It also reports to our government on developments in foreign countries and presents our government's foreign policies decisions to other countries.



# At the Podium - WOODSON K. WOODS, LYNX Schooner



The Defense of Freedom Foundation is primarily an American history educational organization. Our historical focus is American's first defense of freedom and the effort to uphold that freedom during the War of 1812.

We differ from most educational institutions in a very unique way; we bring American history back from the past and surround children with the details of the lessons they are learning. We accomplish this environmental immersion by the use of a very unique vehicle, the 123-foot American Privateer Schooner LYNX. The inter-active LYNX educational program enlightens, challenges and inspires the students to think, absorb, retain and work as a team. In addition, it provides teachers a solid

medium to capture the child's imagination, focus their attention and put the history lessons of this beautiful country's defense into perspective.

Working side-by-side with teachers and school administrators, we offer a complete syllabus so that introduction into the LYNX program from their existing 5th and 8th grade American history course is virtually seamless. The LYNX curriculum combines traditional maritime instruction with modern educational requirements. The Defense of Freedom Foundation educators work closely with teachers and schools to develop pertinent scholastic strategies and appropriate lesson plans that serve a threefold purpose:

- Teach historic maritime traditions and the history of a young American Nation.
- Demonstrate traditional seamanship skills and responsibilities.
- Instill a sense of achievement and personal growth through sail training.

Lynx is an interpretation of an actual privateer named Lynx built by Thomas Kemp in I 8 I 2 in Fell's Point, Maryland. She was among the first ships to defend American freedom by evading the British naval fleet then blockading American ports and serving in the important privateering efforts.

While Lynx has honored the spirit of the original vessel in her design and accounterments, she was modified to meet current U.S. Coast Guard regulations and safety requirements. New tools and modern techniques have only enhanced the time-honored craft of wooden boat building.

The planning, design and construction of Lynx have respected her early American maritime heritage, but have added a healthy infusion of modern technology to help insure safe passage.

At her launch on July 28, 2001 in Rockport, Maine, past and present converged in a gala event that ordained for Lynx a magnificent future on the high seas.

# From the "Devil's" Desk - MEMBER CAMEOS





# Just for fun - IT AIN'T WHAT IT USED TO BE

"Hey Dad," one of my kids asked the other day, "What was your favorite fast food when you were growing up?" "We didn't have fast food when I was growing up," I informed him. "All the food was slow." "C'mon, seriously. Where did you eat?" "It was a place called 'at home," I explained. "Grandma cooked every day and when Grandpa got home from work, we sat down together at the dining room table, and if I didn't like what she put on my plate I was allowed to sit there until I did like it." By this time, the kid was laughing so hard I was afraid he was going to suffer serious internal damage, so I didn't tell him the part about how I had to have permission to leave the table.

Here are some other things I would have told him about my childhood if I figured his system could have handled it:

Some parents NEVER owned their own house, wore Levis, set foot on a golf course, traveled out of the country or had a credit card. In their later years they had something called a revolving charge card. The card was good only at Sears Roebuck. Or maybe it was Sears AND Roebuck. Either way, there is no Roebuck anymore. Maybe he died.

My parents never drove me to soccer practice. This was mostly because we never had heard of soccer. I had a bicycle that weighed probably 50 pounds, and only had one speed, (slow). We didn't have a television in our house until I was 11, but my grandparents had one before that. It was, of course, black and white, but they bought a piece of colored plastic to cover the screen. The top third was blue, like the sky, and the bottom third was green, like grass. The middle third was red. It was perfect for programs that had scenes of fire trucks riding across someone's lawn on a sunny day. Some people had a lens taped to the front of the TV to make the picture look larger.

I was 13 before I tasted my first pizza, it was called "pizza pie." When I bit into it, I burned the roof of my mouth and the cheese slid off, swung down, plastered itself against my chin and burned that, too. It's still the best pizza I ever had.

We didn't have a car until I was 15. Before that, the only car in our family was my grandfather's Ford. He called it a "machine."

I never had a telephone in my room. The only phone in the house was in the living room and it was on a party line. Before you could dial, you had to listen and make sure some people you didn't know weren't already using the line.

Pizzas were not delivered to our home. But milk was.

All newspapers were delivered by boys and all boys delivered newspapers. I delivered a newspaper, six days a week. It cost 7 cents a paper, of which I got to keep 2 cents. I had to get up at 4 AM every morning. On Saturday, I had to collect the 42 cents from my customers. My favorite customers were the ones who gave me 50 cents and told me to keep the change. My least favorite customers were the ones who seemed to never be home on collection day.

Movie stars kissed with their mouths shut. At least, they did in the movies. Touching someone else's tongue with yours was called French kissing and they didn't do that in movies. I don't know what they did in French movies. French movies were dirty and we weren't allowed to see them.

If you grew up in a generation before there was fast food, you may want to share some of these memories with your children or grandchildren. Just don't blame me if they bust a gut laughing.

Growing up isn't what it used to be, is it?



# At District 5000 - HAWAII CENTENNIAL GSE TEAMS

Preparations are underway for the Hawaii Rotary District 5000 to participate in the Rotary International 2004-2005 Centennial Year Group Study Exchange Program. Our Hawaii Centennial GSE Team is to depart Hawaii on 12 February 2005 for the 30-day GSE program in Manila with Rotary District 3810, to return to Hawaii 14 March. The exchange Manila GSE Team is scheduled for their GSE program in Hawaii 30 April – 31 May 2005. The Group Study Exchange program provides 30-day travel grants between paired Rotary districts in different countries to exchange teams composed of four non-Rotarian professionals (ages 25-40) and a Rotarian team leader. Team members live in local Rotarians' homes wherever possible and follow a carefully prepared itinerary throughout the host district. Team members study and observe their host country's professional, commercial, and industrial operations; systems of government; and education, health, welfare, and social institutions. The GSE Team is fully funded by The Rotary Foundation and the respective Rotary districts.

The Hawaii Centennial GSE Team will be composed of four non-Rotarian team members who are employed full-time in a recognized profession, and a Rotarian team leader from a Hawaii Rotary Club. The Hawaii GSE Team will be selected by District Team Leader and Team Member Selection Committees based on applications and interviews. Team Leader and Team Member applications, and the GSE Brochure which should be provided with the Team Member application, can be downloaded from (GSE download documents) or requested from the District GSE Chairman. The deadline for submitting Team Leader applications is 1 August 2004. Selection of the Team Leader is planned to be in early August. Applications should be submitted through the applicant's Rotary Club to the District GSE Chairman. Some have been received already, but we welcome more applications.

The deadline for submitting Team Member applications is 15 September 2004. Their applications must also be submitted through a sponsoring Rotary Club to the District GSE Chairman. Selection of Team Members is expected to be completed prior to October.

Questions regarding the GSE program and requests for applications may be directed to the District GSE Chairman. All Team Leader and Team Member applications must be endorsed by the respective sponsoring Rotary Club prior to submission to the District GSE Chairman. Mark H. 

Rotary is made up of business and professional leaders who work to better their community and build understanding and peace in the world. Rotary is a

non-political, non-religious humanitarian organization. There are approximately 1.2 million Rotary club members of more than 31,000 Rotary clubs in 166 countries. Rotary was founded in 1905. Since 1947, the Kotary Foundation has awarded more than US\$1.1 billion in humanitarian and educational grants, which are administered at the local level. Rotary projects address critical issues in communities around the world. Here are some of Rotary's focus

POLIO ERADICATION - In 1985, Rotary's members vowed to make the world polio-free. This 20-year commitment to end polio represents the largest privatesector support of a global health initiative to date. Rotary has already committed US\$500 million and countless hours of volunteer work to help immunize nearly two billion children throughout the world. Today, there are only a few hundred polio cases worldwide, a 99.8 percent reduction since 1988, when polio paralyzed more than 350,000 children a year.

INTERNATIONAL EDUCATION -Rotary is the world's largest privately funded source of international scholarships. Each year, nearly 1,000 university students receive Rotary scholarships to study in another country. Rotary clubs also coordinate a high school-age student exchange program that sends nearly 8,000 students abroad for 3 months to a year.

PEACE - In an effort to educate tomorrow's peacemakers and ambassadors, Rotary recently launched the Rotary Centers for International Studies for peace and conflict studies at eight prestigious universities worldwide. The program provides master'slevel degree education in conflict resolution to a group of 70 Rotary World Peace Scholars chosen annually in a worldcompetitive selection process.

LITERACY - Rotary clubs are engaged in the fight against illiteracy worldwide. One example is a Rotary literacy program in Thailand that dramatically reduced school failure and was adopted by the Thai government for all the nation's schools.

# Just Last Week - by William Moore Jr.

Members and guests heard Cliff Dochtermann, Past President of Rotary International, present on video "The Unwritten History of Rotary". His theme: Real happiness is helping others. Rotary began in Greece In 500 B.C. when three businessmen, Sophocles, Aesculus and Eurypides, began meeting in the evening, preceded by a cocktail hour. When one of them showed up with the marks of a chariot wheel on his face, the Rotary wheel was born. From Greece, Rotary spread to Rome where old Presidents were thrown to the lions and when the candles on a birthday cake (all Rotarians were over 80) tipped over and set the Rotary banners afire at the Rome Hilton a well-know violinist named Nero played for the members. Moving west, Rotary came to France. Not only was Napoleon a member, but a cross-dresser named Jean D'Arc became the first woman member. Unfortunately, she was discovered and was a feature guest at the annual barbecue. From Rome, Rotary spread to England from whence the Pilgrims set out with the 4-way test and manuals for the new world. The 4-way test had been introduced by Moses whose followers couldn't remember all the 10 commandments so they picked 4. Prominent American Rotarians included Paul Revere whose famous ride was not to warn the colonist but to accomplish 12 makeup meetings in 1 day. George Washington was not only first in war and first in peace, but also first to be an "early leaver". He had Betsy Ross make the first club flag out of various scraps of left over material. All the founding fathers and leaders were Rotarians except for Benedict Arnold-- he was a Kiwanian. Abe Lincoln, classification "rail splitter, retail", settled the disputes between Robert E. Lee and Ulysses Grant over their classification, "warriors, wholesale" using Noah's change in classification system: should be two. Prominent women Rotarians included: Liz Taylor, classificatio n: "housekeeper" (she managed to keep all the houses from 8 divorces), Estee Lauder, whose started "makeups" and Monica Lewinsky, classification unknown, chair of the fellowship committee. The point of his irreverent humorous presentation is that Rotarians should have fun; laugh together. We may not remember what the speaker said at the meeting but we'd not forget how we felt when going home afterward. Meetings have to be fun if we want people to come back week after week. He closed with comments about the serious efforts and successes of Rotary. Thanks to Rotary Plus 300,000 cases of polio have been reduced to less than 400 worldwide annually and the work goes on. Thanks to Rotary efforts people are being fed, drinking clean water, using wheelchairs instead of crawling on the ground and seeing clearly. Somewhere in the world at every hour on every day a Rotarian is reaching out in service. "Real happiness is helping others".



We are in an election season with a divided electorate and stark divisions of opinion so Congressmen are reluctant to make tough decisions, preferring to avoid conflict. The first challenge is foreign policy. Iraq is still a difficult situation. We have to finish the job of restoring stability and security, completing transition to a reasonable and sustainable government of the people's own choosing, assisting in the restoration and reconstruction of services such as electricity & water, and undertaking an orderly disengagement of our troops, hopefully by 2006. Second

is the 9/11 commission report which states that we were clearly not prepared. Blame does not fall in one particular branch of government; all bear a share. Congressional oversight must be improved. The third challenge is the state of our Federal budget. No one wants to talk abut how to get a handle on it as it calls for tough choices but something must be done to control the deficit.

He went on to say that Big Island challenges include: accessibility to health care, small business support and transportation planning. During the question/answer period he discussed the use of Community Health Centers for health care provision and his bills in Congress to remove the Jones act and PVSA that hamper island cruise ship industry.

Many times I would meet George on the court just days after he had endured a debilitating treatment of chemotherapy. Wondering how he could muster the strength and enthusiasm to be on the court so soon I asked him why he did it. "I need to get in all the tennis I can before I go," he answered. "Go where?" I asked. He didn't answer that question, he just smiled and glanced upwards.

For those of us who knew George and loved him, and the list is long indeed, we will miss him intensely. We will miss his wonderful stories, his unending good humor and his indomitable spirit. For those of us who shared his love for tennis, a shorter but equally distinguished list, we will miss his blazing forehand, his usually appreciated "tennis tips," his always appreciated comraderie, and his frienship.

We will miss you George. You may be gone but you will not be soon forgotten. You will live on in the hearts of all your friends, and your laughter and wisdom will long echo on the courts.







# At the Podium - LYNN WALTON, Kona Community Hospital

Lynn Walton, President and Managing Director of Kona Community Hospital, will be giving up an update on what's happening at the hospital with emphasis on the new Radiation Therapy Unit.

Project: Radiation Therapy Clinic,

Kona Community Hospital, 79-1019 Haukapila Street, Kealakekua, HI 96750

Project Manager: Glenn Sparks, Assistant Administrator

Physican Consultant: Dr. James Lambeth Architect: Kajioka Yamachi Architects General Contractor: Quality Builders

Building: Approx. 3700 sq. ft Cost of Construction: \$1.8 million

Major Equipment: Varian 21EX Linear Acclerator, Portal Vision (verifies treatment position), IMRT (Intensity Modulated Radiation Therapy, allows direct escalated doses without side effects), \( \( \text{20 Multileaf Collimator (eliminates custom blocks and can duplicate shape \) of tumor)

Cost of Equipment: \$2.1 million

The project constrcution started on August 23rd. The time line is being finalized and should take approximately 6-7 months. The Linear Acclerator will take approximately 6 weeks to calibrate once on site. The vault which will house the Linear Acclerator will have walls are constructed with concrete which is 3 to 6 feet thick. The vault will be 1000 soare feet.

The staffing will include: I Radiation Oncologist, Part Time Dosimetrist, Part Time Physicist, 2 Radiation Therapists, 1 Clerk

The expected patient load initially will be approximately 15. These patients routinely receive radiation therapy 5 days a week for 5-8 weeks. The treatments are not very long and ensuring correct positioning is critical. The Treatment planning process establishes the type and scope of the treatments and it is done automatically once verified by the staff. We hope to increase the patient load to 25 by the end of the first year.

# Just Last Week - NATIONAL GUARD FAMILY READINESS GROUP

Mrs. Carnie Yniques, wife of the First Sergeant of Bravo Company of West Hawaii's National Guard, discussed the formation of the Guard's Family Readiness Group. There are 50-60 families in West Hawaii affected by the recent call-up of 62 West Hawaii Guard members for active duty in Iraq who need support services. These services include education courses in "Military 101"e.g. the meaning of acronyms, military terms, chain of command, etc.; how to get along without your husband; how to create a happy home for the guardsman to come home to; problem solving; financial management; how to handle post-traumatic stress disorders. This latter is higher in guardsmen and their families because, as civilians, they have not been immersed in a day to day military milies. While this Readiness Group is still in its charter. immersed in a day-to-day military milieu. While this Readiness Group is still in its charter phase, there are two immediate needs: travel expenses for 10-15 guardsmen in Texas to return home at Christmas time (approximately \$1025 per soldier through special arrangements with United Airlines) and travel expenses for their family members to attend a special redeployment ceremony during a University of Hawaii football game in Oahu's Aloha Stadium in October.. In closing, she thanked those members who have yellow or flag colored ribbons on their cars. While the troops do not see them, the family members do and it means a lot to them. (These magnetized ribbons are on sale through the Elks Club, Kona Coast House of Lights and, periodically, outside Wal-Mart). She asked that club members keep in touch with her group.



## William Moore, Ir



Lynn Walton, President and Managing Director of Kona Community Hospital, presented an update on where the hospital is going and how it's going to get there. The number one project is the completion of the Radiation Therapy Clinic expected by April, 2005. Equipment will be state of the art and target oriented. The clinic will be leveraged with Hilo to insure backup between the two clinics. Negotiation are ongoing with a nationally renowned Radiation Oncologist at U.C.L.A. to head up the clinic. Discussions are also being held with developers of a NIH Cancer Institute adjacent to the new medical school to allow Kona Hospital to

use all the research protocols such that West Hawaii patients will have access to advanced aggressive cancer treatments.

During the Q & A segment Mr. Walton announced that the Nuclear Medicine department has really taken off exceeding projections by 50%; that CT scan colonoscopy is now available. As to the concern that we have enough physicians in the community he reported that 2 new OB/Gyn specialists have been recruited to arrive in November/ December. In addition 3 anesthesiologists have been and a gastroenterologists will be added to staff this year. As to the West Hawaii Medical Center, no certificate of need has been completed nor has a site been chosen; the Community Health Clinic will open in late November.



## In International Service - SISTER CLUB IN JAPAN



The International Services Committee has been communicating with the Rotary Club of Kobe West in Japan. We have been able to do this through the efforts of Allen Konno and his guest Rotarian Ted Minakata. The Kobe West Club BOD has enthusiastically approved a resolution to establish a sister club relationship with our club. While they admit that Hawaii is an obvious attraction, they have also expressed a willingness to explore working with us on a joint project, possibly even in India next year.

The International Services Committee voted to explore this relationship on the condition that this would be a working two way Rotary Club relationship and not just a social program. ### In the World - scavenger Hunting in Iraq!

This Iraqi jet, an advanced Russian MiG-25 Foxbat, was found buried in the sand after an informant tipped off the U. S. troops. The MiG was dug out of a massive sand dune near the Al Taooadum airfield by U.S. Air Force recovery teams. The MiG was reportedly one of over two dozen Iraqi jets buried in the sand, like hidden treasure, waiting to be recovered at a later date. Contrary to what some in the major media have reported, not all the jets found were from the Gulf War era.

The Russian-made MiG-25 Foxbat being recovered by U.S. Air Force troops in the photos is an advanced reconnaissance version never before seen in the West and is equipped with sophisticated electronic warfare devices. U.S. Air Force recovery teams had to use large earthmoving equipment to uncover the MiG, which is over 70 feet long and weighs nearly 25 tons.

The Foxbat is known to be one of Iraq's top jet fighters. The advanced electronic reconnaissance version found by the U.S. Air Force is currently in service with the Russian air force. The MiG is capable of flying at speeds of over 2,000 miles an hour, or three times the speed of sound, and at altitudes of over 75,000 feet.

The recovery of the advanced MiG fighter is considered to be an intelligence coup by the U.S. Air Force. The Foxbat may also be equipped with advanced Russian (and French) made electronics that were sold to Iraq during the 1990s in violation of a U..N. ban on arms sales to Baghdad.

The buried aircraft at Al Taqqadum were covered in camouflage netting, sealed and, in many cases, had their wings removed before being buried more than 10 feet beneath the Iraqi



## At the Podium - DR. ROCKNE FREITAS, Chancellor, Hawaii Community College



Chancellor of Hawaii Community College and its UH Center, West Hawaii will be the speaker at this week's meeting. This is Dr. Freitas' first opportunity to visit and meet club members and will provide him a chance to share his goals for his chancellorship for the college.

The University of Hawai`i Board of Regents approved the appointment of Dr. Rockne Freitas as Chancellor of Hawai`i Community College at its July meeting. His appointment is for a three-year term, effective August 3, 2004.

Freitas was vice president and executive director of the Ke Ali`i Pauahi Foundation. He has held leadership positions at Kamehameha Schools, the University of Hawai`i, and GRG Enterprises, Inc., and served as a trustee for the Office of Hawaiian Affairs. He holds a bachelor's degree in animal science from Oregon State University as well as a master's degree and doctoral degree in education from the University of Hawai`i.

Prior to his academic career, he was a player and coach in the National Football League with the Detroit Lions and Tampa Bay Buccaneers and is an inductee in the Hawai`i Sports Hall of Fame and the Oregon State University Sports Hall of Fame.

## Just Last Week - ROTARIAN RAY WOODS MIDDLE EAST TRAVELS by William Moore Jr

Rotarian Ray Woods shared his recent solo travels as a member of the "Travelers' Century Club" (members must visit 100 countries) through a dozen Middle East countries beginning in Afghanistan, excluding Iran and Iraq. During these travels he visited several Rotary clubs, all of whom now have women as members. One "highly sophisticated" club in Algeria in particular had a woman president; has as its service project the provision of wheelchairs to all citizens needing them. He stated that despite prejudicial media stories he encountered no hostile reaction or incidents in any of these countries traveling as an individual. In fact in Pakistan, for example ,he had unrequested full-time police protection wherever he went to assure his safety and was able to visit in safety the private homes of Arabs in Hezbollah territory.

Other highlights: Tour guides usually Christian Arabs; Palestinians have the single highest birth rate; Arabs lack what they want most, "Pride and Dignity"; Jericho virtually a prison camp for Palestine Authority and citizens; many of these countries are "running out of water" due to lack of rain from deforestation so that, for example, Israel Arabs get I gallon of water a day, Jews 25; the U.S. is losing its ability to be a peace broker; MTV and the Internet are opening the world to young people in the Middle East and many want to come to the U.S.



## Just Last Week - NEW CHANCELLOR OF HCC/UH CENTER SPEAKS by William Moore Jr



Dr. Rockne Freitas, recently appointed Chancellor of Hawaii Community College and UH Center, West Hawaii, stated that he believes our academic institutions are instruments of reflection and change. They "reflect the traditions and needs of the communities that we serve and we instill in each of our students the necessary skills to implement change when it is necessary and appropriate". The mission of Community Colleges is to provide a quality education experience through an open enrollment policy at a very affordable price.

HCC professors concentrate on instruction rather than research and publication. As Chancellor he is charged with creating an identity for Hawaii Community College, bringing in additional resources and improving morale.

Long range plans for identity include a new campus in Hilo across from the high-tech park, a new center in partnership with Hiluhilu Development (Lam/Schwab, principals) in North Kona due to open in 2007 and joint projects with 2 other land owners north of Kailua-Kona. Enrollment in Hawaii Community College has increased 4.1%, the largest in the state system. He closed with his recollection of a sign in the weight room when he was a student, "What the mind can conceive and believe, you can achieve."

Among the legislation proposed at the 2004 Council on Legislation in June was item No. 04-18, "to allow attendance credit for a 30-minute interactive club Web site activity." The passing of this item significantly expanded the definition of make-up meetings, and by extension, Rotary activity. Now, if a member misses a meeting, in order to receive attendance credit, he or she can go online. This offers an alternative to making up a meeting at another club. The Council's recognition both attests to the number of Rotary club Web sites — estimated at 4,000 and growing — and highlights a recent trend in the Rotary world: Web-based clubs that are not merely Web sites of physical clubs but legitimate clubs that exist exclusively on the Internet.

The first e-club, Rotary eClub of District 5450 (Rotary eClub One), was initiated in June 2001 as part of the New Models for Rotary Clubs pilot project and currently has 13 members. The Rotary eClub of District 7150 NY1 and the Rotary eClub of District 7890 followed under the three-year Rotary eClub Pilot Project (formerly known as Cyber Rotary Clubs Pilot Project). Twenty-six clubs are now participating in the eClub project, which was adopted by the 2001 Council on Legislation to help extend Rotary to those who, for a variety of reasons, are unable to meet traditional attendance requirements. "The majority of our members are folks who believe very strongly in Rotary and all that it stands for but find that business demands prevent them from meeting traditional club-meeting percentages," says Marlene Brown of Rotary eClub of District 7150 NY1, which has seven members. Chris Joscelyne, president of eClub One, adds: "Our members have given a total of 150 years of service to Rotary, and eClub One provide the opportunity for them to continue to serve. Without eClub One, these folks would be lost to Rotary."

Joscelyne views the passing of the attendance-credit item in June 2004 as a victory for an idea that the club has championed for some time. "It's an endorsement of the information-rich attendance experience we offer Rotarians who visit our club online for 30 minutes or more," he says. We hope that the Council on Legislation enactment will encourage Rotary clubs everywhere to embrace the concept of an online make-up as a valid attendance credit." To earn an attendance credit, Rotarians usually log on to the Web site, read online material on a range of subjects, post comments, and submit a form to the club secretary. "The overwhelming comment from visitors is that our online programs educate, inform and inspire. That's a great outcome for an investment of a 30-minute visit to our Web site," Joscelyne says. Joscelyne says in a typical week, eClub One welcomes some 2,375 visitors, 715 of whom participate in a meeting program and apply for a make-up credit.

But full-time members of Rotary eClubs like to emphasize that their clubs offer more than just a quick make-up. "A make-up visit to Rotary eClub One is not a 'quick fix' but a real opportunity to become a better informed Rotarian," Joscelyne says. As fully functional and legitimate Rotary clubs, e-clubs pay dues, participate in community projects, and function much like any other traditional club, except that a Web site serves as the only meeting place. This virtual gathering has some Rotarians criticizing online clubs as lacking fellowship, while others fear the replacement of weekly Rotary meetings altogether with online activity. John Minter, the founding president of Rotary eClub One, answered critics of the cyber clubs recently on his club's Web site: "We do not advocate the online make-up venue to replace anything but rather to expand and enhance the wonderful world of Rotary."

Paul Harris could have never imagined e-clubs when he founded the first Rotary club nearly 100 years ago. Whatever the future holds, no one can doubt that e-clubs are providing a whole new way to experience Rotary and bring new members into the Rotary world.


## Just for Fun - HOW TO STAY YOUNG



## At the Podium - ROTAPLAST PROGRAM



This week's speaker will be Rich Wlosinski, a Rotarian from Hilo who was part of the Rotaplast Team that traveled to Cebu City last year. Rich will be presenting a short video tape of the trip, as well as his personal experience of the program. Rich has also been on a National Immunization Trip to India, and if time allows will touch briefly on that trip as well.

The mission of Rotaplast is to provide free reconstructive surgery and treatment to underprivileged children to provide education and to advance research in the prevention of

cleft lip and palate. Rotaplast was founded in 1992 by Rotary Club President Peter Lagarias and Dr. Angelo Capozzi in collaboration with the Rotary Club of San Francisco to facilitate a surgical program in La Serena, Chile to treat children with cleft lip. IN 1996 Rotaplast became a separate non-profit organization and has since expanded its number of annual missions. By the end of 2001 almost 4000 children received curative reconstructive surgery. Hundreds of medical and non-medical volunteers who give of their valuable time, as well as generous organizations such as hospitals and medical equipment companies which give supplies, account for the continued success and expansion of Rotaplast missions.

The Rotary Club of Kona is a charter member of Rotaplast, and has annually provided funding for trips. This year, Past President Bev Fraser will be going to Cebu City with the Rotaplast team as a non-medical volunteer representing Big Island Rotary Clubs. The trip takes place between October  $18-31^{\rm St}$  and in recognition of the  $100^{\rm th}$  year of Rotary, the team will operate on 100 children with cleft lip and palate.

## Just Last Week - NORTH HAWAII OUTCOMES PROJECT by Bev Fraser

The Rotary Club of Kona welcomed Dr. Andrew Ten Have from the North Hawaii Outcomes Project as our guest speaker last week. Speaking on behalf of Dr. Sharon Vitousek, Dr. Have presented many interesting facts and figures regarding the rate of Motor Vehicle Related Fatalities in the County of Hawaii, and why the issue needs to be addressed. As an example, Hawaii County has an average motor vehicle related fatality rate per age adjusted 100,000 population, from 1996 to 2000, which is three times higher than the City and County of Honolulu, and two times higher than Maui and Kauai counties. Dr. Ten Have spoke of the group's research and the importance of the issue, as well as making the Rotary club aware of the cost to the communities in relation to the statistics. Several recommendations were put forward by the North Hawaii Outcomes Project, including the support of effective staffing of the DRE; supporting graduated licenses; and reporting any reckless driving to the non emergency police line. 

## Just Last Week - ROTOPLAST REPORT by William Moore, Jr.



Following a 15 minute screening of a video filmed during the October, 2003, visit of the California-Hawaii Rotaplast team to Cebu City, Philippines, Rich Wlosinski, Hilo Rotarian shared some of his experience. During a 6 day period and after a careful screening of the applicants by pediatricians and geneticist (who had to turn away for medical reasons, 25), the team repaired the cleft lips and palates of 100 patients ranging in age from a few months to 30 years, making a tremendous impact in their lives (initially, when asked her

name, one little girl answered "ugly face"). The before and after pictures were impressive. Rich and other lay volunteers provided transport and record keeping often working from 5:30 A.M. to 7:30 P.M. The total cost of the trip was \$54,000 or approximately \$500 per patient. In addition there were out-of-pocket donations by all members. When asked why there appeared to be so many with cleft lips, Rich replied that non-existent prenatal care was a major factor.

I'll see you all at our meeting on the 28<sup>th</sup>



## AT RI - ROTARY INTERNATIONAL PRESIDENT PRAISES ROTARY ECLUB ONE



Rotary International President Glenn Estess Snr has expressed confidence in a strong future for Rotary eClub One. In a meeting with Rotary eClub One President Chris Joscelyne, Glenn Estess said that the world's first online Rotary Club is demonstrating the viability of Rotary fellowship and service online.

A Rotary club of District 5450 Colorado with its President in Sydney Australia, its Secretary in Oregon, USA, and its board members in various cities of the United States, Canada and Australia may sound like a strange idea, but it is working smoothly as Rotary eClub One expands its membership worldwide.

Members communicate via the club website and via teleconference, email, voice over IP, and in face-to-face meetings at various locations.

An initiative of District 5450, the Internet-based Rotary club was chartered in January 2002. It is Rotary's first eClub, leading the way as other Rotary Districts establish eClubs in Finland, South Korea, Singapore, Hong Kong, Brazil, India, Turkey, Greece, United Kingdom, Malaysia, Norway, Taiwan, Philippines, Australia, New Zealand and in six states of the United States. The original group got a commitment for \$3,000,000 once the land was acquired. The overall project is projected to cost \$10,000,000. Purpose of the project is to give kids a place to go. The project will include 14 tennis courts, golf driving range, high tech room, dance area, parking for 300 cars. This program will be free to kids under 18 and they estimate they have operating funds of \$200,000 to run the facility. There will also be a tower to honor Ellision Onizuka and remind kids that anything is possible if they try. There was also discussion about holding major tennis tournaments with top world champions participating. Les needs community support and is looking for people willing to assist.

## AT RI - FOUNDER BIOGRAPHIES



PAUL P. HARRIS (1868-1947) was a Chicago attorney in 1905 when he had an idea for a club in which professionals could share "mutual cooperation and informal friendship such as all of had once known in our villages." On the evening of Thursday, 23 February 1905, Harris gathered three business acquaintances to form a group that became the Rotary Club of Chicago, initiating the world's first service organization. Harris became the first president of what would later become Rotary International, the association of Rotary clubs around the world with 1.2 million

members united under the motto Service Above Self.

SILVESTER SCHIELE (1870-1945) was a coal dealer and a client of Paul Harris in 1905. Born in rural Indiana, Schiele liked to tell Harris interesting anecdotes of his "young pioneer" boyhood. During the course of their business dealings, Harris first shared the idea with Schiele for a new kind of club for professionals. On 23 February 1905, Harris invited Schiele for dinner to develop his ideas of a fellowship and booster club. In addition to becoming first president of the Rotary Club of Chicago, Schiele developed a close lifelong friendship with Harris.

GUSTAVUS H. "GUS" LOEHR (1864-1918) was a Chicago mining engineer who lent his office on the seventh floor of the Unity Building at 127 Dearborn Street in Chicago for the first gathering of the founders of Rotary on 23 February 1905. Loehr invited Hiram Shorey to this meeting. His health later deteriorated and he left the club, but remained a supporter of Rotary until his death at age 53.

HIRAM E. SHOREY (1862-1944) was a merchant tailor in 1905. One of the founding four members of the Rotary Club of Chicago, he remained a Rotarian for only a short time before moving back to his home state of Maine. Upon his later return to Chicago, he rejoined for a brief time before resigning again. Despite his brief membership, Shorey was always supportive of the Rotary Club of Chicago and voiced pride at his early association with Rotary.



## At the Podium - DR RANDY HITZ, Dean, UHM College of Education



Joining us for this Thursday's meeting is Dr. Dan Boylan, a professor of history at the University of Hawaii--West Oahu, moderator of "Island Insights" on PBS-Hawaii, and political analyst for KHNL News-8. He also writes a weekly political column for the Oahubased MidWeek.

The focus of his talk will be on Politics and the Elections - 2004.

Dan's academic background includes a BA in English Literature from the University of Michigan-Kalamazoo; a MA in English Literature from the University of Michigan, a MA in American Civilization from the University of Iowa-Iowa city; and a Ph.D. in American Studies from UH Manoa. He first came to Hawaii years ago as a Peace Corp Volunteer and attended training in Hilo for his eventual service in Sarawak.

Known for his colorful and informed commentary, quick wit, and years of experience in reviewing politics...both locally and nationally, this is a program you might want to invite a friend to attend.

## Just Last Week - DEAN RANDY HITZ SPEAKS by William Moore, Jr.



Dr. Randy Hitz, Dean, UH Manoa College of Education opened his talk with a few time-worn adages as seen by children: "People who live in glass houses--shouldn't undress" and "A penny saved-isn't much". He then discussed the recent state legislatures' "Reinventing Education Bill" which incorporates the fundamental tenets of "No Child Left Behind" and represents a dramatic shift in education objectives for the future. The first of the tenets is that every child needs and deserves high quality education. In the past it has not been uncommon for only 10 to 50% of high school students to graduate; the goal is now 90%; a civic responsibility.

The second is that teachers do make a difference and teacher quality is very important to the UH. Each year Hawaii needs 1500 new teachers. Inasmuch as local programs graduate only 600, the remainder, usually short termers, must be recruited from the mainland. To alleviate this shortage, the UH plans to develop neighbor island programs that are web-based, making it economically feasible. It is a truism that teacher students drawn from the community are 80% more likely to return to the community whereas mainland teachers are 80% more likely to leave. In addition, the Manoa campus will offer teacher preparation, baccalaureate and post-baccalaureate and masters programs.

great milestones and turning points that have defined our organization. One of Rotary's most significant developments was the creation of The Rotary Foundation of RI, whose programs and projects have brought dignity and hope to millions of people around the world.

The Rotary Foundation started as the dream of one man – Past RI President Arch Klumph. In 1917, he proposed an endowment fund with the express purpose of "doing good in the world." But despite his enthusiasm, the idea did not immediately take off. The first contribution was in the modest amount of US\$26.50 from the Rotary Club of Kansas City, Mo., USA. It wasn't until 1947 – the year of founder Paul Harris's death that Rotarians began contributing large amounts to honor his memory. Since then, The Rotary Foundation has provided more than \$1.4 billion in grants for projects in more than 165 countries.

I would like to thank all those Rotarians who have given so generously of their time and money. Without your support, we would not be able to fund all those programs that have improved the quality of life for so many people. Through the Foundation, Rotarians are helping to overcome hunger, poverty, disease, and illiteracy — the basic afflictions of the human condition that are the main obstacles to world understanding and peace.



## At the Podium - BARNEY & GILL MUNNALALL, International Service, India

### Just Last Week - DR DAN BOYLAN SPEAKS by William Moore, Jr.



"This year, I'm afraid, in many, many ways Hawaiian politics, local politics, are singularly dull." So began Dr. Dan Boylan, UH Manoa history professor and Hawaii Public Television political commentator for many years. went on to say that the Presidential race was consuming all of us; that 17 million more viewers watched the first Bush-Kerry debate this year than watched the first Bush-Gore one. His favorite definition of politics as stated by Henry Adams, "Politics is the systematic organization of hatred". For the first time in 30 years the Democrats are hated every bit as much as the Republicans are. Further highlights included: No one can get excited

about either candidate in the mayoral race; the Democratic party is the party of short people e.g. Neil Abercrombie and Dan Inouye and Mufi is just "too tall" to win as a Democrat; the last Gubernatorial race showed a slow movement to the party of tall people, Linda Lingle being the tallest woman he had met; ; the Congressional races are not likely to result in any changes (Gabbard is a one issue candidate, Case is a fiscally conservative moderate Democrat, Cam Cavasso failed in the Lt. Governor race 2 years ago) there is a dearth of talent in the Republican party despite the growing fiscal and organizational strength in that party; "icons" like Harry Kim always win; President Bush will lose Hawaii by 2-3%; there are demographic changes in Hawaii in several areas: the Japanese population has dropped from 35 to less than 20%, we've had an influx of wealthy mainlanders who are conservative, there are an increasing percentage of Cosmopolitan citizens, and a religious revival with a conservative social agenda is occurring.

Dear fellow Rotarians,



This week is World Interact Week and we Rotarians should take pride in Interact Clubs everywhere and

especially our own Kealakehe Club here in Kona.

The Interact is Rotary International's service club for young people ages 14-18. Interact clubs are sponsored by individual Rotary clubs, which provide support and guidance, but Interact clubs are selfgoverning and self-supporting.

Club membership varies greatly. Clubs can be single-gender or mixed, as well as large and small. The membership base can be drawn from the student body of a single school or from two or more schools from the same community.

Each year, Interact clubs complete at least two community service projects, one of which furthers international understanding and goodwill. Through projects, Interactors develop a network of friendships with local and overseas clubs. And, in the process, Interactors develop leadership skills and learn the value of hard work.

As one of the most significant and fastest-growing programs of Rotary service, with more than 8,600 Interact clubs in some 110 countries and geographical areas, Interact has become a worldwide phenomenon.

Interactors also often spearhead the formation of clubs and participate in (RYLA). Interactors also often go on to become students or .

For more information about Interact in your area, contact your local Rotary club or your district Interact chair.

Interact, Rotary International's service club program for young adults at the secondary school level, was officially inaugurated on 28 October 1962. The foundation of Interact marked a new approach to youth service for Rotary. For the first time, Rotarians were not just serving youth, but were empowering them to serve in their communities and internationally with their Rotary club sponsors.

Rotary service to youth dates back as early as 1917, when a committee was appointed to study youth service. Two years later, a department dedicated to "Boys' Work" was established and in 1920, the Rotary Club of New York organized Boys' Week, an annual celebration that encouraged patriotism and loyal citizenship in its young participants. The movement caught on as Rotary clubs sponsored Boys' Weeks across the United States and abroad. Thirteen years later, the program was officially renamed Youth Week in order to incorporate girls. Although such activities engaged Rotarians in service to youth, many club members around the world began to feel that something else could be done to actively engage young adults in service to their communities.

One of the earliest predecessors to Interact was known as the Ro Club, a service club for high school students. Ro clubs' goals and projects were very similar to those of today's Interact clubs. Yrator Clubs (Rotary spelled backward) for outstanding high school students also were active as early as 1934. Their efforts focused on community activities but did not incorporate the international element that is required of clubs today. In 1939, Pan-American Clubs for primary and secondary school students were proposed as a way to increase international understanding and goodwill. The clubs' purpose was to educate students throughout the Americas on the customs and cultures of other countries in the Western Hemisphere. However, without the official endorsement of Rotary International, the movement eventually fizzled out.

Throughout the 1940s, Rotarians continued to serve the children and young adults in their communities by sponsoring the efforts of other organizations. Yet, feeling the need to actively engage youth in community service, Rotary clubs around the world soon began forming youth service clubs based on the ideals, principles, and organization of their own clubs. The Rotary Club of Miami, Fla., USA, sponsored the most influential of these movements, known as Wheel clubs. Although Wheel clubs were not adopted as an official Rotary program, the RI Board decided to research the feasibility of creating a youth service organization for adoption by all Rotary clubs.

Before the end of his term in 1960, then-RI President Harold T. Thomas appointed an Ad Hoc Committee on Youth to study the implementation of youth service clubs. The group studied preexisting youth clubs and consulted with Rotarians, educators, teenagers, and sociologists. Committee Chairman Charles H. Taylor of Christchurch, New Zealand, played the greatest role in the creation and approval of the program through his insight, leadership, and extensive research. The program was named Interact, a combination of the words "international" and "action."

On 5 November 1962, within eight days of the official adoption of the Interact program, the first Interact club was chartered at Melbourne High School, Fla., USA. The club's 39 members reflected the universal criteria that all Interactors be male and in the last three years of secondary school. Within one year there were 177 Interact clubs in 24 countries; by October 1964 that number had grown to 450 clubs in 35 countries. Within a few years, Interact began to take on its present form. In 1967, the RI Board opened membership to female members, preceding the admission of females to Rotary clubs by 20 years. During the same year, Interact membership was extended to any student in the last four years of secondary school.

From 1967 to 1978, The Rotary Foundation of RI sponsored "Rotary International Awards for International Understanding" for Interactors. Recognition was awarded to Interact clubs that undertook projects that improved international understanding and goodwill. Youth Exchange participation, visits to foreign Interact clubs, and projects that aided developing countries were among the most common projects recognized.

Since 1999, recognition for Interact clubs has continued in the form of , which is celebrated every year during the week of 5 November to commemorate the founding of the first Interact club. During World Interact Week, Interactors and Rotarians are encouraged to work together on a variety of service projects. Upon completion of these projects, clubs are recognized with a special pin and letter from the RI president.

Interact continues to experience phenomenal growth. The United States, India, Brazil, and Japan boast the highest number of Interact clubs. Interactors also frequently join with other local and international organizations in the name of service. Working together, Interactors and Rotarians continue to show that they are ready for "international action."



#### At the Podium - FELICITY JOHNSON & STUDENTS, Hualalai Academy



Our presenters this week will be from Hualalai Academy, a private, nonsectarian, K through 12<sup>th</sup> grade school located here in Kona on the side of Hualalai Mountain. Principal Felicity Johnson and a handful of students will share with you information about Hualalai Academy from its inception as an independent school in 1995-96 as a K through 6<sup>th</sup> grade school of 67 students with seven full time and five part time faculty and staff, to the K through 12<sup>th</sup>

grade school of today with 206 students with twenty-three full time and twelve part time faculty and staff.

Felicity Johnson has been the Principal of Hualalai Academy since its inception in 1995-96. Felicity has attended the University of London Institute of Education, London University, and Oxford University; she holds an M A degree in Education. She is past president of Kona Crime Prevention, vice president of the Waimea Community Theater, and, among other things, a member of Partnership for Hawaii's Keiki Project, National Association of University Women, and the Association for Childhood Education International. Each student will introduce themselves and tell you a bit about why they like being a student at Hualalai Academy.

#### Just Last Week - BARNEY & GILL MUNNALALL by William Moore, Jr.

Barney and Gill Munnalall from the School of Biblical Studies, Univ. Nations, Kona, recounted their experiences while serving in Calcutta, India, and leading student outreach teams from YWAM. To his rhetorical question, "What is India like?" Mr. Munnalall went on to say that: India is the largest "democracy" in the world with a population greater than one billion; it is a mixture of contrasts from the extreme wealth and development to abject poverty and destitution; there is no common language such that citizens from one area are totally ignorant of the language of another; 80% are devout Hindus with a rigid caste system despite efforts of Mahatma Ghandi and others to abolish such; changes in caste can occur only with reincarnation; there are 4 major castes e.g. Brahmans (priests/earthly gods), Kshatriyns (warriors), Vaisyas (farmers and merchants) and Sudras (laborers/servants) and then the caste-less, the "Untouchables" which include those with leprosy; this system is perpetuated by ideas of reincarnation and "karma"; the "Untouchables", as demonstrated in Mother Theresa's mission long for and respond gratefully to such basic care as baths and food.



#### At the Podium - BEV FRASER, Rotoplast Adventure



Past President Bev Fraser will be our guest speaker this week and will be sharing with the Club her Rotaplast Adventure. As part of the 29 member team to Cebu City Philippines in October of this year, the group joined with the Rotary Club of Metro Cebu and the Rotary Club of Cebu Port Center in an effort to operate on 100 children and adults with cleft lip or cleft palate. This joint project between Rotaplast and the Rotary clubs was to celebrate the 100th anniversary of Rotary International.

As a charter club of Rotaplast International, the Rotary Club of Kona has had presentations on Rotaplast trips in the past, but this is the first time one of our own club members has participated in a mission. Past President

Bev will share her personal stories of the experience, which are sure to be both emotional and heartwarming. Please join us in learning why Rotaplast "Changes Smiles - Changes Lives".

#### Just Last Week - FELICITY JOHNSON by William Moore, Jr.



AT our last Royal Kona Meeting on November 11, Felicity Johnson, Principal, Hualalai Academy and 5 students discussed the mission of the Academy over the past 8 years since its inception. Students are taught to: exhibit appropriate social skills, demonstrate high levels of critical thinking, take responsibility for their own physical well being and show interest, appreciation and respect for the fine arts and culture. Five of her students then presented their

testimonies as to their achievements in this academic environment and their appreciation for this school. One junior reported his invention of a successful model hovercraft that could achieve speeds up to 30 miles per hour 2 cm off the surface. Another student presented slides of her science project showing that fertile chicken eggs rotated every 8 hours for 18 of the 21 day incubation period produced a larger harvest and healthier chicks compared with a commercial egg agitator. Future plans for the Academy include additional classrooms, a performing arts center and additional sports facilities.

On November 18 members gathered at the Natural Energy Laboratory of Hawaii for a presentation by Jacqui Hoover, NELHA Gateway Manager of the ongoing research and production of desalinated water, aquaculture and renewable energy. Begun in 1974 with OTEC, the campus now houses 34 separate tenants using the AA pure deep seawater off Keahole Point. At present Koyo USA is producing 250,000 liter bottles of water for consumption throughout Asia at a price of 5-18 dollars per bottle; they are backordered for 3 years! Four other companies are under construction to provide "pure" water also. Aquaculture companies include Cyanotech, which produces high-value microalgae-based natural products including nutraceuticals; others are cultivating shellfish, moi, abalone, halibut, sea horses for aquaria, flounder and black pearls. Of interest is that the abalone is air-freighted to Japan in "6 packs" for a price of about \$20 per abalone. She then escorted members to the Hawaii Gateway Energy Center demonstration building. Renewable natural energy has become a priority since "without energy security there is no national security". In the building she pointed out that natural air conditioning and water are produced by coursing warm air over cold seawater pipes in the floor; when the copper roof heats up it draws outside air through a miniature "volcano" of lava rocks behind the building. As the air passes over the seawater pipes it is cooled and exits through two chimneys. Water of condensation produced is used in flush toilets and household activities.





#### Just Last Week - BEV FRASER, Rotoplast Project Experiences



Rotaplast 2004, Cebu, Philippines. After a 10 minute video presentation, Bev Fraser asked rhetorically, "Have you ever volunteered without knowing what you were getting into?" then shared her experiences as part of the Rotaplast team of 29 members. During its visit the team repaired the cleft palates and/or cleft lips of 99 patients at a cost of roughly \$500 per case. Initially a recorder for the dentist in the prescreening clinic, Bev was then assigned to the postoperative recovery room with the pediatrician . The days of work were

long and intense beginning at 0630 and often lasting until 2100 hours in hot, muggy weather where only the operating rooms were air-conditioned. She was able to meet many children and their families before and after surgery. During her presentation Bev recounted many case histories, drawings and still photos of these children. She concluded by saying that this was a profoundly moving experience and a credit to Rotary and the surgical teams.

## At the Podium - THE FRIENDS OF THE CHILDREN'S JUSTICE CENTER OF WEST HAWAII



The goal of this organization is "to help a victim become a child again". Supported since its inception by the Rotary Club of Kona, the FRIENDS of the Children's Justice Center is a private 501(c)3 non-profit corporation formed to support the State of Hawaii's Children's Justice Center. The CJC, a program of the State judiciary, provides facilities where children who have been abused and/or neglected or have been witnesses to serious violence are professionally interviewed in a friendly environment. Though the resulting videotapes are not admissible in court, their existence removes the need for the child to testify repeatedly to the police, the social worker,

or other professionals who become involved in the case and can facilitate settlement of the case.

The FRIENDS provide for "enhancement" activities, and sometimes the basic needs, of the child victims that are not available from other social services. This has included just about everything from diapers to prom dresses. Support for participation in extracurricular clubs and classes is a priority, and the FRIENDS have made possible the attendance of many teens from West Hawaii at Winners' Camp, a week-long life skills and self-image improvement camp on Oahu.

We are fortunate to have three leaders of this organization who will speak this week to Kona Rotary about the work of the CJC and the FRIENDS. Suzanne Gillam is an audiologist who serves as chair of the Program Committee for FCJC Board of Directors, Debbie DeRoos is the Program Director of the CJC of West Hawaii and Alice Daniel is the Program Coordinator for the FRIENDS. Come to the meeting and learn about the exciting work of this local non-profit!

#### Just Last Week - CLUB ASSEMBLY, by William Moore, Jr.

Scott Unger opened the Club Assembly with his Vocational Service report of the successful granting of a Junior Achievement charter and selection of Kealakehe High School for the first project for which 5 students are enrolled. He announced the initiation of an "Employer of the Year" award for next year. There followed the election of officers for 2005-2006: Richard Hershberger, President; Ron Scott, President-Elect; Secretary: Gretchen Watson-Kabei; Barbara Bush, Treasurer; and Larry Peckam, Sergeant-at-Arms. Barbara Bush discussed the budget for next year, salient points of which included: Revenue of \$28,050.00 from dues and various fees; Total Expenses of \$40,251.00; shortfall of \$12,201.00 to be made up from Community and Youth Service Projects and rolled over International Service Project funding. She went on to say that future fundraisers might include a golf tournament and "Taste of the World" international project adding a projected \$20,000.00 for service projects. Income from the MasterCard golf tournament was already earmarked for Community Service projects. Bill Cliff presented the International Service report of the matching grant program with Shennai, India, and the cancellation of the proposed Rotary/Interact visit to orphanages sponsored in India. Ron Scott announced the Centennial TriClub social at Marriott Waikoloa on the evening of February 26th. Bev Fraser reported that the club had 73 members with 2 more "in the pipeline". President Clark closed with the announcement that there would be no club meeting on February 20 and February 27th would be joint meeting with the Chamber of Commerce.

On Thursday, January 6, 2005, Congress unanimously passed legislation to allow a deduction on 2004 tax returns for qualified tsunami-related charitable contributions made in January 2005.

This is a wonderful opportunity to help provide much-needed relief to tsunami victims in South Asia without having to wait a year to enjoy the tax deduction. (Normally you can deduct only charitable contributions made during the tax year.)

The deduction does not have to be taken in 2004 and any contribution made throughout 2005 is still deductable for 2005, but this could be an opportunity to offset some 2004 profits resulting from our booming real estate and construction industries.





#### At the Podium - LYNN WALTON - Kona Community Hospital



CEO of the HHSC and Kona Community Hospital and Kohala Critical Access Hospital and past Kona Rotarian, Lynn Walton will be presenting a short update to the Club concerning "where we are and where we are going with acute hospital care in Kona and Kohala."

He will give a general presentation, discuss the medical issues before the legislature and then have a more extended Q & A time so that he can respond to the issues members are most concerned about.

#### Just Last Week - CHILDREN'S JUSTICE CENTER, by William Moore, Jr.

Incorporated in 1989, the Childrens Justice Center (CJC), then called "Advocacy Center", built a house where children who had witnessed serious violence or had been abused/neglected might have professional care in a supportive environment. Thus began the presentation by Program Chair Suzanne Gillum. Most children are in foster care with needs from diapers to prom dresses. Another emphasis is on lessons that improve self esteem e.g. hulas, karate, soccer. Project "Winners Camp" is an annual week-long self esteem camp on Oahu at a cost of \$1000 per child; 65 children have been sent from Hawaii since 1989 with the support of FRIENDS and their fund raisers. Last year 190 interviews were held with close to 400 children seen. Program Coordinator, Alice Daniel, then discussed such topics as: They have had a 25% increase in services requested during 2004; the desire to institute a Winners Camp follow-up program; their partnership with Family Support Services. During the Q & A, she stated that children usually come to the CJC through the police department or to FRIENDS through any professional venue.

#### At the Club - WELCOME TO OUR SISTER CLUB



On January 27 at Allen Konno's house, a select group of Kona Board Rotarians officially welcomed the Rotary Club of Kobe West, Japan, as a sister club of Rotary Club of Kona. Bill Cliff made the opening remarks followed by welcome address by Dick Herschberger, President Elect. Katsuhiro Uegaki, President of Kobe West then gave an welcoming address completely in English. Signing of the official Sister Club Agreement was next, followed by the exchange of Club Flags. After the traditional exchange of gifts, the ceremony was closed by Bill Cliff.

After the ceremony ended, everyone enjoyed an evening of entertainment and socializing highlighted by a magic show performed by our own Allen Kona. Allen noted that like Kona, Kobe has about 80 members and is also celebrating its 50th anniversary this year. We all look forward to a long and cordial relationship with our new friends and fellow Rotarians from Kobe, Japan.

Do you know what is involved in the Polio immunization campaign in India? Here are some facts:

- 640,000 vaccination booths.
   2.3 million vaccinators.
- 3) 1.1 million vaccination teams.
- 4) 137,000 supervisors, with 137,000 vehicles (cars, motorcycles, mopeds, bicycles, boats, elephants, camels or whatever it takes).
- 5) 200 million doses of Polio Vaccine, carried around the country in 2 million vaccine carrier bags.
- 6) 6.3 million Ice packs to keep all those doses of Polio Vaccine in the 2 million vaccine carrier bags cold.
- 7) 191 million homes visited. 8) 170 million children immunized in just one day.

And that's just for one single NID. In 2004, India will conduct 5 such NID's and I Sub National Immunization day (SNID) targeting 100 million children.



#### Just Last Week - LYNN WALTON SPEAKS, by William Moore, Jr.



Lynn Walton, CEO of Kona and Kohala Hospitals, presented an update on both hospitals. Positive developments in Kona Hospital included the opening of the Radiation Therapy Department in April; completion of a helipad and new parking area; increased community participation and patient satisfaction up some 18%.

Areas of concern include slow growth of medical staff compared with population in general so that local physicians are overwhelmed; resignation of urologist and ER physician; unavailability of in-hospital house staff (this latter to be addressed by development of contract hospitalist physicians

to provide hospital care).

Future plans include a Kona Hospital Clinic so that Honolulu physicians can provide patient care and use operating room facilities; digital x-ray storage; computerized lab and x-ray results for instantaneous use in all hospital areas; a pharmacy system upgrade in 1 year; expansion of ER department to 5700 square feet of! space; recruitment of essential physician specialists. He went on to say that given resources and governmental clearance we could build a state-of-the-art hospital and a centralized medical campus within 2 years on land north of Kailua Kona; that the legislature is the "enemy of the public hospital system" through its control of procurement and rules regarding bargaining units; that the hospital is asking the State to pay at least 41 million of an 80 million dollar bill for services rendered to their patients under Medicaid, etc.


#### Just for fun - THE VET BILL



At the Podium - JUSTIN VIEZBICKE - Hawaiian Islands Humpback Whale National Marine Sanctuary



The Hawaiian Islands are the world's most isolated island archipelago, born of ancient volcanoes and inhabited by animals and plants derived from ancestors that found their way here over thousands of miles of ocean. According to scientists, the shallow, warm waters surrounding the main Hawaiian Islands constitute one of the world's most important habitats for the endangered humpback whale. Nearly two-thirds of the entire North Pacific population of humpback whales migrates to Hawai`i each winter. Here, they engage in

breeding, calving and nursing activities critical to the survival of their species.

The sanctuary is also home to a fascinating array of marine animals, corals and plants, some of which are found nowhere else on Earth. Its cultural heritage includes Native Hawaiian traditions of living in harmony with the sea. Its waters invite activities such as diving, boating and snorkeling, and support commercial uses such as fishing and shipping.

Just Last Week - Kathie Amelotte, Hawaii Island United Way by William Moore, Jr.



Along with seven United Ways across the nation, Hawaii United Way (HUW) is looking at community impact areas where "we can unite folks together to bring all the community resources together to make a difference in a systematic way", began Cathie Amelotte in her presentation to the club. HUW is an island-wide charitable organization independent of Aloha United Way with some 46 programs funded on this island. To date it has reached 88% of its current goal.

She then introduced Ardeth Weeks, who discussed Hospice of Kona, a HUW program. Hospice provides support for the entire family, not just the patient, on an outpatient basis, not only during the terminal illness but also during the bereavement period. Each patient must have a prognosis of less than 6 months, a personal physician and a home caregiver. At present Hospice cares for 19 patients per day, a marked jump since its inception. Emphasis is placed on physical, ! emotional and spiritual therapy for pain; volunteers to provide relief for over-extended family members; arranging for specific specialized medical equipment.

Hospice does not provide curative care, diagnostic testing or private care givers. An RN is available 24/7 to answer questions from the families. At present 85% of patient care is paid for by private or government insurance and 15% from donations. No one is turned away.



The Hawaiian Islands Humpback Whale National Marine Sanctuary is one of 13 national marine sanctuaries created under the U.S. Marine Protection, Research and Sanctuaries Act. The sanctuary's goal is to promote comprehensive and coordinated management, research, education and long-term monitoring for the endangered humpback whale and its habitat.

The sanctuary focuses its efforts on a variety of issues, including supporting the work of marine researchers, coordinating and participating in community outreach projects, developing educational displays, and working cooperatively with local organizations, agencies and volunteers to address resource protection and public awareness.

On the Big Island, the Sanctuary covers the west side of the island from Keahole Point to Opolu Point. Mr. Viezbicke told us that the humpback whale population is increasing about 7% per year and that approximately 5,000 whales migrate each year from Alaska to Hawaii. 



This week, Kira Bogouslavski, a member of the Rotary Club of Kihei-Wailea, on Maui, will be speaking and showing a PowerPoint presentation about The OrphanAct Project. The Rotary Club of Kihei-Wailea is the first sponsor of this exciting new project and other clubs are being asked to become co-sponsors of this project.

The goal of this project is to help orphans around the world, with the pilot project starting in Eastern Russia. Russian Rotary clubs are being asked to find projects that will help children in orphanages. These projects will be shown on the OrphanAct website. Rotary clubs may then choose a project to sponsor. OrphanAct is in the early stages of development and currently a joint Rotary project of The Rotary Clubs of Hawaii and Rotary District 5010 (Alaska, Eastern Russia, and Northwest Canada).

#### Just Last Week - GREG CHUN PhD, Pres Bishop Holding Corp, GM Keauhou Resort



Keauhou Resort is comprised of 2,368 acres of land in makai portions of the ahupuaa of Kahaluu, Keauhou I and Keauhou II on the Kona coast of Hawaii's Big Island. Existing development of over 750 acres includes approximately 1,500 residences, two hotels (Sheraton Keauhou Bay Resort & Spa and Outrigger Keauhou Beach Hotel), two 18-hole golf courses and a shopping center. Many important cultural and historic sites are located throughout Keauhou. Keauhou Resort is poised to reposition itself as a successful new resort community that uniquely blends a resort lifestyle with cultural and educational elements.

The Keauhou Strategic Master Plan outlines a vision and roadmap for Keauhou. In this vision, Keauhou is transformed into a thriving and successful Hawaiian resort community that fulfills the intent of Princess Pauahis Will, both indirectly by generating income to support the educational mission of Kamehameha Schools, and directly by the development of educational and cultural programs based in Keauhou that serve Kona. Due to its historical and cultural legacy, Keauhou can provide a venue for educational outreach and cultural programs that synergize visitor and resident interaction at the resort. Keauhou is envisioned as a thriving and successful resort community resonating with a Hawaiian sense of place.

Keauhou Resort was developed over forty years ago as one of the first destination resorts in Hawaii. Its present inventory of approximately 3,000 hotel/condo/single family homes represents over 40% of the total West Hawaii resort inventory.

- Under the new strategic plan, full build out density has been reduced by one third, from 6,570 to 4,428 units. Fewer hotel units represent the bulk of this reduction, reflecting an increased emphasis on residential sales and the more ownership-oriented nature of Keauhou.
- In keeping with current trends, larger residential lots and units will be developed to attract higher end buyers.
- The strategic plan calls for the development of significant resort amenities within Keauhou Resort.
- Development of golf courses are important to provide aesthetic and recreational benefits to Keauhou visitors and residents.
- The restoration and maintenance of cultural assets is clearly a goal within the strategic plan.
- The integration of education into the development through a Community Learning Center will provide a variety of educational programs that nurture native Hawaiians, local residents and visitors.
- Upon completion, Keauhou will increase by approximately 51% over todays unit inventory. The plan envisions a shift from a hotel-dominated resort, to one more oriented to private ownership of condominiums, timeshare units and vacation home residences.



## At the Polium - MARK MCGUFFIE, GREG CHUN - KKCC Leadership Development Project

Mark is the founder of the Hawaii Island Leadership Series - Ulumau. Greg is a graduate of the first class. The Ulumau program is sponsored by the Kona-Kohala Chamber of Commerce with the intention of expanding the ranks of community leadership by providing a broad range of leaders with the knowledge and incentive to confront the needs of our community. The series informs, motivates, and raises awareness of community issues and sense of community trusteeship through seminars, tours, reading, and interaction with experts, leaders and decision-makers. A group of outstanding individuals is selected annually to participate in a program that runs from September to June. Classes meet monthly, with full-day sessions around Hawai`i Island, to provide working, hands-on knowledge of pertinent issues facing the community. In addition to the classes, each class member is required to participate on a working committee that will assist pre-selected organizations that are in need of hands-on help for the duration of the series. Ulumau is currently accepting applications for its third year, which will begin in September 2005.

#### Just Last Week - KIRA BOGOUSLAVSKI, OrphanAct Project

THE PROBLEM - 4 million orphans and homeless kids in Russia. Thousands die on the streets every winter from cold and starvation. Orphanage graduates are not prepared for independent living

SAD STATISTICS - Over 700,000 orphans in Russia in 2000. After leaving their orphanages: 50% - fall into a high-risk category. 40% - become drug users. 40% - commit crimes. 10% - commit suicide.

THE ORPHANACT WEBSITE OFFERS THE PROJECTS TO U.S. ROTARY CLUBS - The service they provide is to bring the Russian Rotary clubs offering projects, together with the U.S. Rotary clubs looking for projects. This is rather like a real estate broker bringing buyer and seller together. This service will be offered on the OrphanAct website (.) The key to effectively selling any product is in the marketing and sales effort. The projects will be aggressively marketed to clubs and Rotarians. The heart of the service side of OrphanAct is the website. Constantly updating the web pages will be one of the first committee projects. At first this website would display a few projects supplied by Russian Rotary clubs and will be used by clubs in District 5000. This would be a time of testing out our project in District 5000. Our goal is to attract a small number of volunteers from each club on Maui, then a small group of volunteers from clubs on other islands. In addition we will be discussing OrphanAct with District 5000 leadership and the leadership of District 5010. Our goal is for Rotarians from both Districts to be on any committee they choose. We will need the following committees:

- Finance managing how money is spent and keeping accurate records.
- Marketing considering subjects such as website design, and literature.
- Steering most likely made up of the committee chairs.
- Liaison volunteers who will be in contact with Russian Rotary clubs and District 5010 leaders to coordinate the movement of photos and text.
- Technology a committee to consider using groupware (software that allows committees or teams to work together over the internet so they do not need to meet in person) to organize the committee work. This may not be necessary at first, but later we will have people from different Rotary clubs working together on the same committees and then this software will be helpful.
- Project Selection Aiding and monitoring the project selection process in Russia.
- Board of Directors Rotarians from District 5000 and 5010.

Our goal is to involve you and your club in the lives of the children in need. This is more than a fundraising project! It is a Rotary, Rotaract, and Interact INVOLVEMENT project. We use the power of the internet to involve you and your club with Rotary clubs, Rotaract clubs, orphanages, children's hospitals, and homeless shelters in Russia. You and your club may become as involved as you want to be. You may sponsor a single project, or a series of projects at the same facility and watch the children grow. 

#### Just Last Week - MARK MCGUFFIE, GREG CHUN - KKCC Leadership Development Project

Using his experience with an executive leadership program in Indiana some 20 years ago Mark McGuffie met a few years ago with a small number of business leaders, Rotary officers and Daniel Akaka to organize Ulumau, an eight month long educational experience providing a select group of community leaders with the knowledge and incentive to confront the needs of our community. Thus began the presentation by Mark and Greg Chun, a graduate of the first class. Classes are held monthly from October to June and cover all aspects of Hawaii Island beginning with the history of this island. In addition to class attendance, participants are given assignments to organizations that are in need of hands-on help such as Hawaii Aloha United Way. Greg, now with the Kamehameha Investment Corporation, recounted his experience as a class member in 2004 assigned to assist the Aloha United Way with their strategic plan, and in gaining wider knowledge of island resources. Ulumau is sponsored by the Kona-Kohala Chamber of Commerce and its mission parallels the mission of Rotary: "Service above Self". During the Q&A period Mark pointed out that admission is via a written application to the Kona-Kohala Chamber of Commerce; that applicants must have lived in Hawaii for three or more years and have demonstrated a record of participation/achievement in voluntary community activities. The cost of the program is \$1000 per participant.



#### At the Podium - ANN PETERSON, PATH

PATH was formed in 1986 to provide traffic safety education and a safe environment on roadways and trails for recreation, fitness and alternative modes of transportation. Ann C. Peterson, current secretary for PATH, will provide an update on the organization's activities.

Ann C. Peterson has a Masters degree from Michigan State University - While at the university she was the council of graduate student's rep on the "All University Traffic Council -- (at 45,000, the population of MSU is larger than Kona the districts.) While on council the university did a two-years comprehensive traffic study, where she had the opportunity to learn much of the philosophy she uses today. She served as a Traffic Commissioner for the city of East Lansing, and was on the Linear Park steering committee in my home town of Battle Creek.

She moved to Kona in 1994 from Takasaki, Japan where she was the "sister city liaison" for three years. She joined KTSC (Kona Traffic Safety Committee) 8 years ago, and was elected chair 6 years ago. She has been the Educational Programs & Development Director at the Kona Historical Society, and has served as the VP for Public Relations for Kona Outdoor Circle and is presently the Secretary for PATH. 



#### At the Podium - ROB PACHECO, Hawaii Forest & Trail



Rob Pacheco has a passion for the natural world of Hawaii. It was a passion that began almost as soon as he stepped off the plane here in 1990 and quickly realized that these islands contained diverse and unique ecosystems rivaling any place on earth.

Because of its isolation in the middle of the Pacific and volcanic geology, Rob realized that Hawaii was a paradise for studying evolutionary biology, extinction, endangered species and conservation. It was a place where the fundamental lessons of creation and earth sciences could be seen, experienced and understood.

At the same time Pacheco, who has worked as a naturalist on the mainland, concluded most residents and visitors were only seeing Hawaiiis beautiful scenery and had little knowledge of Hawaiiis natural history.

Pacheco decided to combine his passion with a vision: to share his passion for natural history with others and to help conserve Hawaiiís endangered environment by educating them about it. It was a vision that fit well with the growing worldwide interest in ecotourism. Soon thereafter, and with the help of his wife Cindy whom he had met in Kona, the idea for Hawaii Forest & Trail was born.

#### Just Last Week - ANN PETERSON, PATH - by William Moore Jr.

Our dream is that more people will get out of their cars to walk, roller blade, bike ride or whatever and enjoy Kona in a face-to-face environment, stated Ann Peterson, secretary of PATH, in her update of the organizations activities. To do that we need more facilities and education. She went on to illustrate with photos of the Walua Road Bike and Pedestrian Scenic Route and old pedestrian pathways such as Ala Kahakai, Judd Trail and Makai Street, now usurped by autos. While PATH is doing a lot it is not a happy story. For example early 90s school programs on bicycle and pedestrian safety are no more; more safe routes to school are needed (at Kealakehe, over 300 students can easily walk to school when a short connection was opened on the water tank easement road; at Kahakai, where traffic studies were made in depth, the "carpeted" path could have increased pedestrian use and sharply reduce auto traffic congestion); "Walk to! school" days should be encouraged (90% of students ride to school at present). She went on to add that engineers, many living on Oahu, don't seem to understand the importance of bike and pedestrian facilities when planning development; that motor vehicles need to be on a human scale with safety features such as "breakaway bumpers" i.e. "pedestrian friendly". Future activities include advocating the completion of a Queen Kaahumanu pathway and a Pu'u'wa'awa'a Wilderness Area with hiking and biking trails with camping.







Tours described by Rob include Mauna Kea and its observatories, Kilauea Volcano, Kohala Mule Rides, wet and dry forest adventures, and forest bird watching. Additional

comments included: that the goal of the company is to provide for each guest a safe, comfortable and enjoyable educational experience; that all guides must have the right information and be passionate about providing each tour; that while prices appear high, people want value, not bargains, and authentic experiences such as seeing red lava or standing behind a waterfall. He concluded by urging those of us who live in Hawaii to pay attention to what's happening to our natural resources and help conserve Hawaii's endangered environment.



#### Just Last Week - JOHANN RIVAUD, University of the Nations



Johann Rivaud, French born faculty member of the University of Nations, regaled the membership with his observations of American attitudes to France. The common statement by tourists that the French do not like Americans stems from the fact that visitors typically spend 3 days in Paris and rarely, if ever, spend time in the more hospitable countryside where language and customs vary from province to province e.g. South France is much like Kona; Alsace is German speaking; Normandy dialects are almost unintelligible to someone from Alsace. "Paris is not France"; it is a cosmopolitan

big city with big city attitudes. He went on to say that Food is "big" in France where the typical meal is 5 courses: entree (salad), hors d'oeuvre (main course), cheese, bread and, most important, dessert followed by coffee. Weddings are typically 2 day feasts of as many as 11 courses with intervening entertainment, lasting 5 hours culmnating with dessert at 1:30 A.M. Dancing until 7:30 A.M., guests nap and afterward enjoy a big lunch. He concluded with tips on French mealtime etiquette: keep both hands but no elbows on the table, wait until hostess begins to eat before dining, crossed utensils on the plate means "I'm full" whereas parallel indicates the desire for additional servings, decline initially hostess offer of more and it is acceptable to sop up the sauces with one's bread.

#### At RI - ROTARIANS CELEBRATE 100 YEARS AT PARIS MARATHON



A youthful centennial may be an oxymoron to wordsmiths, but to the 232 Rotarians who participated in the Paris Marathon to mark Rotary's 100th anniversary, it was a sprightly statement about commitment to service.

Clad in Rotary's blue-and-gold colors, the runners came from 40 Rotary districts in 15 countries. According to Jean-Claude Brocart, governor of District 1700 and initiator of the Paris Marathon centennial project, the team was one of the largest

contingents to enter the race. A total of 35,000 people participated in the marathon on 10 April 2005.

"Our target was to communicate about Rotary and PolioPlus and to give a dynamic and young picture of Rotary," Brocart explained. "Every runner, especially the numerous foreigners, was quite satisfied."

Rotarians traveled from all over France and abroad to cheer the participants. A group from the Île-de-France region near Paris distributed fliers and brochures about Rotary and sold Rotary-themed T-shirts, baseball caps, and posters to raise funds for polio eradication.

Guillaume, a nine-year-old whose leg muscles have been weakened by myopathy, was one of the youngest participants. Eight Rotarians pushed and pulled a Joëlette, (a special wheelchair) bearing him through the entire course of the race.

"Guillaume had dreamt of [doing] this for many months," Brocart said. "It was a great success. The heroic team was continuously cheered by the public."

On the eve of the marathon, Rotarian runners and spectators gathered for a pasta party and pep rally. They met again at a dinner party after the event and considered planning future reunions to recapture the fellowship they experienced during the marathon.



### President's Position At Dissict 5000 - CONTROVERSY SURROUNDS DG NOMINATION

The following letter (edited for length) from Dave Berry started the controversy:

"As you know five of us were nominated by our Clubs as candidates for District Governor and were not selected. All of us had been candidates in the past. We had been advised that essential qualities to be a viable nominee were among other things experience at the District level and being known by the Rotarians of the District. I know all of my fellow nominees well and they certainly all qualify on both counts and over many years have shown their dedication to Rotary.

I know I speak for all of us when I say that when you become a serious candidate for DG you sort of put your life on hold for several years and even before the selection process begin to make plans on how to improve your District. If we are not selected of course that is a disappointment, but in the past we have always known that the nominee has also had vast experience and dedication to Rotary.

This year much to the surprise of all of us the Nominating Committee selected a first time candidate who has never had one day of experience beyond the Club level and is not well know outside of his own island. I know the candidate who was selected and in no way question his sincerity, it is just that the rest of us honestly felt betrayed based on what qualifications the Nominating Committee told us they expected. I think it would be safe to say that he was just as surprised as the rest of us.

Two of my fellow nominees indicated that their Clubs intended to put their names in as challenge candidates. Having seen a challenge in my previous District I know that challenges can be very detrimental to the District and can of course label the challenger as a non team player and acting out of sour grapes.

I know that this is not the case with my fellow nominees, they just feel betrayed by the system and I can certainly understand that. I suggested to them that since one or more challenges seem inevitable that I thought it would be more appropriate it all of us became challengers. Hopefully this would send the message that the problem is with the system and not the egos of the unselected candidates. Believe me I have thought long and hard on this before taking this step, but I think this is the right thing to do under the circumstances and with a democratic rather than emotional solution, with all the Clubs having a voice on who will lead them in the future passes all aspects of the Four Way Test.

I have been told that one Club has passed a resolution that nominates not just their Club member but rather all five of us and that two others are expected to do so. So in concurring with the nominations you would be expressing your approval for the Clubs to have a choice of all of the qualified candidates. Of course the candidate selected by the Nominating Committee would also be a choice.

Therefore I am requesting that you very seriously consider sending the following to DG Claude before the imposed deadline of 10 June.

THE ROARY CLUB OF KONA CONCURS WITH THE CHALLENGE CANDIDATES FOR DISTRICT GOVERNOR FOR THE 2007-2008 ROTARY YEAR THAT MAY BE PROPOSED BY THE ROTARY CLUB OF SOUTH HILO, THE ROTARY CLUB OR KAUAI, THE ROTARY CLUB OF EAST HONOLULU, THE ROTARY CLUB OF HONOLULU SUNSET, AND THE ROTARY CLUB OF ALA MOANA."

Several Rotarians have expressed opinions on this issue, in support of and in opposition to Dave's proposal. If you have an opinion, make it known to President Alan so he can respond in accordance with our club's wishes.





The Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) established the Pu'u Wa'awa'a 'Ahupua'a Advisory Council for state lands in North Kona, Hawai'i. The council was first formed in June 2002 to advise DLNR with community expertise in the various aspects of managing these lands. The dedication, candor and cooperation of the council members in developing a management plan is gratefully acknowledged by DLNR.

At its July 25, 2003 meeting, the Land Board approved in concept a management plan that identified 62 unique objectives that are intended to support the complex array of resource management needs and community interests that apply to Pu'u Wa'awa'a and the makai lands of Pu'u Anahulu (see

http://www.state.hi.us/dlnr/dofaw/puuwaawaa/draftplanv6.pdf)

These objectives are intended to provide a framework for management of this area for a 10-year period. Many projects that directly support the management plan are already in progress, and others will be initiated shortly. Input from the initial advisory council was critical to the successful completion of the plan as well as implementation strategies.

"The DLNR is very excited about the future management activities in the Puu Wa'a Wa'a area," said Peter Young, DLNR Chairperson. "For us, it brings together multiple divisions of our department working in partnership with community groups at an ahupua 'a scale. Hopefully, it will create a workable model that can be used in other areas throughout the state."



At the Podium - ZACHARIE YANOGO, International Service Speaker

Our speaker today is Zachrie Yanogo. He was born and reared in Ouagadougou, Burkina Faso, where he attended regular school and a technical school.

In 1985 he completed a Discipleship Training School at a University of the Nations' campus in Africa. That was followed by taking courses and serving on staffs at University of the Nations' campuses in Togo, France, Switzerland, Honolulu, and finally Kona. In 1991 he arrived at the U of N-Kona campus, where he received a BA in Christian Ministry the following year.

Since then he married Esther (also from Burkino Faso) in 1993 and has been on the staff of the U o fN-Kona's College of Humanities & International Studies. His varied roles have included administrative responsibilities for that College and serving as the Leader for its School of Reconciliation. He also serves on the Executive Committee of the University of the Nations' International Committee for its world-wide College of Humanities & International Studies

He will be speaking about his native African country of Burkina Faso.

#### Just Last Week - MICHAEL DONOHO, Pu'u Wa'awa'a Ahupua'a

Pu'u Wa'awa'a cinder cone, the oldest feature at 100,000 years on the slopes of Hualalai Mountain, lies in the heart of Pu'u Wa'awa'a Ahupua'a, a 40,000 acre DLNR park.

Michael Donoho of the advisory council for this Ahupua'a went on to say that there were 4 visions for the council: Preserving the Paniolo heritage as ranching was established in 1863 and once was a larger ranch than Parker; Assuring sustainability of rare and endangered plants and fauna while establishing trail systems for public access to resource areas; Insuring that enjoyment of the Pu'u Anahulu and Pu'u Wa'awa'a lands would be there for today's and future generations; That conflicts between public hunting, grazing and recreation use needed to be minimized.

He pointed out that there are unique geologic and climactic regions in this Ahupua'a, which sees from 10 to 60 feet of rainfall per year and supplies significant water to the leeward region. He concluded by saying that these 40,000 acres are not a state park in the usual sense of the word and public use for today falls secondary to resource restoration for tomorrow.

#### At RI - RI CONVENTION CLOSES



Rotary's centennial convention closed with a look to the next 100 years. The keynote address from Nobel Prize winner Dr. Wangari Maathai focused on our shared future, the environment, and others gave examples of how Rotary's youth programs are instilling in the next generation an ethic of Service Above Self.

Maathai, who won the 2004 Nobel Peace Prize for her contributions to sustainable development in Africa, used the metaphor of a traditional African three-legged stool to

discuss the three pillars of any stable government: the environment, democracy, and peace. Maathai also stressed that the basic needs of people are not just water, food, shelter, and education, but also justice and equality.

Later in the day, Maathai said she was inspired by Rotarians' abilities to manage multiple projects. "Listening to the presentations at the convention, I am inspired by [their] ability to achieve so much with limited time and resources," she said.

Three members of the Rotaract Club of New Road City, Nepal, told the audience of their ascent to Mount Everest earlier this year. Moni Mulepati Sherpa, Pem Dorjee Sherpa, and Kami Sherpa brought the flag they hoisted atop the world's highest peak and presented it to RI President Glenn Estess Sr., who waved the flag to the roaring cheers of the audience.

The attendants met President-elect Carl-Wilhelm Stenhammar and his family as a group of Swedish Rotarians cheered them on, waving the blue and yellow colors of their nation (and Rotary). In a humorous moment, Stenhammar demonstrated a prototype yellow and blue "reversible jacket" for the 2006 RI Convention in Malmö. He said the jacket would later be auctioned with proceeds going to The Rotary Foundation.

Stenhammar declared that the first year of Rotary's next century would be the year of women in Rotary and added that the appointment of Incoming Trustee Carolyn Jones should send the signal that there is a place for women in Rotary leadership.

He also discussed his dream to bring China and Cuba back into Rotary and shared his passion for Rotary's youth programs, in particular Rotary Youth Exchange. "I have a dream that every single youth, at the age of 17, would become an exchange student," he said. "If we did so, we would have no wars."


