THE WEST HAWAI'I FISHERIES COUNCIL A community-based approach to fisheries management

In 1998 the Hawai`i State legislature passed Act 306, which established the West Hawai`i Regional Fishery Management Area (WHRFMS) under the Department of Land and Natural Resources Division of Aquatic Resources (DAR), Boating and Ocean Recreation (DOBOR), and Conservation and Resources Enforcement (DOCARE). The Act defined the West Hawaii area to encompass the near shore waters from Upolu point (North Kohala) to Ka Lae (Ka'u) a shoreline distance of approximately 147 miles. The purpose of Act 306 is to:

Effectively manage fishery activities to ensure sustainability, enhance near shore resources and minimize conflicts of use in the WHRFMA.

Act 306 specifically mandated that DAR shall:

Designate a minimum of 30% of the West Hawai'i coastal water as Fish Replenishment Areas (FRAs) in which aquarium fish collection is prohibited.

Establish a day-use mooring buoy system and designate some high-use areas where no anchoring is allowed.

Establish a portion of the FRAs as Fish Reserves where no fishing of reef-dwelling fish is allowed.

Designate areas where the use of gill nets as set nets shall be prohibited.

Conduct a review of the effectiveness of the WHRFMA every five years.

Act 306 also required that management decisions within the WHRFMA be made with substantial community involvement via facilitated dialogs with residents and resource users. To provide community involvement and input, the West Hawai`i Fisheries Council (WHFC) was created in June 1998, drawing on members and work previously accomplished by the West Hawai`i Reef Fish Working Group. In order to accomplish the goals and tasks of the legislation, the DLNR empowered the WHFC to serve as a primary source for formulating and recommending West Hawai`i management actions to DLNR.

The WHFC consists of 25 voting members as well as additional non-voting, ex-officio resource members. The voting members represent a broad spectrum of community interest, user groups, and geographic locale. The WHFC strives to fairly represent the stake holder community. Application for voting membership is open to all interested community members with knowledge and experience in the marine environment or issues concerning fishery management. Council members must recognize that the success of community-based management lies in the exchange of information between stakeholder and decision-makers. All members are expected to act as liaisons with the community and to bring pertinent concerns and matters to the Council and to the community. The WHFC meets from 6:30pm to 8:30pm on the third Thursday of every month at the Honokohau Marina Hawaii Big Game Fishing Club. Council members or their alternates are required to attend meetings or appoint a proxy for voting purposes. WHFC members understand the importance of community-based co-management and freely give of their time and resources to accomplish the work of the Council. Members often travel long distances from Hawi to Kawaihae and as far south as Ka'u to attend meetings and/or provide information. The WHFC meetings are open to the public, noticed in the local newspapers and other venues through which interested people are actively encouraged to attend and participate.

Local Resource Councils

The West Hawai'i Fisheries Council members understand the burden of transportation and long drives for many outlying residents on Hawai'i Island. To make it possible for communities that wish to be represented at the WHFC, an outreach liaison person is funded through grants to help communities form Local Resource Councils (LRC). The purpose of the LRC is to gather mana'o from outlying communities on issues under consideration by the WHFC as well as the communities' own issues of concern and to communicate information from the WHFC to the community. Presently is an LRC in Miloli'i in South Kona and Kawaihae in North Kohala.

Accomplishments

- 1. The WHFC has established a network of nine FRAs which prohibit aquarium fishing and fish feeding. Several hearings and Small Business Regulation Review process were supported by much testimony from the WHFC.
- 2. The Council has recommended amendments to the initial FRA rule to enhance enforcement and initiate the creation of a sustainable, limited entry aquarium fishery.
- 3. The Council has acknowledged and discussed with DLNR the mooring buoy program and is currently working in subcommittee to develop a workable agreement and implementation with the US Army Corps of Engineers. WHFC is working with Malama Kai Foundation (www.malama-kai.org) to site these buoys and to inform communities of the value of day use moorings to preserve our coral reefs
- 4. The Council developed a management strategy to provide the limited kupuna harvest of wana near Makae'o, the Old Kona Airport Marine Life Conservation District (MLCD) and supported the Small Business Regulation Review and public hearings process.
- 5. The Council has developed a set of gill net rule recommendations focused on limiting impacts of large-scale commercial netting while providing for subsistence netting and spearheaded this rule through the public hearings process and the Small Business Regulation Review. Six no gill net refuges have been accepted as well as a Hawaiian cultural netting area (hand constructed, natural fiber nets only). These are now the only gill net fishing sites as the state has banned most of the ones in the state. We are hoping that our gill net fishermen will follow these rules so the state will not ban netting in West Hawaii also. A simple tag from DAR office in Kona will make a net legal and useable in West Hawaii.
- 6. The Council has suggested to DAR that Spearfishing with SCUBA be banned and DAR is writing the regulations for this. There will be public hearings.

The WHFC Youth Council has recently distributed a petition for no-smoking at Kahaluu Beach Park, wrote a Resolution (with the help of Councilperson Virginia Isbell) and got it passed by the County Council and then wrote an ordinance that was passed unanimously two months ago. Kahalu`u Beach Park is now the second beach in the state that is no-smoking. Sea Grant, Tobacco Free Coalition, council member Donna Goodale and Hualalai Academy helped with this effort but thirteen young people (7th to 8th grade) testified at every level and insisted that the Mayor come and sign the bill with them, which he did.

The Legislature of the State of Hawai`i recognizes that regional community-based management is an effective approach to sustaining the quality and health of our marine environment and resources. THE WHFC continues to work diligently to accomplish the tasks and goals of Act 306 as well as other issues of concern.

Community-based regional marine resource management efforts are ongoing throughout the Pacific



THIS WEEK: CARE-A-VAN—HOMELESS OUTREACH PROGRAM

The Care-A-Van (Office of Social Ministry) district covers from HOVE to Waimea and Kohala. We work with the many individuals and/or families. The services that we offer is to work with the many who might have a medical need/care, substance abuse services whether it might be on an outpatient versus inpatient care. The many instances of why someone becomes homeless/unsheltered varies in why. Some of the reasons why one becomes unsheltered might be because of mental illness, substance abuse, domestic violence, divorce, loss of employment, physical disability, separation from family, transients from another state and/or relocation from another island.

The services that we provide are clothing, computer, kitchen, laundry, locker, mail, shower, telephone and transportation services. We also have donated books for the many to have for reading. Through our initial contact we discuss a plan and assist the individual an/or family to identify their immediate needs. We through our many contact in the community we build a great resource for our consumers.

We have a REC (Rental Education Course) that is offered to our consumer, which we encourage that they take. This course is not only to assist in finding a home, how to complete a housing application, understanding the rights of a tenant versus a landlord, budget management, cleaning your home, being a good neighbor and maintaining rental history. This is a four hour course that is held 3x a month in Kona.

We also have a Representative Program that assist and helps an individual with budget management. There might be times when one might need this type of support and assistance, which we provide this service and supported by the Social Security Administration.

We do on the East side have an emergency housing shelter known as Kihei Pua located on Kapiolani Street and we have a transitional shelter known as Beyond Shelter located on Ululani Street. We also have a Community Reintegration Program called Ponahawai Ola located on Kinoole Street. This program is to assist those who are being released from incarceration.

Much has been made about our low unemployment rate and the difficulty in finding good employees. However, with the specter of a potential economic downturn looming large is there more to this "epic labor challenge" than meets the eye?





- Adding a "One Minute of Rotary" as a regular feature each meeting
- Continuing the effort to solicit and induct new qualified members. In 1983 the club had 46 members, and on June 30, 1988 had 72 members, which was one less member than on June 30, 1987.

Some of the goals set by the Avenue of Service Chairs included:

Club Service - to improve on all aspects of Club Service in small ways to improve the quality of the club in a significant manner. Public relations, an article in The Rotarian magazine, the club bulletin and more comprehensive indoctrination of new members were also mentioned as goals, along with the establishment of a single, large fund raising event to benefit the community.

Vocational Service - the expansion of the CareerNet and Project Business programs, along with the resurrection of the Sea Cadets Program at Konawaena High School.

Community Service - the major objective was to focus on the number of needs in the community that the club could help fulfill; the creation of a permanent committee to monitor and handle funds raised for the Chemo Therapy Room; to "adopt Hookena School" which was in much need of some physical improvements.

International Service - to establish a brother/sister club relationship with a Rotary Club in New Zealand; to expand the student exchange program; to support District 500 (it was not District 5000 back in 1988) in the Pacific and Far East, specifically the Marimed and National Geographic's to Korea Programs; to meet the club's goal of \$4,000 to the Rotary Foundation; to sponsor a candidate for a Rotary Scholarship; to continue with the collection of PolioPlus pledges; and to establish an on-going World Community Service project somewhere in the Pacific Basin.

Youth Service - the continue to work with the Interact Club at Konawaena; work with the District in locating students for Rotary Scholarships; participating in the RYLA conference and attending the Interact State Convention in Honolulu.

During Rick's year as President, the annual dues were raised from \$70.00 per year to \$80.00. That same year, the Rotary Club of Honolulu's dues were \$200.00 per year! Some of the expenses at that time included the newsletter, which had to be printed, photocopied and MAILED! (The cost of the postage was 25 cents per issue). The District assessment per member was raised from \$13.50 per member to \$16.00 per member.

PP Rick also notes that in his year, the club raised \$13,000 from the Big Island Book sale, which was the seed money for the Rotary Club of Kona Community Foundation.

The G.S.E. Team the club hosted in 1988 was from Israel.

August is Membership and Extension Month!

According to the Rotary International Calendar, the month of August is **Member-ship and Extension Month.** Every club faces the challenges of recruiting new members, and following are some suggestions as published in the Rotary Magazine:

Rekindle old relationships

Remember that spunky 16-year-old your club sent to Ireland 14 years ago as a Rotary Youth Exchange student? You know, the one who now runs her own business organizing tours to the Emerald Isle? But wait – you don't know that, because your club lost touch with her. Look her up, and ask if she'd like to become a Rotarian. Who knows, she might bring a little luck o' the Irish to your recruiting efforts. But don't stop there. Contact alumni your club or district has sponsored or nominated for Rotary International and Rotary Foundation programs, including former Group Study Exchange participants, Interactors, Rotaractors, Rotary Foundation Ambassadorial Scholars, and Rotary World Peace Fellows. Angela Forthun knows what happens when Rotary clubs remember their alumni. She studied Japanese in Osaka, Japan, on a Cultural Ambassadorial Scholarship from the Foundation, sponsored by the Rotary Club of Glen Waverley, Australia. "I was 31 years old at the time," she says, "and on my return was approached by two Rotary clubs to become a member but in June 1999 was inducted as a member of the Rotary Club of Glen Waverley."

Put new members to work

Encourage new Rotarians to nominate another new club member within their first year of joining. Loren Kuehne's club, the Rotary Club of Las Cruces (Rio Grande), N.M., USA, tried and still uses this approach. "After holding a membership development drive, we had all new members sign a pledge to propose a new member within three to six months of joining the club," he says. "We followed up with the new members and reminded them of their promise. As a result, we doubled our membership from 33 to 67 between 2002 and 2006."

Get carded

When Joe Dino was governor of District 7490 (New Jersey, USA) in 2004-05, he asked clubs in his district to hand out cards at fundraisers to invite people to attend one of their weekly meetings at the club's expense. He also encouraged Rotarians to keep a couple of the cards in their pockets in case they ran across a potential recruit. The cards, which his district's clubs still hand out, say Be My Guest and include the day, time, and location of club meetings, as well as a blank line to write the host club member's name. "That's the best way to bring them in," says Dino, a regional RI membership coordinator and a member of the Rotary Club of Paterson, N.J., USA. He estimates that since 2004, about 150 people in his district have become Rotarians as a result of receiving these cards.







A message from President Diane

I am on my way to Clearwater, Florida to visit my brother. So with time on my hands while in the air, I am going to write a few notes for the *Coffee Blossom*. In the next few issues, I plan to address recruitment of new members. Our membership is only as strong as our ability to serve. We should as Rotary members, be looking for others in our area, men and women of good character who posses an excellent business and/or professional reputation. The process I am laying out for you, in this issue, is Rotary International's recommended way of bringing in new members.

It is best to first invite a prospective member to a Rotary meeting. You should be sure to introduce him/her to some of the members of our board of directors. If you believe after the meeting he/she is interested in being a member you should submit a proposal form on the prospective member's behalf to our board. It is then the responsibility of your board to ensure the person is fully qualified and approve or disapprove the proposal within 30 days. With the capabilities of doing this by email our time should be shorter. The proposer would then be notified by the club secretary. Please note at this time you have not even mentioned to the candidate that you have proposed them. The reason that it is done this way is to avoid embarrassment to the proposer if the candidate does not meet qualifications. Although this is very rare, it has happened.

Once approved by the board, bring your proposed member to another meeting, share a *Coffee Blossom*, and be sure to introduce the prospective member to your fellow Rotarians. After the meeting, follow up with the individual and see if they would like to be proposed for membership. If that is what the candidate would like to do, have him/her fill out the membership proposal form. This gives us permission to publish the proposed members name and classification to the club membership. After the form has been submitted, the club secretary will send out to our club members, the proposed member's information. If there is no objection to the proposed individual with in seven days following the publication of the name, the proposed member is fully informed of the privileges, expectations and responsibilities of club membership. Then that individual, upon an admission fee, payment of dues and then initiation, becomes a member of our club.

It seems like a lengthy process but remember we are looking for lifetime Rotarians who are willing to serve and support the club with their time, talents, and financial support. Please do your part to strengthen our club by proposing a new member.

He told Farrington about Rotary and later called him up to invite him to visit his club. In December 2005, Farrington was inducted into the Menlo Park club. Now, Farrington says, he proudly wears his own pin.

Honk if you love Rotary

Marty Peters, a 2006-07 RI membership zone coordinator, has a bumper sticker on his convertible that reads, Good-bye Polio – Thanks Rotary. Here's what inevitably happens when he's at a gas station or a parking lot: "Someone asks about the bumper sticker," he explains, "and I say, 'I don't have time now, but here's my business card. Give me your card. How about lunch next Thursday? I'd like to introduce you to some of my crazy friends.' And then what I do is, I follow up with a simple phone call. I'll say something like, 'I hated to be rude to you at the gas station. Let's meet next Thursday. I'll pick you up.'" Peters, a member of the Rotary Club of Del Mar, Calif., estimates that in the last seven years, at least 30 people have become Rotarians in his club or clubs in his area as a result of seeing his bumper sticker.



New book published for Rotarians, by Rotarians

Randal Adams believes everyone has a story to tell. And he's made it his goal to help Rotarians tell their favorite tales of service, fellowship, networking, personal trials, and triumphs in his new book, *Speaking of Rotary*.

The book is a compilation of interviews Adams conducted with Rotarians in the United States and Canada.

By using Rotarians' exact words instead of taking a more narrative approach to writing the book, Adams says, "it feels like you're having a one-on-one conversation with the person... This book is like doing make-ups in 78 clubs, without ever leaving your house."

Adams, a member of the Rotary Club of Carmi, Illinois, USA, was 11 years into his Rotary career when he started working on the book. "I was interviewing Rotarians over the phone in 2004 thinking I could have it done for the centennial," he says.

Talking to Rotarians, however, was just the beginning of what turned out to be an unexpectedly long process. After transcribing every interview, Adams spent another two years editing. The book was finally finished last month.

It's now available for purchase at www.randal-adams.com, and costs US\$25 plus \$3 for shipping. A portion of the proceeds will be donated to The Rotary Foundation's Permanent Fund.

September is New Generations Month

Youth programs are a springboard to Rotary for former RYLArians

Lawrence Chew and Bern Igoche are so passionate about the <u>Rotary Youth Leader-ship Awards (RYLA)</u> program that after participating in the 2006 International RYLA in Helsingborg, Sweden, they decided to return to the event this year — as Rotarians.

"Last year's program had 124 participants from 25 countries," says Chew, 27, a member of the Rotary Club of Richmond Sunrise, British Columbia, Canada. "That blew my mind."

Each year, Rotary clubs and districts nominate local RYLA alumni to attend the <u>International RYLA</u>. Chew and Igoche served as counselors at the 2007 event, which was held in June in Salt Lake City, Utah, USA, before the RI Convention. Longtime members of the family of Rotary, the two Rotarians have been Interactors and Rotaractors, as well as district-level RYLA participants and counselors.

"I am proud of my involvement with Rotary and the chance to continue contributing as a RYLA counselor," says Igoche, 30, who believes the RYLA experience benefits not only participants but also the people they encounter throughout their lives.

"They return to their countries intent on cooperating with their district Rotary clubs to carry out service projects for their communities, country, and even the world," says Igoche, of the Rotary Club of Makurdi, Benue State, Nigeria.

Both men agree that RYLA also helps build awareness of Rotary. By inviting young people to RYLA events, especially those without a connection to the organization, Rotarians are promoting Rotary's good works to the next generation.

"The next time they see the Rotary logo or hear Rotary mentioned, they're likely to think, 'Hey, I went to a program run by that organization.' So, even if they don't join Rotary, they have a good opinion of Rotary and what it does," Chew says.

The foundation of Interact marked a new approach to youth service for Rotary. For the first time, Rotarians were not just serving youth, but were empowering them to serve in their communities and internationally with their Rotary club sponsors.

Rotary service to youth dates back as early as 1917, when a committee was appointed to study youth service. Two years later, a department dedicated to "Boys' Work" was established and in 1920, the Rotary Club of New York organized Boys' Week, an annual celebration that encouraged patriotism and loyal citizenship in its young participants. The movement caught on as Rotary clubs sponsored Boys' Weeks across the United States and abroad. Thirteen years later, the program was officially renamed Youth Week in order to incorporate girls. Although such activities engaged Rotarians in service to youth, many club members around the world began to feel that something else could be done to actively engage young adults in service to their communities.

One of the earliest predecessors to Interact was known as the Ro Club, a service club for high school students. Ro clubs' goals and projects were very similar to those of today's Interact clubs. Yrator Clubs (Rotary spelled backward) for outstanding high school students also were active as early as 1934. Their efforts focused on community activities but did not incorporate the international element that is required of clubs today. In 1939, Pan-American Clubs for primary and secondary school students were proposed as a way to increase international understanding and goodwill. The clubs' purpose was to educate students throughout the Americas on the customs and cultures of other countries in the Western Hemisphere. However, without the official endorsement of Rotary International, the movement eventually fizzled out.

Throughout the 1940s, Rotarians continued to serve the children and young adults in their communities by sponsoring the efforts of other organizations. Yet, feeling the need to actively engage youth in community service, Rotary clubs around the world

soon began forming youth service clubs based on the ideals, principles, and organization of their own clubs. The Rotary Club of Miami, Fla., USA, sponsored the most influential of these movements, known as Wheel clubs. Although Wheel clubs were not adopted as an official Rotary program, the RI Board decided to research the Daniel Thiebaut's Beer feasibility of creating a youth service organization for adoption by all Rotary clubs.

Before the end of his term in 1960, then-RI President Harold T. Thomas appointed silent auction and door an Ad Hoc Committee on Youth to study the implementation of youth service clubs. The group studied preexisting youth clubs and consulted with Rotarians, educators, teenagers, and sociologists. Committee Chairman Charles H. Taylor of Christchurch, New Zealand, played the greatest role in the creation and approval of the program through his insight, leadership, and extensive research. The program was named Interact, a combination of the words "international" and "action."

Did you know?

Every year, World Interact Week is celebrated the week of 5 November. Besides participating in service projects, Interactors learn leadership skills and meet new friends. Check out a few facts about Interact, Rotary International's service club for young people ages 14-18:

- Interact was inaugurated in 1962 in Melbourne, Florida, USA.
- There are 3,050 Interact clubs in Canada and the United States.
- There are 247,043 Interactors and 10,741 Interact clubs worldwide, sponsored by 8,464 Rotary clubs.
- Rotary clubs in about 120 countries and geographical areas sponsor Interact clubs
- The 1,000th Interact club is located in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil.

Did you also know that the Rotary Club of Kona originally sponsored the Interact Club at Konawaena High School, prior to the opening of Kealakehe? In 1985 the Konawaena Interact Club had 35 members. Interact President that year was Charmaine Yukawa.



In other words, he is not trying to "Westernize" the people, but rather give them the tools to survive in their homeland as they have done for centuries. His organization, Central Asia Institute, was formed in 1996 with the mission "*To promote and provide community-based education and literacy programs, especially for girls, in remote mountain regions of Central Asia*". Central Asia Institute community projects are in remote

mountain villages of northern Pakistan, Afghanistan, Kyrgyzstan and the steppes of Mongolia. The terrain varies from the highest consolidation of high peaks in the world to miles of high desert plateau. Most of their community-based projects are in the Karakoram Mountains of Pakistan, and the Pamir and Hindu Kush Mountains of Afghanistan. Very few organizations serve the remote areas where they work.

Paulette will address the club on her experiences and how the work of Mr. Mortensen fits in with the International Service component of Rotary.





16-17 lb. turkey

1 cup melted butter

1 cup stuffing (Pepperidge Farm is good.)

1 cup uncooked popcorn (ORVILLE REDENBACHERS LOW FAT)

Salt/pepper to taste

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Brush turkey well with melted butter, salt, and pepper. Fill cavity with Stuffing and popcorn. Place in baking pan with the neck end toward the back of the oven. Listen for the popping sounds. When the turkey's a** blows the oven door open and the turkey flies across the room, it's done. And you thought I couldn't cook!!

Rotary Club of Kona Membership Brochure: We have again revised our membership brochure. Our brochure provides an overview and history of Rotary International, The Rotary Club of Kona, TRF, and the 4-way-test. It communicates a thumbnail of club projects, member's duties and obligations and the location, time/date, and a map for club meetings. It has proved to be an easy way to introduce prospective members to Rotary and provides a qualifying process before being invited to a club meeting.

Revision of Club indoctrination and induction procedures: The club was following indoctrination and induction ceremony procedures that had been unchanged until last year. The club BOD and the membership/retention committee agreed that further updating was in order. This was accomplished earlier in the year and resulted in more timely BOD votes on new members, indoctrinations scheduled more quickly, and the involvement of Past Presidents in both the induction process and post induction mentoring.

Using a combination of Avenues of Service Chairs, member sponsors, Past Presidents and chairpersons of various club activities, new members are now actively engaged in club projects shortly after induction. We encourage them to select an Avenue of Service during the formal indoctrination process.

New Generations – Rotary Club of Kona

STRIVE mentoring program: High school seniors at Kealakehe High school are paired with a Rotarian mentor to work on pre college testing (mock SAT and ACT), college selection, college applications, financial aid applications, and scholarship searches. We try to pair Rotarian mentors with students who are interested in a career that the Rotarian may have first hand knowledge. This sometimes means a Rotarian will take the student to the job place and assist with valuable intern opportunities or other introductions. This year we have over 30 students participating with Rotarians.

Text Book Donations to the Hawaii Bureau of Corrections: Rotarian Harold Meltzer started this program many years ago through Maureen Tito, who is the Director of the Educational Division of the Bureau of Corrections in the State of Hawaii.

Kona has two outbound students and one exchange student that we are sharing with North Hawaii.

We have been working with our award winning Interact club with highway cleanup, meet and eat, and the Ironman. We invited the officer to a fall meeting to share their plans for the year. Yanna Lewis and David Huitt long time advisors were recognized at a recent meeting for their dedication.

The first West Hawaii Rotaract meeting was held on November 7, 2007. Ann Goody has been leading the effort for our club. Claude Thompson and John Steelquist representing Rotary District 5000 came over for the first meeting to share their expertise in this area. ROTARAT will have its first charter meeting on Friday, November 30th.





Joining us this week is Megan Yarberry, Academic Dean of the Traditional Medical College of Hawaii. In December, Megan took her 6th trip with the Pan African Acupuncture Project, whose mission is to train African healthcare workers in basic acupuncture protocols for treating the symptoms of HIV/AIDS, TB, Malaria and other prevalent conditions and diseases of the region. So far, over 120 healthcare workers in Uganda have treated thousands of patients with significant improvement in conditions after even one or two treatments. December's trip took her to Kenya, where the group collaborated with the Abha Light Foundation which offers education and clinical service in the slums around Nairobi.

Megan also works with the Real Medicine Foundation toward offering acupuncture to populations affected by conflict, poverty, or other natural disasters. Studies indicate that acupuncture may be at least as effective in treating Post Traumatic Stress Disorder as the conventional therapies, and is a cost-effective, easily transportable medicine.

The Traditional Chinese Medical College of Hawaii has been supportive of this work, and has it's own projects and programs to develop initiatives and collaborations that will provide patients better access to proven and cost effective healthcare treatment and train students to recognize community need and create successful programming in response.


As you can see by the flyer, District Youth Exchange is hosting inbound and outbound students, along with chaperones, on a trip to our island.



There was an article in West Hawaii Today last week remarking on the life of Leona Rife, wife of the late Mark Rife, a Past President of The Rotary Club of Kona. The article detailed many of the accomplishments of Leona's career in business with The McDonald Corporation, serving as Human Resources for Foodland Stores. She also served several terms as President of The Kona Outdoor Circle and a wide range of projects you see everyday in and around Kailua were accomplished during that period of her life.

What the article failed to accurately describe was the passion that Leona shared with Mark going about the business of Rotary. She was a woman ahead of her time as Rotary International hadn't accepted the concept of women Rotarians. Yes, nowadays it's hard to believe there was a time in memorable history when there were no women in Rotary. Leona never realized that fact. If there was a clean up project, Leona was there. If our club volunteered to assist anywhere in the greater Kona area, Leona was there, hands on and in the fray. She was as committed a Rotarian as any that I have ever seen, her enthusiasm for service equaled only by Mark's.

Our club grew in many ways during the Mark and Leona years. Fines were stabilized and a great camaraderie began with members sharing meals at their homes. We were truly a great 'ohana' of Kona Rotary and much of what exists today came from that time. In fact, the Coffee Pot that we use weekly for the collection of fines was introduced by Leona.

So in her passing, celebrate the relationship that The Rotary Club of Kona enjoyed with Leona and Mark; and know that the club is what it is today in large measure to the enthusiasm of these two people. I miss them every day.





CLUB HISTORY TIDBITS

According to the Club Activities Report filed with Rotary International for the year 1955-1956:

CLUB SERVICE: The Rotarian Magazine: The committee plans a series of three minute "reviews" of items from The Rotarian to be given at the regular meetings by members of the club.

CLUB SERVICE: Club Bulletin: There are four editors for the year, one each quarter. The aim of the club since the beginning of the Coffee Blossom has been that such pertinent facts about the club should always be included so that a file of the Coffee Blossom be an informal history.

CLUB SERVICE: Forums on the Club Level: According to the Program Committee, a series of "Four Object" Forums to be conducted by the four committees will be as programs at weekly meetings. A number of factors peculiar to our particular area make it more practical to have such discussions as program material at the regular meeting.

CLUB SERVICE: Fireside Meetings: These same factors make the scheduling of fireside meetings impractical. The Kona Club is noted for its outstanding "good fellowship". New members become one of us in a

CLUB SERVICE: Regular weekly meetings: Kona Inn. Fridays. 7:00 pm. Best location in Kona for visiting Rotarians. Except for business of the day the meetings are very informal. Fellowship is the outstanding quality.

CLUB SERVICE: Other: Three new members were taken in on Friday October 7, 1955. The First Club Assembly was held on Friday September 30, 1955. A most interesting session was held with Rotary International Vice President Ollie Oberg at the regular meeting of September 2nd. The subject DEVELOP OUR RE-SOURCES is being followed quite literally in the Kona Club. Every member is on at least one committee, and almost everyone is also chairman of another committee. Program material is largely developed from within our own community by bringing in members of other organizations and various areas of community interest. Bringing these people into the club gives us the opportunity to extend to the community the ideals of Rotary.

VOCATIONAL SERVICE: With very little community wide organization of the vocational fields in this rural area, our Vocational Service Committee works on an informal basis with the idea that we are "Putting Rotary to Work Where We Work". Each Rotarian is expected to do his part. Three sub committees—Buyer-Seller Relations, Employer-Employee Relations, and Trade Associations are at work on their program but have not completed plans. They will definitely share in the "Forum Sessions" planned by the Program Committee along with the other four major committees.

COMMUNITY SERVICE: The major financial project of the club this year is the purchase of a Basal Metabolic machine for the Kona Hospital. The Youth Committee continues to sponsor the Holualoa Post 26 of the Explorer Scouts. There are 16 boys in the post. Two became Eagle Scouts last year, and two more are expecting to gain that rank this year. It is also planned to assist the Little League Baseball program this year. The manner in which the Rotary Club will participate has not yet been fully determined.

INTERNATIONAL SERVICE: With the assistance of the Program Chairman one outside speaker has already been sponsored by the International Service Committee. He was Bob Unger, Director "D" of the Hilo Club. His program was a fine example of one club sharing with another its ideas and plans on the subject of International Service. The International Contacts Committee has chosen the following foreign areas for special contacts this year: Australia, New Zealand, Japan, the Scandinavian Peninsula, and South American Countries.



PRESIDENT'S CORNER

Dear Fellow-Kona Rotarians;

What a week this (January 17-21) has been for the USA! - Record highs on the Stock Market; Record lows on the thermometers in much of the East; and perhaps the world's most expensive disaster ever, in Southern California.

This is being written while flying home from Los Angeles as a survivor of the third event, Southern California's big 6.6 (Richter Scale) earthquake—and the hundreds of after-shocks (including the largest, a 5.4 rocker on Wednesday, while I was attending my former Rotary Club's regular meeting in Costa Mesa.)

Our sleep was shockingly interrupted early on January 17, the day before my Mother's funeral and less than 12 hours after driving on several of the very freeways which were wrecked by the earthquake.

The news media reports the quake's toll to be 51 people dead, 4,500 injured, 20,000 homeless (with expected rain soon) and damage in excess of \$30 billion. Many of us have relatives/friends included in these sobering statistics.

But, what has been the reaction of the people most seriously affected—the hurt, the homeless and the bereaved—in this devastating event? One might expect that their reaction would be that of anger, bitterness, frustration and/or fear. Some may react in such a fashion. But it appears that virtually all of those suffering loss from the earthquake instead are indicating thanksgiving, praise, and generosity. They are thankful to God that, even though suffering much material loss, they and their loved ones are alive. The are praising the work of others who have provided prompt (and often heroic) rescues and other assistance. Although in hardship themselves, these people (and their neighbors) are generously volunteering to help other suffering from this major catastrophe.

It is estimated that tens of billions of dollars will be needed to repair/replace buildings. Freeway overpasses and other structures, to grant food/housing help, and to meet other basic needs.

But almost without exception, the hard-hit people claim that the most important and most appreciated service being provided initially is that of personal care/help—people, people praying for others, people giving to people, and people giving of themselves to those in need. That sounds like "Service Above Self"!

At today's Club Meeting, we will learn how we also can participate in providing prompt assistance to these need earthquake victims and join them in further demonstration of "Service Above Self".



ROTARY CLUB OF KONA IS 60 YEARS OLD TODAY!

On November 4, 1947 the following article appeared in the Hilo Tribune Herald:

"Kona Group Seeks Rotary Club Charter"

"Steps for the organization of a Rotary Club in Kona were taken Saturday by a group of 15 business and professional men.

Meeting with the special representative of the District Governor of District 100 (Hawaiian Islands), George Larsen Jr. and two other members of the Rotary Club of Hilo, Don Crozier and J. Orville Wonder, at Kailua, these men voted to apply for a charter in Rotary International thus adding Kona to the list of more than 6,200 clubs in some 77 countries and geographical regions of the world where Rotary has come to play a leading part in the progress of the community.

Present at the organization meeting in addition to the three members from Hilo were David M. Fraser, president; Garnett Watson, vice president; George Parker,

secretary; Sherwood Greenwell, treasurer; George Cherry, sergeant-at-arms; Lin C. Child, director; Yuk L. Liau, director; Robert Greenwell, Antone Gouveia, Walter D.

termination. At no charge to The Food Basket, The Roman Catholic Church in the State of Hawaii has offered to be fiscal intermediary for the duration.) Led by a core founding board of Hawaii Island business leaders that included Ignacio, the agency continued its work and retained the support of the Catholic Church. At time of incorporation, The Food Basket had a full-time island wide staff of seven.

The Food Basket, Inc. is a clearinghouse for food and non-food items that retailers, wholesalers and farmers would normally discard, and for food donated by the community through food drives. On a daily basis, The Food Basket staff members drive to donor sites to receive these items. All goods are delivered to the warehouses, one in East Hawaii and one in West Hawaii, where staff and volunteers weigh the incoming poundage and salvage usable products. Once items are salvaged, they are stocked for distribution via over 100 non-profit partner agencies.

Million pounds of food are distributed by this network of approved nonprofit agencies. Each month approximately 3,000 unduplicated individuals receive emergency food and/or hot meals. Requests for food range from 12,000 to 14,000 per month. Partner agencies distribute goods directly to the needy either by serving meals, providing food boxes, or providing snacks to adults and children in various programs. The largest segment of these agencies provides emergency food pantries to the hungry in their respective communities. Agencies also include those that serve hot meals, child and adult programs, programs that serve the chronically ill, homeless and abuse shelters and substance abuse recovery programs.

Rotarian becomes South Korea's new president

A Rotarian has risen to the top position in the South Korean government.

Myung-bak Lee, of the Rotary Club of Seoul Samchung, Seoul, won a landslide victory in December to become the country's 17th president. RI President-elect Dong Kurn Lee attended the inauguration festivities on 25 February.

"We hope that the objective of Rotary to encourage and foster the ideal of service will help you administer the affairs of the nation," the RI president-elect said in a video message shown at a District 3650 celebration in January. More than 700 Rotarians attended the event, which was held in the new president's honor.

The president responded: "I am most appreciative for what the Rotary Club of Seoul Samchung and fellow Rotarians did. I will make an effort to reflect honor upon Rotary."

Lee became involved with Rotary in 1994, after expressing an interest in charity work to his friend and colleague Woo Joo Chang, a member of the Rotary Club of Hanyang. From 1995 to 1996, Lee served as charter president of the Seoul Samchung club.

"The club set a good example of Service Above Self by working with orphanages, showing concern for the elderly, and offering scholarships to college students," said Chang. He added that Lee has been "a model Rotarian," attending as many club meetings as possible, even while serving as mayor of Seoul from 2002 to 2006.

Though Lee will be unable to remain involved in Rotary activities because of his busy schedule, Chang says Rotarians are excited about his presidency.

Several other South Korean Rotarians have served as high-level officials, including former prime ministers Chung Yul Kim, Duck Woo Nam, Choong Hoon Park, and Chang Soon Yoo, all members of the Hanyang club.

Lee also joins the ranks of Rotarians around the world who have led their countries, including Foreign Minister Bhichai Rattakul of Thailand, Prime Minister Antoine Pinay of France, Foreign Minister Jan Masaryk of Czechoslovakia, and President Warren G. Harding of the United States.

How Rotary is helping Johnny (and Jenny) read

John Corcoran prayed a lot when he was in Catholic grade school: "I used to pray, 'Dear, God, when it comes my turn, please let me be able to read the words."

Suffering from an undiagnosed learning disability, Corcoran sat in the back row, called the "dumb row." But he was athletic and good in math. So Corcoran charmed, lied, cheated, and even bought his way through high school and college, eventually becoming a teacher and successful real estate investor. All without ever learning to read and write. It wasn't until he was 48 that he learned to read through a community learning center. Now, through the John Corcoran Foundation, based in Oceanside, California, USA, he works to end illiteracy in North America. And he's even gone on to write two books, including a best-selling memoir, *The Teacher Who Couldn't Read*.



Losing ground

When most North Americans hear about illiteracy, they think it's a problem in other parts of the world. Given that every U.S. and Canadian child has the opportunity to attend school, literacy rates ought to be much higher, Corcoran and others observe. But poverty, undiagnosed learning disabilities, and sometimes even the education system itself are to blame for more and more children slipping through the cracks. The effects of low levels of literacy continue into adulthood. The National Endowment for the Arts released a report last November that showed correlations between income disparity and the decline of reading. Adult illiteracy in the United States alone carries a \$17 billion per year price tag in lost income and tax revenue, welfare, unemployment, crime, and training costs in business.

Mike Chittom, of the Rotary Club of Tulsa, Oklahoma, USA, has seen the effects of illiteracy firsthand in a third-grade classroom at a local school, which his club supports through a mentoring project. "If every Rotary club could get involved with a school, there is no telling what we could accomplish," Chittom says.

RI President Wilfrid J. Wilkinson, of Canada, has made fighting illiteracy an emphasis for Rotarians and appointed an RI Literacy Resource Group to encourage and support clubs in developing literacy projects.

"[Literacy is] the next progression of what the world needs," Wilkinson says. "We know water is the key issue. Once they have good water, they can have good health. When they have good health, they can go to school, become literate."

Wilkinson wrote the foreword to Corcoran's forthcoming book, *Bridge to Literacy: No Child or Adult Left Behind*. Corcoran lauds Rotary's efforts, calling them an "exciting development" and noting that "Rotarians are known for



their commitment to humanitarian goals and their drive to achieve them."

An 'epidemic' of illiteracy

The illiteracy problem isn't new. More than half a century ago, Rudolf Flesch published *Why Johnny Can't Read: And What You Can Do about It.* "In the years since, the malady revealed by Flesch has grown to epidemic proportions in which nearly one-third of all U.S. school children have serious literacy deficits," wrote William J. Moloney, Colorado's commissioner of education, in a *USA Today* editorial in 2006. Poverty and illiteracy are ideal partners. The environment of poverty makes it difficult for children to succeed. And success, when it comes, is often short lived. The U.S. Department of Education found that even though reading skills improved modestly among fourth to eighth graders in the past 15 years – with the largest jump occurring, ironically, before No Child Left Behind went into effect – by 12th grade, reading scores fell and reading proficiency dropped as well.

The education system is failing many students, spouting a fountain of criticism: Colleges often fail to train new teachers to develop classroom programs that work and fit the needs of every student, and teachers aren't given the support, resources, pay, or respect for the autonomy necessary to cope with their situation. Teachers need school settings where they are freed from a script that tells them what to do and say, says Susi Long, assistant chair of the National Council of Teachers of English's Elementary Section Steering Committee. "Publishers who develop programs can't possibly know children in each classroom and their needs," she says. To many children, the material isn't meaningful. Yet teaching from the text of prescribed programs is more prevalent now, Long says.

Taking action

"Children are told it's their fault they can't learn," Corcoran says. "The child feels the shame and gets the blame. It's a form of child neglect and child abuse." Rotary wants that to stop.

"So, how do we do that?" Wilkinson says. "We looked for ways to help in North America. Despite the fact that we have fine schools, we still need help."

Impressed by the results of a pilot literacy project that linked Rotary clubs with Computer-Assisted Literacy Solution (CALS), Wilkinson negotiated a reduced rate for access to the online program. "It enables users of any age to quickly improve their English language and math skills in a measurable way. I'm encouraging other clubs to get involved [with CALS]," he says. "That doesn't mean we don't have other great [literacy] programs, but we are attracting new members with this one."

Corcoran recognizes the potential. "I viewed Rotary as a sleeping giant, but I sense an awakening," he says. Corcoran has spoken to many Rotary clubs on his lecture circuit. Rotary, in partnership with the International Reading Association, has created a new resource, called *Every School a Star*, to help Rotarians select and implement school-based literacy projects. Adopt-a-school programs vary in size and scope, but Rotarians in cities throughout North America dedicate themselves to tutoring, mentoring, and teaching to help lift children out of illiteracy.

As hard as it is to reach all the children who need help learning to read, getting them to keep reading is another quest. Book and dictionary drives, which some Rotary clubs are involved with, help provide age-appropriate books to children who live in areas that simply don't have them. In Canada, England, and the United States, Rotary clubs are working with singer Dolly Parton's Imagination Library, which buys books for each child born in participating communities. In Arizona, USA, the Rotary Club of Tucson's Reading Seed program provides books and volunteer reading coaches to students in grades 1-3.

Is Corcoran optimistic that volunteer groups can bridge the gap? "The fires of illiteracy have not been contained, so I do get discouraged sometimes," he says, citing the political and institutional barriers to literacy. But he remains hopeful that Rotary can make a difference.

"Many of these children have nobody but us," Chittom says. Wilkinson says current global crises give him a sense of urgency. "A better educated and informed population can make better decisions," he says. "Literacy is the final key to helping people help themselves."

THIS WEFK: Hawai'i Constitutional Convention

For those who attended the luncheon last week with Governor Linda Lingle, you will recall that she made reference to the need for a Constitutional Convention in Hawai'i. As stated in the Constitution, Article XVII:

CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION

Section 2. The legislature may submit to the electorate at any general or special election the question, "Shall there be a convention to propose a revision of or amendments to the Constitution?" If any nine-year period shall elapse during which the question shall not have been submitted, the lieutenant governor shall certify the question, to be voted on at the first general election following the expiration of such period.

Since there has not been a Constitutional Convention (Con-Con) in the past nine years, the question will be on the ballot this election year (2008). Joining us today is Mark Spengler, who led a Con-Con study group for eight months in 2006. Mark is going to address the potential of a Con-Con, such as: potential to deconstruct the size and scope of government; potential to reform the education system by creating local school boards; potential to bring greater government accountability; potential to reform the tax system - among many others.

If you are interested in how having a Con-Con can be beneficial for both you as an individual and business owner, join us to learn more about the process and timelines for a Constitutional Convention in Hawai'i.



THEME ANNOUNCED FOR 2008—2009 ROTARY YEAR!

Rotary International President-elect Dong Kurn Lee addressed incoming district governors today at the 2008 International Assembly, urging them to use their resources to help curb child mortality. Lee said he was in disbelief when he learned that 30,000 children under the age of five die every day from preventable diseases such as pneumonia, measles, and malaria.

"Once I understood the issues behind that terrible number, I

knew what I needed to do," Lee said. He told the incoming governors that Rotary will keep the service emphases of recent years -- water, health and hunger, and literacy -- but asked them to focus their efforts in each of these areas on children.

"In 2008-09, I will ask you all to Make Dreams Real for the world's children," he said. "This will be our theme, and my challenge to all of you."

"Children are killed by illnesses that become deadly in combination with poor sanitation and malnutrition," Lee said. In addition, families stricken by extreme poverty are trapped in a cycle that only leads to more unnecessary deaths. "It's a cycle that is not interrupted because there is no access to education."

He challenged the audience to do their part to give children "hope and a chance at a future" by reducing the rate of child mortality in the world.

"We will bring clean water to their communities and create sanitation projects that keep children healthy," Lee said.

As the incoming governors begin preparing for the year ahead with the training and inspiration they receive at the International Assembly, Lee reminded them of Rotary's power and encouraged them to use their resources efficiently to maximize the good done around the world.

Governor-elect Geoffrey Mathis, of District 9930 in New Zealand, thinks the upcoming RI theme allows Rotary to dream big. "Make Dreams Real will be an easy theme to sell around the world. We all like challenges; Lee has allowed us to put our dreams to practice."

Rotarians can improve children's health, Lee said, even in small ways, such as delivering mosquito nets, rehydration salts, vitamins, and vaccines. "So much more can be done with just a little more: a trained birth attendant, a simple clinic, a school feeding program, a visiting nurse," he continued. "These are simple and direct ways to save children's lives."

In 2008-09, Rotarians will be asked to open their eyes to the needs of children in communities near and far, Lee said.

"Children die not because nobody can help them, but because too often, nobody does. But you and I, here in this room, are Rotarians, and helping is what we do best," he said, adding that "our job is to Make Dreams Real for children. If every one of us does this, at the end of our year, we will all have achieved something wonderful."

THIS WFFK: Hawaii Coastal Photography—Brian Powers

Brian Powers has lived in Hawaii for over twenty five years, starting as a kid growing up on Oahu in the late 1960's. He first arrived on the Big Island with a back pack and a surf-board in 1975 after attending high school in Huntington Beach, California. He has lived in Kailua Kona permanently since 1989. He is single father raising three children ages 10,13 and 16. Brian has been a successful professional photographer in Kona for almost twenty years creating Hawaiian Images Photography & Video in 1992. He specializes in corporate event photography, as well as wedding and aerial photography. Brian is a licensed commercial pilot who taught flying at Kona airport in the late 1970's.

Brian bought an airplane in 2002 and began expanding his photography business into the aerial photography field. Working for realtors, developers and property owners Brian soon became the primary source of aerial photography on Hawaii. In 2005 Brian began photographing the entire coastline of the Island of Hawaii from 500 feet. A year and a half later he had 4,000 aerial photos available to be viewed online by anyone in the world to view. This website became such a great success that Brian decided to do the same thing for the other islands in the state of Hawaii. In January 2008 the new website went online. It contains over 10,000 aerial photos showing the entire coastlines of all of the Hawaiian Islands as seen from 500 up. This is the first time that someone has digitally photographed every foot of Hawaii's coastline in fine detail and made the images available for anyone in the world to see at no charge. 





THIS WEEK: Hui Ho'omalu - Linda Case

Did you know that there are over 160 children in foster care in West Hawaii?

May is National Foster Care Month, and today's guest speaker, Linda Case, is going to provide us information on Hui Ho'omalu, (a group to shelter and protect) which is a program of Partners in Development Foundation, a non-profit organization which partners with the State Department of Human Services, Catholic Charities, Forster Family Programs and a consortium of other community providers all working together to advance the foster care system.

On September 1, 2006, Partners in Development Foundation (PIDF) was awarded a master contract from the State of Hawaii Department of Human Services (DHS) to create and implement innovative strategies to better meet the needs of Hawaii's children in foster care as well as the Foster/Resource families who care for them. Specifically, this statewide initiative addresses the identification, recruitment, screening, training and ongoing support and retention of Foster/Resource Families for children and families that are in the care of DHS.

Infused throughout this new endeavor lies the concepts of collaboration, partnership, teamwork, community building and resource sharing with the agencies mentioned above.

In addition to overseeing the overall management of the contract, PIDF also conducts General Licensing for foster/resource families. The General Licensing Branch focuses on coordinating the recruitment, training and licensing of General Foster/Resource Families. FFP provides support services to post placement foster/resource families. This includes a Warm Line to provide information and referrals, training opportunities, a statewide Resource Manual, and support groups, etc. Kokua Ohana focuses on recruiting and providing support services for Native Hawaiian Resource Families.

Ongoing development of partnerships with communities, agencies, organizations, and individuals are key to reaching our goals. Together, we can provide a nurturing and safe environment for our foster keiki as well as supporting, retaining and increasing the pool of Hawaii's Foster/Resource Families.

Books for All—written by Eloise Coiner

Armed with dictionaries for third graders at the Naalehu Elementary School, the Rotary Club of Kona - Keiki Vision Team arrived in town to start testing the students' vision. On the way to the testing site (the cafeteria), the team learned that the entire school library was washed away in a recent flood. The smell of molding books and the dark library was very painful to walk by. No plans were underway by the education system to help restore the library's contents. Enter Rotary Club of Kona Rotarian Ann Goody.

In short order, she contacted Craigslist and Freecycle web sites asking for gently used children's books and asked the Rotary Club pay the flat rate postage to send those books to her home on the Big Island of Hawaii. Once the books arrived they each had a sticker applied showing the book as a gift from the Rotary club. Two truckloads of books made their way to Naalehu, plus enough books additional books to make distributions to three other needy rural schools.

Eventually the children's book collection program expanded to include, Read-to-Me Centers, rural Healthcare Centers, Neighborhood Community Centers. As this project grew an Ann wondered if there was a need to provide books for shut-ins, disabled and senior citizens? There was!. Now for this purpose, big, used bookstores on the Island gladly contribute, on a weekly basis, their excess books that they have on hand. Services for Seniors, Meals on Wheels, and the Hawaii County Nutrition programs are included in the book project. The drivers each get a bag of paperback books (hardbacks are too heavy) to carry as they make their rounds. Even County medical transport units and private nursing companies were contacted and are on board for individual book drop-offs to interested people. Shut-ins, elderly and handicapped folks are now in the loop, too, with personal visits by Rotarians. West Hawaii's Interact Club and Rotaract continue to perform a valuable service by sorting books for either children or adults and affixing stickers in the books. The stickers display that the books are a Kona Rotary Club gift and printed on each sticker is the 4-way test. After the first day of book delivery to shut-ins, Ann Goody received 30 calls from very happy people.

Currently, in addition each month a bag of books is dropped off for inclusion in care boxes sent, at their request, to 47 Hawaii National Guard troops serving overseas as well as other military who are provided by care packages in our community.

What was initially an emergency education service for children in a small, deprived town has mushroomed into a West Hawaii continuing community literacy project, involving Rotarians, Interact students, the West Hawaii Rotaract club and book recipients, such as, children who live in rural/poverty prone areas, shut-ins, elderly, handicapped, and service men and women.





Kealakehe Elementary School Playground

You are probably aware of the Kealakehe Elementary School Playground situation from the article in WHT two weeks ago this Tuesday. Given the vandalism that took place nine months ago, the playground has been unusable. The state BOE gave the school only the option of converting the playground to another use, ie.

Basketball Court, to which they may have helped in the funding. Therefore without community support, there would not be a playground for the 1,000 children that attend Kealakehe Elementary School. The Rotary Club of Kona Board of Directors discussed this and has moved forward in agreeing to support what is a \$14,000.00 project to replace/refurbish the playground equipment, with a sponsorship of \$2,000.00. In addition, the Rotary Club of Kona Community Foundation is matching that amount with a contribution of \$2,000.00. Additional sponsors include:

I am a polio survivor who has lived in Kailua Kona for 20 years. I know the difference between accessible and just a "helping hand".

My background as a college instructor in Communications and as



a missionary has allowed me to travel to 32 countries. I am familiar with the challenges of traveling alone internationally, as well as arranging my own transportation, housing, touring, entertainment and other events: "how many stairs?", "I need a seat on the aisle", "is there an elevator?"

I often missed out on doing things I felt I could not do - no one encouraged me to ask questions or negotiate alternatives. In 2007 I was crew on a Tall Ship outfitted for disabled voyagers. We sailed from London across the North Sea to the Netherlands on a 3-masted, 18 square sailed ship. I returned home convinced that adventures were open to me that I had considered closed. DISABLED ADVENTURES HAWAII is the result of my new-found courage to try the untried.

In addition to informing us about Disabled Adventures Hawaii, Jean will pay tribute to Rotary's part in eliminating Polio in the world, and also discuss Post Polio Syndrome, the new epidemic. She will also talk about her personal experiences with Polio.

Join us in learning first hand about the disease that Rotary International if working diligently to eradicate in this world.

Shelterbox among the first international relief groups to reach stricken Myanmar

EVANSTON, Ill. (May 8, 2008) -- As major relief agencies waited for access to cyclone ravaged Myanmar, among the first charities actually to reach the affected area was Shelterbox, a grassroots disaster relief organization supported by Rotary clubs around the world.

A specially trained team of volunteers was on the ground Thursday (8 May) preparing to distribute more than 800 Shelterbox containers, each providing a tent, blankets, a multi-fueled stove, a water purification kit, tools and other necessities to help a family of 10 survive for six months. Some containers carried two 10-person tents, doubling the shelter capacity. The first Shelterbox deployment will benefit more than 10,000 people.

Shelterbox founder and Rotary club member Tom Henderson says 224 containers left a pre-positioned site in Dubai on Tuesday. Another 220 boxes left from Melbourne, Australia, while 400 are in route from Shelterbox headquarters in Cornwall, England.





Lakewood Ranch, Fla., says her phone has been "ringing off the hook" as U.S. Rotary club members call to donate in the wake of the disaster. She also notes a spike in online donations. Similar reports came from Shelterbox offices in Australia, Canada and Germany.

Henderson said the team will work in cooperation with local groups in Myanmar to line up transportation and determine where the shelters will do the most good amid the massive devastation, which includes estimates of up to 100,000 deaths, 70,000 people missing, and the destruction of entire communities, leaving tens of thousands of people homeless.

Shelterbox started in 2001 as a modest project by the Rotary Club of Helston-Lizard, England, and quickly garnered support among Rotary clubs worldwide. To date Shelterbox has raised \$29 million and delivered aid to 40 countries in response to more than 70 disasters. Each Shelterbox container costs \$1,000 to sponsor, and Rotary clubs provide more than half of the charity's funding. Visit www.shelterbox.org for more information.

Disasters in China and Myanmar: Rotary's response

Rotarians are responding to the recent cyclone in Myanmar and the earthquake in China by providing disaster relief through Aquabox, LifeBox, ShelterBox, and World Water Works. These Rotary club-sponsored organizations are raising funds to provide shelter and clean water to victims of the disasters.

ShelterBox was one of the first aid organizations to reach cyclone victims in Myanmar, delivering a shipment of 644 boxes within a few days and another 1,050 within two weeks of the disaster. It has also distributed 800 boxes to China, providing assistance to the hundreds of thousands left homeless after the May earthquake.

LifeBox sent 100 LifeBoxes to the Sichuan province of China, each of which included six LifeStraws, a portable water purification tool. They also sent an additional 1,280 LifeStraws to the victims.

After negotiation with Myanmar authorities, Aquabox shipped 120 Aqua30s and 180 standard Aquaboxes to the Yangon International Airport for distribution. Each Aqua30 is able to process 33,000 liters of portable water. They are due to arrive in Myanmar in the beginning of June. Additionally, World Water Works is set to ship 300 Water-Survival Boxes to Myanmar as soon as possible.

Rotary clubs in China are requesting international assistance for the provinces affected by the devastating earthquake. The clubs are suggesting that aid be sent via the Chinese Red Cross or ShelterBox. Learn more at www.rotarychina.org and www.rotaryshanghai.org.

The newly formed Disaster Relief Rotarian Action Group is helping Rotary clubs to coordinate disaster relief efforts. Once fully operational, the group will provide a worldwide structure for Rotarians to effectively participate in disaster response and recovery that will be both timely and long-term. Currently, the group is collaborating with ShelterBox in order to distribute boxes in Myanmar. Find updates on the Disaster Relief Rotarian Action Group and RI Web sites.


