In any case, it has been a privilege to serve the Rotary Club of Kona as bulletin editor, and I look forward to serving our club in other capacities in the years to come.



AT RI - STENHAMMAR RI PRESIDENT FOR 2005-2006

Carl-Wilhelm Stenhammar, the first RI president of Rotary's second century, took office on I July, against the backdrop of a successful centennial year marked by worldwide celebrations of the ideals and initiatives that have driven the organization's expansion into 168 countries.

Going back to the basics, Stenhammar said, can help clubs and districts embrace the challenge and opportunity presented by Rotary's motto, Service Above Self, which also is the 2005-06 RI theme. The new RI president called upon Rotarians to join him in continuing to sponsor projects based on the presidential emphases of education and literacy and water, hunger, and health concerns, as well as those directed at public image.

"I believe in continuity," he told RI News in a 30 June interview. "Past presidents Majiyagbe and Estess have both been involved in literacy and education, and then President Estess added water. Monica and I have always discussed at home what is most important for a human being to live a decent life. I said literacy, and she said water. I think both are dependent on one another. To me, it was very natural to continue these emphases." Noting that the United Nations, a longtime partner of Rotary, has chosen water and literacy as part of its goals through 2015, Stenhammar said that clubs and districts can achieve much more if they cooperate with other organizations.

"I also believe in cooperation, because all of the emphases that we work with are so huge that we cannot as an organization do it ourselves. We cannot do it overnight," he said. "So if we can work with others like we've done with PolioPlus and the United Nations, over time, we can achieve much more together. It's a big puzzle, and we have to see to it that our piece in that puzzle becomes as large as possible." Stenhammar emphasized that Rotary's top priority is still "to finish our PolioPlus [program]. It may take a little longer than we had expected, but we will do it." He also encouraged clubs and districts to invest in the future and reach out to the new generation through increased sponsorship of the Youth Exchange program.

At the new RI president's initiative, The Rotary Foundation of Rotary International starts a new century of service with its first female trustee, Carolyn E. Jones, of Anchorage, Alaska, USA. Believing that involving women at all levels of Rotary leadership makes good business sense, he also has appointed female Rotarians to chair the Membership Development and Retention Committee, Literacy Resource Group, and Public Image Resource Group.

A food broker, Stenhammar is the former owner of Gust. F. Bratt AB and has been a member of the boards of several companies and chair of the board of a local private school. A Rotarian since 1974, he is a member of the Rotary Club of Göteborg, Sweden. Stenhammar has served RI as district governor, committee member and chair, task force general coordinator, and director.

AT THE PODIUM: Some of Hawaii's Recent Alien Arrivals

Singing Frogs, Stinging Caterpillars, and Little Fire Ants By Chris Jacobsen and Arnold Hara

University of Hawaii Manoa, College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources, Department of Plant and Environmental Protection Sciences

Chris Jacobsen has worked for the University of Hawaii for more than eight years as a Research Associate for Dr. Arnold Hara. Much of that time has been spent developing control strategies for alien arthropod pests in Hawaii's nurseries and landscapes.

JUST LAST WEEK BY DR. BILL MOORE

"When asked about my horseback riding, I reply that since I have been at Parker Ranch for only a year the cowboys won't let me near any live animals. My background has been in real estate development." Thus began CEO Chris Kanazawa's presentation to the club. He went on to discuss the present and future role of Parker Ranch following the rules of the trust set up by Richard Smart before his death in 1992. The four beneficiaries of the trust are: Parker School, Hawaii Preparatory Academy, North Hawaii Community Hospital and Hawaii Community Foundation. All decisions made by the trustees must be approved by these beneficiaries. While livestock should be a part of business and a key part of Waimea lifestyle, there is a shift to looking at "ourselves" as a land company with over 180,000 acres of land. Some of this land is "core" land essential to the Parker legacy with livestock operation and preservation of historical vistas. "Non-core" land can be diversified into other uses that are stable and produce long term income to support the beneficiaries. He pointed out that cattle breeding poses typical commodity risks; that Parker Ranch has 18-22 thousand cattle; that steers are shipped at 6 months of age to 2 co-ops on the mainland for further growth; that the ranch is the largest grass fed calf producer in the islands; that the ranch is thus also in the business of growing grass. During the Q&A period he confirmed that Parker Ranch grass fed beef is not readily available since the beef calves are sent to the mainland; he is in consultation with a mainland firm to supply this beef locally after processing on the mainland; that a "retail center" is a possibility "outsourced" to experts with the proviso that such a center must support Parker Ranch style; that affordable housing is a strong need for workers in Waimea who often face long commutes and is under serious consideration by the Trustees.



JUST LAST WEEK BY DR. BILL MOORE

Opening her presentation with quotes from Pres. Lincoln "..government of the people, by the people and for the people" and Gogh " The best of all governments teaches us to govern ourselves", Carol Christianson, Executive Director of Community Enterprises went on the inform the members of this recently developed non-profit organization dedicated to "Correct governance through an informed populace". The goal is to arrange monthly meetings that will bring together and inform the "shakers and movers" of issues and concerns of our community. With such meetings she hopes to change the triangular paradigm of top down selected flow of information from government to citizens (an uninformed populace is much easier to manipulate) to an upward flow from an informed populace who would "run" the government. The first meeting is scheduled for September 13th. As it will be the dinner hour she promised "heavy" snacks and a challenging program that would last no more than 2 hours.

President Dick closed the meeting with a Club Assembly whose highlights included a report from the Treasurer that the club was solvent; new member badges would cost \$5 and replacements \$15; a weekly door prize of at least \$35 in value was expected of members in rotation. ISC chairman Bill Cliff reported that the mechanical soybean milk "cow" joint project with Kona Mauka and Waimea clubs was being actively pursued; that Kobe West's contribution of \$1000 would be put to use this year; that a more active relationship would occur with our sister club in Kawasaki, Japan; that other projects dealing with nutrition or safe water were being pursued in accord with RI President's desires. Club Service reports that meals would remain the same or improve. The Vocational program with Kealakehe was alive and progressing. Community Service continues the "Meet and Eat", holiday parade, Children's Justice Center, sailing scholarship and development of a skateboard park with the Skate Board Assn. programs. President Dick than outlined his agenda for the year: "Not For a Minute" educational program for seniors in Senior Centers: a joint venture with Kona Mauka and Waimea clubs to spot test vision and hearing and provide dental hygiene education in public schools; a fresh water project to provide low cost testing kits for families using catchment tanks.

AT THE PODIUM: KEEPING THE THEATER ALIVE

This week our speaker will be Marylei Drake, Chairwoman of the Kona Theatrical Preservation Society. The KTPS is a non-profit organization founded in 1995 to empower the community through performing arts, cultural exchange, and educational and wellness programs. Although the organization has been around for 10 years, the group is now refocusing it's efforts to target at risk children by building self esteem through the performing arts.

Marylei will be speaking about the KTPS - it's past, present and future as well as the positive benefits this group provide to the community

JUST LAST WEEK: BY DR. BILL MOORE

Stating that West Hawaii's employees have high rates of obesity, diabetes and strokes; that 14.5% work 2 or more jobs (3X the national average) yet have the lowest per capita income in the state; that they have long commutes to and from work; and that they have little time to spend on wellness programs, Vivienne Aronowitz, WOW project leader, went on to discuss Friends of the Future's Workplace Wellness Program with club members.

Through quarterly one day conferences and follow-up monthly meetings to train and support employee "Health Champions" WOW's goal is to educate, encourage and support the workers of Hawaii to value and adopt healthier behaviors and lifestyles. Similar programs in Boeing, Coca Cola, Traveler's Insurance nationally and First Hawaiian Bank, Times Markets and Hawaii Prince Hotels locally have demonstrated that benefits to employers include reduced absenteeism, lower or stable worker's compensation and health insurance premiums, reduced use of high cost medical procedures, and low unemployment rates. Benefits to employees, many of whom represent an aging workforce at some resorts, include improved morale, support for healthy lifestyle and work behaviors, increased motivation and production, and lower cholesterol levels. The best employee health programs today have increased management support, frequent contact with target population, more aggressive programs on health and offer more menu-driven or choice-oriented agendas. She concluded by outlining how such a wellness program would encourage healthy cafeteria choices, nutritious products in vending machines, walking and stretching classes, ergonomics (safe equipment, proper posture training, pre-work stretching exercises), motivation (leadership by example, team and buddy approaches) and "Health Champions" (key dedicated employees who would facilitate and cheerlead wellness activities).

AT THE PODIUM: The Big Island Skateboarding Association was created in January of 2005, by a group of skaters wanting to bring a better skateboard environment to the Big Island of Hawaii. Our goal is to develop parks and promote skateboarding all over the island, from east to west and Kohala to Ka'u. In order to actually achieve this goal, our island needs to stand as one skate community. The Big Island Skateboarding Association was created for this exact reason. Imagine going on a weekend road trip around the island that included stops at the Kona skate park, followed by camping and a session in Kawaihae. Then hitting a mega-ramp in Hilo, before one last skate jam in Captain Cook. This fantasy is what we hope to make a reality. In much the same way that surfing allows the youth to rise above the poverty and drug addiction that holds down many of our citizens, skating can as well. The biggest difference is that the ocean is, well, everywhere! We're on an island! But there is a serious lack of skateboard facilities on this island. Skateboarding is the third most popular sport among 6-18 year olds, yet there are more "No Skateboarding" signs in the Wal-Mart parking lot than there are skate parks on the whole island! It's time to do something about this grave insufficiency, and the BISA is here to do it.

Our first project is the Kailua-Kona skate park project. It is a very ambitious project, as we are hoping that the park will be among the best in the world. As the second most populated city on the Big Island, and the foremost tourist destination, we feel that our park should reflect just that, and be something that the residents of Kona, and the whole island, can be proud of. Where Waimea has a 7,500 square foot skate park, our goal is for a 30,000 - 35,000 square-foot skate complex. Complete with a world-class skate park, large covered half-pipe, shaded areas, as well as water fountains and restrooms. The design itself will also take into account the beautiful scenery Kona has to offer and has plenty of flora incorporated into it to "blend in" with its surroundings. A park of this magnitude will certainly do a lot to alleviate many of the problems between skateboarders and the community.

Matt Martin, head of the recently formed non-profit BISA group promoting the development of a skate board park in West Hawaii and an avid board skater since the age of 13, outlined the proposed state-of-art park on land at the old airport presently owned by the County. Board skating is the 3rd most popular sport among children between 6 and 18 years. This \$650,000 seamless concrete (half of all skateboard injuries occur on irregular surfaces) park would cover 30,000 sq. feet and contain not only half-pipes and bowls but also commonly skated street structures such as rails and stairs; would be attractively landscaped with trees and foliage; would get skateboarders off streets where they hassle pedestrians and shop owners; would be open and available to all skaters during daylight hours only and under police surveillance for vandalism and drug trade at night when the gate to the old airport is closed as is the case for this area now; would require no supervision or injury waivers since it is on county land and falls under the same law that covers county beach parks. During the Q & A period, Matt stated that the budget income proposed would be raised through fund raisers, sponsorships of local and national businesses (he named Quiksilver as one interested sponsor) and private donations; that maintenance of the concrete structure was minimal for at least 5 years and then need only surface repair; that professional national skateboard organizations might want to use this facility (it would be the premier park at present in all the U.S.) for annual contests much like the Ironman and produce TV income. Several members expressed an interest in offering advice on fund raising and cost sharing with local concrete manufacturers.

JUST LAST WEEK: BY DR. BILL MOORE

Pausing briefly to describe the functionality and answer some of the criticisms of Westpro Holding's assembly plant's glaring big tent look on its location mauka of Queen K Highway north of Kailua Kona, e.g. the white color reflects the rays of the sun keeping the interior cooler, the material would deteriorate if painted, it is translucent to increase interior lighting and conserve energy. Alan Decker President of Westpro Holdings proceeded to describe the company's efforts and success in including "affordable" housing in its developments. The framing of these steel framed 1215 square foot structures conform to UBC codes, are prefabricated and can be assembled in 1 week. Each steel stud is extruded and pre-drilled by a single machine from New Zealand; all the studs needed for a single home can be completed in 7 hours to a 1/8-inch tolerance throughout the house. At present the company is placing homes on 30 finished lots in Discovery Harbor. Several photos of the process from manufacturing "tent" to turnkey readiness were circulated and impressive. He then went on to discuss the acute need for "affordable" housing including such facts as 5000 need such homes; county government runs the lottery in which as many as 2-300 families may vie for 14 homes; applicants must earn 130% of the median island income or approximately \$65,000 a year; it takes at least 5 months to satisfy all the county permits; government management is often mind-boggling. During the Q & A session he stated that all homes were equipped with solar hot water heating, which while it costs the buyer an additional \$5000 on his mortgage produces a 30% reduction in his electric bill. He concluded by stating that developers have to make a commitment to build "affordable housing"; have to be innovative and creative.

JUST LAST WEEK: Opening with that well-worn morticians' joke, "People die to meet me", Susan Gillespie went on to enlighten members on West Hawaii's only full service funeral home, A Hui Hou, and her role as founder and Hawaii's only female mortician. Born and reared in a small rural Oregon town where she was valedictorian in her high school class of 17, Susan took up a graduate career in mortuary science for several years before coming to Kona a year ago after learning during visits here that West Hawaii had no funeral home. A Hui Hou is unique in that it can meet any of the needs that people have in funeral services. "We want to take care of our clients as though they were family," said Susan, offering counseling, planning and follow up visits with families for one year after a loved one's funeral. During Q & A Susan stated that her faith is very important to her and guides her business philosophy. She urged members to plan well; that the most precious gift they can give their family is to have end-times details planned including such essentials as wills, death certificate completion, personal wants for funeral, etc. She said that today cremation or burial expenses approximate \$3000; that her firm offers an "insurance" like plan with regular payments that will pay the full benefit should the insurer die before the entire amount is paid; that expenses can be paid in full if desired before death; that "trusts" set up by funeral homes benefit the funeral homes only.

AT THE PODIUM: This week many of our members will be honoring their valued employees as part of our Vocational Service month activities.

JUST LAST WEEK: BY DR. BILL MOORE

Lt. Paul Kealoha, District Commander of the Community Policing Staff for the Kona District gave a PowerPoint presentation to club members whose salient points included the recently developed Mission and Vision Statements as well as a table of organization. One of the biggest problems facing the Police department is lack of personnel. While there is funding and authorization for 59 uniformed officers, at present only 36 positions are filled. This staff has to handle from 1200 to 1500 calls per month in an area extending from Oceanview to Pu'u Wa'a Wa'a. Barriers to hiring more officers include stricter background checks, higher cost of living compared with the Pacific Northwest, lack of public support of police/public partnership, reluctance of officers to expand their roles and lack of resources. He went on to say that crime was a triangular relationship with criminals, opportunity and victims as the three elements; remove any one of these and crime does not happen. Organizations such as Hawaii Security Assn and Business Security Watch (retail stores in Kailua) greatly reduce "opportunity" particularly for white-collar crime. He expressed the need for the community to be proactive; to assist in arresting burglars; to address root causes. The Q & A period provoked some interesting discussions. For example, it is up to the legislature to set laws regarding riders in pickup truck beds; crimes against property have increased while those against people have decreased; white collar crime, particularly credit card theft, has risen considerable; 5% of the community take up 95% of police time. While there are an average of 36-40 burglaries per month, August saw 72 of which 50 were committed by 3 burglary rings, now in custody. 90% of property crimes are due to drug use, particularly "ice". As to the "ice" epidemic, it is a social problem requiring public education as well as police work. Neighborhood Watch and Kona Aloha Patrol are worthwhile community activities. When asked what else the community could do to help, his response: "Identify people who would be good police officers!".

Aloha Ken! I would like to take this opportunity to discuss openly the concerns that you have raised on behalf of yourself and several Rotary Club of Kona members.

Perhaps you missed the meeting at the beginning of the year when it was announced that it had come to the attention of the Board of Directors that there are members of our club who don't happen to be of the Judeo-Christian belief system. In an effort to celebrate our diversity of beliefs and be inclusive, the BOD decided that the appropriate ecumenical process would be to occasionally substitute the traditional prayer with a thought expressing an alternative religion or point of view.

I acknowledge that these are trying times in the world. These times have come upon us, in part, because of the lack of understanding of other people's cultures, including their religious beliefs. It is my desire that we grasp this opportunity to share. Being an educator, I am sure that you would want your students to develop the skills and desire to think their way through a process as opposed to having a single view point force fed to them.

And so it is with our Rotary club. You and I want a club willing to share a world of understanding and diverse thought. You and I want a club that is willing to help others without the need for categorizing according to some narrow perspective. You and I and the vast majority of members want a club that will be tolerant of all whom it benefits in its service to the world and our community.

In answer to your questions: At the beginning of my elected term, the BOD made the decision to be inclusive based on popularly used procedures at a multitude of clubs throughout the Christian and non-Christian Rotary world. I directed the Kona Coffee Blossom Editor to include "thoughts" that would represent a broad spectrum of idealistic thought interspersed with the traditional prayer used by our club in the past, as it is in the current issue.

I was raised in a Christian household and the most important tenet gleaned from that upbringing was to "Love My Neighbor". The teachings of my childhood were race, religion and color blind. We were taught to love everyone, inclusively. I know that you and the others for whom you speak share this principle or you wouldn't be members of Rotary.

It is my desire to see this experiment in tolerance through to the end of my term as President of The Rotary Club of Kona.

RECOGNIZING A STROKE

A neurologist says that if he can get to a stroke victim within 3 hours he can totally reverse the effects of a stroke...totally. He said the trick was getting a stroke recognized, diagnosed and getting to the patient within 3 hours.

RECOGNIZING A STROKE - A true story

Susie is recouping at an incredible pace for someone with a massive stroke all because Sherry saw Susie stumble - - that is the key that isn't mentioned below -and then she asked Susie the 3 questions. So simple - - this literally saved Susie's life - - Some angel sent it to Suzie's friend and they did just what it said to do. Suzie failed all three so then 9-1-1 was called. Even though she had normal blood pressure readings and did not appear to be a stroke as she could converse to some extent with the Paramedics, they took her to the hospital right away. Read and Learn!

Sometimes symptoms of a stroke are difficult to identify. Unfortunately, the lack of awareness spells disaster. The stroke victim may suffer brain damage when people nearby fail to recognize the symptoms of a stroke. Now doctors say a bystander can recognize a stroke by asking three simple questions:

- 1. *Ask the individual to SMILE.
- 2. *Ask him or her to RAISE BOTH ARMS.
- 3. *Ask the person to SPEAK A SIMPLE SENTENCE eg. It is sunny out today.

If he or she has trouble with any of these tasks,

call 9-1-1 immediately and describe the symptoms to the dispatcher.

After discovering that a group of non-medical volunteers could identify facial weakness, arm weakness and speech problems, researchers urged the general public to learn the three questions. They presented their conclusions at the American Stroke Association's

Annual Meeting last February. Widespread use of this test could result in prompt diagnosis and treatment of the stroke and prevent brain damage. A cardiologist says if everyone who gets this e-mail sends it to 10 people, you can bet that at least one life will be saved.

JUST LAST WEEK: BY DR. BILL MOORE

"Destination Kona Coast" was the subject of Richard Farnham's presentation to the club. With the advent of the cruise ship industry it was recognized by several Kona business leaders that a program should be developed to insure that visitors on the "Constitution" and "Independence" received a warm welcome, were educated about Kona's ambience and assured that they went home "happy campers", glad to have come to Kona. Thus was formed in 1992 Destination Kona Coast (DKC) with six board members and funded by private contributions and some fund raisers. Among the latter was the annual "Block Party" begun in 1993 as an Ironman kickoff with Alii Drive between King Kamehameha hotel and Hualalai Road devoted to booths offering food, local products and live entertainment. While it may have been a social event it was not financially rewarding and was discontinued in 1998 after a net profit of less than \$25 over the five years. In 1998 Auntie Lei Collins from the Hulihee Palace who organized the Kona Volunteer Committee revitalized DKC. Between the hours of 7 A.M. and 2 P.M. on arrival days this group provides a tent at the pier staffed by volunteers to present leis and the Kona Footprints brochure to each visitor, entertain them with local musicians, provide information and give them a cool area in which to await shore to ship transportation. It has been an instant success; 40% of passengers visit this tent/booth and all rate Kona as the friendliest port in Hawaii due to the greeters. Turning non-profit in 1997 DKC now has 100 members (individuals and companies); has a budget of \$65,000 (\$50,000 of which comes from Hawaii County who finally recognized the value of this endeavor and the rest from fund-raisers). Richard went on to say that the cruise ship industry has grown from the original 2 ships to 164 ship visits in 2005. Projected visits for 2006 and 2007 are 221 and 250 visits, respectively. Each ship averages 2000 passengers who spend at least \$50 per person giving Kona an average income per ship of \$76,800 (60% of passengers visit the town, 50% take guided tours). Projected total income for 2005 is \$25 million; for 2006, \$33 million and 2007, \$37 million. An integral part of DKC is the "Kona Aloha Patrol" organized in 2001 and now spearheaded by Dick Dressie, who was introduced and gave a short description of its function. Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights between the hours of 6 and 9, teams of 2 volunteers, wearing distinctive shirts and badges patrol Alii Drive greeting passersby and local merchants, answering questions from visitors and being neighborhood watchers for the Police department. This program has also been an ungualified success with merchants; it needs more volunteers so that more nights could be covered.

PE Bill Cliff and the International Service Committee will give us an up to date report on the progress of their efforts for the year; here's the nuts and bolts of helping people all over this wonderful world of ours

JUST LAST WEEK: BY DR. BILL MOORE

Opening with photos of the devastating effects of crystal meth (a brain with half of its cells dead after 4 months; premature facial aging and necrotic gums after 4 years) U.S. Attorney Ed Kubo held the membership spellbound with his presentation of "Our War On ICE". He went on to say that although there are many homebased ICE labs, Mexico is the usual source and the ICE is trans-shipped by courier or commercial shipping through California to Hawaii. Containing such ingredients as lithium, denatured alcohol, phosphorus from match heads, ammonium nitrate it is small wonder that such physical damage occurs, not to mention explosions during the cooking process. To illustrate the extent of the problem in Hawaii he pointed out that half of all criminals arrested had positive tests for ICE and 20% of those in prison tested positive even during incarceration. In 2002, when there were 30,000 ICE users out of 1.2 million Hawaii citizens and Hawaii considered the ICE capital of the U.S. with children as young as 11-12 becoming addicts, his office, State and County DEA agents and police began operation "Weed and Seed". Picking areas with such criteria as high crime and public housing and cracking down on dealers they were able to reduce a 70% and 80% drop in crime in Kalihi and Waipahu, respectively, on Oahu. Pahoa was the first outer island area to be hit. Result? A Big Island rancher who shipped as much as 1.5 million hits (1/6 oz each) in 5 years in cattle containers; Operation Shave Ice yielded another dealer who shipped 50 pounds a year; 5-10 meth labs last year on the Big Island. All were busted and the criminals in prison with no hope of parole serving 16 years or more. At the present trend in 3 years the ICE problem will be "contained"--not eliminated. Already crime figures are dropping and the price of ICE has soared to \$30,000 a pound (compared to \$2500 in Texas) due to interdiction and arrests of prominent dealers. Attorney Kubo closed with a discussion of the problem of current identity theft with credit cards, here most often stolen from tourists. Across the U.S. such theft occurs about 13 times a minute. Criminals face a mandatory 2-year sentence. Future projects include "Operation Child Safe" protecting children from exposure in homes with meth labs and the development of a network of Neighborhood Watch Groups. He pointed out that selling paraphernalia was illegal and businesses doing so should be reported at once.

Scouting, which began in Hawaii in 1910, promotes six growth factors: strong personal values, goal setting, a desire to learn, strong relationships, self worth and usefulness and social skills. Scouts are expected to learn by doing. They went on to state certain statistics, e.g. throughout the U.S. scouts provided 42 million hours of community service last year; 120,000 churches and service organizations sponsor scout troops; 1.25 million volunteers are involved in supporting scouting; it takes \$89.95 per year to support one scout and a total of \$25,000 for the council to put on programs on Hawaii, one of which is Camp Honokaia AKA "Rainforest Camp"! They ended their presentation by announcing a fund-raising partnership with McDonald's and approaching civic leaders to pledge raising funds in February. Right now they need volunteers particularly as merit badge counselors.

At the time of this week's Rotary meeting I should be recovering from the anesthesia; and at the time of next week's Rotary meeting I probably will be checking what is left and itching to get out of the hospital. Since that time schedule leaves such a small window of time before the second operation, Marge and I will remain in Honolulu between operations. At least this satisfies one of her long-time wishes -- to see the lights and decoration in Honolulu at Christmas. We trust that you and your families have a wonderful Christmas; and we look forward to seeing you upon resuming regular attendance at the weekly Rotary Club meetings on December 29. Ken

JUST LAST WEEK: BY DR. BILL MOORE: Barbara Bush, Club Treasurer, switched hats to President of the Rotary Club of Kona Community Foundation and opened the program with a discussion of "Rotary Club of Kona Community Foundation". Organized in 1989 with 9 Directors and a Financial Advisor, its mission is to provide scholarships of \$4000 (\$1000/year if the student keeps a 2.5GPA) to deserving West Hawaii high school graduates and to meet certain community needs e.g. Old airport jog/walk path, community bike patrol and KC hospital radiation center. Present financial fund of \$293,000 comes from fundraisers (book sales, golf tournaments), donor designated contributions and investment returns. She closed with how members can help: with fundraisers, making a tax-deductible donation and becoming a "Benefactor".

Jim Weaver, executive director of Angel Flight West, followed with a presentation on "Angel Flight". 6000 pilots who have a passion for flying and community service were organized in 6 districts, to fly emergency flights taking patients, particularly children with cancer, from remote regions to a medical facility. More recently, under Homeland Security, they have flown 2000 missions with emergency supplies, personnel and material; reunited families torn apart by Hurricane Katrina as well as returning evacuees to their homes. They also assist the American Cancer Society with transportation of cancer patients and carrying patients to various medical condition camps. Angel Flight West missions have increased dramatically since its founding 25 years ago. In that time their annual flights increased from 15 the first year to 4100 in 13 states in 2005. In response to a question about safety he responded by stating that in its last 22 years Angel Flight West has flown 25,000 missions with zero accidents. Recently partnerships have been developed with Alaska and Aloha Airlines to fly those patients they couldn't accommodate. He ended by stating that all pilots pay their own expenses for these trips. Their only compensation is the "Thank You" and the knowledge that they are providing a much needed and appreciated service.

KOBE WEST CLUB IS INVOLVING US: Check out the letter from President Takigawa on the third page regarding a service project to build and furbish a school in India that was wiped out in the tsunami last year. We involved them in our water project in Uganda and now we are participating in their service project. What a wonderful way to celebrate the true internationality on Rotary.

THE FOUR-WAY TEST

9 FEBRUARY 2006

AT THE PODIUM: This week, James "Jimmie" Correa, former Hawaii County Police Chief and since 2002, Administrator of the Big Island for The Transportation Security Administration. Jimmie is a Hilo native and 27 year veteran of HPD.

JUST LAST WEEK: BY DR. BILL MOORE: Chauncey Wong-Yuen, Keahole International Airport manager, brought club members up to date on plan for the airport. He opened by stating that the Big Island has 4 District airports: Hilo International, Waimea (for general aircraft), Upolu and Kona International (which services 7 major airlines and general aircraft). Sitting on 4000 acres of land, Keahole Airport services 45 flights daily, 2.6 million passengers annually flying on 122 thousand aircraft operations. Owing to overcrowding, particularly in summer, security and aesthetic requirements, and safety issues during inclement weather, e.g. rain-soaked passengers slipping on wet runways and having to fly to distant destinations in wet clothing and the risk of lightning strikes. The terminal structures and layout were built for inter-island flights, not the wide-bodied aircraft now accommodated. Future plans including an enclosed terminal expanded North and South with 15 gates by 2015 and 18 to 20 gates by 2025. Other projects include a C-17 military airplane training runway of 4250 feet paralleling the present runway; a master plan update this year; parking lot expansion with 3 to 4 thousand new stalls mauka which goes to bid this summer; a new tower which has to precede air terminal upgrade; hangers for private jets funded with private funds; a public safety training center 95% funded by FAA; elimination of present rental car building.

As for local concerns about the C-17 training runway, he pointed out that this aircraft is essential for humanitarian needs in the event of natural disasters; is quieter that many inter-island aircraft; that having a second runway would allow uninterrupted commercial activity in emergencies; that Kona is the best location as it is buffered from civilian sites.

AT THE PODIUM: Trade Talks by DAVE DeYOUNG and ?. PLUS, presentations by and to our sister club from Kawasaki-chuo, Japan. For over fifteen years, members of the Kawasaki Rotary Club have come to Kona and presented our club with money for a scholarship that is awarded annually to a student who has expressed interest in Asian, particularly Japanese, studies. If you have an interest in the selection process for this scholastic award, please see President Dick Hershberger and Asako Pratt at this Thursday's meeting. On behalf of our club members, The Kawasaki-chuo Rotary Club will go back to Japan with our offer of a joint sister club international service project. Your Board of Directors hopes that our offer will result in a major project happening with multiple Districts of Rotary being involved in service.

JUST LAST WEEK: BY DR. BILL MOORE: "Who are we?" began James Correa, administrator of the Transportation Security Administration (TSA) for the Big Island. Organized after 9/11 under the Department of Transportation TSA was transferred to Homeland Security in 2003 with the mission to protect the Nation's transportation system and its passengers. There are now 50 thousand employees, 80% are "screeners" who must balance the assurance of passenger safety and preserving civil liberties, not a light job. He went on to say that not including inter-island flights. Kona International Airport had 48 flights a day and up to 50 corporate aircraft, some as big as 757 and 737; that Island Air would soon purchase larger (78 passenger) planes. Due to increased layers of protection, e.g., pilots carrying guns, air marshals on flights, hardened cockpit doors, there has been some relaxation in restrictions as to what passengers may carry. IFD (improvised explosive devices) are TSA's biggest concern. A recent device called "The Puffer" is being installed in many airports. As the passenger passes through a portal a sample of the air around him or her is instantly analyzed for traces of explosive material. Ultimately this may replace swabbing passengers hands and handles of carry-on bags. During Q & A, he stated that last year 12 loaded guns, numerous knives, bang sticks and crossbows have been discovered in carry-on baggage; that air marshals carry special ammunition in their guns and are rigorously trained to avoid puncturing the "skin" of an aircraft should they need to use firearms; that TSA has a problem in retaining employees despite a \$16.50/hour entering pay; that air marshals have arduous working conditions--being in the air for long periods of time without rest.

JUST LAST WEEK: BY DR. BILL MOORE: The club program consisted of two vocational talks, one by Dave DeYoung, the other by Barbara Kossow.

Dave is a financial adviser with Merill Lynch, the world's largest financial planning company in the world with over 1 trillion dollars in its portfolio. According to Dave, this massive size provides the best investment resources available as it surveys the whole world for the best of the best investment programs. Despite its size, programs can be tailored to the individual with as little as \$25K to large corporations with millions in retirement accounts. In answer to the question of "Why do I need a financial adviser?", he pointed-out that everyone needs help with wealth management and retirement programs. He illustrated with the widow who wants to leave money tax-free to her grandchildren for college and reduce the tax burden for her children when she dies--she can set up tax code "529" college funds for each child to the tune of \$50 thousand every 5 years.

Barbara followed with a description of her work in the Mayor's office in West Hawaii. Born and reared in what she called a sugar "camp" of the Kohala sugar company she retired as a branch manager for Bank of Hawaii and joined Mayor Kim's staff. Among her many concerns and activities are helping immigrants and disabled, overseeing handicapped parking permits, recruiting police officers "who can shoot", she added. Major problems being wrestled with are the traffic (Mayor Kim's mother has a residence in Kona so he is quite aware of our traffic), the homeless (who appear to be increasing in number), and mapping the future with committees like the Kailua Community Improvement Committee concerned with cleaning up our environment. She closed by asking for input from members whenever problems arose.

We received funds for our joint scholarship that will be awarded to a student from West Hawaii who is continuing their education. AT THE PODIUM: One female high school student in three reports being physically or sexually abused by a dating partner. More than 40% of male and female high school students surveyed had been victims of dating violence at least once. Violent relationships in adolescence can have serious ramifications for victims, who are at higher risk for substance abused, eating disorders, risky sexual behavior, suicide, and adult re-victimization. 81% of parents surveyed either believed dating violence is not a problem or admitted they did not know it is a problem.

The American Bar Association Steering Committee on the Unmet Legal Needs of Children has provided tool kits to 15 high schools on the Island of Hawaii, with funding from the Hawaii County Council. AT THE PODIUM: The Kailua Village Business Improvement District, the first of its kind on the island and the third one in the state, is poised to launch 'clean and safe' services this fall. Following formal adoption by Hawaii County Council, the KV BID boundaries encompass the greater village area from Lunapule Road to Makala Boulevard. Two service zones are envisioned with the intensity of services initially provided within the village core along Alii Drive and our three gateways: Palani Road, Henry Street and Kuakini Highway. The County administration (Mayor Kim, Barbara Kossow, Bill Takaba and Bruce McClure) along with Kona's two council members Angel Pilago and Virginia Isbell has been highly supportive of the project. The volunteer KV BID board of directors has formed with representation of district landowners, lessees, commercial tenants and government officials. Eric von Platen Luder is serving as board chair.

JUST LAST WEEK: BY DR. BILL MOORE: "He dreamed of killing me." Rae Spence held the membership in stunned silence as she gave her testimony of an abusive dating relationship with a fellow student in an Austin, Texas, highschool beginning when she was 14 years old. During this relationship she was hit, kicked, pushed down a flight of stairs, choked, called at all hours of the night. At first she lied to her parents about the relationship; finally confessed; was moved to another neighborhood and school to escape. Her boyfriend went on to date one of Rae's friends, used the same controlling tactics and killed her in a fit of rage in school. In retrospect it was learned that he had had been reared in an abusive atmosphere. The school has subsequently instituted increased safety and educational programs for its students in Teen Dating Violence. She was followed by Lieutenant Bruce Wheatley, Pocatello, Idaho police department, who recounted his experience with his daughter, who at 17 entered into an abusive relationship with an older male who had a long rap sheet; moved in with him at 18; had an illegitimate child; was forced to flee with him to neighboring town; became addicted to ICE; had her son taken away after he had been severely battered by her boyfriend when only 5 weeks old. Lt. Wheatley is now supervisor of the Pocatello police department's domestic violence and hostage negotiation team. He pointed out that dating violence is an issue of power control with such warning signs as verbal abuse (calling names), possessiveness (checking whereabouts and activities at all hours), controlling clothing choices and physical bruising. He urges adolescents to talk to someone if these signs occur! During Q & A he related that his daughter, now 24, is happily married and has another child; that her first son has been adopted by Lt. and Mr. Wheatley with no physical after-effects of his severe beating. Rae and Bruce are in Kona as featured speakers during the Teen Dating Violence and Prevention Conference sponsored by, among others, the Hawaii County Council and Office of the Prosecuting Attorney.

AT THE PODIUM: Photon Power provides optimum financial solutions to clients' power generation needs, whether they be residential, industrial or commercial and how they can benefit from using solar photovoltaic technology, both financially and environmentally. David Uhlmann has a masters of science in finance from Golden Gate University and a BA in economics and international relations from the University of California, Davis. Prior to moving to Hawaii he worked at Barra, a developer of risk management models for institutional portfolio managers, as the director of global in-house client services in Tokyo, Hong Kong, Berkeley and London. After Barra was acquired by Morgan Stanley in June of 2004, he had the choice of moving to New York to continue working for MSCI-Barra or coming to Hawaii. The choice wasn't difficult: Living off-grid in paradise was the better option.

JUST LAST WEEK: BY DR. BILL MOORE: Debbie Hecht from the Save Our Lands Committee, working with the Hawaii Island Land Trust, opened the program with a discussion of the committee's attempt to place an Initiative on the election ballot in November that would allow the voters on the Big Island to decide whether to remove the cap on the 2% of Hawaii County's property taxes to be set aside for an "Open Space" fund to purchase such properties as Kiholo Bay, Punalu'u Beach Park and about 40 other similar properties. She went on to point out that in a 2004, poll 72% of Big Island voters were in favor of this "2%" program; that this would not increase present property taxes; that Maui and Kauai citizens voted overwhelmingly to amend their county charters to dedicate such funds resulting in the purchase of hundreds of acres of cultural and natural lands. She asked members to support by signing the committee's petition.

Yannah Lewis and David Huitt, faculty advisers to Kealekehe's Interact Club followed with a video produced by the students presenting a program called "Citizenship First" stressing such ethical and moral behavior such as "honesty" "being good people", "giving back to the community", "character building" and education in the Constitution and Bill of Rights. They pointed out that we live in a society that has become increasingly focused on materialistic values to the detriment of our young people; that having one teacher or a whole school chanting such slogans as "Honesty is the best policy" is not enough; that what is needed is a firm grounding in the teaching of certain values, the wisdom from which they originated and why people have chosen them.

AT THE PODIUM: Integrity and Stewardship in Action -- The Kuleana Green Business Program promotes ethical business practices and environmental stewardship among Chamber members and throughout Hawaii. Michael Kramer, Chair of the committee, will be speaking this week on this new program where members understand their kuleana (right and responsibility) to generate profits as well as positive impacts in their social and natural environments. Michael will talk about the "Triple Bottom Line" and how businesses can enjoy a number of competitive advantages in today's marketplace by enrolling in the Program.

JUST LAST WEEK: BY DR. BILL MOORE: Trisha Macomber, Professor, UHHilo Tropical Agriculture School and director of the Water Catchment program, discussed with the members the upcoming worldwide conference on Water Catchment in Hilo and asked for financial support of \$500 per Rotary Club on the Big Island. A veteran of 5 years of research and education in water catchment she has written the definitive work on this subject, "Guidelines on Rainwater Catchment Systems in Hawaii" and developed a home purity testing kit for those using catchment systems (at present there is no method for testing for leptospirosis, spread by rodent urine, however). She went on to say that Hawaii is the center of water catchment use in the U.S.; that while there are probably a quarter of a million users across the U.S. none involve whole communities as in Hawaii; that infrastructure is the big obstacle to the use of the large amounts of ground water on the Big Island; that Kona citizens use an average of 1250 gallons/day of water (3-4 times that of East Hawaii); that rain barrels which can hold 35 gallons of water are an efficient use of catchment water for watering lawns, washing cars and other non-potable water uses for those on city water systems. During the Q & A period it was pointed out that catchment water in West Hawaii with its Vog has a very low pH that can lead to serious tooth damage; that mosquito control is important; that 2 1/2 minute showers and low volume toilets are de rigueur. [Ed. Note: You can shower for how long?]
