was, in the eyes of his daughter, a courageous, selfless, and loving man. Sonora's father was born in June, so she chose to hold the first Father's Day celebration in Spokane, Washington on the 19th of June, 1910.

President Calvin Coolidge, in 1924, supported the idea of a national Father's Day. Then in 1966 President Lyndon Johnson signed a presidential proclamation declaring the 3rd Sunday of June as Father's Day.



U.S. agricultural scientist is winner of 2002 RAWUP

Dr. Norman E. Borlaug — widely known as father of the Green Revolution for his role in the development of "miracle wheat" — is the winner of the 2002 Rotary Award for World Understanding and Peace (RAWUP).

He will receive the prestigious honor, given annually to a non-Rotarian or organization for outstanding humanitarian service, at the RI Convention in Barcelona. Raised on a farm in Iowa, USA, Borlaug earned a doctorate in plant pathology from the University of Minnesota. From 1944 to 1960, he led a team of Rockefeller Foundationsupported researchers in Mexico in developing high-yield, disease-resistant strains of wheat, thereby transforming agriculture and averting famine in many parts of the world. In the 1960's and 1970's, he directed the International Maize and Wheat Improvement Center in Mexico and trained young scientists from around the world.

In 1970, Borlaug was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize for his efforts to end world hunger. In his acceptance speech, he hailed agricultural science's potential to provide,

by the century's end, food for all, which he called "a moral right." In a Nobel anniversary speech in 2000, Borlaug lamented that population growth and unalleviated poverty had "eaten up" many of the Green Revolution's gains. He argued forcefully that the world could still feed 10 billion people, provided farmers are permitted to use new technology.

Now 87, Borlaug remains active. He heads the Sasakawa Africa Association, which focuses on preventing malnutrition in Africa. He founded and chairs the World Food Prize Council, which recognizes achievements in improving the world's food supply. A professor at Texas A&M University, he also lectures worldwide.

The Rotary award comes with a US\$100,000 Rotary Foundation grant, which Borlaug has designated for several educational projects connected to his work in Iowa and Mexico. Rotarians in Des Moines, Iowa, nominated him for the award.
