
We're moms, we're surfers, we're kids and teens... we're you. We're engaged to protect what we love; oceans, waves and beaches.

The Center provides access to multiple disciplines, serves as a receive site for courses, course sequences and/or a limited number of complete BOR-authorized credential programs that originate from other campuses of the University of Hawai'i system.

In addition to HawCC programs, the Center facilitates the delivery of baccalaureate and master's programs to West Hawai'i. Students may apply/register for distance education courses found at other community colleges in the UH system.

Hawai'i Community College serves West Hawai'i at the UH Center in Keala-

kekua, with classrooms, a nursing learning center, a dining room/kitchen, computer lab, library, learning center and administrative offices. Distributed Learning HITS and video conferencing classrooms provide West Hawai'i students the opportunity to attend live classes locally while pursuing a degree through the UH system.

The University of Hawai'i Center in West Hawai'i is one of three University Centers established by the Board of Regents (BOR) in June 1996. Administrative responsibility for West Hawai'i was given to Hawai'i Community College, effective in July 1997. Access to higher education is one of the core commitments of the University of Hawai'i. Whether you are a taro farmer on Moloka'i, a single parent in Kona, or a business professional looking for career advancement opportunities, you can be a student of the University of Hawai'i.

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

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

Our visiting GSE (Group Study Exchange) team from the Philippines arrives in Kona on August 27<sup>th</sup>. Everyone is invited to a multi-club social and reception on August 29<sup>th</sup> at the Kona Brew Pub at 5pm. The members of the GSE team will be presenting a slide show of their life in the Philippines. This will be a lot fun and really shouldn't be missed. A group of young professionals from the Philippines will tour the island as part of the Rotary Group Study Exchange program.

The cultural and vocational exchange for professionals between the ages of 25 and 40 involves members spending about a month abroad studying the culture, way of life and their individual vocation in the host country. The GSE team is from Quezon City, Rotary District 3780, and is led by Rotarian Roberto Montellano, an oral surgeon/orthodontist/cosmetic dentist. Contributions to The Rotary Foundation cover the transportation costs, while sponsoring districts and Rotary Clubs provide home hosting during the exchange.

Rotary District 5000 encompassing Hawaii is seeking candidates to submit applications to join the Hawaii team slated to visit Quezon City from March 23 to April 24. The application deadline is Sept. 1. Applications may be obtained from any of the Rotary clubs on the Big Island.

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In a typical four-week tour, applicants participate in five full days of vocational visits, 15 to 20 club presentations, 10 to 15 formal visits and social events, two to three days at the district conference, three to four hours per day of cultural and site tours, and three to four hours per day of free time with host families.

For each team member, the Foundation provides the most economical round-trip airline ticket between the home and host countries. Rotarians in the host area provide for meals, lodging, and group travel within their district.



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

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# Message from Kalyan Banerjee President, Rotary International

September 2011

My dear brothers and sisters in Rotary,

We have a color for the 2011-12 Rotary year, and that color is green. Why green? Because green is the color of spring, of new life, of bright leaves bursting forth from spreading branches. And there is no doubt that it is time to "green" Rotary – to lift our deepening pallor of gray and replace it with brighter shades of green.

Overall, in Rotary, only 11 percent of our members are under the age of 40, while 68 percent are over 50 and 39 percent are over 60. Its not too hard to see where this will lead us in 10, 20, and 30 years down the line, if we don't do something about it now. It is not enough to simply bring in new members. We need to bring in younger members, who will breathe new life and new vigor into our organization.

How can we be more attractive to younger members, who are so different in so many ways from the young professionals of a generation or two ago? We have to come to them where they are – and for most young people, where they are is on the Internet, on Facebook, on Twitter and e-mail, and on their smart phones. A club that doesn't have a presence on the Internet simply doesn't exist as far as they are concerned. A club's website is its public face – and it has to be a good one.

More than anything, I believe we need to bring back the idea of the family of Rotary. We need to look at all of Rotary as one family: Rotarians, their families, and also Rotaractors, Interactors, Youth Exchange students and alumni, Foundation alumni, and so on. And we need to consider retention as an idea that applies not just to Rotarians, but to the entire family of Rotary.



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



When you visit the World Vision website there is a multitude of information. The following excerpt discusses a small portion of what they do.

The Millennium Development Goals —Eradicate extreme poverty and hunger

Goal 1: Reduce by half the number who struggle daily for survival

The facts: Some 1 billion people live on less than \$1 a day.

There are 963 million undernourished people in the world today. The majority of these are women and children.

Every three seconds, a child dies because of extreme poverty and disease.

Extreme poverty exacts a devastating toll on the children of the world, and hunger is for many a daily reality. Half of all childhood deaths can be tracked to a lack of food and malnutrition. For this reason, much of World Vision's work focuses on reducing chronic malnutrition and ensuring that families and communities can provide for their needs.

How World Vision tackles hunger and extreme poverty. **Nutrition education**: World Vision trains parents in the importance of feeding their children food that contains essential nutrients such as vitamins A and C.

Agricultural assistance: World Vision provides farmers with seeds and tools for raising crops and livestock.

**Agricultural training**: We teach farmers improved agricultural techniques such as crop rotation, drip irrigation, and the planting of trees that will enrich over-worked soil.

**Improved product storage**: World Vision helps communities protect their available food resources with new storage techniques. In Mali, for example, we built granaries that decreased the annual food storage loss from 30 percent to 3 percent.

**Marketing assistance:** By identifying and providing resources for marketable products, World Vision helps farmers earn a stable income for their families. For example, we helped Brazilian farmers cultivate and market a crop of organic peppers when environmental changes made it impossible to grow their former crops.


**Feeding centers:** Following a natural disaster or refugee crisis, World Vision establishes emergency feeding clinics and often provides supplemental food until the next harvest.

# Keiki Vision Kealakehe: Seeing Results!

On a seemingly ordinary Wednesday morning, Rotary Club of Kona and community volunteers were accomplishing extraordinary service. On October 12, 2011 Keiki Vision: Kealakehe Elementary took place screening 166 third grade students in several key areas. Working with at least one optometrist at each Keiki Vision / Dictionary distribution project, our program provides a screening exam to point out to the schools and to the parents those children who will benefit from a comprehensive vision test by an optometrist.

On a national level, 25% of school age children have vision problems. Only 33 states and the District of Columbia require vision screening programs.

We have received reports of dramatic improvements in educational achievement for many students who have been examined pursuant to recommendations from these screenings. We hope that more such success stories will follow from this year's project.

Following the vision screening, each student was presented with their own personal student dictionary. The Hawaii Rotary Club Keiki Vision Screening / Dictionary Project is designed to aid third grade teachers in their goal to see all their students leave at the end of the year as good writers, active readers, and creative thinkers. The dictionary is for the children to keep, so they can take it with them into the fourth grade and use it throughout their school career. # Rotary International - December News

My dear brothers and sisters in Rotary,

In late August, Binota and I were in Ghana, where Rotary Foundation Trustee Vice Chair Sam Okudzeto and enthusiastic local Rotarians took us to the ribbon-cutting for a water project in a little village, Abutia Teti, about 60 miles from Accra. We arrived at about 11 a.m., and the whole village seemed to be there. Everyone had been waiting since early morning to welcome us. In the past, the women had to walk over 3 miles to carry pails of water from a river. Now they had a supply of safe, clean water from tube wells in the village itself. It was a simple but effective project in which Rotary and USAID had worked together. But what struck us most that day was family: The men, the women, the children were all there together, dancing, singing, and welcoming us. It made me think about how everywhere around the world, people come together in families, and families join together as communities.

And this made me happy that the first of our emphases in this Rotary year is the family, because the family is where everything begins. It is where life begins, it is where our day begins, and it is where our Rotary service must begin. Because it is the family, and not the individual, that is the building block of the community – and of Rotary.

It is one of my great priorities to encourage the involvement of families in Rotary service. I feel incredibly strongly that Rotary should never, ever come between the Rotarian and the family. Rotary service should be something that brings the family closer together. For myself, if I cannot bring Binota with me to a Rotary event, it's simple – I don't go! Rotary is not just for me; it is for both of us. This is why I encourage districts to welcome families at district conferences, to involve spouses and children in service projects, and to plan meeting times with families in mind. The more that families are involved in Rotary, the more Rotary will thrive – today and tomorrow.







# Kadomatsu (門松, literally "gate pine")

A kadomatsu is a traditional Japanese decoration of the New Year placed in pairs in front of homes to welcome ancestral spirits or kami of the harvest. They are placed after Christmas until January 7 (or January 15 during the Edo period) and are considered temporary housing (shintai) for kami. Designs for kadomatsu vary depending on region but are typically made of pine, bamboo, and sometimes ume tree sprigs which represent longevity, prosperity and steadfastness, respectively.

"The fundamental function of the New Year ceremonies is to honor and receive the toshigami (deity), who will then bring a bountiful harvest for farmers and bestow the ancestors' blessing on everyone." After January 15 (or in many instances the 19th) the kadomatsu is burned to appease the kami or toshigami and release them. (from Wikipedia)



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Leaders of the humanitarian service organization see the Jan. 13 milestone as a testament to the determination of its international membership of 1.2 million – and especially the 116,000-plus Rotarians of India – to eradicate the infectious disease through the mass immunization of children, a goal Rotary took on 27 years ago.

"With the support of their Rotary brothers and sisters around the world, Indian Rotarians have worked diligently month after month, year after year, to help organize and carry out the National Immunization Days that reach millions of children with the oral polio vaccine," said Rotary International President Kalyan Banerjee, of Vapi, India. "As an Indian, I am immensely proud of what Rotary has accomplished. However, we know this is not the end of our work. Rotary and our partners must continue to immunize children in India and in other countries until the goal of a polio free world is finally achieved."

#### India's First Polio Free Year

Deepak Kapur, of New Delhi, who chairs Rotary's polio eradication program in India, also credits the Indian Health Ministry for its commitment to the effort. To date, the Indian government has spent more than \$1.2 billion on domestic polio eradication activities. "Government support is crucial if we are to defeat polio, and we are fortunate that our government is our biggest advocate in this effort," Kapur said.

"Marching ahead, the goal now is to sustain this momentum," he added, describing as potentially "decisive" the upcoming immunization rounds in January, February, and March, which aim to vaccinate 174 million children against polio.

If all ongoing testing for polio cases through Jan. 13 continues to yield negative results, India will be declared by the World Health Organization to have interrupted transmission of indigenous wild poliovirus, laying the groundwork for its removal from the polio-endemic countries list which it now shares with Afghanistan, Pakistan, and Nigeria. However, other countries remain at risk for cases imported from the endemic countries, which is why immunizations in India and other endemic and at-risk countries must continue. Neighboring Pakistan, which has reported 181 cases so far for 2011, is a major threat to India's continued polio-free status. In 2011, a polio outbreak in China, polio-free for a decade, was traced genetically to Pakistan.

Rotary launched its polio eradication program in 1985 and in 1988 became a spearheading partner in the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, with the World Health Organization, UNICEF, and the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Since then, the incidence of polio has plummeted by more than 99 percent, from more than 350,000 cases a year to only 604 reported so far for 2011. The 12-month milestone in India – where the last reported case was a two-year old girl in West Bengal on Jan. 13, 2011 -- continues the progress of 2010, when the country recorded only 42 polio cases out of 1,352 worldwide.

In addition to raising awareness and advocating within the public and private sectors on behalf of the cause, Rotary members to date have contributed more \$1 billion in support of polio eradication. Indian Rotary members have raised more than \$11.6 million. Rotary members now are closing in on a \$200 million fundraising milestone in response to a \$355 million challenge grant from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, which has identified polio eradication as one of its top priorities.

Rotary is a global humanitarian organization with more than 1.2 million members in 34,000 Rotary clubs in over 200 countries and geographical areas. Rotary members are men and women who are business, professional and community leaders with a shared commitment to make the world a better place through humanitarian service. Rotary's top priority is the global eradication of polio.

#### India's First Polio Free Year

Deepak Kapur, of New Delhi, who chairs Rotary's polio eradication program in India, also credits the Indian Health Ministry for its commitment to the effort. To date, the Indian government has spent more than \$1.2 billion on domestic polio eradication activities. "Government support is crucial if we are to defeat polio, and we are fortunate that our government is our biggest advocate in this effort," Kapur said.

"Marching ahead, the goal now is to sustain this momentum," he added, describing as potentially "decisive" the upcoming immunization rounds in January, February, and March, which aim to vaccinate 174 million children against polio.

If all ongoing testing for polio cases through Jan. 13 continues to yield negative results, India will be declared by the World Health Organization to have interrupted transmission of indigenous wild poliovirus, laying the groundwork for its removal from the polio-endemic countries list which it now shares with Afghanistan, Pakistan, and Nigeria. However, other countries remain at risk for cases imported from the endemic countries, which is why immunizations in India and other endemic and at-risk countries must continue. Neighboring Pakistan, which has reported 181 cases so far for 2011, is a major threat to India's continued polio-free status. In 2011, a polio outbreak in China, polio-free for a decade, was traced genetically to Pakistan.

Rotary launched its polio eradication program in 1985 and in 1988 became a spearheading partner in the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, with the World Health Organization, UNICEF, and the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Since then, the incidence of polio has plummeted by more than 99 percent, from more than 350,000 cases a year to only 604 reported so far for 2011. The 12-month milestone in India – where the last reported case was a two-year old girl in West Bengal on Jan. 13, 2011 -- continues the progress of 2010, when the country recorded only 42 polio cases out of 1,352 worldwide.

In addition to raising awareness and advocating within the public and private sectors on behalf of the cause, Rotary members to date have contributed more \$1 billion in support of polio eradication. Indian Rotary members have raised more than \$11.6 million. Rotary members now are closing in on a \$200 million fundraising milestone in response to a \$355 million challenge grant from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, which has identified polio eradication as one of its top priorities.

Rotary is a global humanitarian organization with more than 1.2 million members in 34,000 Rotary clubs in over 200 countries and geographical areas. Rotary members are men and women who are business, professional and community leaders with a shared commitment to make the world a better place through humanitarian service. Rotary's top priority is the global eradication of polio.

This afternoon at the International Assembly, we had the pleasure of announcing that the Challenge has surpassed the US\$200 million mark and has raised US\$202.6 million as of 17 January 2011.

In addition Jeff Raikes, Chief Executive Officer of The Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation was at the Assembly and announced that the Gates Foundation has awarded The Rotary Foundation an additional US\$50 million grant for polio eradication. The new \$50 million grant from the Gates Foundation is **not a challenge grant**; it results from Rotary's early achievement of the \$200 million milestone and of the need for continued funding support for the Global Polio Eradication Initiative. We are aware that there may be many questions concerning the additional grant from the Gates Foundation so to help answer many of these questions a <u>Fact Sheet</u> has been prepared. Please feel free to share the <u>Fact Sheet</u> with your fellow Rotarians.

We know that many districts and clubs supported The Challenge through fundraisers in their community; we would encourage you to share this <u>press release</u> with your local media. You may want to personalize the press release to include information on fundraisers and other polio related activities in your area.

We must remember, however, that this achievement is just one more milestone in our journey to eradicate polio. Most importantly, our ultimate goal is the certification of the eradication of polio. Rotarians are continuing to raise funds for the challenge, which officially concludes on 30 June 2012, and as Rotary leaders, we should encourage their continued involvement. We are confident that we will far exceed our \$200 million goal, just as Rotarians have done in all previous campaigns.

Thank you for all you have done and will continue to do to help us reach our ultimate goal, the certification of polio eradication. Together we will End Polio Now.

My dear brothers and sisters in Rotary, President, Kalyan Banerjee

At Arlington National Cemetery outside Washington, D.C., stands a memorial to the Seabees, formally known as the U.S. Naval Construction Force. An inscription reads, "With willing hearts and skillful hands, the difficult we do at once; the impossible takes a bit longer."

In Rotary, we already have our own mottoes. If we didn't, I might be given to nominate those two lines. The power of combined effort, as Paul Harris once wrote, knows no limitation. When we work together, the impossible becomes possible.

It is time for us to prepare by taking an honest look at our clubs. Are our projects meaningful, sustainable, and relevant? Are our meetings productive and enjoyable? Are our clubs welcoming to new members, and are our schedules and events friendly to young families? And once people join us, do we welcome them properly, involve them enough? Do we make them a part of the family of Rotary quickly enough?

case.

Leaders of the humanitarian service organization see the Jan. 13 milestone as a testament to the determination of its international membership of 1.2 million – and especially the 116,000-plus Rotarians of India – to eradicate the infectious disease through the mass immunization of children, a goal Rotary took on 27 years ago.

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### Rotary International February 2012 President, Kalyan Banerjee

This November, I had the opportunity to speak at the Rotary institute in Kolkata, India. The focus of this institute was on peace and the ways in which we in Rotary could work to build peace. When I received the invitation, I began to think about what I might say, knowing that with all that Rotarians do in this area, my main challenge would be keeping within the time limit!



But just before I arrived in Kolkata, I spoke at a water conference in Tel Aviv. It was a wonderful event at which Rotarians and non-Rotarians from all over the world came together to discuss the many challenges of keeping an ever-growing population supplied with an increasingly scarce resource. Before I could begin to talk about Rotary's contribution, however, I had to explain what Rotary is and what we do - because even in that very educated audience of scientists and entrepreneurs and executives, there were many people who had simply never heard of Rotary.

As I left that event, I began to think again about what to say in Kolkata, because so much of what we do in Rotary to build peace depends on public awareness of who we are. Why have we been so successful in our work to eradicate polio? Because Rotary is able to go where no government and few other nongovernmental organizations can - into homes, into schools, and into communities, with the trust and confidence of the people we serve.

When we in Rotary work for peace, we don't do it by negotiating treaties or demonstrating in the streets. Instead, we build peace by example - by working together, whatever our nationality or background, and putting others' needs above our own. We build peace by dealing with the problems that disrupt people's ability to live normal, peaceful lives - whether those problems are a lack of water, or sanitation, or safe, affordable housing; whether they stem from a shortage of



education or health care, or a need to build productive and positive connections between communities. In everything we do, we rely on our good name.

This is why all of us have a responsibility to be sure that our good name is indeed known. We need to not just work through Rotary, but talk about Rotary - letting the world know about the work we are doing, the differences we are making, and the benchmarks we are setting. Our Rotary work speaks to our belief that a better, more peaceful world is possible, and we need to be sure that our voices are heard.

The new \$50 million grant from the Gates Foundation is **not a challenge grant**; it results from Rotary's early achievement of the \$200 million milestone and of the need for continued funding support for the Global Polio Eradication Initiative. We are aware that there may be many questions concerning the additional grant from the Gates Foundation so to help answer many of these questions a <u>Fact Sheet</u> has been prepared. Please feel free to share the <u>Fact Sheet</u> with your fellow Rotarians.

We know that many districts and clubs supported The Challenge through fundraisers in their community; we would encourage you to share this <u>press release</u> with your local media. You may want to personalize the press release to include information on fundraisers and other polio related activities in your area.

We must remember, however, that this achievement is just one more milestone in our journey to eradicate polio. Most importantly, our ultimate goal is the certification of the eradication of polio. Rotarians are continuing to raise funds for the challenge, which officially concludes on 30 June 2012, and as Rotary leaders, we should encourage their continued involvement. We are confident that we will far exceed our \$200 million goal, just as Rotarians have done in all previous campaigns.

Thank you for all you have done and will continue to do to help us reach our ultimate goal, the certification of polio eradication. Together we will End Polio Now.

## Did you know that Rotary founder Paul Harris wasn't the first president of a Rotary club?

That distinction is actually held by Harris's friend Silvester Schiele, who served as the first president of the Rotary Club of Chicago. Harris deferred his club leadership duties until February 1907, when he was elected the third president of the Chicago club.

In honor of Rotary Awareness Month in January, here's a collection of facts and firsts to expand your knowledge of Rotary. Get the new year off to a good start by sharing a few of these at your next club meeting: Club firsts



On 23 February 1905, Paul P. Harris, Gustavus Loehr, Silvester Schiele, and Hiram E. Shorey gathered in Chicago for what would become known as the first Rotary club meeting. A second club was formed in San Francisco in 1908, and soon after, clubs began to pop up across North America.

On 1 August 1912, the Rotary Club of London became the first club chartered outside of North America. The Rotary Club of Dublin, Ireland, had been organized earlier, but didn't receive its charter until 1 May 1913. Presidential firsts

Paul Harris was elected as first president of the National Association of Rotary Clubs (which later became Rotary International) in 1910, and is the only president to have served two terms.

Other firsts: Canadian E. Leslie Pidgeon (1917-18) was the first Rotary president from outside the United States, Sydney W. Pascall (1931-32) was the first from Great Britain, and Maurice Duperrey (1937-38) was the first from continental Europe. Learn more about past Rotary presidents.

EVANSTON, III. (Jan. 13, 2012) — Rotary members worldwide are cautiously celebrating a major milestone in the global effort to eradicate the crippling disease polio: India, until recently an epicenter of the wild poliovirus, has gone a full calendar year without recording a new

Leaders of the humanitarian service organization see the Jan. 13 milestone as a testament to the determination of its international membership of 1.2 million – and especially the 116,000-plus Rotarians of India – to eradicate the infectious disease through the mass immunization of children, a goal Rotary took on 27 years ago.

**Polio Update** 

"With the support of their Rotary brothers and sisters around the world, Indian Rotarians have worked diligently month after month, year after year, to help organize and carry out the National Immunization Days that reach millions of children with the oral polio vaccine," said Rotary International President Kalyan Banerjee, of Vapi, India. "As an Indian, I am immensely proud of what Rotary has accomplished. However, we know this is not the end of our work. Rotary and our partners must continue to immunize children in India and in other countries until the goal of a polio free world is finally achieved."

Deepak Kapur, of New Delhi, who chairs Rotary's polio eradication program in India, also credits the Indian Health Ministry for its commitment to the effort. To date, the Indian government has spent more than \$1.2 billion on domestic polio eradication activities. "Government support is crucial if we are to defeat polio, and we are fortunate that our government is our biggest advocate in this effort," Kapur said.

"Marching ahead, the goal now is to sustain this momentum," he added, describing as potentially "decisive" the upcoming immunization rounds in January, February, and March, which aim to vaccinate 174 million children against polio.

If all ongoing testing for polio cases through Jan. 13 continues to yield negative results, India will be declared by the World Health Organization to have interrupted transmission of indigenous wild poliovirus, laying the ground-

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But just before I arrived in Kolkata, I spoke at a water conference in Tel Aviv. It was a wonderful event at which Rotarians and non-Rotarians from all over the world came together to discuss the many challenges of keeping an ever-growing population supplied with an increasingly scarce resource. Before I could begin to talk about Rotary's contribution, however, I had to explain what Rotary is and what we do - because even in that very educated audience of scientists and entrepreneurs and executives, there were many people who had simply never heard of Rotary.

As I left that event, I began to think again about what to say in Kolkata, because so much of what we do in Rotary to build peace depends on public awareness of who we are. Why have we been so successful in our work to eradicate polio? Because Rotary is able to go where no government and few other nongovernmental organizations can - into homes, into schools, and into communities, with the trust and confidence of the people we serve.

When we in Rotary work for peace, we don't do it by negotiating treaties or demonstrating in the streets. Instead, we build peace by example - by working together, whatever our nationality or background, and putting others' needs above our own. We build peace by dealing with the problems that disrupt people's ability to live normal, peaceful lives - whether those problems are a lack of water, or sanitation, or safe, affordable housing; whether they stem from a shortage of education or health care, or a need to build productive and positive connections between communities. In everything we do, we rely on our good name.



This is why all of us have a responsibility to be sure that our good name is indeed known. We need to not just work through Rotary, but talk about Rotary - letting the world know about the work we are doing, the differences we are making, and the benchmarks we are setting. Our Rotary work speaks to our belief that a better, more peaceful world is possible, and we need to be sure that our voices are heard.

work for its removal from the polio-endemic countries list which it now shares with Afghanistan, Pakistan, and Nigeria. However, other countries remain at risk for cases imported from the endemic countries, which is why immunizations in India and other endemic and at-risk countries must continue. Neighboring Pakistan, which has reported 181 cases so far for 2011, is a major threat to India's continued polio-free status. In 2011, a polio outbreak in China, polio-free for a decade, was traced genetically to Pakistan.

Rotary launched its polio eradication program in 1985 and in 1988 became a spearheading partner in the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, with the World Health Organization, UNICEF, and the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Since then, the incidence of polio has plummeted by more than 99 percent, from more than 350,000 cases a year to only 604 reported so far for 2011. The 12-month milestone in India – where the last reported case was a two-year old girl in West Bengal on Jan. 13, 2011 -- continues the progress of 2010, when the country recorded only 42 polio cases out of 1,352 worldwide.

ment in England.

If you are a triathlete, there is no bigger day in this sport than the Ironman World Championship. It is the race that defined our sport as it came of age, and continues to be the defining race in our sport for any avid triathlete.

To get to the starting line in Kona, you must either be very lucky and get yourself a spot through the lottery, or very talented, and win yourself a qualifying spot at one of the qualifying events held around the world.

Tens-of-thousands of triathletes try to get one of those coveted Ironman spots every year. Only 1,800 succeeded.

That means 1,800 "lucky" people get to test themselves on one of the biggest challenges the sports world has to offer ... 2.4-miles of swimming, 112-miles of biking, and a 26.2-mile marathon run through tough ocean waves, and challenging lava-covered terrain.

While there are thousands of triathlons around the world, it is this one that truly defines the sport. It all began at an Awards Ceremony for a relay running race in Honolulu in 1977. A group of local athletes discussed the idea of an endurance triathlon and combining three major events that already existed on the island. John Collins suggested combining them and making it a single-day event. Later that evening, Collins took the stage announcing the event and that "whoever finishes first, we will call him the IRONMAN." It has since become triathlon's Super Bowl, Wimbledon, World Series, World Cup, and Tour de France all rolled into one. What makes this event so unique is that "average" people get to compete alongside the best in the world.

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#### RC of Kona Leads Partnership of D5000 Clubs to Sponsor International Water Project in Ichalkaranji, India

On January 29<sup>th</sup>, The Rotary Foundation (TRF) accepted a proposal for a Matching Grant (MG) project that will install state-of-the-art water purification systems in 27 schools in Ichalkaranji, Maharashtra State in west-central India. The high bacterial contamination of the existing school water supplies has led to high rates of illness and absence among the students in the Government-funded schools of this industrial city with about 280,000 people. The planned project is designed to dramatically reduce the illness and absences, thus leading to healthier and better lives for the students.

The project was conceived by the RC of Ichalkaranji Textile City (RCITC) to meet a humanitarian need in their community. Their prospectus for the project reached D5000 Grants Subcommittee Chair, Gary Siracusa, who forwarded it, through our Assistant District Governor, Bill Cliff, to the RC of Kona in early December. As we worked on the MG application, possibilities for improvement and expansion of the project led us to seek contributions from other D5000 Rotary Clubs, as is encouraged by TRF.

Matching Grants enable multiplication of contributions from partner clubs by about 3.5:1 (see accompanying description of the TRF grant process), so the total contributions of about \$4000 from D5000 clubs and \$2000 from the Host Partner Club (RCITC) lead to a project budget of \$18,500, enough to purchase and install "Eureka Forbes Aqua Guard 600" self-contained 3stage water purification systems in 27 of the city's schools.

TRF is now reviewing the MG Application, with approval anticipated about March 1st. The RC of Kona IS committee will collect contribution checks from the other D5000 clubs and combine them into a single check for submission to TRF as soon as

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(Continued from page 5) International Water Project in Ichalkaranji Textile City, India cation to TRF, which assigned its tracking number (#76499) prior to the deadline, ensuring that the full \$18500 project can be conducted using the more favorable exchange rate.

We have just received clarification from TRF headquarters in Evanston that the most efficient way to combine the contributions and ensure appropriate credit to the four participating D5000 clubs is to submit one check for the total of participating D5000 clubs and include a list of the amounts and names/numbers for each club. We will follow their recommendations and submit the contributions accordingly as soon as final project approval is received, usually about 4 weeks from project acceptance.

The obvious questions are:

Why does this process have to be so complicated? – and Can anything possibly be worth this much hassle?!

Summarize total emails = 139 up to Applic acceptance, total email pages (reformatted to conserve space) ~33!

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#### International Water Project in Ichalkaranji Textile City, India

The Rotary Club of Kona (RCOK) is the "Primary International Partner" on an application for a Rotary Foundation Matching Grant (#76499) that proposes to provide water purification systems for 27 elementary schools near the "Host Partner" Rotary Club of Ichalkaranji Textile City (RCITC), District 3170, Maharashtra State, west central India. The RCITC, a 16-month old "spinoff" from the venerable RC of Ichalkaranji Heritage, serves a diverse community in Ichalkaranji, a historical center of the Indian textile industry with a population of 287,580 (2010 census).



The Host Club, which has already conducted multiple Rotary Humanitarian Matching Grant projects in their community, recognized that bacterial contamination of the water supplies at local schools is leading to high rates of illness and absence from school. Children who drink purified water at the schools will suffer fewer illnesses and absences, leading to quantifiable improvement in their school performance and life prospects.

As with most MG initiatives, the Host Partner club initially proposed the project, which will install water purification systems in the elementary schools around Ichalkaranji. Their prospectus for the project was distributed to Rotary districts worldwide, and D5000 District Grants Subcommittee Chair (DGSC in Rotary Speak) Gary Siracusa forwarded it to our ADG (Asst District Gov), Bill Cliff, who, knowing that the RCOK had some unexpended International Service budget \$\$, passed it on to our IS (International Service) committee on 1 Dec 2011.

We saw that the project was a good prospect for a successful MG partnership, but initial calculations indicated that the \$2000 we had budgeted, even when combined with the ~3.5:1 match from TRF and D5000 DDF (see sidebar) would not meet the initial budget proposal from RCITC, which also included substantial contributions from the Host Club and District 3170. Bill Cliff helped arrange for an additional contribution of \$572 from the RC of Kona Mauka (RCKM), which brought the total project budget to the \$13000 needed for the initial RCITC project proposal.

In acknowledging receipt and approval of our proposal on 12 Dec, SN Agrawal, the very energetic and personable email contact from RCITC, informed us that a potential significant increase in the effectiveness and longevity of the project could be realized by employing "Eureka Forbes Aqua Guard 600" self-contained 3-stage water purification systems instead of the initially proposed individually assembled multi-component systems – for a nominal cost increase of only \$2000.

Rtn. Agrawal also brought into the email conversation George Lewis, an Oregon (now Florida) Rotarian known as "the Waterman", who has developed more than \$2M in Rotary Matching Grants for water projects worldwide over several years (see: )

Recognizing the increased value of the new systems to the project effectiveness, we sought an additional \$572 from other D5000 clubs to reach the new proposed total of \$15,000. ADG Bill Cliff and DGSC Gary Siracusa suggested that the RCs of Honolulu and Hawaii Kai (RCOH and RCHK) might have remaining budget and available DDF eligibility to participate. We forwarded the proposal and budgets to both clubs on 5 Jan 2012. The RCOH President responded on 8 Jan, but said that her board would have to make the decision at their next meeting on 18 Jan, so we delayed submitting the application. Their initial decision was to contribute \$1000 to the project, but with the stipulation that the club NOT be named as a participant in the project. We re-calculated the project budget by adding the RCOH contribution to the RCOK contribution, thus receiving the same DDF Match (under Phase 2 – see sidebar again) as the RCOH match would have generated and bringing the total budget to \$16500. The RCOH President informed us on 23 Jan that, after receiving clarification from TRF, they DID want to be a formal participant in the project – so we changed the application to include them as a separate partner.

We received no response from our query to the RCHK until 20 January, by which time we and RCITC had already re-worked the budgets and proposal to include the additional \$1000 from RCOH. Though we had difficulty in both email and phone communications, the RCHK President agreed to poll their board by email to determine whether they would participate. We developed a new proposal budget and our RCITC contact SN Agrawal reworked the proposal to serve up to 27 schools if the additional contribution came through.

At the same time, on 27 Jan, Mr. Agrawal confirmed that the Rotary Foundation (TRF) was going to adjust the effective MG exchange rate between Indian Rupee (INR) and US\$ on 1 Feb. The adjustment, which reflects ongoing changes in the official exchange rate, would significantly change the proposal, requiring re-negotiation of the procurement contracts and a significant reduction in the number of schools that could be served.

We therefore prepared completed applications for the two different project totals and determined to submit whichever one was appropriate at the last possible time before the Feb 1 deadline. Both proposals were signed by all of the required Indian, Kona and D5000 Rotarians – thanks to Rotary rules which allow transmission of signatures by fax or email scan - before our RCOK Pres-Elect, Alan Clark, called me on 30 Jan from a meeting with the DGE, who told him that the RCHK board had approved the donation so we could submit the larger application! Rotarian Agrawal submitted the appli-

the project is approved. As with most MG projects, the Host Partner Club (RCITC) is responsible for executing the project and preparing the needed progress and final reports for TRF. The international partners will publicize the project in our communities and provide any remote technical or administrative assistance needed.

RC of Kona IS committee chair, Dr. Frank Toscano, and committee member, PP Tom Daniel, have spent many hours preparing this application and learning how the MG process works. We are excited by the opportunity to dramatically increase the positive impact of our contributions in less developed countries and plan to seek additional opportunities to serve the international community with this type of project.

#### RC of Kona Leads Partnership of D5000 Clubs to Sponsor International Water Project in Ichalkaranji, India

On January 29<sup>th</sup>, The Rotary Foundation (TRF) accepted a proposal for a Matching Grant (MG) project that will install state-of-the-art water purification systems in 27 schools in Ichalkaranji, Maharashtra State in west-central India. The high bacterial contamination of the existing school water supplies has led to high rates of illness and absence among the students in the Government-funded schools of this industrial city with about 280,000 people. The planned project is designed to dramatically reduce the illness and absences, thus leading to healthier and better lives for the students.

The project was conceived by the RC of Ichalkaranji Textile City (RCITC) to meet a humanitarian need in their community. Their prospectus for the project reached D5000 Grants Subcommittee Chair, Gary Siracusa, who forwarded it, through our Assistant District Governor, Bill Cliff, to the RC of Kona in early December. As we worked on the MG application, possibilities for improvement and expansion of the project led us to seek contributions from other D5000 Rotary Clubs, as is encouraged by TRF.

Matching Grants enable multiplication of contributions from partner clubs by about 3.5:1 (see accompanying description of the TRF grant process), so the total contributions of about \$4000 from D5000 clubs and \$2000 from the Host Partner Club (RCITC) lead to a project budget of \$18,500, enough to purchase and install "Eureka Forbes Aqua Guard 600" self-contained 3stage water purification systems in 27 of the city's schools.

TRF is now reviewing the MG Application, with approval anticipated about March 1st. The RC of Kona IS committee will collect contribution checks from the other D5000 clubs and combine them into a single check for submission to TRF as soon as

## Rotary International February 2012 President, Kalvan Banerice

This November, I had the opportunity to speak at the Rotary institute in Kolkata, India. The focus of this institute was on peace and the ways in which we in Rotary could work to build peace. When I received the invitation, I began to think about what I might say, knowing that with all that Rotarians do in this area, my main challenge would be keeping within the time limit!



But just before I arrived in Kolkata, I spoke at a water conference in Tel Aviv. It was a wonderful event at which Rotarians and non-Rotarians from all over the world came together to discuss the many challenges of keeping an ever-growing population supplied with an increasingly scarce resource. Before I could begin to talk about Rotary's contribution, however, I had to explain what Rotary is and what we do - because even in that very educated audience of scientists and entrepreneurs and executives, there were many people who had simply never heard of Rotary.

As I left that event, I began to think again about what to say in Kolkata, because so much of what we do in Rotary to build peace depends on public awareness of who we are. Why have we been so successful in our work to eradicate polio? Because Rotary is able to go where no government and few other nongovernmental organizations can - into homes, into schools, and into communities, with the trust and confidence of the people we serve.

When we in Rotary work for peace, we don't do it by negotiating treaties or demonstrating in the streets. Instead, we build peace by example - by working together, whatever our nationality or background, and putting others' needs above our own. We build peace by dealing with the problems that disrupt people's ability to live normal, peaceful lives - whether those problems are a lack of water, or sanitation, or safe, affordable housing; whether they stem from a shortage of education or health care, or a need to build productive and positive connections between communities. In everything we do, we rely on our good name.



This is why all of us have a responsibility to be sure that our good name is indeed known. We need to not just work through Rotary, but talk about Rotary - letting the world know about the work we are doing, the differences we are making, and the benchmarks we are setting. Our Rotary work speaks to our belief that a better, more peaceful world is possible, and we need to be sure that our voices are heard.

  - The total DDF for the current year MG budget will be allocated to the clubs based on their percentage of APF contributions three-years earlier
  - D5000 Rotary clubs may partner with one or more D5000 clubs to pool their DDF allocation within any given year
  - Phase 1: Completed grant applications submitted by 15 November
    - LIDF up to the allocation level of each participating club will be provided at a 1.1 match.
  - All DCF allocations unused after 15 November will be pooled for Phase 2.
  - Phase 2: Completed grant applications submitted 15 Dec through 15 Mar.
    - DOF distributed on a first come, first served basis.
    - 1.1 Match for all contributions, until DOF depleted
    - Total DDF Match must be between \$4000 and \$10,000
- Total effective multiplier is -3.5 times the sum of the qualifying contributions from D5000 Clubs.

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



My dear brothers and sisters in Rotary,

In the first message I wrote for this magazine, last July, I quoted Mohandas K. Gandhi, who said, "You must be the change you wish to see in the world." And in the months since, I have had incredible opportunities to travel the Rotary world and see how Rotarians everywhere are bringing those words to life.


Creating positive change means, at its simplest, using our knowledge and resources to solve a problem. But when we are talking about solving humanitarian problems in a real and lasting way, knowledge and ideas and resources are not enough to ensure results. We have to remember something else that is no less important: sustainability.

A sustainable solution is one that will continue to work even after the Rotarians who proposed and facilitated it are gone. This means that even though the project might have come from Rotary originally, the community will take ownership of it. That, of course, means that when a part breaks on a water pump, there will be a process in place to repair it and to keep that pump functional – carried out by the community, and without further recourse to Rotary.

The first step toward sustainability is understanding the need – for example, the cooking fuel problem common in much of the developing world. In many regions, solar ovens are a wonderful solution: They are inexpensive; they rely on a source of energy that is free, nonpolluting, and inexhaustible; and they are simple to use and maintain.

But before we step into a community and attempt to solve its fuel problem with solar ovens, we have to fully understand its situation – and look beyond the problem we see. Perhaps the local foods need to be cooked at a temperature higher than the solar oven can provide. Perhaps the area is windy, and the solar ovens would blow away. Perhaps it's traditional in that area to begin cooking before dawn, which, of course, you cannot do with a solar oven.

These are issues you simply might not have thought of, but that could soon lead to the solar ovens being used to patch roofs or keep animal feed dry instead of for cooking. If we are trying to bring about change, it's not enough to say, "My way is the better way." We have to be listening and watching, not just talking. We can only help others if we reach out with an open mind – and with the knowledge, the commitment, and the perseverance to deliver on what we promise

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

#### **EMERGENCY ACCESS FOR GATE COMMUNITIES ON HAWAII ISLAND**

Gaining access to gated communities can be problematic for emergency responders. Working in collaboration with gated communities around the island, the Hawai'i Police Department has developed a solution to provide law enforcement with immediate access into gated communities during times of emergency.

The estimated 200 gated communities across the island use various methods to control access, and it is impractical for emergency responders to carry keys for every lock or keep track of every combination. Some attempts to do so in the past have resulted in police personnel being substantially delayed when communities changed their lock or reprogrammed the combination without informing the Police Department.

Working together with gated communities, a solution has been agreed upon to standardize access by utilizing radiocontrolled gate openers. Once a community installs the system, police officers will be able to open the locked gate with their police radios. This technology allows for immediate access by police personnel during an emergency, while continuing to provide security and prevent unauthorized access by those other than residents.

Each community association that wishes to utilize this technology will be responsible for purchasing, installing, programming maintaining and repairing the radio-controlled gate system. The Police Department is equipped to use the technology with its existing police radios and will not incur any additional costs associated with the implementation of this new access system.

Chief Harry Kubojiri said he is grateful for the participation of the community associations in reaching this agreement. "It has always been our goal to work in partnership with our communities to address and resolve problems that affect public safety. Police want to provide residents and visitors alike a safe place to live, visit and conduct business while on the island of Hawaii," Kubojiri said.

Participation by gated communities in this program is strictly voluntary. The Police Department will continue its practice of not storing keys and/or recording individual combination lock numbers for these gated communities.

To participate in this program, a gated community association must designate a contact person and have an authorized representative sign a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the Police Department. The MOU sets forth the responsibilities of both the gated community and the Police Department with respect to the radio-controlled access system.



## FLASH — GRANT APPROVED FOR INTERNATIONAL WATER PROJECT

FLASH! On Monday, March 5th we received notification that The Rotary Foundation has approved our Matching Grant proposal, MG 76499, for an \$18,500 project that will install much needed water purification systems in 27 schools in Ichalkaranji, India. The Rotary Club of Kona is the Primary International Partner in this project, which is also supported by the Rotary Clubs of Honolulu, Kona Mauka and Hawaii Kai. The Host Club for the project is the Rotary Club of Ichalkaranji Textile City, a relatively new but very dynamic club, formed in 2010 as an offshoot of the Rotary Club of Ichalkaranii (itself formed in 2007!).

The approval was received only 35 days after submission and acceptance of the application - a process that takes a minimum of 30 days. This quick turnaround happened in spite of the application changes necessitated by the resignation of our president after the application had been accepted. We believe that the clear value and appropriateness of the project was an important factor leading to this guick action by the TRF trustees


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




# Rotary International President Kalyan Banerjee

My dear brothers and sisters in Rotary,



In so many parts of the world, subsistence farming practices are the only way food can be acquired, and a few months of poor weather, or even a single storm, can mean catastrophe. It is unfortunately also the case that the parts of the world where food supplies are the most vulnerable are often those that receive the least attention when disaster does strike.

But this is one of the greatest advantages of Rotary: our local presence in so many parts of the world, and our ability to see, and react to, crises when they occur. More important than this, however, is our commitment to a long-term approach to addressing the root causes of hunger.

There is a great deal that all of us in Rotary can do about global hunger, but as always, we rely on the work of local Rotarians to bring help to where it is needed the most. And there is little question that when we look at the world today in terms of poverty and hunger and extreme material want, the place we need to be looking first is Africa – which is why Africa is also where we should be looking to expand.

Rotary's Reach Out to Africa initiative seeks to increase Rotary club membership in Africa, mobilize African Rotarians to address local needs, and raise awareness of African issues among Rotarians in more developed regions. It is just one way to connect the people who need help with the people who want to give it but may not know where to begin.

There is no question that the obstacles to global food security are significant. But they are not insurmountable, and the Rotary model is perhaps one of the most promising paths forward for development - if we continue our work to build Rotary into an ever more effective agent of global change.

**Mufi Hannemann** is president and CEO of the Hawaii Lodging & Tourism Association, the state's largest private trade organization of hotels and tourism-related businesses. He is the former mayor of the City and County of Honolulu. My dear brothers and sisters in Rotary,

In this issue, you will read about what Rotary is doing

Kalyan Banerjee to combat one of the most pressing humanitarian crises facing us today: hunger. It is, I think, common knowledge that when we talk about food shortages, the problems we face are nearly always local. There is more than enough food produced in our world to feed everyone in it. The problem is getting the food where it is needed, and helping people in the poorest regions achieve food security.



In so many parts of the world, subsistence farming practices are the only way food can be acquired, and a few months of poor weather, or even a single storm, can mean catastrophe. It is unfortunately also the case that the parts of the world where food supplies are the most vulnerable are often those that receive the least attention when disaster does strike.

But this is one of the greatest advantages of Rotary: our local presence in so many parts of the world, and our ability to see, and react to, crises when they occur. More important than this, however, is our commitment to a long-term approach to addressing the root causes of hunger.

There is a great deal that all of us in Rotary can do about global hunger, but as always, we rely on the work of local Rotarians to bring help to where it is needed the most. And there is little guestion that when we look at the world today in terms of poverty and hunger and extreme material want, the place we need to be looking first is Africa – which is why Africa is also where we should be looking to expand.

Rotary's Reach Out to Africa initiative seeks to increase Rotary club membership in Africa, mobilize African Rotarians to address local needs, and raise awareness of African issues among Rotarians in more developed regions. It is just one way to connect the people who need help with the people who want to give it but may not know where to begin.

There is no question that the obstacles to global food security are significant. But they are not insurmountable, and the Rotary model is perhaps one of the most promising paths forward for development – if we continue our work to build Rotary into an ever more effective agent of global change.

#### Mufi Hanneman, - Campaign for Congressional Seat

He was active in the U.S. Conference of Mayors, where he served as trustee and chairman of the group's tourism committee and led the charge nationally among his mayoral colleagues to prioritize the arts and visitor industry.

Hannemann helped found the Hawaii Council of Mayors, the organization of the state's four mayors that collaborates on inter-county issues, lobbies for state legislation, and works together on matters affecting local government. They also were members of the U.S. Conference of Mayors, where they pursued federal assistance for the counties of Hawaii.

The Honolulu-born, Harvard-educated leader is an alumnus of `lolani School, where he was student body president, an all-star athlete in football and basketball, and recipient of the Headmaster's Award. He chose to attend Harvard University from amongst Stanford, Yale, Princeton, Brown, and Cornell. He graduated cum laude with a bachelor's degree in government from Harvard, and was active in student government and lettered in varsity basketball. Following his graduation in 1976, he studied abroad as a Fulbright Scholar at Victoria University in Wellington, New Zealand.

Hannemann served on the City Council beginning in 1995, including as its chairman. At the state level, he was a special assistant to Governor George Ariyoshi. In the administration of Governor John Waihe'e, he was director of the Department of Business, Economic Development & Tourism and Office of International Relations. He was an executive with agribusiness C. Brewer and Company, created and operated his own consulting firm and non-profit organization, and was an educator and coach at 'Iolani School, his high school alma mater. He also founded the Pacific Century Fellows, modeled after the White House Fellows, that is mentoring and encouraging future generations of local leaders.

He has the distinction of having served in four Presidential administrations-Carter, Reagan, Clinton, and Bush-in a number of appointed capacities. He was a special assistant in the U.S. Department of the Interior's Office of Insular and International Affairs under President Jimmy Carter. He was a White House Fellow with Vice President George H.W. Bush during the Reagan administration. He was President Bill Clinton's U.S. representative to the South Pacific Commission under the U.S. Department of State. And he was appointed by former U.S. Labor Secretary Elaine Chao to the Advisory Committee on Apprenticeship during the tenure of President George W. Bush.

Among his numerous honors and awards, Mayor Hannemann recently received the American Public Transportation Association's 2010 Local Distinguished Service Award for his role in Oahu's rail transit project. Another national award was bestowed on Hannemann in 2008 by Americans for the Arts and the U.S. Conference of Mayors as the nation's mayoral advocate for the arts.

He was selected for the Easter Seals National Outstanding Advocate Award, named Fellow of the Pacific by Hawaii Pacific University, honored by Iolani School with the Alumni Service Award, and inducted into the Farrington High School Governors' Hall of Fame. The National Football League gave him its highest state accolade by honoring him with the Val Pinchbeck Award for his support for the Hawaii Pro Bowl and the league's charitable endeavors in the islands. The American Diabetes Association has recognized Hannemann as its honorary chairman for several years and credits him as the most prolific fundraiser and volunteer recruiter for the organization's annual fundraising walk.

In August 2009, the Boy Scouts of America's Aloha Council named him its Hawaii Distinguished Citizen of the year. And in December 2009, Helemano Plantation, an organization dedicated to improving the quality of life of the physically and developmentally challenged, presented him with its Humanitarian of the Year Award. He was named the "Best Public Official" in 2008 and again in 2009 by Honolulu Magazine, and in 2009, the readers of Honolulu Weekly judged him "Best Local Politician."

On January 1, 2011, Hannemann became President of the Hawai'i Lodging & Tourism Association (HLTA). The Board added the title of CEO in Fall 2011 in recognition of Hannemann's exemplary work in enhancing the credibility and profile of HLTA. The Hawai'i Lodging & Tourism Association has a statewide membership of 170 hotels, condominiums, timeshares and other lodging entities representing more than 48,000 guest rooms, and also has an allied membership of more than 280 companies. The organization is devoted to representing the interest of Hawai'i's hospitality industry through education, political action, and member benefits that improve the financial position and public awareness of the industry and its contributions to the community.

Hannemann is married to Gail Mukaihata Hannemann, who is the chief executive officer of the Girl Scout Council of Hawaii. They reside in `Aiea



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Building familiarity is not easy, says Pauline Leung, Rotary public image general coordinator. "Sometimes Rotarians are doing too many things and can get people confused about Rotary. We must have consistency when promoting the image of Rotary. Rotarians should receive training so they can clearly express our position, our vision, our values, and our areas of focus."

High awareness, low familiarity The survey showed that awareness of Rotary varies from country to country, and culture to culture. Of the six countries surveyed, Australia had the highest proportion of respondents who said they were aware of Rotary (95 percent), while Germany had the lowest (34 percent).

But awareness of Rotary doesn't necessarily translate into familiarity with what it does. While almost everyone in Australia indicated an awareness of Rotary, only 35 percent of respondents said they had some familiarity with the organization. In South Africa, where 80 percent of respondents indicated they were aware of Rotary, only 23 percent said they had some familiarity with what it does.

The survey report concluded that public image efforts will need to be tailored to each country. It also noted that boosting awareness alone will not be enough to get the public to readily associate Rotary with good works, or to generate greater community involvement.

The survey further concluded that demographics play a significant role in whether people have heard of Rotary. The survey included a cross section of each country's population by age, gender, income level, and education level. In Japan, 67 percent of respondents age 40 or older said they had heard of Rotary, compared to only 38 percent of those younger than 40. In Argentina, 63 percent of the highest income bracket had heard of Rotary, while only 20 percent of the lowest income bracket had. The report concluded that clubs may need to gain a better understanding of what would increase interest among younger professionals.

**Public perception and giving** The public's view of Rotarians differs somewhat from how Rotarians see themselves. More than 65 percent of respondents viewed Rotarians as charitable, respected, and caring. But only 26 percent selected the attribute women to describe Rotary, while more than 50 percent associated the organization with men. In other questions, more respondents said they associated club membership with men than with women. The survey concluded that Rotary is still being seen as a male-dominated organization. Work needs to be directed toward communicating opportunities for women to join.

Interest in contributing time or money to a Rotary club varied by nation. Interest was highest in South Africa, at 49 percent, and lowest in Japan, at 10 percent. The survey report concluded that because interest in contributing money varies by nation, Rotarians need to tailor marketing efforts to reflect local club initiatives. The public's interest in joining a Rotary club is low. Among the countries surveyed, an average of only 16 percent of respondents said they would be likely to join a local Rotary club. More than 59 percent said they would be unlikely to join. In the United States, women were half as likely as men to report interest in joining.

- Maximize federal assistance to Hawai`i-specific environmental protection efforts
- Reject one-size-fits-all federal programs without full appreciation and accommodation of our ethnic, cultural and place of origin diversity

Again, this agenda just scratches the surface, and does not specifically address current priorities such as financial and immigration reform. And again, my prior record also provides a good indication of the goals I will pursue if re-elected.

I hope this provides you with a sense of my general focus if again honored to serve you on Capitol Hill. I welcome your own agenda and questions at edcase@edcase.com.

### This Week at the Rotary Club of Kona Professor Yoshiko Okuyama, PhD "Japanese Mythology and Modern Japan"



Dr. Okuyama is an associate professor at UH-Hilo, specializing in Japanese studies. She is currently studying Mythology and it's place in Modern Japanese Culture. Dr. Okuyama embarked on Japan's millennium-old, premier pilgrimage called the Shikoku Pilgrimage – or *ohenro*.

This tradition extends over 1,000 years back in history and seems out of place in Modern Japanese Life. During her journey, she came to understand the different types of people who participate, the reason's they go and the religious symbolism be-

hind the journey. and Applied Linguistics. Last year, the Hawai'i Council for the Humanities, or HCH, supported his fieldwork and archival research in Japan for the book that he is writing about Japanese Mythology.

With that funding, he went on a pilgrimage in Shikoku, Japan. Similar to El Camino de Santiago in Spain, the Shikoku Pilgrimage – or ohenro– is Japan's millennium-old, premier pilgrimage. There are some parallels between a recent U.S. film, The Way, featuring El Camino de Santiago and his fieldwork onohenro. Both are full of religious symbolism in pilgrimages, various types of pilgrims, and equally varying reasons for walking. The tradition of both pilgrimages extends over 1,000 years back in history, too. So, for this talk, he will refer to some parts of the film to point out some universality in this type of spiritual journey.



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
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




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# Rotary District 5000 News
