Hokuli'a Update

Construction of the much-needed Mamalahoa Bypass Road is anticipated to begin in April. Final purchase agreements have been sent to property owners for Hokuli`a to exercise the option to purchase the right-of-way for the highway and all EIS and SMA approvals have been obtained. Per County requirements, the second portion of the Bypass road from Haleki'i Street to Napo'opo'o is to be completed no later than January 2005.

The Bypass Road will help relieve the bumper-to-bumper gridlock now faced by commuters traveling along the Mamalahoa Highway north and south during the morning drive and pau hana periods, and the design of the road will also allow for biking and jogging along the

The need for a bypass road has been recognized for nearly 30 years. The State Department of Transportation (SDOT) did a comprehensive study in 1977. The study included an environmental impact statement and addressed several alternative routes. However, a lack of funding prevented its construction and the project was not carried forward. Consequently, it was not provided with further funding and was placed low on the priority list of SDOT highway projects.

Why I am a Rotarian

Because I did not have any faith in Rotary at all, I used to "tease" Rotarians. I never believed that Rotary was really a service club, but a mere luncheon club.

I used to "tease" Rotarians, especially the one who happened to be a medical doctor in the pharmaceuticals manufacturing plant where I worked as Managing Director.

I did not understand, then, why he should be so excited before noon every Thursday, just because he was about to attend his Rotary club luncheon meeting.

I did not understand why this Rotarian doctor so very often did not charge his patients when he knew that they came from the rural areas of Thailand and had hardly enough money for their transport down to Bangkok. They brought bananas and mangoes from their farms and fields to pay for the medical bills.

I did not have the answers even after his death! I was not really interested in Rotary anyway! But, as fate would have it, I was "drawn" into Rotary by an elderly gentleman who approached my father in 1958 and invited my father to help him to form a new Rotary club, the second club in Thailand, which was to be born on 14 May 1958.

My father, like me, was not at all interested in Rotary; however, out of respect for his friend, he "forced" me to help that elderly gentleman, who I later on learned was a charter member of the Rotary Club of Bangkok, founded in 1930, and who was to become the charter president of the second club in the country, the Rotary Club of Dhonburi.

I can still remember very well his quotation from George Bernard Shaw: "Life is not a 'brief' candle. It is a splendid torch that I want to make burn as brightly as possible before handing it on to future generations."

He had indeed handed on to me a splendid torch that was to change my life completely, from being a very selfish man, a man who minded only his own business, who had never had the idea that giving is grace, that not giving is disgrace, a man without

thoughtfulness of and helpfulness to others, Being a Rotarian changed me into a responsible citizen, a Rotarian and a politician with a vision and a mission who plans every deed with the thought of giving as much joy to others as possible.

He who shared Rotary with me back in 1958 exists no longer. But his wisdom and his belief that Rotary was good and did good will always be a guiding torch, whatever I do. I, too, want to make this torch burn as brightly as possible before I hand it on

to future generations.

Biography

Bhichai Rattakul was educated in Bangkok and Hong Kong and received an Honorary Doctorate Degree in Political Science from the University of Ramkhamhaeng University in Bangkok and Kensington University in California.

A Member of Parliament for nine terms since 1969 and Leader of the Democrat Party, he has served his country as Foreign Minister, Deputy Prime Minister, Speaker of the House of Representatives and President of the Parliament. He has also led many Thai delegations to the United Nations.

Bhichai Rattakul is Honorary Vice President of the Thai Scout Council. He has also served as Chairman of the Anti Corruption Commission, Anti Drugs Commission, National Audit Commission and the 13th Asian Games Organizing committee.

He has been decorated with Special Class Honor from the King of Thailand and honors from the Emperor of Japan, Presidents of the Philippines, Korea, Austria, and Nicaragua.He was also awarded the highest International Olympic Award and the Asian Olympic Award by the International Olympics Committee.

Bhichai Rattakul joined the Rotary Club of Dhonburi in Bangkok as a charter member in 1958 and has served Rotary International as district governor, international assembly group discussion leader, committee member and chairman, trustee of the Rotary Foundation, director and chairman of the Executive Committee of Rotary International. He is the recipient of The Rotary Foundation's Distinguished Service Award and Citation for Meritorious Service for his support of its international humanitarian and educational programs. He will serve as president of Rotary International programs.

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Hokuli'a Update

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The Bypass Road will help relieve the bumper-to-bumper gridlock now faced by commuters traveling along the Mamalahoa Highway north and south during the morning drive and pau hana periods, and the design of the road will also allow for biking and jogging along the shoulder

The need for a bypass road has been recognized for nearly 30 years. The State Department of Transportation (SDOT) did a comprehensive study in 1977. The study included an environmental impact statement and addressed several alternative routes. However, a lack of funding prevented its construction and the project was not carried forward. Consequently, it was not provided with further funding and was placed low on the priority list of SDOT highway projects. The road alignment for the first study ran from about the intersection of Kamehameha III Road and Kuakini Highway, roughly following the old railroad alignment, south into Honaunau valley, and intersected again with the Hawaii Belt Road near the intersection of the Belt Highway and Pu`uhonua O Honaunau. Since then, traffic along the Mamalahoa Highway from Honalo south towards Captain Cook has become more and more congested. While this congestion is the worst during the morning and afternoon commuting hours, perhaps more importantly, safe and vital access to Kona Community Hospital and the Konawaena schools has been impeded.

The issue resurfaced in 1991, and Hokuli`a brought the idea to the community for their input. Working together, the developer and the County of Hawaii created conditions and a mechanism whereby the road would be built by the developer in conjunction with the development of Hokuli'a using private funds. The new road alignment was set after taking into consideration the property owners, topography, traffic capacities, existing business areas, land uses, overall regional circulation and important design aspects.

Hokuli'a was required to acquire the right-of-way needed for the road before any development on the project could occur, thus ensuring that all of the land needed was in place and ready when the proper time for construction was determined. The Bypass portion from Ali'i Drive to Haleki'i Street will be complete by the time the first home in the makai area is occupied.

The Mamalahoa Highway Bypass is one of the several assets to the community flowing from the development of Hokuli'a and the Hokuli'a Development team, along with the public access to Shoreline Park and the Haleki'i Street traffic light.

New RI president spells out

Rotary's mission in 2002-03

RI President Bhichai Rattakul took office on 1
July with a call to Rotarians to grow the organization
through a renewed commitment to the four Avenues of Service —
especially vocational service — and a return to the grassroots values that will empower clubs "to chart their own course, set their
own goals, and fulfill their own dreams."

"By going back to the basics, we respect the initiative and autonomy of Rotary clubs," he said. "While drawing strength from our vision of a world in which international understanding and peace replace the wilderness of wars and tensions, we will all listen intently to the heartbeat of Rotary, which is club service. I am convinced that active club service leads to vital clubs with active members, and it is this vitality and the practice of our ideals that will inspire the new generation to join and invest in Rotary." In keeping with the 2002-03 Rotary theme, "Sow the Seeds of Love," this year, Rotarians will devote their professional and business skills to rediscovering the timeless principles that enabled Paul Harris and co-founders to build a dynamic new movement based on the human desire to share and serve.

Three RI presidential conferences are planned for the 2002-03 Rotary year in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia, on 9-11 August 2002; Nairobi, Kenya, on 21-23 February 2003; and Panama City, Panama, on 20-22 March 2003. The meetings are based respec-



tively on the main themes of peace and conflict resolution and the Rotary Centers for International Studies; health and devel-

opment issues, including AIDS and polio; and vocational education and micro-enterprise projects.

Rattakul is the Thailand Goodwill Representative for International Cooperation. He was a member of the Thai parliament from 1969 until he retired in November 2000. During those years, he served as leader of the Democratic Party, foreign minister, deputy prime minister, speaker of the House of Repre-

sentatives, and president of the Parliament. He also served as chairman of several commissions and honorary vice-president of the Thai Scout Council. An accomplished diplomat, he has been awarded the highest decorations by King Bhumibol Adulyadej of Thailand, the emperor of Japan, and the presidents of the Philippines, Korea, Austria, and Nicaragua.

A charter member of the Rotary Club of Dhonburi, Bangkok, Thailand, since 1958, Rattakul has served RI as district governor, international assembly group discussion leader, member and chairman of numerous committees, trustee of the Rotary Foundation, director, and chairman of the Executive Committee of Rotary International. He is the recipient of The Rotary Foundation's Distinguished Service Award and Citation for Meritorious Service for his support of its international humanitarian and educational programs.

NGRATULATIONS PDG HAL DARCEY AND TEAM!

What a great year you have had, three new Rotary Clubs, Lahaina Sunrise, Diamond Head, Kalepa Sunrise, almost 600 new members and a retention rate over 91% are just a few of the outstanding accomplishments. Couple this with annual giving exceeding \$400,000, the many noteworthy service projects and a great district conference and you score a "winning year" in Rotary.

When I was notified on November 1, 2001 that I would take office on July 1, 2002, you can imagine the insecurity that that started to creep in. It didn't take long though and thanks to many including PDG Hal Darcey, PDG Linda Coble, PDG Dick Mosko, PDG Roy King, PDG Al Ficker and many others, that we were able to bridge the gap and are now well on our way. I appreciate all the encouragement and support that that have stepped up to the plate to help with District Committees, Assistant District Governors and the many special projects. We could never have gotten this far without your help.

The first challenge we were faced with this year was to implement the new District Leadership Plan (DLP). It all started with the appointment of a District Trainer, PDG Linda Coble. As a direct result of her efforts to create a "train-the-trainer" program, we now have a cadre of capable trainers on each island. This team is available to help with district training requirements ranging from The Rotary Foundation to Successful Service Projects. This

concept replaced the practice of using a traveling training team.

We are honored that so many of our Past District Governors have volunteered to chair the various committees called for under the new DLP. Their actions to organize these committees and to train their successor will ensure that we have continuity and a degree of standardization in our programs. This is necessary for any successful district to make its annual transition to a new leadership team. The role of the Assistant District Governors has been expanded. All 8 of our ADG's attended PETS in March alongside the club presidents they are responsible for. They have also attended other district leadership training and are now poised to assist their team of clubs in implementing their plans for the year.

RI President Bhichai Rattakul shook up the Rotary World when he announced his theme for the year "Sow the Seeds of Love" and his "bottom to top" leadership style. He has declared Rotary International will not send out any goals or new directives this Rotary year. Except that, Global Quest is a two-year project that started last year and will

continue through June 30, 2003. As your District Governor, I fully support President Bhichai's leadership style.

We can expect a great deal of emphasis this year on "fulfilling our promise" to eradicate Polio by 2005, Rotary's 100th anniversary. Because the verification process takes two years, Rotary International needs to complete its eradication efforts in the remaining 10 countries before June 30, 2003. We are 99% complete. This final push requires a lot of money and extra effort by every Rotarian world-



I am confident that each Rotarian in District 5000 will go the extra mile needed to insure completion of this important project. We are fortunate that PDG Hal Darcey has agreed to head the Polio Eradication Campaign (PEC) Committee. At Pre-PETS in January, all incoming District 5000 Presidents agreed to continue our goal of \$125 per-capita giving to the Rotary Foundation. Also at Pre-PETS we talked about my dream of having 1,000 people attend our District Conference in May 23-26, 2003. With over 2,400 Rotarians in the district and considering that most will bring their spouse/partner, we are talking about 25% of our membership attending.

We have listened to your suggestions and will hold the conference at the Waikiki Marriott (old Hawaiian Regent). The room rate is \$99. VIP Trans (Ayman) will provide free transfers to and from the airport and there is an hourly shuttle to the Ala Moana shopping center.

The hotel is working with us on some creative ways to keep the food cost down. We will hold the golf and tennis tournaments on Friday

afternoon before the conference starts on Saturday. We have a slate of great speakers and a fun filled program. Please do your part and sign up today. You can find a registration form on the district web site. By the way, we already have 270 registered.



Fulfilling Our Promise: Eradicate Polio

Rotarians are on the verge of ridding the world of polio. The number of polio cases has declined by 99 percent in the 16 years since Rotary International and The Rotary Foundation made polio eradication the highest "Fulfilling Our Promise: Eradicate Polio," will priority.

In this period, many of the PolioPlus challenges and obstacles in the path of the ultimate goal have been overcome through the pioneering work of PolioPlus. But because of the changed priorities following the terrible events of 11 September 2001, it is now clear that without a

special effort, governments, agencies, nongovernmental organizations, and the private sector will not be able to fill the US\$400 million funding gap that threatens to snuff Rotary's dream of a polio-free world.



last only through the 2002-03 Rotary year with the goal of raising \$80 million.

The funds raised through this campaign will multiply quickly because they will be matched or surpassed by funding from the World Bank, the Gates Foundation, and the United Nations Foundation.

In some cases, every dollar brought in by Rotary will become a contribution of up to five dollars that will go to governments, the World Health Organization, or UNICEF to buy and distribute vaccine.

An earnest young man diligently sweeps the floors of his father's company...The manager of a logging company rides an elephant through a dense forest...

Thailand's foreign minister meets with Khmer Rouge guerillas in the jungles of Cambodia...The Thai deputy prime minister addresses an audience of hundreds at a meeting of the UN Economic and Social Commission for Asia and the Pacific...

These are all snapshots from the life of one man: 2002-03 RI President Bhichai Rattakul of Thailand. His personal album reflects an incredible diversity of life experiences and unique journeys. During his 75 years, he has overcome amazing odds to rise from a clerk in a pharmaceutical manufacturing company to be-



come Thailand's deputy prime
minister - one of the country's
most influential leadership positions. Along the way, he has handled challenge and adversity with characteristic grace, humility, and diplomacy.

"Bhichai has the amazing ability to turn almost any obstacle into opportunity," says Past District Governor Xanxai Visitkul of the Rotary Club of Bangkok South, who has known Rattakul for 30 years. "He has a wealth of experience in both Rotary and politics. We are very excited and honored that he will

serve as the first RI president from Thailand."

Bhichai Rattakul, the fourth generation of Chinese immigrants, was born in Bangkok in 1926. His father was an officer in the Thai police force while his mother stayed at home to care for his eight brothers and sisters. At the age of nine, Rattakul traveled to Hong Kong to attend a private school, but his studies ended abruptly with the start of World War II.


Literacy and Numeracy

Combating illiteracy has been an emphasis of Rotary International since 1986 — and for good reason. UNESCO estimates that a quarter of the world's population is illiterate. Millions more are functionally illiterate, without the reading and writing skills necessary for everyday life. The United Nations has identified illiteracy as a major obstacle to economic, political and social development.

RI's literacy emphasis is intended to educate Rotarians about the problem, encourage clubs to sponsor and support literacy efforts, enlist the aid of Rotary Community Corps, Interact and Rotaract clubs, and to develop Rotary projects addressing a full

range of literacy issues, including primary and vocational education, teacher training and functional literacy.

A valuable resource, the hand-book *Rotary Promotes Literacy* (Publication No. 621), is available to assist Rotarians and others interested in learning about illiteracy and taking steps to attack this widespread problem. The handbook is designed for those interested in undertaking or supporting literacy efforts in their communities. It offers an overview and suggests ways to get involved, including examples of model Rotary projects and a wealth of Rotary and public resources.

matched, clubs will be divided into two categories: clubs with fewer than 50 members and clubs with 50 or more members, as of 1 July 2002. The top two clubs in each winning district — one from each category — will be designated as club

winners.

Winning clubs will be determined by the highest percentage net gain and will be identified by the district governor. Starting figures will be based on the 1 July 2002 semiannual reports received by RI World Headquarters by 30 September 2002. Final membership figures will be based on figures from the semiannual reports and new member report forms received by RI World Headquarters by 1 May 2003.

WORLDWIDE WINNERS

There will be three worldwide winners: one district and its two winning clubs — one with fewer than 50 members and the other with 50 or more members.

WHAT IS THE AWARD?

The 50 districts and 100 clubs will receive monetary awards to cover expenses for a community or international service project. These monies will be awarded to the winning districts and clubs upon receipt of the appropriate application. Monies will be disbursed in the name of a district or club only upon

submission of an application and appropriate documentation for use of the funds. Funds cannot be released in the name of an individual Rotarian or non-Rotarian. The awards are as follows:

World-winning district US\$4,000 49 districts US\$2,000 World-winning clubs US\$2,500 98 clubs US\$1,000

The world-winning district governor and two club presidents, along with their spouses (a maximum of six people), will have the following costs covered by RI for the International Convention in Brisbane, Australia: registration, hotel expenses for six nights, and the stipulated per diem. Travel and any additional expenses will be at no cost to RI.

Winners will be recognized at the convention and publicized in various RI publications and on the Web site.

Each district is encouraged to conduct a membership program and identify and recognize the club with the highest net membership gain as the District Global

American Flag of Flowers

The 2002 Floral Flag is 740 feet long and 390 feet wide and maintains the proper Flag dimensions as described in Executive Order #10834. This Flag is 6.65 acres and is the first Floral Flag to be planted with 5 pointed Stars comprised of White Larkspur. Each Star is 24 feet in diameter; each Stripe is 30 feet wide.

This Flag is estimated to contain more than 400.000 Larkspur plants with



- **11. Entertainment:** Rotary offers conferences, conventions, assemblies and institutes that provide entertainment in addition to Rotary information, education and service.
- **12.** The Development of Social Skills: Every week, members have an opportunity to develop their people skills through Rotary's meetings, service activities and social functions.
- **13. Family Programs:** Rotary provides one of the world's largest Youth Exchange programs, programs for high school and college-age students, opportunities for spouses, and activities to assist family members in the development of values
- **14. Vocational Skills:** Every Rotarian is expected to contribute to the development of his or her vocation.
- **15.** The Development of Ethics: Rotarians practice The 4-Way Test, which governs one's ethical standards. Rotarians are expected to be ethical in business and personal relationships
- **16.** Cultural Awareness: Virtually every country, culture, religion, race, creed, political persuasion, language, color and ethnic identity is

found in Rotary.

- **17. Prestige:** Rotarians are people who make decisions and influence policy.
- **18. Nice People:** Rotarians, above all, are nice people. They are important people who believe in the adage that while "it is nice to be important, it is more important to be nice."
- **19.** The Absence of "Official Creed": Rotary has no secret handshake, no secret policy, no official creed, no secret meetings or rituals. It is an open society of men and women who simply believe in helping others.
- **20.** The Opportunity to Serve: Rotary is a service club. Its business is mankind; its product is service. This is perhaps the best reason for becoming a Rotarian the chance to do something for somebody else while experiencing self-fulfillment in the process.

A Tribute to Stanley E. McCaffrey

[PP Rick Merschdorf recalls that Stanley McCaffrey "madeup" many times here at our Club — the following are excerpts of the article that was published in the Rotarian]

"I firmly believe that we in Rotary have the power to make a difference in bringing peace to the world. I believe that we, more than any other organization, have the potential to accomplish that goal. Let us dedicate ourselves to achieve that objective — World Understanding and Peace Through Rotary" - Stanley E. McCaffrey 1981-82 RI President.

Stan McCaffrey loved the internationality of Rotary. Stan considered peace and goodwill among the world's people to be a major mission and Rotary's destiny. During 1981-82, he emphasized the programs of The Rotary Foundation of RI, World Community Service, Youth Exchange, and Presidential Conferences of Goodwill as effective steps toward greater world understanding and peace.

Stan began his 54 years of Rotary service in the Rotary club of Berkeley, California. He served as club president

in 1954 and district governor in 1964-65. He was selected RI director for 1969-70 and was vice president in 1970-71. Following his presidency in 1981-82, Stan served for five years as a trustee of The Rotary Foundation and one year as trustees chairman. In recent years, he belonged to the Rotary clubs of Stockton an Moraga, California.,

Two years ago, Stan was diagnosed with Alzheimer's disease, which increasingly curtailed his activities. Nevertheless, he looked forward to the weekly meetings of the Moraga Rotary Club.

Last December, the club held "Stan McCaffrey Day", which honored him for his many years of dedication to higher education, Rotary International, the community and the thousands who benefited from his lifetime of service. The week before Stan's death on 3 March 2002, the Moraga Rotarians celebrated his 85th birthday. Stand responded, "I am so glad to be a Rotarian". The Rotary world can share those words. We are enriched because Stan McCaffrey truly was a real Rotarian.

Fulfilling Our Promise: Eradicate Polio

RI Website

Rotarians are on the verge of ridding the world of polio. The number of polio cases has declined by 99 percent in the 16 years since Rotary International and The Rotary Foundation made polio eradication the highest priority.

n this period, many of the challenges and obstacles in



the path of the ultimate goal have been overcome through the pioneering work of Polio-Plus. But because of the changed priorities following the 2001, it is now clear that without a special effort, governments, agencies, nongovernmental organizations,

and the private sector will not be able to fill the US\$400 million

funding gap that threatens to snuff Rotary's dream of a polio-free world.

The RI Board of Directors and the Foundation Trustees have unanimously resolved to introduce a **Rotary International** new campaign to raise additional

funds for PolioPlus. The campaign, "Fulfilling Our Promise: Eradicate Polio," will last only through the 2002-03 Rotary year with the goal of raising \$80 million.

The funds raised through this campaign will multiply terrible events of 11 September quickly because they will be matched or surpassed by funding from the World Bank, the Gates Foundation, and the United Nations Foundation. In some cases, every dollar brought in by Rotary will become a contribution of up to five dollars that will go to governments, the World Health Organization, or UNICEF to buy and distribute vaccine.

The group consists of 120 active volunteers who receive no compensation. Some of the goals of Andy's group are to have an instructional league (not just play), coaches get to coach and not worry about equipment, fundraisers or parents. The same for the umpires. There are clinics on coaching, rules, safety, and other topics so that as the children change teams and coaches there is a consistency in coaching and umpiring techniques.

The board of directors is set up to manage the "business" end of the organization. The group also has a "fair draft" so that every kid tries out, the teams are balanced which allows for close competition and the playing rule requires that every child start in at least 50% of the games.

They have several fund raisers each year and provide all the equipment (except gloves) for the players, umpires and coaches. Andy's enthusiasm for the sport and making it a special place of learning for each child is evident.

After some initial dormancy, UH Hilo's Mauna Kea Astronomy Education Center (MKAEC) Project has begun moving forward on the planning, design and implementation efforts for creating a world-class interpretive center at a swift pace. The center will be located on a 9.1-acre lot in the university's Research and Technology Park.

A team of researchers and interpretive planners commenced work on content development, and UHH Assistant Professor of Hawaiian Language Larry Kimura joined the project in January to cus of the center." oversee the development of Hawaiian content for the MKAEC. "We need to know more about the Hawaiian sanctity and the sanctity of astronomy," Kimura said. "Those two have to come together so that they can be complementary. Project Director George Jacob emphasized the significance of interpretive planning. "This workshop is a prelude to this journey of creative thinking that will eventually shape the educational fo-

with Bruna Lima, the exchange student that came to Hawaii from Brazil. Jay spent much of her time learning to speak Portuguese, which is now a fluent second language for her. (P.S. her other host families did speak English).

All of her host families had children, and so this "only child" now found out about life with siblings, and the fun that can be had. She attended a private Catholic school and had to wear uniforms and go to church every week — a little different from public school in Hawaii. At school the students didn't change classes, but rather the teachers changes classes.

Jay spoke of all the friends she made through-out Brazil and from around the world. There was even a "Hawaii Party", where they wore aloha prints and bikinis, played Brazilian music. There was even a going away party for her with ALL of her host families and so many of the friends she made—it was a party of many emotions, happy, sad, and great love.

Jay is experiencing a little culture shock now that she's back in Hawaii. Her iob now is to teach others about what she has learned. She has an immense collection of souvenirs, pictures and mementos. The young, nervous 16 year old Kona girl has returned a worldly, mature, and "in control" 17 year old young woman!

Every Month is Membership Month

[Editor's note — This article was intended to run during the month of August. However, we have had such a full bulletin that there was never enough room. August is officially Membership and Extension Month. Since this issue went to 8 pages and since this is a yearround project, it seemed appropriate to include it in this issue]

The *benefits* of Rotary membership include (and are not limited to!):

- A widened circle of friends and contacts;
- The opportunity to associate with a group with high standards or character and integrity; and
- The chance to participate in activities that positively impact the local community and communities in other countries.

Being a Rotarian requires a considerable commitment of time and resources. The responsibilities of membership include:

- Proposing qualified individuals for membership;
- Following the club's attendance requirements;
- Paying dues to Rotary International and the club; and,
- Participating in club activities, projects and functions.

Qualifications for membership:

- Potential members are men and women in good character who possess an excellent business or professional reputation; and,
- Individuals whose place of business or residence is located in the locality of the club or the surrounding area.

The Classification System:

It is designed to ensure that the membership of the Rotary Club reflects the diversity of the community. The classification system should be used as a guide, not as barrier.

- A member's classification covers the principal and recognized activity of the firm, company, or institution with which a member is connected, or a member's own principal and recognized business or professional activity.
- Clubs shall not elect a person to active membership from a classification if the club already has five or more members from that classification unless the club has more than 50 members. Members who are retired shall not be included in the total number of members from a classification. If a member changes classification, the club may continue the member's membership under the new classifications notwithstanding these limitations.

Types of Membership:

Rotary recognizes two types of membership: active members and honorary members.


- Active Members are classified in accordance with member's business or professional activity.
- Honorary Members have distinguished themselves by meritorious serviced in the furtherance of Rotary ideals; they cannot vote in

club elections, or be elected to club office, hold no classification, and pay no club dues or admission fees.

However, honorary members are invited to participate in all Rotary activities and functions notwithstanding these limitations.

There are three exchange students here. Joel, Vadim, and I. I really only keep in touch with Joel, he speaks English and is from Oregon. We have become good friends, but the rules are so strict here that we are not allowed to see each other. We do not live in the same area and will not be going to the same school. It is true we are here to learn Japanese and have our whole lives to keep in touch but it is nice to do things with friends once in awhile. Right now we email each other and stay positive during difficult times.

My host family is really nice and bought me some Kanji

workbooks to write and study in. So far so good. There are about 10,000 plus Kanji to learn so I learn about 5-10 every day. A nice social activity that I enjoyed was Shuji. Shuji is a Japanese art of writing with a paintbrush. Shuji is fun and I hope to take a course similar to it in school.

My language proficiency is to a minimum. My host family speaks English. There are times

in the day when they will ask me things in Japanese, but I plan to speak it more when school starts on Monday September 2nd. I do however try to learn one phrase a day and use it.

Like: Gochi so sama deshita, means thank you for this meal. =) [look sideways — this is a happy face]

My relationship with my host parents is good. I always keep my room clean and do the dishes after dinner. We clean house on the weekend. They are nice and take me out to lunch and show me different places. My relationship with my counselor, Michael Indigo is fine. I met him at the orientation and we talked about rules and regulations. I told him we have hosted an exchange student before so I know of these things. I suppose if I have any problems I will email him, but other than that I suppose I will see him the next time we meet.

The relationship with the Rotarians is friendly. They enjoyed my video and I try and make somewhat of a conversation with the broken Japanese I know. One of the Rotarians knew a little English and asked if I would like to


Go to the Ocean Dome because he was taking a couple of his students. So yesterday I met up with them at about 5 pm and we went to the Ocean Dome, which is the biggest indoor, fake ocean in the world. The two girls I went

with didn't know any English so I just used hand motions and my broken Japanese. I also got to go boogie boarding and swimming which I have been dying to do since I got here. It is hot just like Hawaii, and I am used to going to the beach every other day. We had a lot of fun despite the language barrier. Dr. Oshikawa also took us out to dinner afterwards, and tomorrow I will bring him a gift to show my appreciation. That is what you do here if someone does something nice for you, it can get a bit expensive if people are very giving.=)

I haven't gone to school yet, I start on September 2nd, and am hoping to meet a lot of people and make some friends. I have a friendship with one of the teachers, her name is Sensei Hoshie and she has been helping me find the uniform, and other

things. She has been really nice and is going to be my counselor in school because she can speak English and will be able to help me choose the classes I want.

The only problems that I have



Japan is really expensive. Another problem I encountered is the rules and regulations, I really didn't know it would be this strict. I guess in school you are not allowed to wear any jewelry, make up, nail polish, perfume etc...this is something that I will have to get used to . I am also confronted with new customs every day. How to bow, what to say, how to hold your tea cup etc...this is all new and will take some time getting used to.

The last thing I encountered was my host mother sometimes offends me by the things she says about Americans. I found a solution by just

laughing at it, that way it doesn't stay in my mind and make me mad. I find myself getting aggravated sometimes, but I read this article in the orientation booklet the Kona club gave me and it helped me understand culture shock.

The essay described all the symptoms I was going through and how it was normal for these reactions to occur. However I feel that soon as school starts I will be able to get out of the house more and make some friends to do things with

Oh by the way they do not have an Interact Club here. I am told that while students are in high school that they don't have

time to do fun things, they are always studying, I will look in to this however and will see when school starts.

I find it is neat that the school organizes a trip during the winter time for the students. We will be going for one week to Nagano, where they had the winter Olympics last year. I am excited about this and can't wait to play in the snow.

Coming from Hawaii this

will be a new experience for me!

So this is my monthly report, all is well, I am staying extra healthy with all this rice. =) Hope this report was okay, I don't really know what a good one is like but I tried my best to support my true feelings and what I am going through. Hope all is spectacular in Hawaii. I give my best

wishes to everyone back home. Thanks for everything and you'll hear from me in one month from now.

Polio Eradication Program Launched

Rotary Club of Kona President Barbara Bush

Rotary has launched a new, one-year campaign to raise US\$80 million for polio eradication. This campaign, called Fulfilling the Promise: Eradication Polio, is underway.

Rotary's 30,000+ clubs are being asked to provide cash and pledges (can pledge donations now and pay over 3-years), above and beyond their Annual Programs fund contributions (i.e.; \$125.00 Paul Harris – Rotary Foundation annual contribution) in order to help plug the \$275 million funding gap that threatens to derail Rotary's goal of eradication by 2005.

*Each Rotary Club is asked to set its own fundraising goal for the new campaign, and reach it through donations of cash, pledges (up to three years), and community fundraisers.

Of the \$1 Billion needed to complete eradication, \$725 million is pledged or projected. The remaining \$275 million is expected to come from governments, the private sector, and Rotary's \$80 million - part of which will be matched by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation and the World Bank. Rotary's \$80 million will be in addition to the nearly \$500 million Rotary has already committed to polio eradication by 2005.

Launched in 1995 to allow Rotarians to support supplemental needs of national immunization days and poliovirus surveillance, PolioPlus Partners raised more than \$33 million to support more than 270 projects in

more than 80 countries, ranging from providing vaccine carriers for Ghana to equipping polio laboratories in

Africa, Asia, and Eastern

Europe. The Polio

effort.

Rotary International Eradication Private Sector Initiative, a joint effort of The Rotary Foundation and the United Nations Foundation to seek major gifts from corporations, philanthropists, and foundations will continue through 2002. The private sector has contributed more than \$112 million to the

Polio Eradication Program Launched

Rotary has launched a new, one-year campaign to raise US\$80 million for polio eradication. This campaign, called *Fulfilling the Promise: Eradication Polio*, is underway.


Rotary's 30,000+ clubs are being asked to provide cash and pledges (can pledge donations now and pay over 3-years), above and beyond their Annual Programs fund contributions (i.e.; \$125.00 Paul Harris – Rotary Foundation annual contribution) in order to help plug the \$275 million funding gap that threatens to derail Rotary's goal of eradication by 2005.

*Each Rotary Club is asked to set its own fundraising goal for the new campaign, and reach it through donations of cash, pledges (up to three years), and community fundraisers.

Of the \$1 Billion needed to complete eradication, \$725 million is pledged or projected. The remaining \$275 million is expected to come from governments, the private sector, and Rotary's \$80 million – part of which will be matched by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation and the World Bank. Rotary's \$80 million will be in addition to the nearly \$500 million Rotary has already committed to polio eradication by 2005.

Rotary Membership, Why Join?

The **benefits** of Rotary membership include (and are not limited to!):

- A widened circle of friends and contacts;
- The opportunity to associate with a group with high standards or character and integrity; and
- The chance to participate in activities that positively impact the local community and communities in other countries.

Being a Rotarian requires a considerable commitment of time and resources. The *responsibilities* of membership include:

- Proposing qualified individuals for membership;
- Following the club's attendance requirements;
- Paying dues to Rotary International and the club; and,
- Participating in club activities, projects and functions.

Qualifications for membership:

- Potential members are men and women in good character who possess an excellent business or professional reputation; and,
- Individuals whose place of business or residence is located in the locality of the club or the surrounding area.

The Classification System:

It is designed to ensure that the membership of the Rotary Club reflects the diversity of the community. *The classification* system should be used as a guide, not as barrier.

- A member's classification covers the principal and recognized activity of the firm, company, or institution with which a member is connected, or a member's own principal and recognized business or professional activity.
- Clubs shall not elect a person to active membership from a classification if the club already has five or more members from that classification unless the club has more than 50 members. Members who are retired shall not be included in the total number of members from a classification. If a member changes classification, the club may continue the member's mem-

bership under the new classifications notwithstanding these limitations.

Types of Membership:

Rotary recognizes two types of membership: active members and honorary members.

- Active Members are classified in accordance with member's business or professional activity.
- Honorary Members have distinguished themselves by meritorious serviced in the furtherance of Rotary ideals; they cannot vote in club elections, or be elected to club office, hold no classification, and pay no club dues or admission fees.

However, honorary members are invited to participate in all Rotary activities and functions notwithstanding these limitations

- 5. Do not worry about situations beyond your control.
- 6. The tears happen. Endure, grieve, cherish your memories and move on. The only person

- 7. Surround yourself with what you love, whether it is family, pets, keepsakes, music, plants, hobbies, whatever. Your home is your refuge.
- 8. Cherish your health. If it is good, preserve it. If it is unstable, improve it. If it is beyond what you can improve, get help.
- 9. Don't take guilt trips. Shoulder only your own responsibilities. If you want to take a trip go to the mall, the next county, a foreign country, but not to guilt. God forgives and forgets and so should you.
- 10. Tell the people you love that you love them, at every opportunity. Remember, life is not measured by the number of breaths we take, but by the moments that take our breath away.

and made a short speech about myself. The other exchange student Joel showed slides of his paintings and Vadim from Russia recited poems. On September 19th all of my host families got together with some Rotary members and attended a boat party.

Places I have visited are: Aya, Nango, and Ebino. I went with my host family to Aya. Aya is famous for its crafts: pottery, weaving, glassware, and bamboo wear. A very beautiful place with many tall trees on the mountain tops and rice fields down below. My host family also took me to Ebino where I visited an active volcano, saw a crater lake, Kiroshima shrine, Onsen (which is pubic baths), and a beautiful waterfall.

A small story for you: when I was at the waterfall a snake that but I guess writing letters will have to do. slithered right in front of me, and of course I screamed and jumped because we all know snakes are non existent in Hawaii .

In Nango I had a chorus performance. It took one and a half hours by bus to get there but the scenery was incredible. The and eat. bus drove along the coast, on a windy cliff side but the ocean looked so beautiful.

Another activity I was involved in was the summer school festival. The festival was a week long. First our class made an exhibit on dinosaurs that took up the whole room, all the classes were to make an exhibit for the festival. Some looked like they took a lot of effort and others well...did not. Some of the themes were: soccer, spider man, and the 70's.

Another day was the sports festival which happened to fall on my birthday! I did the one hundred meter dash, participated in a folk dance, and cheered on the other kids as they competed. There were some interesting games, that I had never seen before. They have a huge tug o war competition too.

My contact with the other exchange students is really only through email. However Rotary decided that all three of us exchange students could meet up once a month. The three of us wanted to get together more often but right now that is not possible. I did see the both of them at a Rotary get together on Sep.27th.

My social activities are basically my classes in school and the chorus club I joined after school. School ends at 4 pm and from 4:15 to 7 pm we practice singing. We even practice for three hours on Sat. and Sun. So I am constantly busy all week.

Today I am going to get together

Homeroom class and we are going to go bowling and afterwards are having a barbecue. So I am looking forward to that.

Subjects I am taking in school are: Art, English, Music, Shodo (which is a Japanese art form of writing), P.E. (Judo), World History and Library (to study on my own). I decided not to take Math because they are very advanced and I only went up to a certain point in Math, and they have Japanese class but it is like a Shakespeare version of Japanese so it is incredibly hard.

Just sitting through World History is tough, I maybe understand a few words throughout the whole hour I am in class, however the teacher is really nice and happens to be my home room teacher as well.

My language proficiency is slowly progressing. My host family still speaks English to me. They say they it is because they want to train me so that when I got to my next host families I won't busy girl. I hope you have been getting my pictures and that be embarrassed, and I will know what to do. I might have said this in my last report. This is good and bad in a way because

will loose one and a half months of Japanese, but I am going to my next host family in 10 days.

Relationship with: Host family is okay. They lecture me on a lot of things, and I find myself irritated sometimes but I know they are just doing it so I will learn the Japanese customs and culture. They have taken me to many places and I appreciate that.

My relationship counselor is good. I emailed him once this month about phone calls. When Clo was at our house, she was able to make one phone call home a month, so I thought that came out of the money that Rotary gave my mom. I guess have I have to pay for any phone calls, which is very very expensive. It is a lot more inexpensive to call from the U.S., so I am sad about

I also saw my counselor at the Rotary get together, he was busy with his restaurant that we were in, so I didn't get a chance to talk to him much, but I thanked him for letting us come

Relationship with the students at school is great. Japanese people are unbelievably friendly. I feel like a celebrity here, everyone says hi and goodbye to me, even if I don't know them. On my first day of school, all the girls from my homeroom class came out and greeted me, and welcomed me into their class with open arms. They ask me a lot of questions, and it is difficult to explain exactly what I want to say with the little vocabulary I have. I have made a general group of friends in my homeroom and in chorus. I even have an invitation to go to dinner with a girl from my class. =)

My teachers are all very nice and do their best to make me feel like one of the students. My homeroom teacher is incredibly funny. He is always trying to speak the little English he knows and messes it all up, we both laugh and try to carry on a conversation. There is also a teacher from England here, and I talk to him every once in awhile to just let out any frustrations or if I have any questions. He has been very helpful and keeps me on the positive side.

> Problems I have been having: I am constantly being compared with Joel the other exchange student. His Japanese is a lot better than mine, but what they need to realize is that Joel studied Japanese in Oregon for 5 years, I only studied for 2, his Japanese is 3 years ahead of mine and his host family speaks Japanese. Rotary is worried that I am not learning Japanese fast enough. My opinion on this is that my next host family speaks very little English. and that I will pick the language up sooner or later. You cannot be here one year with people constantly speaking Japanese around you and not learn at least a little of the language. So we will see how things progress when I am with my next families that speak

no English.

My other problem, is that I don't have enough time in the day. I want to be able to exercise more but with chorus I don't get home until 7:30, by then I have to do chores, eat, shower, etc...My host family often tells me I should study more but then again the time thing. I am already going to bed at 11 pm. I will try and fix my schedule to fit in more studying, we'll see how it goes.

Trips I am planning include: a trip with chorus on Nov.3 for a performance, the ski trip in January, and the Rotary convention in November also.

WHEN: October 19, 2002, beginning at 7:00 a.m.

WHAT: A 2.4-mile ocean swim, 112-mile bike race and 26.2-mile run. Competitors have 17 hours to finish the race; cutoff times are also applied to each segment of the race.

WHERE: Kailua-Kona, Hawaii. The swim segment begins and ends at the pier in Kailua. The bike race travels north on the Kona Coast to the small village of Hawi, and then returns along the same route to the new T2 area at the Old Airport, just north of Kailua-Kona. The marathon course travels through Kailua and onto the same highway used for the bike race. Contestants run back into Kailua-Kona, coming down Alii Drive to the cheers of more than 25,000 people at the finish line.

WHO: Nearly 1,500 competitors, ages 18-80, compete from 50-plus countries and all 50 states. Nearly 50,00 competitors qualify at Ironman qualifying races worldwide. Another 4,000 enter the race lottery, which awards 150 slots to U.S. citizens and 50 slots to international athletes. In recognition of their ath-

letic accomplishment, the 2000 age group champions automatically qualified for the 2001 race.

PURSE: A total of \$325,000, the richest in the sport of triathlon. Both the first male and female finisher receives \$70,000.

2001 CHAMPIONS: Many thought last year's winds were frightening, but Ironman veteran Jan Wanklyn, either a competing pro or interested observer every year since 1983, said the winds on the bike course in 2001 were absolutely the worst she had ever seen. Gusts in excess of 50 MPH had riders all over the road, unable to eat or drink because both white-knuckled hands were needed just to stay on the Queen K. But American Tim De-Boom and Austria's Natascha Badmann weatherd the wind, high heat and humidity to capture the coveted Ironman crown.

TRAINING: The average Ironman triathlete spends 18 to 24 hours each week training for this event. A typical week includes seven miles of swimming, 225 miles of biking and 48 miles of running. Many competitors also (Continued on page 2)



As Rotary's 100th anniversary on February 23, 2005 approaches, it's not too early for our club to begin planning for the grand celebration.

Rotary International and the Rotary Club of Kona's Board encourages Rotarians to focus on three key goals for 2005 in support of Rotary's Centennial: 1) eradicate polio with a pledge of \$175 per member this year. to be paid over three years, 2) increase **membership** to 1.5 million members, and 3) support The Rotary Foundation of RI with a commitment of \$125 per member in donations to the Annual Programs Fund.

In addition, Rotary Clubs are urged

to plan a community service project that will commemorate Rotary's Centennial. To participate in this effort, clubs must register their project with R I by January 1, 2003. All projects must be completed by February 2005.

To qualify as a Rotary Club Centen**nial Project**, projects must meet the following criteria:

Polio Eradication Campaign Launched

President Barbara Bush

Rotary has launched a new, one-year campaign to raise US\$80 million for polio eradication. This campaign, called *Fulfill-ing the Promise: Eradication Polio*, is underway.

Rotary's 30,000+ clubs are being asked to provide cash and pledges (can pledge donations now and pay over 3-years, starting with this year), above and beyond their Annual Programs fund contributions (i.e.; \$125.00 Paul Harris – Rotary Foundation annual contribution) in order to help plug the \$275 million funding gap that threatens to derail Rotary's goal of eradication by 2005.

Each Rotary Club is asked to set its own fundraising goal for the new campaign, and reach it through donations of cash, pledges (up to three years), and community fundraisers. Our Kona Club goal is \$175 from each member. This may be pledged and then paid over a three-year period.

Of the \$1 Billion needed to complete eradication, \$725 million is pledged or projected. The remaining \$275 million is expected to come from governments, the private sector, and Rotary's \$80 million – part of which will be matched by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation and the World Bank. lion will be in addition to the nearly \$500 million Rotary has already committed to polio eradication by 2005.

Launched in 1995 to allow Rotarians to support supplemental needs of national immunization days and poliovirus surveillance, PolioPlus Partners raised more than \$33 million to support more than 270 projects in more than 80 countries, ranging from providing vaccine carriers for Ghana to equipping polio laboratories in Africa, Asia, and Eastern Europe.

The Polio Eradication Private Sector Initiative, a joint effort of The Rotary Foundation and the United Nations Foundation to seek major gifts from corporations, philanthropists, and foundations will continue through 2002. The private sector has contributed more than \$112 million to the effort.

Quite often people ask me about Rotary stating that they've heard of "it", but, what is "it". How do you join Rotary? Or any one of a variety of questions. These are golden opportunities to share Rotary and what it means to me.

Put this information into your own words.....

ROTARY MEMBERSHIP, WHY JOIN

The *benefits* of Rotary membership include (and are not limited to!):

- A widened circle of friends and contacts;
- The opportunity to associate with a group with high standards or character and integrity; and,
- The chance to participate in activities that positively impact the local community and communities in other countries

Being a Rotarian requires a considerable commitment of time and resources. The *responsibilities* of membership include:

- Proposing qualified individuals for membership;
- · Following the club's attendance requirements;
- Paying dues to Rotary International and the club; and,
- Participating in club activities, projects and functions.

Qualifications for membership:

- Potential members are men and women in good character who possess an excellent business or professional reputation; and,
- Individuals whose place of business or residence is located in the locality of the club or the surrounding area.

The Classification System:

It is designed to ensure that the membership of the Rotary Club reflects the diversity of the community. *The classification system should be used as a guide, not as barrier.*

- A member's classification covers the principal and recognized activity of the firm, company, or institution with which a member is connected, or a member's own principal and recognized business or professional activity.
- Clubs shall not elect a person to active membership from

a classification if the club already has five or more members from that classification unless the club has more than 50 members. Members who are retired shall not be included in the total number of members from a classification. If a member changes classification, the club may continue the member's membership under the new classifications notwithstanding these limitations.

Types of Membership:

Rotary recognizes two types of membership: active members and honorary members.

- Active Members are classified in accordance with member's business or professional activity.
- Honorary Members have distinguished themselves by meritorious serviced in the furtherance of Rotary ideals; they cannot vote in club elections, or be elected to club office, hold no classification, and pay no club dues or admission fees.

However, honorary members are invited to participate in all Rotary activities and functions notwithstanding these limitations.



October is Vocational Services Month—District Governor's Message

If you had the opportunity to help reduce unemployment, stimulate the local economy, or inspire young people toward successful, productive careers, all while applying and developing your own vocational skills, would you jump at the chance? As Rotarians driven by the ideal of service, we hold the power to effect that sort of meaningful, positive change in our community through Vocational Service.

The UN advises that we live in an era in which one out of 10 people of working age can't find a job that pays a decent wage. In our schools, many young people have no understanding of how education affects their chances for success in the workforce. Vocational Service efforts can play a vital role in improving the quality of life for hard-working members of our community who need the sort of direction and expertise we can provide. By participating in mentoring, career days, vocational awards, business assistance, or even just talking about our jobs at club meetings we can turn our experience into an invaluable resource for others.

Rotary's emphasis on Vocational Service has its roots in the founding of the organization. The original intent of Paul Harris was to bring together a circle of business and professional acquaintances. By using the classification principle, the guideline by which nearly all Rotary membership is determined, we gain assurance that each club has among its members a cross-section of its community's business and professional population. The second part of the Object of Rotary calls for us Rotarians to apply high ethical standards in our businesses and professions, to recognize the worthiness of all useful occupations, and to consider our own occupations as opportunities to serve society.

A primary goal of Vocational Service is to promote Rotary's high ethical standards. The two tools that we as Rotarians have to assess such standards are the 4-Way Test and the "Declaration of Rotarians in Businesses and Professions" that was adopted in 1989. The declaration provides a framework for ethical behavior that all of us Rotarians can use, together with the 4-Way Test, as a standard against which to measure our business and professional activities.

We hear a lot about the 4-Way Test but very little about the Declaration.

Declaration of Rotarians in Business and Professions
As a Rotarian engaged in a business or profession,
I am expected to:

- 1. Consider my vocation to be another opportunity to serve;
- 2. Be faithful to the letter and to the spirit of the ethical codes of my vocation, to the laws of my country, and to the moral standards of my community;
- Do all in my power to dignify my vocation and to promote the highest ethical standards in my chosen vocation;
- 4. Be fair to my employer, employees, associates, competitors, customers, the public, and all those with whom I have a business or professional relationship;
- 5. Recognize the honor and respect due to all occupations which are useful to society;
- 6. Offer my vocational talents: to provide opportunities for young people, to work for the relief of the special needs of others, and to improve the quality of life in my community;
- 7. Adhere to honesty in my advertising and in all representations to the public concerning my business or profession;
- 8. Neither seek from nor grant to a fellow Rotarian a privilege or advantage not normally accorded others in a business or professional relationship.

President Bhichai reminded us recently that Past Director Elmer R. Jordan wrote in the mid-1980s, "It is the field of vocational service where you and I earn our daily bread, that we as Rotarians are judged. The way in which we conduct our business and profession is what really matters."

President Bhichai also said "His words still ring true today as Rotary approaches its 100 th anniversary. As Rotarians, we will be judged on our ability to uphold the public trust. We must continue to Sow The Seeds of Love by fulfilling our time-honored commitment to vocational service and the highest standards of business ethics."

- Average retail cost for a pound of food in Hawaii is \$2.20 per pound.
- \$I given by member agencies allows them to pick up 7 pounds of food if all goods are at the maximum of .14/pound
- \$I/\$.14 a pound = 7.14 pounds
- 7.14 pounds x \$2.20 a pound = \$15.71 worth of food

A better way of explaining this is that ..."seven pounds of food acquired through a retailer would be \$16 for an agency. The same seven pounds of food acquired at the food bank would be only \$1 for the

agency."



Mr. Kubo is a 1971 graduate of Waipahu High School on Oahu. He thereafter graduated from the University of Hawaii with a bachelors degree in Political Science, and then obtained his Juris Doctorate from the University of San Diego School of Law. He was admitted to the Hawaii Bar in 1979.

On September 2, 2001, President George W. Bush, nominated Mr. Kubo to be the U. As. Attorney in Hawaii. His nomination was supported by virtually every federal and state law enforcement agency in Hawaii. On November

30, 2001, the United States Senate confirmed Mr. Kubo's nomination and he

was officially sworn in on December 7,

As the U. S. Attorney, Mr. Kubo leads an office of approximately 65 members, including attorneys and staff. On Friday, November 8, 2002 the Kona Hospital Foundation will have an opening and blessing of the new chemotherapy and outpatient services facility. The 2100 square foot building was provided to the hospital by the Kona Hospital Foundation. Over \$76,000 have been spent renovating the building to make it function as a patient care area. stration focuses on the federal oversight of all Anti-Terrorism initiatives, establishing "Safe Neighborhoods" in Hawaii, Drug Interdiction and Safeguarding Hawaii's Tourism Industry. Of course, Mr. Kubo also remains a strong proponent of white collar and political corruption investigations. Finally, Mr. Kubo is a very strong advocate for victim's and witness' rights.

From 1990 to 2001, while service as an Assistant U.S. Attorney, Mr. Kubo was responsible for the prosecution of major violent crimes, narcotic offenses, white color crimes and crimes on government reservations.

Mr. Kubo previously served as a Deputy Prosecuting Attorney with the office of the Honolulu Prosecutor's from 1980-83 and 1985-90. During his tenure, he prosecuted homicides, sexual assaults, narcotics offenses and organized crime cases. Between 1983-85, Kubo was in private practice and with the law firm of Carlsmith and Dwyer where he specialized in construction litigation and insurance defense.

Finally, Mr. Kubo has been an instructor at the Honolulu Police Academy, the State of Hawaii Sheriff's Academy and the Pearl Harbor Department of Defense Police Academy, and he has also taught at other state and federal law enforcement agencies throughout Hawaii.

Club Mentoring Program

In an attempt to address an increase in the number of resignations from the club, the Rotary Club of Kona has formed a committee of past presidents of the club who have agreed to undertake the task of mentoring club members. Those dropping out have been both recent inductees and experienced members, so we recognize the need to work with both groups. The mentors will work with the sponsors of new members, providing support and guidance to help both new and experienced members find opportunities to become good and active Rotarians.

It appears to the past presidents that a large part of what the club needs is a "pastoral" function whereby we can track the strengths and needs of individual members and help them to find ways to participate in and to benefit from club activities. We need a mechanism to keep track of events in the lives of members that affect their Rotarian activities, so that we can work together to help with problems and take advantage of special skills and opportunities. The present club structure does not really provide this pastoral function. Much as the president and other officers want to maintain contact with all members, it's really not possible with our busy schedules.

To make this mentoring task do-able within the busy schedule of past presidents – who have already given their "year of blood" to the club – we have decided to divide up the club into approximately equal groups, each of which will be mentored by a past president. We've arbitrarily divided up the club membership into 12 groups, each assigned to a past president, as shown in the table below. For now, new members will be assigned to the group of their sponsor – unless that makes a group too large.

We want to leave the exact mechanism somewhat open so that mentors can find what works best for them and their group. We'll start with the Club Assembly on December 12th, at which members will be asked to sit at a table with their mentor. We hope that discussion at that luncheon will lead to a plan of action for each group. The past presidents will then meet again to get ideas from each other and re-evaluate our overall strategy.

About The Rotary Foundation

The Rotary Foundation is a not-forprofit corporation that supports the efforts of Rotary International to achieve world understanding and peace through international humanitarian, educational, and cultural exchange programs. It is supported solely by voluntary contributions from Rotarians and friends of the Foundation who share its vision of a better world.

The Foundation was created in 1917 by Rotary International's sixth president, Arch C. Klumph, as an endowment fund for Rotary "to do good in the world." It has grown from an initial contribution of US\$26.50 to more than US\$73 million contributed in 2000-01. Its

event-filled history is a story of Rotarians learning the value of service to humanity. The Foundation's Humanitarian Programs fund international Rotary club and district projects to improve the quality of life, providing health care, clean water, food, education, and other essential needs primarily in

the developing world. One of the major Humanitarian Programs is PolioPlus, which seeks to eradicate the polio virus worldwide.

Through its Educational Programs. the Foundation provides funding for some

1,200 students to study abroad each year. Grants are also awarded to university teachers to teach in developing countries and for exchanges of business and professional people. Former participants in the Foundation's programs have the opportunity to continue their affiliation with Rotary as Foundation

History of the Rotary Foundation

In 1917, Arch C. Klumph, Rotary's sixth president, proposed to the Rotary International Convention in Atlanta, Georgia, USA, the creation of an "endowment fund for Rotary . . . for the purpose of doing good in the world in charitable, educational, and other

> avenues of community service." A few months later, the endowment received its first contribution of \$26.50 from the Rotary Club of Kansas City, Missouri, USA.

> In 1928, when the endowment fund had grown to more than US\$5,000, the fund was renamed The Rotary

Foundation, and it became a distinct entity within Rotary International. Five Trustees, including Klumph, were appointed to "hold, invest, manage, and administer all of its prop-

As Rotary's 100th anniversary on February 23, 2005 approaches, **Rotary Clubs are urged to plan a community service project** that will commemorate Rotary's Centennial. To participate in this effort, clubs must register their project with R I by January 1, 2003. All projects must be completed by February 2005.

To qualify as a **Rotary Club Centennial Project**, projects must meet the following criteria:

- · Fulfill a clearly identifiable community need;
- · Provide a solution that has measurable results;
- Involve the active participation of Rotarians in addition to funding and coordination with other community groups; and,
- Provide an opportunity for a permanent sign, plaque, or inscription at the project site identifying the Rotary Club of Kona and Rotary's Centennial Year.

If you think you know of a project we should consider, please talk with President Barbara Bush or President-elect Bev Fraser. We will need from you, in writing, information on the project that will answer the above listed criteria. Please complete the Centennial Project Questionnaire for each project you would like considered. (attached)

We will have a club assembly in the near future to discuss the potential projects and ask the club to vote.

As this is as three-year project, we need the club to have full involvement in the project. **Please, share you ideas today!**

We are considering (as a Rotary Centennial Project, to be committed to by December 31, 2002 and completed by February 2005) continuing the partnership with Friends for Fitness, Kona Mauka Rotary, and Kona Outdoor Circle as regards the future development of this park. Please see President Barbara or President-Elect Bev if you have input regard-

ing this project, or suggestions on the scope of the project. We need to hear of your support or lack of support, or be given other concepts/projects to consider for the Centennial Project, by YOU, the membership.



We have a questionnaire to be completed for each project to be considered. (Need questionnaires submitted to President Barbara or President Bev by November 14, 2002.) A committee, with past and future club leadership represented, will review the projects submitted and bring projects meeting the criteria given by R. I. and the committee, to the club for a vote on December 12, 2002.

Representatives from the State, Hawaii County, Friends for Fitness, Kona Rotary, and Kona Outdoor Circle have been in discussion about the needs to complete the south side of the walking/jogging path. Friends for Fitness hopes to continue the improvements to the center portion of the south side of the path with the help and co-operation of Kona Rotary Club and the Kona Outdoor Circle. The goal is to create a "jewel" in this part of the park that will spark the development of the rest of the area with the help of the State, County, and community groups. (Our club membership has been presented with the plans that have been under consideration for this area.)

Through community meetings, letters to the editor, etc. the community at-large has expressed its wishes to make this area into THE community park for Kailua-Kona. We have the facilities provided by the County (taxpayers) and past community efforts, - the gym, the pool, the fields and small playgrounds. Now it's time to improve the other side and end of the "park". How will the Rotary Club of Kona, and its membership, be involved? YOU have the answer; please share your views with President Barbara or President Elect Bev.

The ISCC — created by Rotarian Edgar F. "Daddy" Allen — later grew in 1987-88, leading to the establishment of Rotary Peace Programs. Then in 1989, 196

The Great Depression and World War II both impeded significant growth for the Foundation, but the need for promoting a lasting world peace generated great post-war interest in developing the Foundation. After Rotary founder Paul P. Harris died in 1947, contributions began pouring into Rotary International, and the Paul Harris Memorial Fund was created for the purpose of building the Foundation.

That same year, the first Foundation program was established — Fellowships for Advanced Study, which was the forerunner of the Rotary Ambassadorial Scholarships program. Then in 1965-66, three new programs were launched — Group Study Exchange, Awards for Technical Training, and Grants for Activities in Keeping with the Objective of The Rotary Foundation, which was later called Matching Grants.

The Health, Hunger and Humanity (3-H) program was

launched in 1978, with the Rotary Volunteers program being created as a part of 3-H in 1980. The PolioPlus program was announced in 1984-85, and the following year saw the introduction of Rotary Grants for University Teachers. The first Peace Forums were held in 1987-88, leading to the establishment of Rotary Peace Programs. Then in 1989, 1963-64 RI President Carl P. Miller and his wife, Ruth, donated US\$1 million to establish the Discovery Grants program.

Throughout this time, support of the Foundation grew tremendously. Since that first \$26.50 donation in 1917, the Foundation has received contributions totaling more than

US\$1 billion. More than US\$68 million was donated in 1998-99 alone. To date, some 726,000 individuals have been recognized as Paul Harris Fellows — that is, someone who has contributed US\$1000 or has had that amount contributed in his or her name.

Such strong support and involvement of Rotarians worldwide ensures a secure future for The Rotary Foundation as it continues its vital work for international understanding and world peace.



Activities since the last report: more sight seeing, parade, private party, and dinner at a friends house. No public speaking engagements this month.

Places visited: Nichinan to see Obi castle, and Saito burial grounds. It was a lot of fun. On the way to Nichinan we took the road a long the coast and I got to see the ocean!! Something I haven't seen in awhile. I also saw Saru shima-monkey island.

Social and sporting activities: Went over to a friends house for dinner. I must have met their entire family that day i.e. aunts, uncles, cousins, grandma and grandpa. They dressed me up in a Kimono and kendo outfit (a fencing outfit). They gave me all kinds of presents, it's a custom to

Give gifts. Who needs Christmas when you get presents all year, just joking. By the way they don't celebrate Christmas here. Not a Christian country.

Contact with other exchange students: We did get together this month. Our Youth Exchange officer Dr.Ooe took the three of us to a theme park and lunch. We had a great time and look forward to seeing each other ever

month. I believe the Rotary Convention over here is on Nov.15th and 16th so we will see each other then.

Subjects I think are still the same: Shodo, Music, Art, English, World History, Judo, Home Economics and Study Hall. However I next class we won't have Judo, we are starting "table tennis," as they call it a.k.a. ping pong.

Language Proficiency is I'm told "getting better" but I need to speak more Japanese. It is hard but I am trying my best. The classes are once a week. Sat's- from 1-2:30pm.

Relation ship with my new host family seems to be going good. I

Problems I have been having: Well lets see....it has been getting very very cold. My first real winter. I don't know if I brought this up last time but I think the exchange students who come from Hawaii need to buy winter clothes before they come, Japan is extremely expensive. My host

mom, Mrs. Ikeda had to ask her friends if they had any spare winter clothes and luckily they did. Seeing as how I am from Hawaii 60 degrees during the day is pretty cold. I'm sure I will slowly get used to it though.

Trips I am planning: Only the Rotary Convention in Kagoshima on Nov. 15th and 16th, and my school trip in January. I am doing well. The news about the war is scary, and I hope everyone is doing okay. November's Monthly Report from Corri Bell

Current Host Family: Nagaoka's

Address: 2-11 Funatsuka, Miyazaki Shi 880-0031, Japan

Counselor in Japan: Michael Indigo

Life in Japan: This was quite an exciting month. I changed host families and everything is going great. I am so excited to live with kids again. The Nagaoka's are a young couple, and have 3 children. Ana who's 12,

Shintaro who's 11 and Kaito who's 9. They don't speak any English so I think I am finally forcing myself to speak the language. There is not one food I don't like these days, besides tomatoes; I don't think I could ever learn to like those. I have been introduced to many types of foods. For example during the winter families bring out a portable

stove and place it in the middle of the table. Now they put a huge bowl on it and boil all kinds of vegetables and meat. I thought this was very interesting, I found it very convenient to have during the winter time. A nice hot meal on a cold winter night. I have gained 10 pounds though, and have been pretty depressed about that, so I have been getting up at 5:45 almost every morning to go jogging. I found this difficult also because it is around 45 degrees in the morning. However these last couple of days one of the Rotarians invited me to go to a gym to work out and swim. The next day he invited me to boxing class, so hopefully I can continue to exercise on a regular basis.

As for Rotary meetings and speeches: This past month was the Rotary District Convention on Nov. 16th and 17th in Kagoshima. Do you want to know how many people were in the audience that day? Only about 1,500 people. I was so nervous, plus I had to make the speech in Japanese. During the speech video cameras were on me and projected a huge 10 foot picture of my-

self on the

wall behind me. Not to worry, my host father said that I did very well and that my speech was great. They were surprised at how well my speech was written despite the fact that it was only 1 minute long. The other

two exchange students made speeches as well.

Traveling: The only traveling I did this month was to Kagoshima for the Rotary Convention. We took the train there. This was a first for me. I thought it was a great way of commuting. We also did some sight seeing after the convention the next day. We visited the aguarium and the volcano. The volcano is a Mountain called Sakura Jima and you have to take a ferry to get there because the valcano is an island. However it does not spill out lava like our Kilauea. After a long day of sightseeing we headed back on the train to Miyazaki.

Social Activities: I have been going with a good friend of mine to go shopping downtown every once in awhile, and other than that I went with my teacher to pick up some Japanese books.

Club Mentoring Program

In an attempt to address an increase in the number of resignations from the club, the Rotary Club of Kona has formed a committee of past presidents of the club who have agreed to undertake the task of mentoring club members. Those dropping out have been both recent inductees and experienced members, so we recognize the need to work with both groups. The mentors will work with the sponsors of new members, providing support and guidance to help both new and experienced members find opportunities to become good and active Rotarians.

It appears to the past presidents that a large part of what the club needs is a "pastoral" function whereby we can track the strengths and needs of individual members and help them to find ways to participate in and to benefit from club activities. We need a mechanism to keep track of events in the lives of members that affect their Rotarian activities, so that we can work together to help with problems and take advantage of special skills and opportunities. The present club structure does not really provide this pastoral function. Much as the president and other officers want to maintain contact with all members, it's really not possible with our busy schedules.

To make this mentoring task do-able within the busy schedule of past presidents – who have already given their "year of blood" to the club – we have decided to divide up the club into approximately equal groups, each of which will be mentored by a past president. We've arbitrarily divided up the club membership into 12 groups, each assigned to a past president, as shown in the table below. For now, new members will be assigned to the group of their sponsor – unless that makes a group too large.

We want to leave the exact mechanism somewhat open so that mentors can find what works best for them and their group. We'll start with the Club Assembly on December 12th, at which members will be asked to sit at a table with their mentor. We hope that discussion at that luncheon will lead to a plan of action for each group. The past presidents will then meet again to get ideas from each other and re-evaluate our overall strategy.

Report on Club Assembly—Centennial Project Small Group Discussions

President Barbara Bush

Thanks to each of you that participated in last week's Club Assembly group project. I greatly appreciate all the discussion and ideas shared. Here's a brief overview of the group reports.

Each project discussed has merit and received support from individual members of the club as well as the group votes. Thanks to each of you that brought forward one of the project ideas for our group discussions.

In summary, it appears our overall choice is a park project to enhance open and recreational space in Kailua-Kona. The project itself still needs to be defined and a plan developed to accomplish it by our Rotary International Centennial Anniversary in February 2003.

OLD "A" PARK

This project received the most "group #1 votes", and supportive "group #2 votes". The essence of discussion related around the need to develop this centrally locate area into a premier park; an



area that the community needs, and a project that needs the community to make it happen, it is time. A project where we can partner with several community groups, where we can both raise funds and participate as volunteers, a project that will have a long lasting positive impact for our whole community.

Some concerns and additional comments were: 1) need to define the specific areas/tasks we will undertake at the Old "A" Park, e.g., a) soccer field enhancements, b) complete landscaping and improvements at walking/jogging Let's utilize this time to our advantage. PLEASE STEP path, c) recreate the airstrip into a landscaped green space with appropriate multi-modal access, d) restore terminal into a youth center, e) toddler park refurbishments, etc... 2) keep it simple, 3) consider ongoing maintenance needs and how they will be addressed for any project we undertake.

Tying for second in "group #1 votes" were the YMCA Alii Drive Park and the Kona Community Hospital Helicopter Pad. (In addition, the YMCA Alii Drive Park project received several more "group #2 votes".) Coming in third was the Kona Community Hospital's Radiation facility.

Some comments & concerns regarding the YMCA park were: 1) concern regarding ability to complete by Feb 2003, 2) there is a need to improve areas already designated as parks such as Old "A", 3) YMCA should appeal to other sources of funding such as Foundations.

Some comments & concerns regarding undertaking the Helicopter pad project at Kona Community Hospital were: 1) do we need expertise we don't have 2) is this a project that will include sufficient volunteerism opportunities (i.e., can we identify ways to work on it or is it something we would just raise money for.) 3) although for the benefit of the general population, it a small portion of the community that will actually use the facility, we have given much support to this particular entity (Kona Community Hospital) in the most recent years – we should spread our projects throughout the community.

Some of the comments & concerns regarding the undertaking of the Radiation Unit at Kona Community Hospital were the same or similar to those regarding the Helicopter pad project.

NEXT STEPS:

I need volunteers to focus on defining our project. Anyone interested, PLEASE, give me a call (960-8292) or email me at (bbush56@hotmail.com).

Given that we have only "brainstormed" these ideas, I'd like for each of the top 3 projects to be researched and "fleshed out" so that we can then bring to the club the most viable projects for a vote. We may, through the research process, discover information on complications or resources that will make one project stand out as the one for us to undertake! We need to make an informed CLUB decision.

Rotary International has deferred the deadline for defining our project until Spring 2003 from Dec 31, 2002. FORWARD and define the project YOU would like for us to work on! I need your help. With enough of us involved in this research, no task will be overwhelming.

Thank you. I look forward to hearing from you. Could be fun!




Meeting Highlights—December 5, 2002



PRAYER

HOW DID WE SURVIVE ?

Looking back, it's hard to believe that we have lived as long as we have. As children we would ride in cars with no seat belts or air bags. Riding in the back of a pickup truck on a warm day was always a special treat. Our baby cribs were painted with bright colored lead based paint. We often chewed on the crib, ingesting the paint.

We had no childproof lids on medicine bottles, doors, or cabinets, and when we rode our bikes we had no helmets. We drank water from the garden hose and not from a bottle. We would leave home in the morning and play all day, as long as we were back when the streetlights came on. No one was able to reach us all day. We played dodge ball and sometimes the ball would really hurt. We played with toy guns, cowboys and Indians, army, cops and robbers, and used our fingers to simulate guns when the toy ones or the BB gun was not available. We ate cupcakes, bread and butter, and drank sugar soda, but we were never over weight; we were always outside playing. Little League had tryouts and not everyone made the team. Those who didn't, had to learn to deal with disappointment. Some students weren't as smart as others or didn't work hard so they failed a grade and were held back to repeat the same grade. That generation produced some of the greatest risk-takers and problem solvers. We had the freedom, failure, success and responsibility, and we learned how to deal with it all.



Almost all of us would have rather gone swimming in the lake instead of a pristine pool (talk about boring), the term cell phone would have conjured up a phone in a jail cell, and a pager was the school PA system.

We all took gym, not PE . . . and risked permanent injury with a pair of high top Ked's

(only worn in gym) instead of having cross-training athletic shoes with air cushion soles and built in light reflectors. I can't recall any injuries but they must have happened because they tell us how much safer we are now. Flunking gym was not an option . . . even for stupid kids! I guess PE must be much harder than gym.

Every year, someone taught the whole school a lesson by running in the halls with leather soles on linoleum tile and hitting the wet spot. How much better off would we be today if we only knew we could have sued the school system. Speaking of school, we all said prayers and the pledge (amazing we aren't all brain dead from that), and staying in detention after school caught all sorts of negative attention for about the next two weeks. We must have had horribly damaged psyches. Schools didn't offer 14 year olds an abortion or condoms (we wouldn't have known what either was anyway) but they did give us a couple of baby aspirin and cough syrup if we started getting the sniffles. What an archaic health system we had then. Remember school nurses? Ours wore a hat and everything.

I thought that I was supposed to accomplish something before I was allowed to be proud of myself. I just can't recall how bored we were without computers, PlayStation, Nintendo, X-box or 270 digital cable stations. I must be repressing that memory as I try to rationalize through the denial of the dangers could have befallen us as we trekked off each day about a mile down the road to some guy's vacant 20, built forts out of branches and pieces of plywood, made trails, and fought over who got to be the Lone Ranger.

What was that property owner thinking, letting us play on that lot. He should have been locked up for not putting up a fence around the property, complete with a self-closing gate and an infrared intruder alarm. Oh yeah. . . and where was the Benadryl

and sterilization kit when I got that bee sting? I could have been killed!

We played king of the hill on piles of gravel left on vacant construction sites and when we got hurt, mom pulled out the 48 cent bottle of mercurochrome and then we got buttwhooped. Now it's a trip to the emergency room, followed by a 10-day dose of a \$49 bottle of antibiotics and then mom calls the attorney to sue the contractor for leaving a horribly vicious pile of gravel where it was such a threat.



We didn't act up at the neighbor's house either because if we did, we got butt-whooped (physical abuse) there too . . . and then we got butt-whooped again when we got home.

Mom invited the door to door salesman inside for coffee, kids choked down the dust from the gravel driveway while playing with Tonka trucks (remember why Tonka trucks were made tough . . . it wasn't so that they could take the rough berber in the family room), and Dad drove a car with leaded gas.

Our music had to be left inside when we went out to play and I am sure that I nearly exhausted my imagination a couple of times when we went on two week vacations. I should probably sue the folks now for the danger they put us in when we all slept in campgrounds in the family tent.

Summers were spent behind the push lawnmower and I didn't even know that mowers came with motors until I was 13 and we got one without an automatic blade-stop or an auto-drive. How sick were my parents?



Of course my parents weren't the only psychos. I recall Donny Reynolds from next door coming over and doing his tricks on the front stoop just before he fell off. Incorporated Measures to Prevent Alcohol Consumption by Teenagers.

Lieutenant Henry Hickman was raised in Phoenix, Arizona and attended college in Arizona and Colorado with a BS in Business Administration and Marketing Research. Lt Hickman graduated from the FBI National Academy.

He has 24 years in law enforcement that includes time as a patrol officer, patrol sergeant, detective in the criminal investigation section, patrol lieutenant and acting district commander.

Lieutenant Hickman is presently assigned as the Commander of the criminal investigation section and the juvenile aid section area II in Kona.

Officer Gerald Wike was raised in West Hawaii and is a 15 year veteran with the Hawaii police department. He is presently assigned to

the Juvenile Aide Section in Kona. Officer Wike is a member of the State of Hawaii Gang Enforcement System and teaches an alternative gang education class in West Hawaii schools.

Officer Wike will discuss the IMPACT programs success and status, which includes present problems focusing on juveniles in West Hawaii. This presentation is accompanied by a recovered video produced by West Hawaii teenagers. Wike also explains what the County of Hawaii curfew laws are and why the enforcement of these laws is vital to our community.

Lt. Hickman explains Hawaii State laws regarding parent's control and duties as well as the duty of a minor, and "what every parent should know". Lt. Hickman and Officer Wike will demonstrate a "hands on" portion of the IMPACT program used to educate juveniles on the effects that alcohol has on a person's coordination.

Polio Eradication Campaign Underway

Fulfilling the Promise: Eradication Polio 30,000+ clubs have been asked to provide cash and pledges, above and beyond their Annual Programs fund contributions (i.e.; \$125.00 Paul Harris – Rotary Foundation annual contribution) in order to help plug the \$275 million funding gap that threatens to derail Rotary's goal of eradication by 2005.

Each Rotary Club was asked to set its own fundraising goal for the new campaign, and reach it through donations of cash, pledges (up to three years), and community fundraisers. Our Kona Club goal is \$175 from each member. This may be pledged and then paid over a three-year period, s tarting this year.

Of the \$1 Billion needed to complete eradication, \$725 million is pledged or projected. The remaining \$275 million is expected to come from governments, the private sector, and Rotary's \$80 million - part of which will be matched by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation and the World Bank. Rotary's \$80 million will be in addition to the nearly \$500 million Rotary has already committed to polio eradication by 2005.

Launched in 1995 to allow Rotarians to support suppleme ntal needs of national immunization days and poliovirus surveillance, PolioPlus Partners raised more than \$33 million to support more than 270 projects in more than 80 countries, ranging from providing vaccine carriers for Ghana to equipping polio laboratories in Africa, Asia, and Eastern Europe. The Polio Eradication Private Sector Initiative, a joint effort of The Rotary Foundation and the United Nations Foundation to seek major gifts from corporations, philanthropists, and foundations will continue through 2002. The private sector has contributed

more than \$112 million to the effort.

asked me to find somebody else to honor. As I was driving home tonight, I started thinking about whom I would honor with this ribbon and longer a grouch but made sure to let all his employees know that they I thought about you. I want to honor you. My days are really hectic and when I come home I don't pay a lot of attention to you. Sometimes I scream at you for not getting good enough grades in school and for your bedroom being a mess, but somehow tonight, I just wanted to sit here and, well, just let you know that you do make a difference to me. Besides your mother, you are the most important person in my life. You're a great kid and I love you!"

The startled boy started to sob and sob, and he couldn't stop crying. His whole body shook. He looked up at his father and said through his tears, "Dad, earlier tonight I sat in my room and wrote a letter to you and Mom explaining why I had killed myself and asking you to forgive me. I was going to commit suicide tonight after you were asleep. I just didn't think that you cared at all. The letter is upstairs. I don't think I need it after all." His father walked upstairs, and

found a heartfelt letter full of anguish and pain. The envelope was addressed, "Mom and Dad".

The boss went back to work a changed man. He was no made a difference. The junior executive helped several other young people with career planning and never forgot to let them know that they made a difference in his life...one being the boss's son. And the young boy and his classmates learned a valuable lesson. Who you are DOES make difference.

You are under no obligation to send this on to anyone...not to one person or to one hundred. But if you have anyone who means a lot to you, I encourage you to send him or her this

message and let them know that they make a difference in your life. You never know what kind of difference a little encouragement can make to a person.

I give you this blue ribbon. Who you are makes a difference.

Then please report back to me and tell me what happened."

Later that day the junior executive went in

to see his boss, who had been noted, by the way, as being kind of a grouchy fellow. He sat his boss down and he told him that he deeply admired him for being a

creative genius. The boss seemed very surprised. The junior executive asked him if he would accept the gift of the blue ribbon and would he give him permission to put it on him. His surprised boss said, "Well, sure." The junior executive took the blue rbbon and placed it right on his boss's jacket above his heart. As he gave him the last extra ribbon, he said, "Would you do me a favor? Would you take this extra ribbon and pass it on by honoring somebody else? The young boy who first gave me the ribbons is doing a project in school and we want to keep this recognition ceremony going and find out how it affects people."

That night the boss came home to his 14-year-old son and sat him down. He said, "The most incredible thing happened to me today. Her only chance of recovery appeared to be a blood transfusion from her 5-year old brother, who had miraculously survived the same disease and had developed the antibod-

ies needed to combat the illness. The doctor explained the situation to her little brother, and asked the little boy if he would be willing to give his blood to his sister. I saw him hesitate for only a moment before taking a deep breath and saying,

"Yes, I'll do it if it will save her." As the transfusion progressed, he lay in bed next to his sister and smiled, as we all did, seeing the color returning to her cheek. Then his face grew pale and his smile faded. He looked up at the doctor and asked with a trembling voice, "Will I start to die right away?" Being young, the little boy had misunderstood the doctor; he thought he was going to have to give his sister all of his blood in order to save her.

Polio Eradication Campaign Underway

Fulfilling the Promise: Eradication Polio

Rotary's 30,000+ clubs have been asked to provide cash and pledges, above and beyond their Annual Programs fund contributions (i.e.; \$125.00 Paul Harris – Rotary Foundation annual contribution) in order to help plug the \$275 million funding gap that Europe. The Polio Eradication Private Sector Initiative, a joint efthreatens to derail Rotary's goal of eradication by 2005.

Each Rotary Club was asked to set its own fundraising goal for the new campaign, and reach it through donations of cash, pledges (up to three years), and community fundraisers. Our Kona Club goal is \$175 from each member. This may be pledged and then paid over a three-year period, starting this Rotary year.

Of the \$1 Billion needed to complete eradication, \$725 million is pledged or projected. The remaining \$275 million is expected to come from governments, the private sector, and Rotary's \$80 million - part of which will be matched by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation and the World Bank. Rotary's \$80 million will be in addition to the nearly \$500 million Rotary has already committed to polio eradication by 2005.

Launched in 1995 to allow Rotarians to support supplemental needs of national immunization days and poliovirus surveillance, PolioPlus Partners raised more than \$33 million to support more than 270 projects in more

than 80 countries, ranging from providing vaccine carriers for Ghana to equipping polio laboratories in Africa, Asia, and Eastern fort of The Rotary Foundation and the United Nations Foundation to seek major gifts from corporations, philanthropists, and found ations will continue through 2002. The private sector has contributed more than \$112 million to the effort.



Polio Eradication —Fulfilling the Promise

Thanks so very much for your enthusiastic response to our club assembly on Fulfilling Our Promise: Eradicate Polio Campaign.

Polio Plus represents the most dramatic and largest nongovernment, non-religious humanitarian initiative ever undertaken. In 1985, Rotary launched its PolioPlus program and vowed to rid the world of this disease by 2005.

We are on track with staggering results. To date, we have immunized over 2 billion children and reduced the incidence of Polio countries and less than 600 cases worldwide (in 2001). It is estimated that more than four million children who might have bee polio victims are walking and playing normally. More than 500,000 cases of polio are now prevented each year through the efforts of governments, the World Health Organization (WHO), the Prevention (CDC), and Rotary International.

We are at a critical juncture.... we must keep the pressure on or we will see Polio start to spread. The last countries will be the most difficult to immunize. Civil strife, difficult terrain, over populated and poverty stricken, the countries of Niger, Somalia, Angola, Pakistan, Nigeria, Afghanistan, Egypt, Ethiopia, and Sudan need our intervention and support.

In 2001, more than 575 million children under five years of age were vaccinated in 94 countries as part of our PolioPlus program. Vaccinators, numbering over 10 million, went house-to-house, boatto-boat, across boarders, through rivers and over mountain ranges to find and immunize every child less than five years of age.

To complete our task and Fulfill Our Promise we need to raise \$80 million dollars now. Each Rotary Club is asked to set its own fundraising goal for the new campaign, and reach it through donations Past Pres. 98-99 Michael Zola of cash, pledges (up to three years), and community fundraisers.

Our Kona Club goal is \$175 from each member. This may be pledged and then paid over a three-year period, starting with a portion to be paid this year.

This past week we kicked off two initiatives to help in the effort to raise our club goal.

1) Anyone committing to \$175 for the Eradicate Polio Campaign AND \$125 to the Rotary Foundation Annual Fund (Paul Harris), henceforth will be exempt from fines for this year!

2) We have a \$10 pool you can contribute to. Once the grid is full, we will draw ten (10) numbers and those folks with the corresponding squares will receive \$100 to match their contribution to the Eradicate Polio Campaign!

We already have 26 squares filled, so purchase yours today! from 120 countries and 380,000 cases a year (in 1988) to 10 endemic. If you've already made your contribution of \$175, consider playing the game anyway, and pass the \$100 matching on to someone that hasn't. A great way to "Sow the Seeds of Love" within our club!

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



A Message from RI President Bhichai Rattakul

In 1921, the Rotary Convention at Edinburgh, Scotland, instituted international service as part of the Object of Rotary. In response, founder Paul Harris declared, "Yesterday our Rotary was a child. Today, in strength and vigor, it steps out into the world."

As we celebrate World Understanding Month in February, let us remember those prophetic words. Rotary's strength lies in the fact that its members look beyond themselves and their borders to serve humanity. International service offers so many opportunities to make a difference, whether it's supporting a Youth Ex-

change student, sponsoring a Rotary World Peace Scholar, contributing to the polio eradication fundraising campaign, or implementing a World Community Service project. Many Rotarians have told me that they did not truly understand the meaning of Rotary until they participated in an international project. The experience added a whole new

dimension to fellow ship, understanding, and service.

One of RI's most popular programs is World Community Service (WCS), which has been described as the "quiet revolution of hope." Each year, Rotary clubs provide an estimated US\$26 million in funds and supplies. The WCS program matches countries in need of assistance with those willing to provide resources and funds. The online WCS Projects Exchange database lists projects to help facilitate the process.

World Understanding Month is an opportunity for Rotarians to establish relationships and projects with clubs in other countries. In these turbulent times, it is more important than ever to Sow the Seeds of Love and promote international understanding.

My dream is that Rotary becomes a major force for peace. Rotary Youth Exchange students, Ambassadorial Scholars, Rotary Volunteers, and Group Study Exchange teams all contribute to global understanding. Our newest initiative, the Rotary Centers for International Studies in peace and conflict resolution, offers two-year graduate programs for scholars to study international relations, mediation, and conflict resolution — See the February Issue of the The Rotarian for the complete text of Pres Ratahul's message.

"Well," concluded Socrates, "if what you want to tell me is neither true nor good nor even useful, why tell it to me at all?"

This is why Socrates was a great philosopher and held in such high esteem.






This month I have been very busy writing scholarship essays for college, I applied to UH Manoa and haven't heard any-

- 3) Information and Education Each week we are fortunate to have a program speaker that enlightens and educates us on subject matter that hopefully gains our interest, as well as entertains us. When you have ideas for a program, please share them with President Barbara or Program Chair Ken Kjer. (We are often booked weeks in advance, so please speak up early!)
- 4) Payment of Dues Our dues are \$200 per year. You may make two \$100 installments, one due July 1st and one due January 1st. 

opportunity to share with and learn about this young person and her life. In 1965-66 along came Andrew Lovitt, from Australia and in 1966-67 my sister Elizabeth went to Australia as an outbound student; she had a year that she will never forget! In 1967-68, Maria Adamopolis came to us from Greece. 1970-71, Sonia Pederson came to us from Argentina. In 1971-72, my brother Gary was an outbound student to Japan. In 1972, my father died.

There were of course, several other youth exchange students along the way, but these are the ones that stood out for me. You see, one of these students, Maria, came back to live with my family for four years while she attended the local University. In 1976 I was lucky enough to visit Maria in Greece, meet her family and see where she grew up. Meanwhile, we have kept in touch with Sonia and Andrew as well. Sonia comes back to the states every couple of years and has brought several members of her family on various visits. My mother has gone to Argentina twice to visit her and her family. These students still call my mother, "Mom Bush".

Andrew came back to visit every year or so for about 15 years, until he married and started his own family. We met every member of his family over the years. Andrew just wrote to me, he now lives in Tasmania. We plan to meet at the Rotary International Conference in Brisbane this June; he is the incoming President of his Rotary Club in Tasmania. Andy has four children, of which his oldest son Angus was an exchange student to Finland 4 years ago; his #2 son, Ben was an exchange student to Brazil last year, and his seventeen year old daughter Sarah just left for South Africa this year. He expects his youngest, Zoe, will eventually follow in their shoes.

MEMBERSHIP IN THE ROTARY CLUB OF KONA IS AN HONOR AND A PRIVILEGE

Fellowship – every week we have an opportunity to share ourselves with other Rotarians and visitors. Sit with different people each week and see how many members of the club you really don't know, and that really don't know you. Share yourself. It's fun! Get out of your rut (if you're in one).

Meeting attendance – As a Rotarian you are asked to attend a meeting of Rotary each week. <u>It is required (per our charter with Rotary International)</u> that you attend at least 60% of these weekly meetings at your own club.

Often your BOD sanctions participation in club service activities, Interact Club attendance, or District functions, as a "make-up" which fills this requirement.

The only "membership classification" which is exempt is Senior Active . In order to be considered as Senior Active Member the aggregate of your age and years of membership in one or more clubs is equal to 85 years or more and the member has notified the Club Secretary in writing of the member's desire to be excused from attendance and the BOD has approved your request. If you think you qualify as Senior Active, please confirm this with Barbara Kossow, our Club Secretary ASAP. (We need to clarify our records for each of you.)

Information and Education – Each week we are fortunate to have a program speaker that enlightens and educates us on subject matter that hopefully gains our interest, as well as entertains us. When you have ideas for a program, please share them with President Barbara or Program Chair Ken Kjer. (We are often booked weeks in advance, so please speak up early!)

Payment of Dues – Our dues are \$200 per year. You may make two \$100 installments, one due July 1st and one due January 1st. The club is required to pay dues on your behalf to the District and Rotary International at these times. If you don't pay promptly, the club "foots" your bill until you do. If you haven't paid the balance of your \$200 for this year, July 1,2002 thru June 30, 2003, PLEASE do so NOW! You're delinquent in your responsibility to the club and the other me mbers

Door Prize - As you know, our club has a door prize each week. You are asked to provide the prize once every 18 months or so, as we have 80+ members and we meet approximately 50 weeks in the year. (See the back of the Kona Coffee Blossom for who's responsible from week to week.) The value of this prize is to be \$35 or greater. When you don't provide the prize for your week, the club "foots your bill" and hands out \$35 in cash. You are then asked to repay the \$35 to the club. A substitute prize is not ideal; as the club is still short the \$35. Club Activities and Functions – As a member of the club you are expected to participate in as many of the club activities and functions as possible, after all, why belong to the club if you don't participate? These are golden opportunities for fellowship. Please make a valiant effort to participate. Don't be a RINO (said like "rhino") - Rotarian in Name Only.

Fulfilling Our Promise: Eradicate Polio Campaign. (continued from Page 1)

cases of polio are now prevented each year through the efforts of governments, the World Health Organization (WHO), the Prevention (CDC), and Rotary International.

We are at a critical juncture..... we must keep the pressure on or we will see Polio start to spread. The last countries will be the most difficult to immunize. Civil strife, difficult terrain, over populated and poverty stricken, the countries of Niger, Somalia, Angola, Pakistan, Nigeria, Afghanistan, Egypt, Ethiopia, India and Sudan need our intervention and support.

In 2001, more than 575 million children under five years of age were vaccinated in 94 countries as part of our PolioPlus program. Vaccinators, numbering over 10 million, went house-to-house, boat-to-boat, across boarders, through rivers and over mountain ranges to find and immunize every child less than five years of age.

To complete our task and *Fulfill Our Promise* we need to raise \$80 million dollars now. Each Rotary Club is asked to set its own fundraising goal for the new campaign, and reach it through donations of cash, pledges (up to three years), and community fundraisers.

Our Kona Club goal is \$175 from each member. This may be pledged and then paid over a three-year period, starting with a portion to be paid this year.

We have two initiatives to help in the effort to raise our club goal.

1. Anyone committing to \$175 for

the Eradicate Polio Campaign AND \$125 to the Rotary Foundation Annual Fund (Paul Harris), will be henceforth exempt from fines for this year!

2. This will be our last week to **enter the \$10 pool** for a chance to receive \$100 toward your (\$175) contribution to the Eradicate Polio Campaign!

If you've already made your contribution of \$175, consider playing the game anyway, and pass the \$100 matching on to someone that hasn't. A great way to "Sow the Seeds of Love" within our club!

"Rotary's Magazine Month," during which clubs are requested to

present programs on the magazine. Helpful material to assist in developing such programs is supplied by the magazine department of the Secretariat.


Do you know that?

The first issue called The National Rotarian was published in January 1911. It was a 12-page tabloid and was printed

to distribute an essay written by Paul Harris. There were 2,000 copies printed. It became so popular that they had to go back to press and run another 2,000 copies.

The second issue was printed in July 1911 and soon after that it became a monthly publication. In February 1995 the magazine published its 1000th issue. It got its name changed from The National Rotarian to The Rotarian in 1912 as a result of a motion made at the RI Convention.

Stripped Gears, the humor page, was started in 1940. This page was retired in May 1983 but the readers disagreed with the decision and by popular demand it was reinstated in April 1984. Most contributors to this humor page come from Rotarians throughout the world. Each month about 500,000 copies are printed.



Most of these (486,000) are mailed to Rotarians in the US. The other copies go to 199 countries around the world. About 20,000 copies go to non-Rotarians. Most of these are gift subscriptions to schools, libraries and individuals. The Rotary Club of Rockford Illinois has been the world's gift-subscription champion for many years. They sponsor 250 gift subscriptions each year. Annual subscriptions run \$12. (WHAT A GREAT RECRUITING TOOL) It can also be found on the web site, www.rotary.org.

As you can imagine, there are many Rotarians around the world that don't speak or read English.

Therefore, more than half of the Rotarians around the world are served by one of the 29 RI

regional magazines. These publications are published independently by Rotarians and distributed to 121 countries. They

have a combined circulation of 750,000. Each magazine is published with a local editorial slant. But, at the same time, these regional magazines include required articles and photographs of international Rotary interest

that they receive from the Rotarian.

Parker Ranch, on the Big Island of Hawaii, is one of the largest ranches in the

United States and home of Hawaii's cowboy-paniolo. 

Hello again. Wow this month has flown by so fast. Things have settled now with my new host family and we are getting along great! My host mom is a piano teacher and my host dad does house financing I think. I live about ten minutes away from school by bicycle so where they live is very convenient.

School is going good. This month we went on "Ensoku" which means outgoing or excursion. Every year at the end of April the whole school goes on a excursion to the park. We played all kinds of games and I even taught them a game I knew. We took school pictures and everyone was in the Hawaii spirit, you could tell because they were all waving the shaka sign and some even wearing flowers in their ears. I think I started a new trend. Message from Rotary International President Bhichai Rattakul

Dear fellow Rotarians.

Our founder, Paul Harris, was a great proponent of Education, Scientific and Cultural Organization). peace and international understanding. He had a vision of how ordinary people could achieve extraordinary goals. Paul felt that one of the most effective ways to promote peace was to carry out humanitarian service projects that relieve human suffering and want. In his words: "Rotary is an integrating force in a world where forces of disintegration are all too prevalent."

Indeed, Rotarians have shown their commitment to world peace from the beginning. They have helped war refugees, provided disaster assistance, established "peace parks," and promoted international exchanges. In 1945, Rotarians played a key role in forming the United Nations.

Forty-nine Rotarians attended the UN Charter Conference as delegates. Past RI Vice President Carlos P. Romulo of the Philippines served as the fourth president of promote international understanding. the UN General Assembly, and His Royal Highness Past District Governor Prince Wan of Thailand served as assembly president in 1956. In 1946, Rotarians were also

instrumental in establishing UNESCO (United Nations Today, RI holds the UN's highest nongovernmental consultative status. RI appoints representatives to UNESCO, the UN Environment Programme, the UN Human Settlements Programme, and other UN agencies. Our most successful collaboration to date has been with the World Health Organization, UNICEF, the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and other partners working to eradicate polio by 2005. Rotarians have risked their lives to deliver vaccine in regions of conflict.

I have served in many roles over the years, including politician and UN delegate. I am convinced that organizations such as Rotary will be the key to long-term peace. Rotary programs such as Ambassadorial Scholars, Group Study Exchange, Rotary Volunteers, and Youth Exchange

Our latest initiative, the Rotary Centers for International Studies in peace and conflict resolution, is educating

Convention News - 1 June

Approximately 15,000 Rotarians from 113 countries joined to-

gether to Sow the Seeds of Love in sunny Brisbane, Queensland, Australia, on Sunday, 1 June, the first day of the 94th annual RI Convention.

In his welcoming keynote address, RI President Bhichai Rattakul expressed his heartfelt appreciation to the host city and encouraged attendees to Sow the Seeds of Love worldwide. "Here, in this warm and welcoming city of Brisbane, we have gathered with an abundance of experience, commitment, and most of all — love," said President Rattukul. "Our founder, Paul Harris, saw tolerance as fundamental to Rotary. It is this spirit of

tolerance that is one of Rotary's greatest gifts— sharing fellowship and service with someone who has a different religion, or culture, or language than the one we know. When we reach across borders and oceans to collaborate on international service projects, we show the world what is possible if we only listen to each other with open hearts and open minds."

The Queensland Youth Symphony, the Conroy Dancers, and "Australia's most celebrated balladeer" (and local Rotarian) Graeme Conners, also treated opening plenary session attendees to an hour-long performance highlighting the spirit and diversity of Australia.

Another highlight of the opening day was the dedication of the Sir Thomas Brisbane Seat at the Roma Street Parkland. The seat, named after the former New South Wales governor, is a permanent gift to the host city. Coordinated by the Rotary clubs of Stone Corner, Queensland, and Largs, Scotland, — Sir Thomas' birthplace — the Helidon sandstone sculpture reflects both the social and natural history of the site.

"This is a testament to the work that Rotary has done in our country," said John Puttick, chairman of the Host Organization Committee. "It is a gift to the people of Queensland."

Convention News - 2 June

The second day of the RI Convention kicked off with charter presentations to Rotary clubs in the new Rotary countries of Timor Leste and Afghanistan. Afterwards, the former prime minister of Thailand Anand Panyarachun addressed plenary session attendees on conflict resolution in an uncertain world. "The challenges to peace today are infinitely more complex than those that shaped the world until just over a decade ago," he began. "Understanding, empathy, compassion, tolerance. These are the virtues that will see humanity through. These are the virtues embodied in the spirit of Rotary International. Let us continue to Sow the Seeds of Love as urged by President Bhichai and start a chain reaction that fills the world with what it needs most."

Jim Christianson, a Rotarian with a heart for helping others, later was recognized with The Rotary Foundation Alumni Service to Humanity Award. A member of the Rotary Club of Pelican Rapids, Minnesota, USA, Christianson first served as a Rotary Volunteer in Peru in 1986. "It is an award I accept with a great deal of humility," he said. "I'm becoming more and more convinced that when Rotary gives you an award, such as the award I am about to receive, it's in anticipation of what you will do, not what you've done."

Convention attendees also had the opportunity to discuss issues facing their clubs in intimate discussion groups. Topics included membership development and retention, Rotary's image and the Rotary Centennial, strengthening basic club prin-

age and the Rotary Centennial, strengthening basic club ciples, and Rotary's youth programs.

Throughout the day, Rotarians continued to converge at the House of Friendship to renew old friendship and forge new ones.

Said Australian Rotarian Euan Miller: "Meeting so many other people who are just as committed to service around the world is fantastic."

Convention News - 3 June

"Fulfilling Our Promise: Eradicate Polio," the 15month polio eradication fundraising campaign (PEFC) that has had Rotarians racing ducks, building snowmen, running marathons, and coordinating countless other fundraising efforts throughout the current Rotary year, celebrated a dramatic moment on 3 June at the 94th annual RI Convention.

RI President Bhichai Rattakul and Trustee Chairman Glen Kinross read a roll call of fundraising achievements by national committees during a morning plenary session that culminated in an announcement that Rotarians worldwide have raised US\$88,557,000 for the PEFC. The amount, which surpasses the fundraising goal of \$80 million set in 2002, includes cash contributions, District Designated Funds, and pledges.

"Thanks to the remarkable commitment and generosity of Rotary members worldwide, we are closer than ever to wiping out this crippling and deadly disease." said Rattakul.

The announcement brought thunderous applause from the crowd at the Brisbane Convention and Exhibition Centre Professor Federico Mayor, former assistant director general of UNESCO and founder of the Culture of Peace Foundation, also was awarded Rotary's highest honor, the Rotary Award for World Understanding and Peace, on 3 June. The annual award recognizes outstanding individuals and organizations who exemplify the Rotary ideal of service. The award comes with a US\$100,000 grant, which Mayor will use to continue civic peace-building efforts through international and regional conferences and projects to instill a culture of peace and human rights in Guatemalan youth.

"Education for peace, particular attention to the most vulnerable segments of society, democracy-building, sustainable development and freedom of expression — par-

Convention News - 4 June

Four days of fun and fellowship came to a close on Wednesday, 4 June, with the ringing of the Rotary Centennial bell at the fifth and final plenary session. The bell now will travel from Brisbane to the first 100 Rotary clubs and will finish its journey at the centennial convention in Chicago, Illinois, USA, in 2005.

Earlier in the day, Incoming RI President Jonathan B. Majiyagbe addressed Rotarians on the importance of fostering a family atmosphere within clubs. "Our clubs are where we find the core of our Rotary family," said Majiyagbe. "And that is why, in the coming year, I will be asking every club to form a family of Rotary committee to find more ways to create and nurture that atmosphere of warmth and caring. A greater sense of a family atmosphere within our clubs will support the work we do outside of our clubs."

Majiyagbe also challenged Rotarians to Lend a Hand. "Whether we are reaching out to those in our own clubs, or reaching halfway across the world when we Lend a Hand, we work together and celebrate our shared humanity. In this way, one hand can become many and there is no limit to what the helping hands of Rotary can accomplish."

Keynote speaker Gemma Sisa, who founded an organization that finances finance education in Tanzania, is a prime example of how one person can make a difference. Through hard work and dedication — and help from local Rotary clubs and a Matching Grant from The Rotary Foundation — she turned an initial A\$5 personal donation into a school for 120 East African students. Said Sisia: "If you fight poverty through education, you are much better off in the long run because the students can help their families."


