

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Hanohano `O Kona Lecture Series for July 2012

(Kona Historical Society)

Wednesday, July 25, 5:30PM - 7:00PM, West Hawaii Civic Center, Kealakehe Parkway, Kailua Kona



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The first written account of surfing was made by James King (first lieutenant for Captain Cook and commander of the Discovery after Cook's death) in 1779 and chronicled the locals at Kealakekua Bay riding the waves on their wooden boards. Knowing that surfing was first documented here in Kona, it is fitting to have Kona watermen, Jerome Kanuha and Pete Hendricks, discuss the development of surfboards and techniques over time;

present day surfing including kiteboarding, tow in and standup paddleboarding; and what the future may hold. This is the July portion of a community lecture series for 2012 that spotlights local and state speakers on a wide variety of cultural and historical subjects. Presented by Kona Historical Society, in cooperation with the County of Hawai'i, this lecture series is a gift from the Society to the community that has supported it for so long. Free of charge, it is open to all, residents and visitors alike.

Message from RI resident Sakuji Tanaka

July 2012

Dear fellow Rotarians,

I am part of the first generation to grow up in Japan after a terrible war. I think it is natural that my countrymen now place a great priority on peace. We saw where militarism brought our country, and we also saw the great economic growth that came when our nation made the choice to embrace peace.

This was the decision that allowed Japan to grow and thrive. It allowed generations of children to grow up in safety, to become educated, to improve their lives. It fundamentally changed the Japanese attitude toward other countries and cultures. It caused us to open our minds, to become more tolerant, to seek greater understanding.



And it allowed us to redirect our energies toward positive goals. In Japan, it is traditional to prioritize the needs of the society over the needs of the individual. This has always been part of our culture. In the weeks and months following the great earthquake and disaster of March 2011, this was what helped us to survive and rebuild.

This is a lesson that I think the whole world can learn from, in a positive way. When we see the needs of others as more important than our own needs - when we focus on a shared goal that is for the good of all - this changes everything. It changes how we relate to the world. It changes our priorities. And it changes how we understand the idea of peace. In the 2012-13 Rotary year, peace will be our focus and our goal, and I will ask all Rotarians

to actively work for Peace Through Service.

A belief in the power of service lies at the very heart of Rotary. By making service our priority, we put the needs of others above our own. We empathize more deeply with the difficulties of other people; we become more generous with our time and resources, and more open to new ways of thinking. Instead of trying to change others, we recognize that everyone and everything has something to teach us.

Through service, we become more tolerant of our differences and more grateful for the people in our lives. Our sense of gratitude drives us to understand others better and to see the good in everyone. Through better understanding, we learn to respect others. With mutual respect, we live with others in peace.

And so I ask you all to put Peace Through Service at the forefront of your Rotary work this year, and to commit to a Rotary goal of a more peaceful world.

THE HISTORY OF THE STARS AND STRIPES

The Stars and Stripes originated as a result of a resolution adopted by the Marine Committee of the Second Continental Congress at Philadelphia on June 14, 1777. The resolution read:

"Resolved, that the flag of the United States be thirteen stripes, alternate red and white; that the union be thirteen stars, white in a blue field representing a new constellation."



The resolution gave no instruction as to how many points the stars should have,

nor how the stars should be arranged on the blue union. Consequently, some flags had stars scattered on the blue field without any specific design, some arranged the stars in rows, and some in a circle. The first Navy Stars and Stripes had the stars arranged in staggered formation in alternate rows of threes and twos on a blue field. Other Stars and Stripes flags had stars arranged in alternate rows of four, five and four. Some stars had six points while others had eight.

Strong evidence indicates that Francis Hopkinson of New Jersey, a signer of the Declaration of Independence, was responsible for the stars in the U.S. flag. At the time that the flag resolution was adopted, Hopkinson was the Chairman of the Continental Navy Board's Middle Department. Hopkinson also helped design other devices for the Government including the Great Seal of the United States. For his services, Hopkinson submitted a letter to the Continental Admiralty Board asking "whether a Quarter Cask of the public Wine will not be a proper & reasonable Reward for these Labours of Fancy and a suitable Encouragement to future Exertions of a like Nature." His request was turned down since the Congress regarded him as a public servant.

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
4th of July Parade and Fireworks a Success



Dear fellow Rotarians,

I am part of the first generation to grow up in Japan after a terrible war. I think it is natural that my countrymen now place a great priority on peace. We saw

where militarism brought our country, and we also saw the great economic growth that came when our nation made the choice to embrace peace.

This was the decision that allowed Japan to grow and thrive. It allowed generations of children to grow up in safety, to become educated, to





improve their lives. It fundamentally changed the Japanese attitude toward other countries and cultures. It caused us to open our minds, to become more tolerant, to seek greater understanding.

And it allowed us to redirect our energies toward positive goals. In Japan, it is traditional to prioritize the needs of the society over the needs of the individual. 

Dear fellow Rotarians,

What is Rotary? When I ask Rotarians this question, they often give vague answers. And when I asked myself this question, I had to think about it. August is Membership and Extension Month in Rotary, and I want all Rotarians to be able to send a unified message about what Rotary is and why they joined.



The key to increasing membership is for every Rotarian to be convinced that it's good to be a Rotarian, and to convey that passion to others. In Rotary, we have a tendency to be humble and keep our achievements to ourselves. But we must share them with those around us and with the world.

Every Rotarian has a specific moment that stands out and has a special meaning. Some people refer to this as their "Rotary Moment." I believe it is very important to share this moment with others. Facts and numbers can only go so far, but sharing a personal experience can open doors and build friendships. That's why I decided to create some sample messages that I call "Rotary Moments." You can use these one-minute and three-minute messages to answer the question "What is Rotary?" in a way that is most personal to you. They will help you talk about the projects you've been involved in, how they've helped your community, and what's been most meaningful to you.

To strengthen Rotary, we need more members. But unless those members are convinced of the benefits of the organization and can share that passion with others, expanding Rotary won't be meaning-ful.

If every Rotarian is happy about being a Rotarian and spreads the word with a clear, unified message - if every Rotarian around the world can be his or her own PR department - the combined, collective effect will be enormous. These sample messages will help us all clearly communicate our enthusiasm to others. This will lead to an increase in new membership and in member retention.

The Rotary Club of Kona Leads International Pure Water Project in Ichalkaranji Textile City, India

When members of the Rotary Club of Ichalkaranji Textile City discovered that the high rate of absenteeism and sickness in their local schools was probably due to bacterial contamination of the schools' water supplies, they proposed development of a Rotary "Matching Grant" project to address the issue. Their proposal was distributed to Rotary Clubs worldwide and eventually reached Bill Cliff, the Assistant District Governor for West Hawaii of Rotary District 5000 that encompasses the State. Bill Cliff, a member of the Rotary Club of Kona Mauka, knew that the Rotary Club of Kona had allocated some money for an international service project that had failed to materialize. He suggested last December that the Kona club consider pursuing a Matching Grant for this worthwhile clean water project.

The Rotary Club of Kona is the "Primary International Partner" on a Rotary Foundation Matching Grant (#76499) that will provide water purification systems for 27 elementary schools in and around Ichalkaranji. The Rotarians selected a packaged system, the "Eureka Forbes Agua Guard 600" 3-stage water purifier, as the most complete and cost-effective option for purifying the water. The project funding was received in July, and the systems will be installed and operational by the end of this month. Children who drink purified water at the schools will suffer fewer illnesses and absences, leading to quantifiable improvement in their school performance and life prospects. Ichalkaranji, a "small" city of 423,000 people (2010 census) is located about 425 km (265 mi) ssw of Mumbai in the Kolhapur District of the West Central Indian state of Maharashtra. It was a historically important center of the textile industry, so that was incorporated into the name when this new Rotary club was formed in 2010 from the slightly older Rotary club of Ichalkaranji, itself a relatively new club formed in 2007 with sponsorship from the older Rotary Club of Ichalkaranji Central. During its short 2 year existence, the Rotary Club of Ichalkaranji Textile City, has already conducted multiple Rotary Humanitarian Matching Grant projects to meet needs in their community

The Rotary Foundation of Rotary International (TRF) funds many projects of this type around the world every year. Each project involves a "Host Club", which defines the project to meet local needs, and one or usually more "International Partner" Rotary clubs which provide additional funding for the project. The Rotary Districts in which both the Host and International Partner Clubs are located provide additional funds, and TRF matches all funds from Host and International Partner Clubs and districts, effectively multiplying club contributions by a factor of about 3.5.


The budget for the Ichalkaranji water project was about \$18,000, with about \$5000 coming from the Hawaii clubs, \$2000 from the Ichalkaranji club and the remaining \$11,000 from the Rotary Districts and TRF. TRF receives funding from annual contributions of the ~1.2 million Rotarians, the ~8,900 Rotary clubs and the 538 Rotary districts worldwide. Other donors, such as the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, also provide support to TRF. Foundation operations are funded from investment earnings over the three years after receipt of donations. After three years, 50% of funding is distributed pro rata to District Designated Funds maintained by each of the Districts for funding of local and international projects developed by the district and by its member clubs. The remaining 50% goes to the World Fund, for programs available to all Districts regardless of their contributions, e.g., Humanitarian Grants, Group Study Exchange, Peace Scholars, Global and Local Scholarships, etc. TRF also main-

tains a Permanent Fund, in which all funds are invested in perpetuity, with a percentage of the total value spent annually to support all other TRF programs.


A special Polio Plus Fund, established by TRF in 1985, has provided more than \$750 million to the worldwide effort, working in cooperation with the World Health Organization and the US Centers for Disease Control, toward the elimination of this devastating disease. A recent \$255 million challenge grant to TRF from the Gates Foundation will bring TRF's total contribution to nearly \$1.2 billion by the

time the world is certified polio free within the next few years.

The Rotary Club of Kona and our partner clubs in Hawaii (Kona Mauka, Honolulu and Hawaii Kai) are pleased to have the opportunity to use the worldwide resources of TRF to help purify the water in Ichalkaranji schools. We plan further projects of this type, and we welcome others in the community to join us in these efforts. Please contact any Kona Rotarian or send us a note at P.O. During its short 2 year existence, the Rotary Club of Ichalkaranji Textile City, has already conducted multiple Rotary Humanitarian Matching Grant projects to meet needs in their community

The Rotary Foundation of Rotary International (TRF) funds many projects of this type around the world every year. Each project involves a "Host Club", which defines the project to meet local needs, and one or usually more "International Partner" Rotary clubs which provide additional funding for the project. The Rotary Districts in which both the Host and International Partner Clubs are located provide additional funds, and TRF matches all funds from Host and International Partner Clubs and districts, effectively multiplying club contributions by a factor of about 3.5.



(The following is from an article in West Hawaii Today) The mauka-makai beach access road to Kohanaiki Coastal Community Park will close for approximately six weeks for road improvements. This temporary closure, starting Aug. 6, is a safety precaution and construction requirement, said Kaimi Judd, Kohanaiki Shores project manager.

Situated along 1.5 miles of coastline, the park can still be accessed from the Natural Energy Laboratory of Hawaii Authority road north of Kohanaiki. Daily beach area use and camping at the popular "Pine Trees" surfing and diving spot in North Kona will continue during the construction, Judd said.

The road work is part of an overall improvement plan for the long-fought-for shoreline park, slated to be completed in December. Improvements began in June with groundwork and grubbing for the roadway, parking areas and restrooms/ shower area, as well as moving and transplanting of trees and other flora in the way. During the closure, construction crews will continue grading and paving of the mauka-makai beach access road. Afterward, landscaping will be added, Judd said.

The current shoreline access from Queen Kaahumanu Highway will eventually be closed, under the terms of memorandum of understanding between Kohanaiki's developers and government officials. Property owners - Kohanaiki Shores and Rutter/KW Kohanaiki LLC - are proposing to construct a portion of a frontage road, which, as planned, will someday stretch from Kona International Airport to Honokohau Small Boat Harbor, as well as reduce vehicular access points to the highway. The proposed frontage road would also connect to the mauka-makai beach access road, Judd said.

Public use of the road and beach area varies, with the heaviest times happening on camping and high surf days, he added. Judd did not know exactly how many people use the mauka-makai beach access road daily as of press time.

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



Rotary International Message from President Sakuji Tanaka



September 2012

Dear fellow Rotarians,

Many of you know that we now have five Avenues of Service in Rotary. The fifth, and newest, is New Generations Service. There are many ways to serve through this avenue, and you will read about some of them in this month's issue.

All of the work we do to educate children, to improve maternal health, to help families live healthier lives – all of this is service to New Generations. We also serve New Generations by working to eradicate polio, helping to ensure that future generations of children will be born into a polio-free world.

Our youth and young adult programs, such as Rotaract, Interact, Rotary Youth Leadership Awards, and Rotary Youth Exchange, are a very important part of this Avenue of Service. We must remember that the youth of today are the leaders of tomorrow. By helping to develop young leaders and bringing younger members into our clubs, we strengthen communities – and Rotary's future.

For most of my life, I have been a salesman. I learned long ago that being a good salesman is not enough. You must also have a good product. If you are a good salesman, you will make the first sale. But if you do not have a good product, you will make only the first sale. You will not make the second.

It is not enough to bring new members into Rotary. We want them to stay. We want the new, young members to become longtime members. We want them to be Rotary leaders in 10, 20, or 30 years.

How do we do this? We have to look at our product. We have to look at Rotary not with our own eyes, but with new eyes. When we invite a new member to join and that person's answer is no, we should ask why. This is not to pressure someone into joining. It is to find out more information. What are the obstacles to membership? Is it an inconvenient meeting time? Is it too much of a time commitment? Is it something else that we have not thought of?

We need to ask questions, and we need to open ourselves to the answers. We cannot say, "No, we will not do this," just because we have never done it before. Why not have child care at a meeting? Why not involve families in projects? Why not make attendance requirements less strict, or meet less often?

Our new Avenue of New Generations Service is an important step in ensuring many future generations of Rotary, and of Service Above Self

The Rotary Club of Kona Leads International Pure Water Project in Ichalkaranji Textile City, India

When members of the Rotary Club of Ichalkaranji Textile City discovered that the high rate of absenteeism and sickness in their local schools was probably due to bacterial contamination of the schools' water supplies, they proposed development of a Rotary "Matching Grant" project to address the issue. Their proposal was distributed to Rotary Clubs worldwide and eventually reached Bill Cliff, the Assistant District Governor for West Hawaii of Rotary District 5000 that encompasses the State. Bill Cliff, a member of the Rotary Club of Kona Mauka, knew that the Rotary Club of Kona had allocated some money for an international service project that had failed to materialize. He suggested last December that the Kona club consider pursuing a Matching Grant for this worthwhile clean water project.

The Rotary Club of Kona is the "Primary International Partner" on a Rotary Foundation Matching Grant (#76499) that will provide water purification systems for 27 elementary schools in and around Ichalkaranji. The Rotarians selected a packaged system, the "Eureka Forbes Aqua Guard 600" 3-stage water purifier, as the most complete and cost-effective option for purifying the water. The project funding was received in July, and the systems will be installed and operational by the end of this month. Children who drink purified water at the schools will suffer fewer illnesses and absences, leading to quantifiable improvement in their school performance and life prospects. Ichalkaranji, a "small" city of 423,000 people (2010 census) is located about 425 km (265 mi) ssw of Mumbai in the Kolhapur District of the West Central Indian state of Maharashtra. It was a historically important center of the textile industry, so that was incorporated into the name when this new Rotary club was formed in 2010 from the slightly older Rotary club of Ichalkaranji, itself a relatively new club formed in 2007 with sponsorship from the older Rotary Club of Ichalkaranji Central. During its short 2 year existence, the Rotary Club of Ichalkaranji Textile City, has already conducted multiple Rotary Humanitarian Matching Grant projects to meet needs in their community

The Rotary Foundation of Rotary International (TRF) funds many projects of this type around the world every year. Each project involves a "Host Club", which defines the project to meet local needs, and one or usually more "International Partner" Rotary clubs which provide additional funding for the project. The Rotary Districts in which both the Host and International Partner Clubs are located provide additional funds, and TRF matches all funds from Host and International Partner Clubs and districts, effectively multiplying club contributions by a factor of about 3.5.


The budget for the Ichalkaranji water project was about \$18,000, with about \$5000 coming from the Hawaii clubs, \$2000 from the Ichalkaranji club and the remaining \$11,000 from the Rotary Districts and TRF. TRF receives funding from annual contributions of the ~1.2 million Rotarians, the ~8,900 Rotary clubs and the 538 Rotary districts worldwide. Other donors, such as the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, also provide support to TRF. Foundation operations are funded from investment earnings over the three years after receipt of donations. After three years, 50% of funding is distributed pro rata to District Designated Funds maintained by each of the Districts for funding of local and international projects developed by the district and by its member clubs. The remaining 50% goes to the World Fund, for programs available to all Districts regardless of their contributions, e.g., Humanitarian Grants, Group Study Exchange, Peace Scholars, Global and Local Scholarships, etc. TRF also main-

tains a Permanent Fund, in which all funds are invested in perpetuity, with a percentage of the total value spent annually to support all other TRF programs.

A special Polio Plus Fund, established by TRF in 1985, has provided more than \$750 million to the worldwide effort, working in cooperation with the World Health Organization and the US Centers for Disease Control, toward the elimination of this devastating disease. A recent \$255 million challenge grant to TRF from the Gates Foundation will bring TRF's total contribution to nearly \$1.2 billion by the

time the world is certified polio free within the next few years.

The Rotary Club of Kona and our partner clubs in Hawaii (Kona Mauka, Honolulu and Hawaii Kai) are pleased to have the opportunity to use the worldwide resources of TRF to help purify the water in Ichalkaranji schools. We plan further projects of this type, and we welcome others in the community to join us in these efforts. Please contact any Kona Rotarian or send us a note at P.O. The County of Hawai'i Office of the Prosecuting Attorney has been awarded a federal Justice Assistant Grant, now in its second year, to establish an Elder Abuse Prosecution & Prevention Unit. The mission of this unit is to expedite prosecution of elder abuse and financial exploitation cases and to enhance the awareness and prevention of elder abuse in Hawai'i County through inter-agency collaboration and community outreach.



The unit has established a collaboration with the Hawai`i County Police Department and the East and West Hawai`i divisions of Adult Protective Services. Police captains, APS supervisors and the Prosecutor's Elder Abuse Unit now meet regularly, which has resulted

in better information-sharing and problem-solving for our elders. The unit has also established a community outreach program to educate elders and their caregivers on ways to recognize and prevent abuse.

Oktober 2012 Dear fellow Rotarians,

Carlos Früm, 2011–2012 governor of District 6440 (Illinois, USA) and a member of the Rotary Club of Northbrook, teaches business principles and entrepreneurship to Maya high school students as part of his district's ongoing service project in Guatemala.

"Vocational service gives Rotarians the opportunity to help others escape poverty and gain a measure of self-respect," Früm says. "As business and professional leaders, we have a duty to lead and encourage good ethics through vocation."

Through vocational service, Rotarians contribute their professional expertise and skills to address societal problems and needs, and to promote high ethical standards in the workplace.

It is our honor to recognize the many ways that you serve," said Foundation Trustee Chair Wilfrid Wilkinson in welcoming the inductees, along with several Rotary senior leaders and their spouses, to the induction ceremony at RI Headquarters in Evanston.

Harley and Mary Jordan Harley Jordan, a retired math professor and operations research analyst for the United States Department of Defense, is a member of the Rotary Club of Central Vermont (Berlin-East Montpelier). He is past governor of District 7850. Jordan served in the U.S. Coast Guard during several combat missions in World



War II. In introducing Jordan, Rotary Foundation Trustee Michael McGovern said Jordan's exposure to the chaos of war may be the reason he has been so motivated to pursue world peace.

"The Rotary Foundation is, I believe, a significant force in the search for world peace," Jordan writes. "When whole populations are no longer poorly fed and housed, then maybe peace will have a chance. I long for that day."

In remembrance of his wife, Mary, who died in 2004, Jordan said, "[She] supported my every attempt to further Rotary and the Foundation. We are particularly grateful for the opportunity to continue to participate, in a small way, in the many programs of the Foundation . . . through our gifts to the Permanent Fund."

Floyd A. and Betty Lou Lancia Floyd A. Lancia works in the field of real estate development and construction, following a career in education. He is a member of the Rotary Club of Anthony Wayne (Fort Wayne), Indiana, USA, an assistant regional Rotary Foundation coordinator, and past governor of District 6540.

Rotary Foundation Trustee and Past RI President Ray Klinginsmith noted Floyd is equally committed to projects at home and abroad. Lancia said one of his life-changing moments occurred when he vaccinated a little girl against polio during a National Immunization Day in India. "She looked me in the eye and smiled as I administered the drops, and I knew that her life would be changed, because she would not be a victim of polio."

In contributing to the Foundation, Lancia said that for him and his wife, Betty Lou, "It's about the differences we can make in the lives of others . . . It's a matter of trust and knowing that the money will go to good use."

Rafael M. Garcia III and Minda A. Garcia Rafael Garcia is chair and CEO of the Mega Group of Computer Companies, a multinational conglomerate based in the Philippines that specializes in high-technology systems. He is a member of the Rotary Club of Pasig and past governor of District 3800.

"The same savvy and inclination for growth that have made him successful professionally have also served him well in his Rotary work," said Rotary Foundation Trustee and Past RI President Dong Kurn Lee. As district governor in 2011-12, Garcia led 14 clubs to double their membership, chartered three new clubs, and inspired all of the district's clubs to support the Annual Fund.

Garcia has also provided support to a housing project in Pasig that has a medical clinic, community center, daycare center, and preschool. Rafael's wife, Minda, is governor of Soroptimists International for the Philippines, an organization committed to supporting girls and women. "Those of us who can help must know how to give back," said Rafael. "And the best way to give back is to give to The Rotary Foundation."

Cecil "Pancho" Padilla Cecil "Pancho" Padilla is a consultant with Pacific Gas and Electric, following his retirement from the company as a senior manager. A member of the Rotary Club of Winters, California, USA, he has traveled to more than 70 countries on medical missions, along with helping to build bridges and renovate orphanages. Padilla helped establish a dental clinic in Baja, California, as part of his first international Rotary service project. "Experiencing the ability and strength of Rotary to help the people in this little fishing village set a fire in me and it was there that I became a Rotarian," he said.

Padilla says that his experience in Rotary, which includes immunizing children in Africa against polio and working to rebuild towns in Louisiana devastated by Hurricane Katrina, has enabled him to more broadly serve his own community, including through the Red Cross and Habitat for Humanity. He has also sponsored 23 individuals for Rotary club membership. "For me, it is a privilege to be in Rotary," Padilla said.

Jim and Donna Philips Jim Philips retired from the real estate financial services sector in 2004, following the sale of his Atlanta- and London-based firms. He is a member of the Rotary Club of Decatur, Georgia, USA, and past assistant governor of District 6900. Jim's wife, Donna, who taught special education classes before her retirement, is an honorary member of the Rotary Club of Decatur. Jim spoke of the importance to him and Donna of "the great work of the Foundation, particularly Rotary's effort to eradicate polio," and how honored they feel to be part of Rotary's involvement. The couple participated in a National Immunization Day in India in 2006, and some of their experiences were captured in the Rotary film The Last Hurdle. "More than anything else, we look forward to the day in God's good time when polio is vanguished on the earth," said Jim.

Oswaldo and Hisame Takata Oswaldo Takata, who founded the largest construction company in Brazil, is a member of the Rotary Club of São Paulo-Sudeste. He enjoys supporting PolioPlus and participating in community fundraising events hosted by his club. Oswaldo's wife, Hisame, is a pediatrician and has provided assistance, including free medicines, to students at Escola Valentim Gentil for more than 20 years. She also chairs Chama Social de Asistência ao Excepcional, an organization that assists people with special needs.

"I am very happy to be part of this wonderful Rotary family, one of the largest in the world," said Oswaldo. "Contributing to The Rotary Foundation means being sure that your money will be managed very well and efficiently."Canada Day and Taiwan Day induction ceremonies were held 25 October and 26 October. Hui Ho'omalu, is a collaborative effort between PIDF, Catholic Charities Hawai'i, and Family Programs Hawai'i. Together, they will continue to work closely with the Department to best meet the needs of Hawai'i's foster youth and the resource families that care for them. But, they can't do it alone...

Hawai'i continues to need more resource families statewide. There is especially a need for families who are willing to care for older children/teens and sibling groups. There are approximately 1,200 children in Hawai'i who are not able to live with their families. We especially need families willing to accept older children/teenagers and sibling groups. Children are moved from their homes for reasons such as: Physical Abuse, Sexual Abuse, Psychological Abuse, Neglect/Medical Neglect, Parents/caregivers need time and support to

In addition to having to deal with the trauma of leaving their homes and families, they must transfer schools and get acquainted with a new community.

We're doing the vision screening at Waikoloa Elementary School this Thursday, and we're (again) short of time to get it all arranged. In addition to our faithful optometrist, Dr. Frank Toscano, who plans to be there, we need at least 14 volunteers to "man" ("woman"?) the four screening stations needed for efficient screening of - and dictionary distribution to - the 81 3rd graders at Waikoloa this year. Dr. Honda, who has helped faithfully in the past, cannot be available Thursday - which is the only day we were able to fit into the school's busy schedule. Bonnie Pond, our Keiki Vision chair for this year, and I will be there, but we need at least 12 more helpers, especially

since we've added a new color vision test which may necessitate an extra screening station in a place with better lighting.

I'm addressing this to everyone I can think of who's helped at Waikoloa before (this is the 7th year!), and others I hope might be interested in helping. I realize that not all of you can be available, but . . . if you can - please let me know as soon as possible, by phone (989-0171) or email, that you'll be able to help. Some of the people who have indicated that they're willing to help, will have difficulty doing so this week, so I hope we can get enough "new blood" to let them off the hook. PLEASE beat the bushes among your friends who might be available - and have them contact me if they can come. I'll notify the "if really needed" people if they aren't - otherwise, please assume we need you!

For those who haven't been there before (or may have forgotten) I attach a couple of Google Earth images that show where the school is in Waikoloa. If you don't know where Waikoloa is, please check a map or call me for directions. We should be through by 10:30 at the latest. We haven't gone past 10:00 for the screenings in past years.

Message from Rotary International and District 5000

November 2012

Dear fellow Rotarians,

There are many ways to describe our Rotary Foundation. But I think of our Foundation literally – as the foundation for all of Rotary.

We do not often think about the ground beneath our feet. We do not often think about the walls that are holding up our house. We take them for granted. We think about them only when they are not there.

Not long ago in Japan, the ground fell out from under our feet. On Friday, 11 March 2011, a magnitude 9 earthquake shook Japan to its very core. More than 15,000 people died, nearly 6,000 were injured, and another 4,000 are still missing. The total losses of the disaster are estimated at over US\$300 billion.

In a matter of hours, half a million people in one of the world's wealthiest and most developed countries lost everything. They went from living in comfort and security to facing an uncertain future in school gymnasiums, tents, and ruined buildings.

In Japan, we are used to earthquakes. We thought we were ready for anything. But no one ever expected anything like this.

What happened on that day changed Japan, and everyone who lives there. It has made us realize how fragile our lives are. And it has made me realize how little separates me from the people I help through Rotary.

It is easy to look at the people we help through our Foundation as somehow different from ourselves. They live far away. We do not know their language or their culture. We do not know what it is like to have no running water, no sanitation, no health care, no education. We look at pictures, and we read stories in the news about poverty, wars, and disasters. We see, from so far away, the people who are living through such terrible times. But it is hard to put ourselves in their place.

Today, I tell you that there is nothing at all separating us from the people we help. We are all the same. Only the circumstances surrounding us are different.

Through our Foundation, we have the power to live the words of our Foundation's motto: Doing Good in the World. Through it, we can do so much more good than we could ever do alone. And it matters so much – to people just

They have a lot of information and ideas to share so don't miss the opportunity as they travel to each island to make the training available to all of you.



Interact clubs celebrate the program's golden anniversary

The very first Interact club, formed at Melbourne High School in Melbourne, Florida, USA, is joining Interact clubs and their sponsors around the globe in celebrating the program's 50th anniversary during World Interact Week, 5-11 November.

The Melbourne club received its charter in November 1962, under the guidance and sponsorship of the Rotary Club of Melbourne, Florida, USA. In celebration of the golden anniversary, charter members of the club joined current Interactors and Rotarians from District 6930 for a night of reflection and fellowship.

"What makes Rotary great is what makes Interact great," says Michael Welch, president of the Rotary Club of Melbourne, who helped plan the anniversary event. "For a person -- especially a young person, an Interactor -- to appreciate the concept of Service Above Self, and then put it to work on their own time, it's a special experience that can change a lot of lives."

As part of the celebration, Melbourne Interactors gave a presentation on the history of Interact. District Governor-nominee Juan Ortega explained how his experiences with Interact in Colombia led him to join Rotary.

The present-day Interactors and their sponsors also re-created an iconic photo of their club that appeared in The Rotarian in 1962.

The Interact Club of Robert E. Lee High School in Baytown, Texas, USA, which was chartered just months after the club in Melbourne, is celebrating the anniversary with various events, including a roundup on 15 September that was attended by more than 320 Interactors from across District 5890.

The Texas Interactors created a video showing photos and projects from the past five decades, in addition to networking with fellow Interactors and Rotarians. The Interactors and the Rotary Club of Baytown, which sponsors the club, presented two cakes, one to mark their club's anniversary and the other for the Interact program.

The celebrations continued 27 September as RI President Sakuji Tanaka spoke at an all-club meeting held by the district. Garrett Kneese, a district Interact leader, discussed the importance of Interact and Rotary.

The Interactors are also conducting service projects to mark the anniversary. District Interactors went door-todoor with their Rotary sponsors on 31 October collecting nonperishable food for the district's Interact Hungry Harvest

Message from Rotary International and District 5000

November 2012

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Not long ago in Japan, the ground fell out from under our feet. On Friday, 11 March 2011, a magnitude 9 earthquake shook Japan to its very core. More than 15,000 people died, nearly 6,000 were injured, and another 4,000 are still missing. The total losses of the disaster are estimated at over US\$300 billion.

In a matter of hours, half a million people in one of the world's wealthiest and most developed countries lost everything. They went from living in comfort and security to facing an uncertain future in school gymnasiums, tents, and ruined buildings.

In Japan, we are used to earthquakes. We thought we were ready for anything. But no one ever expected anything like this.

What happened on that day changed Japan, and everyone who lives there. It has made us realize how fragile our lives are. And it has made me realize how little separates me from the people I help through Rotary.

It is easy to look at the people we help through our Foundation as somehow different from ourselves. They live far away. We do not know their language or their culture. We do not know what it is like to have no running water, no sanitation, no health care, no education. We look at pictures, and we read stories in the news about poverty, wars, and disasters. We see, from so far away, the people who are living through such terrible times. But it is hard to put ourselves in their place.

Today, I tell you that there is nothing at all separating us from the people we help. We are all the same. Only the circumstances surrounding us are different.

Through our Foundation, we have the power to live the words of our Foundation's motto: Doing Good in the World. Through it, we can do so much more good than we could ever do alone. And it matters so much – to people just

At the Rotary Club of Kona Gordon Joyce, Retired US Park Ranger "In Search of First Contact

An Examination of a Possible Pre-Contact Landing in Hawaii"

Gordon Joyce graduated from University of Hawaii Manoa with a bachelor of science degree in geology in 1965. Gordon spent two seasons fighting fires with the Forest Service in California and worked as a roustabout in the oilfields before going overseas as a UNESCO volunteer in Nigeria. He began a 35 year ranger career with the National Park Service in 1968. Stationed at Grand Canyon N.P., Natchez Trace Parkway, Yosemite N.P., Haleakala N.P., American Memorial Park in Saipan, and retired as Chief Ranger at Pu'uhonua o Honaunau National Historical Park in 2002.

He became fascinated with Pacific history while on Saipan in the 1980's while observing the archeological excavation of the offshore wreck of the Nuestra Senora de la Concepcion, a Manila galleon lost in 1638. Since then, he has researched and written about first contact between Europeans and Pacific Islanders using original source material and taking advantage of recently translated documents unavailable to earlier authors. The focus in recent years has been on possible pre-Cook voyages to Hawaii resulting in a still unfinished 200+ page manuscript. Gordon has been a guest lecturer to several college history classes.



Message from Rotary International and District 5000

December 2012 Dear fellow Rotarians,

The year 2012 is nearly gone, and we have reached the midpoint of this Rotary year. It is time to take stock of the goals we have set for ourselves, and the progress we have made toward them. Are we on track to achieve what we set out to accomplish? I am a great believer in the importance of setting goals that are high but realistic. A worth-while goal should be within your reach but still require you to stretch. Opening yourself to a new challenge helps you find out what you are really capable of – which may well be more than you think.

On 1 July, we will embark on our newest challenge as an organization: the full rollout of the Future Vision Plan, the new grant model for our Rotary Foundation. We in Rotary have set for ourselves a simple and vital goal: to do the most good we can with all the resources we have. To do this, we will be working to reduce overhead; to improve accountability, transparency, and local control; and to focus our service more intensely in the areas where we know we can have the most impact.

With Future Vision, we will implement a simplified grant structure that will encourage Rotarians to serve in our six areas of focus: peace and conflict prevention/resolution, disease prevention and treatment, water and sanitation, maternal and child health, basic education and literacy, and economic and community development. These are areas in which Rotarians around the world have already been working for many years, and in which we have experience and a track record of project sustainability.

Sustainability will be a major focus under Future Vision, as we shift our emphasis to long-term, highimpact projects. Simply put, a sustainable project is one that will continue to benefit the world even after Rotary funding ends. The ultimate example of a sustainable project, of course, is polio eradication: When polio is gone, the good that we have done will continue forever, centuries after the last polio vaccine is given. And the lessons we have learned from PolioPlus are universal. A truly sustainable project requires an emphasis on planning and cooperation, a long-term perspective, and an approach that considers community members as partners in our service, not passive recipients.

Embracing Future Vision means embracing a more ambitious view of Rotary – one in which we work to address major issues in a serious, lasting way. It is a new way of thinking about our service, and an approach that I believe will lead to a Foundation more capable than ever of Doing Good in the World.



Consider buying rechargeable batteries (and a charger) for electronic gifts to help reduce the amount of harmful materials thrown away. After the holidays, look for ways to recycle your tree instead of sending it to a landfill. If you plan to send greeting cards, consider purchasing ones that are made of recycled paper or sending electronic greetings. Get more ideas on how to reduce waste, save money, and help the environment.

A Message from Exchange Student Hannah Unger and her adventure in Argentina

I'm back for round two, currently about four and a half months through my exchange here in Argentina! I thought I'd sneak an email in between celebrations. I cannot believe that I am almost HALFWAY through with this experience. Blows my mind.

If I were to say that it's been easy, I'd be lying. My advice to any future exchange student is that when people tell you how great of an experience the year will be and how much it will change you, it is the truth. But to not, for ONE second, think it will be easy. For those who know me best, know that I've struggled with negativity all my life. I got into the habit as a child of complaining and feeling sorry for myself. To be honest, the first three months of my exchange were pretty miserable. I was dwelling on missing out on the college



experiences, missing my family (now I don't care about you guys muahaha just kidding), not having friends, etc. I thought all the people that loved their exchange and were happy were just a bunch of ferries. One day, after an awful night, I woke up and decided I was done being unhappy and depressed. I decided to really open my mind and attempt to be positive. For every bad thought I had, I forced myself, without ease, to see the upside of it. Since that day I have enjoyed myself SO much more here. I absolutely love my exchange now and am very confident in my abilities and decision to have done this. I know there will still be hard times to come, but I don't doubt that I will be able to get through it and come out stronger. I will never again doubt the power of positivity and how crucial it is for a happy life.

School ended during the last week of November. I passed with flying F's (just kidding)! I was patted on the back for my "effort" and sent on my way to enjoy summer. I have taken full advantage of sleep, food, TV, and reading. It took my host mom a while to understand my ways of hibernation and tranquility, but after I explained my demanding way of life for the past four years I think she finally understands. Their eldest daughter, Valentina, has returned home for the summer with her four-year-old daughter, Jazmin. The energy in the house has definitely gone up a notch. Valentina is absolutely awesome, very mature and sweet. She treats me completely like a real sister, and I've spent a lot of time with her and her friends. Justina and I have had an off and on relationship for the past couple months. With Valentina around, everyone kind of clicks better.

For some reason I didn't expect there to be many cultural holiday differences, but of course there were. In my family, we have always had a tall, real, Christmas tree. This year, I fished the Christmas tree out of a box, and it was about half my size. In Argentina, you set up the Christmas tree on the 8th of December (Immaculate conception), and take it down on the 6th of January (the day of the three kings). Christmas is celebrated more on the 24th "Noche Buena". Or you could say it's celebrated on the 25th, but at about one in the morning. We had a big dinner at our house with Marta's brother, his family, and other friends. When the clock struck twelve, we all went outside to await the arrival of "Papa Noel". We set off some fireworks and then let the young ones run back into the house to shriek at the presents under the tree. Following dessert came hours of Karaoke. Nothing like intoxicated adults singing at the top of their lungs and standing on chairs. Good fun! After Karaoke, the adolescents do what they do best, and go out and party. I think it's fair to say I'm officially nocturnal. We are either out till seven in the morning, or I'm home and can't get myself to fall asleep. Nevertheless, it's all done in good fun. New years will be no exception. The 6th of January is also celebrated with gifts because the three kings brought gifts with them for the baby Jesus. I'm still unsure of how this one works but we will see. Apparently they leave grass and water under the tree for the kings' camels. Sounds cool to me.

January comes with the promises of a new year and I'm excited. Another exchange girl and I are going to make a trip to visit another exchange girl in Mar de Plata. It's a huge city right on the beach. I'm looking forward to seeing a body of water. Every time I open my clothes drawer, I swear my bathing suits are frowning at me. Marta also has a trip planned for us to visit a place called Puerto Madryn, which is another beach port filled with penguins. In February us exchange students have a three-week Rotary trip all over the North of Argentina. I'm super excited about it. It's awesome to be with the other exchange students because no one gets you like they do. By the time I return from the trip, school will be starting up for the final three months of my exchange. Crazy!

As for my ability to speak Spanish, I learn something new everyday. I was Skyping another exchange girl, (Marley), the one in Mar de Plata, and we were talking about our improvement in speaking Spanish. We both agreed that on a day-to-day basis, it's hard to see improvement. However, when you look back to the beginning you realize how many things you didn't know before you got here. I remember thinking I understood a lot when I got here, now I giggle looking back on the thought. It's not that I didn't know anything, it's just that I knew NOTHING compared to what I know now. It is extremely rare for me to not understand a conversation nowadays. There are still times that I won't know a specific word, but by putting things in context I can almost always figure it out. I'm still working on my ability to speak back, but I know it has improved tremendously. I have also realized how much better I speak when I'm confident. The other night I was in the club and started having a casual conversation with a guy I didn't know. When I told him I was an exchange student he was thoroughly surprised. I told him not to lie to me, but he insisted we were talking like he would talk to anybody else. I took the liberty of giving myself a little pat on the back. I'm not saying I'll be able to walk out of this year giving you a lecture about astrophysics, but as for normal day-to-day conversations, I'm fluent.

Language is such a trippy thing. I was scrolling down on Facebook about a week ago and came across a status that another U.S. exchange student had posted. She said, "Guys, I have a confession to make. I forgot a word in English and I honestly still can't remember it for the life of me." The word she was looking for was "hardboiled" eggs. This same thing happened to me with the word "fraternal" twin. It's not the usual "can't think of a word" for 10 minutes. It took me about a WEEK to think of the word "fraternal" twin. My point is that Spanish is going into my brain, and English is going out. We were joking that by the time we head back to the U.S. we will be talking like caveman, "I. want. cookie."

Random cultural differences: They give you a straw for every bottled soda or juice. They put mayonnaise on everything. There is no such thing as carpet. Dreadlocks are considered really cool. Unless you are married, everyone has a twin bed. They absolutely love the Simpsons. I have now seen seven dead dogs.

As for future plans, I have been accepted to Boise State University, Colorado State University, and Washington State University. All three are equally up there in possibility. When the time comes, I will make a decision and go with it.

Well loved ones, this is all I have for now. I hope you all had wonderful Christmases and that you all enjoy a beautiful safe New Years. I wouldn't be doing this year had it not been for all the support I have received and continue to receive. Thank you, from the bottom of my heart. Until next time! Love, Hannah

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
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Peace Through Service brings out the best in us. It makes us aware of the borders we set up around ourselves – and it helps us tear them down.

Post Office to Change Mail Delivery Status—Beginning August From USA.gov

Starting in August, the U.S. Postal Service will no longer deliver regular mail to street addresses on Saturdays. Mail will be delivered Monday through Friday.

The following services will NOT change:

Packages will still be delivered on Saturdays.

Mail will still be delivered to PO Boxes on Saturdays.

Post Office locations currently open on Saturdays will remain open on Saturdays.

Discontinuing Saturday delivery is expected to save the Postal Service \$2 billion annually. The Postal Service is an independent government agency and does not receive tax money to support its operations. It relies on the sale of postage, products, and services to fund its operations.



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RI President Sakuji Tanaka February 2013

Dear fellow Rotarians,

In December, I spoke at the first of the three Rotary Global Peace Forums we have planned for this Rotary year. This first event, with the theme "Peace Without Borders," was

held in Berlin, the home of the Berlin Peace Clock. The clock, intended as a piece of art, is 3 meters high and weighs over 2 tons. On its side are inscribed the words, Time bursts all walls asunder.

The clock was unveiled on 9 November 1989. That was the day the Berlin Wall fell. It was a wonderful coincidence that the moment the hands on the clock began to move, the orders were given to open the border to West Berlin. The words written on the side of the clock had come true.

In Rotary, we do not divide our work by nation, culture, or language. It does not matter what is printed in your passport. What matters is that you believe in Service Above Self. But even in Rotary, it is easy to think in terms of countries or communities. This project may help someone in my own community, or that project may help someone from Germany, or Kenya, or South Africa. Sometimes we think of different types of borders. This project, we think, helps the young. This helps the elderly. This helps people who are hungry, poor, or sick, or who have disabilities.

The truth is that Service Above Self does not know such borders. When we serve, the impact is not limited to our community, or the community we are helping. We are not only helping the young, or the elderly, or this school, or that orphanage. When we serve, we are helping all of humanity. The effects of what we do go on and on.

When we put Service Above Self, we are making a choice. We are choosing to put other people's needs ahead of our own desires. We are saying, "Your problems are my problems, and I care enough to help you."

Rotary brings peace by addressing the needs that cause conflict: the need for clean water, for nutrition, sanitation, and health care. When these needs are met, there is opportunity. And there is hope. Hope has no borders. It is the garden from which peace can grow.

Peace Through Service brings out the best in us. It makes us aware of the borders we set up around ourselves – and it helps us tear them down.

Wow, the 1st month of 2013 went by so quickly! It is February already. February is World Understanding Month for Rotary International. What does that mean? It is our opportunity to help promote peace and understanding throughout the world. Many of your Matching Grants are coming back approved by RI and your projects are getting underway. Through these projects, you are helping to encourage peace and understanding standing in the world.

Through you and the clubs in District 5000, we are making a huge difference in our local and global communities. I have been fortunate to be able to see all the wonderful Matching Grant applications and am able to visualize what types of projects our clubs are involved in. We promote health and wellness, provide clean water, immunize children, and promote literacy and much more. 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
Free Smartphone APP







RI President Sakuji Tanaka April 2013 Dear fellow Rotarians,

Rotary is an international organization, and when I travel for Rotary, I usually

speak in English. But it has been a long time since my last English exam, and when I am working in Evanston, I always have a Japanese interpreter. It is important to understand every word of the meetings, and it is important as well that the staff understand what I am saying.

It was a new experience for me to speak Japanese to a group, and then hear my words spoken in English. Even now, I find it interesting. I hear new ways of expressing myself in English, and I also have a small glimpse of what it must be like not to speak Japanese.

But perhaps the most interesting moment came early on in my year as president-elect, when I was in a meeting with Rotary staff members. To be sure that we could communicate well, I had with me a Japanese interpreter. I spoke in Japanese, and she interpreted what I said into English. We had a pleasant and productive meeting.

After it was over, one member of the staff came up to me and asked, "There is one word I heard you use many times in Japanese. I would like to know what it means. What is the word ichiban?" I told her that ichiban in Japanese does not convey any philosophy or complicated thought. It simply means to be the best.

But it made me think. Of all the words I had used in Japanese, of all the words she had heard over and over, this was the word she had heard the most. I did not realize I had used it so often. But for me, that one word, ichiban, is essential to how I feel about my job as a Rotarian, and as president of RI.

For me, Rotary service means being ichiban. It means doing your best, and being the best you can be. It means working as hard as you can – not for yourself, but for others. It means achieving as much as you can, to make other people's lives better.

I n the dictionary, ichiban means "best." But in Rotary, "best" means something different. It means bringing Service Above Self into all of your thinking. It means looking at your own effort, not in terms of what it costs you, but in terms of what it can give. In this way, we are inspired to do so much more. It is our job to see to it that our Rotary service is ichiban – so that we do the most we can to build Peace Through Service.

Autism Facts Test your knowledge.

According to the Center for Disease Control one in 150 children has been diagnosed with autism Fact: The CDC reports that a stunning one in fifty boys is now diagnosed with autism.

Autism is more common in boys than girls. True.

Autism is diagnosed with a blood test. False. The diagnosis of autism is made by taking a careful history and doing a developmental examination - i.e. testing their language, social and other skills. It's not always an easy diagnosis to make; sometimes it can be subtle, especially when children are young, and there are other conditions (such as hearing loss, or language delays) that can be confused with autism. That's why, when autism is even a possibility, it's a good idea to have an evaluation by a someone with special training in child development, such as a developmental pediatrician, a pediatric neurologist, or a child psychologist.

You can't make the diagnosis of autism until a child is in school. False! Signs of autism can be seen as early as 18 months or even younger. Some of the common early signs are: not talking, or saying very few words, not responding to their name by 12 months, not making eye contact, preferring to be alone-not wanting to be held, getting upset with any change in routine, not playing "pretend" with toys by 18 months, repetitive movements, like hand-flapping or rocking. Having one or more of these doesn't necessarily mean a child has autism, but if any of these are going on, it's important that parents talk to their doctor.

Vaccines cause autism. False. There has been lots of research on this, including a recent study showing no link between getting lots of vaccines and autism. Vaccines do not cause autism. An autism gene has been identified, but experts do not know yet what environmental factors cause that gene to express. It is clearly something in the environments and possibly a combination of things.

It is easy for individuals with autism to get all the services and supports they need. False. Although children with autism are eligible for services through Early Intervention (birth to age 3) and the public schools (age 3 and older), getting the right help isn't straightforward. It's easier if you've got lots of money and are tenacious, savvy about advocacy and know how to navigate bureaucracy, but that doesn't exactly describe most parents. It's not that people don't want to help kids with autism, it's just that there aren't enough services out there, especially for young adults who are transitioning out of high school.

Message from Rotary International and District 5000

RI President Sakuji Tanaka April 2013 Dear fellow Rotarians.

Rotary is an international organization, and when I travel for Rotary, I usually

speak in English. But it has been a long time since my last English exam, and when I am working in Evanston, I always have a Japanese interpreter. It is important to understand every word of the meetings, and it is important as well that the staff understand what I am saying.

It was a new experience for me to speak Japanese to a group, and then hear my words spoken in English. Even now, I find it interesting. I hear new ways of expressing myself in English, and I also have a small glimpse of what it must be like not to speak Japanese.

But perhaps the most interesting moment came early on in my year as president-elect, when I was in a meeting with Rotary staff members. To be sure that we could communicate well, I had with me a Japanese interpreter. I spoke in Japanese, and she interpreted what I said into English. We had a pleasant and productive meeting.

After it was over, one member of the staff came up to me and asked, "There is one word I heard you use many times in Japanese. I would like to know what it means. What is the word ichiban?" I told her that ichiban in Japanese does not convey any philosophy or complicated thought. It simply means to be the best.

But it made me think. Of all the words I had used in Japanese, of all the words she had heard over and over, this was the word she had heard the most. I did not realize I had used it so often. But for me, that one word, ichiban, is essential to how I feel about my job as a Rotarian, and as president of RI. For me, Rotary service means being ichiban. It means doing your best, and being the best you can be. It

For me, Rotary service means being ichiban. It means doing your best, and being the best you can be. It means working as hard as you can – not for yourself, but for others. It means achieving as much as you can, to make other people's lives better.

I n the dictionary, ichiban means "best." But in Rotary, "best" means something different. It means bringing Service Above Self into all of your thinking. It means looking at your own effort, not in terms of what it costs you, but in terms of what it can give. In this way, we are inspired to do so much more. It is our job to see to it that our Rotary service is ichiban – so that we do the most we can to build Peace Through Service.

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We hear the word peace every day. But most of us spend little time thinking about what peace is. On its simplest level, we can define peace by what it is not. It is a state of no war, no violence, and no fear. It means that you are not in danger of hunger, or persecution, or the suffering of poverty.

But we can also define peace by what it is, and by what it can be. Peace can mean freedom of thought and of speech, freedom of opinion and of choice, and the ability for self-determination. It can mean security, confidence in the future – a life and home in a stable society. On a more abstract level, peace can mean a sense of happiness, of inner serenity, of calm.

However we use the word, however we understand peace, Rotary can help us to achieve it. Rotary helps us to meet the basic needs of others – to provide health care, sanitation, food, and education when and where they are most needed. It helps to meet the inner needs as well, for friendship, connection, and caring. And Rotary helps us to build peace in its most traditional sense, by reducing the causes of conflict. It builds bridges of friendship and tolerance among people and nations. It helps us to understand one another.

However we define peace, whatever peace means to us, we can bring it closer through service. Peace, in all of the ways that we can understand it, is a real goal, and a realistic goal for Rotary. Peace is not something that can only be achieved through treaties, by governments, or through heroic struggles. It is something that we can find, and that we can achieve – every day, and in many simple ways.

And so I thank you for your commitment to Peace Through Service – and to a Rotary goal of a more peaceful world.

This Week At the Rotary Club of Kona Kelly Greenwell, Former County Council Person And Life Long Resident of Kona

Join us this week to hear what life long Kona resident Kelly Greenwell has to share with us. Kelly is a direct descendant of the Henry Nicholas Greenwell (1826-1891).

Henry Greenwell sailed to the Hawaiian Islands in January 1850 to recover from an injury. After a brief time in Honolulu working at the H. J. Holdsworth store, he moved to Kailua Kona, and opened his own retail store in late 1850. Greenwell's coffee was honored at the 1873 World's Fair in Vienna. In 1876 Greenwell provided coffee as part of the Centennial Exposition in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

The Greenwell family traded in sheep skins and dairy products, eventually



using the profits to buy more land in the area. Coffee only grows in a narrow elevation band, so drier areas above the usual cloud cover were used as pasture land for cattle, sheep, and horses. Early in 1879, the royal physician Georges Phillipe Trousseau sold all of his

holdings in Kona to Greenwell. Other lands were purchased from the family of missionary John Davis Paris

Today, Bo is the Executive Director of La'i 'Opua 2020 with a modest staff of two, and has raised with its partners, over \$8 million to date for the first phase of this development project. From the streets of Kalihi to the shores of North Kona, Bo has brought full circle the creation of a community infrastructure that will provide for the social and educational needs of its residents and surrounding areas.

The vision for La'i 'Opua 2020 is built on an urgent need for a gathering place, formed from the cultural and spiritual values inherent in the land and people of Hawai'i. Their goal is to ensure the existence of adequate health care, social

service, and recreational facilities to complement and support the Native Hawaiian homesteaders and nearby populace residing in the greater Kealakehe community. With 275 homes resided in at Villages of La'i 'Opua, there is an additional 2,300 mixed-use units planned for the Forest City Villages at Keahuolu, and 975 units planned for the Villages of La'i 'Opua—a total of over 3,500 residential units in need of a community infrastructure to support its residents.

Serving as a model for emerging communities statewide, La'i 'Opua 2020 includes the Community Center—a 52,000 square-foot complex facility, which will offer an array of programs and services to meet almost every health, social, educational, and recreational need of the community and its surrounding neighbors.

Tanaka said the honorees exemplify how Rotary brings people together to solve problems that are too large for one person to tackle.

"Alone, we look at the problems of our community and our world and we feel helpless," he said. "But together, we are powerful. 

Message from Rotary International and District 5000

RI President Sakuji Tanaka May 2013

Dear fellow Rotarians,



From the moment I was nominated as Rotary International president, I knew I would

choose a theme that would focus on peace. This is why I planned three peace forums – to give Rotarians an opportunity to think about peace, to talk about peace, and to share their ideas on building peace together. The final Rotary Global Peace Forum takes place this month in Hiroshima, Japan.

We hear the word peace every day. But most of us spend little time thinking about what peace is. On its simplest level, we can define peace by what it is not. It is a state of no war, no violence, and no fear. It means that you are not in danger of hunger, or persecution, or the suffering of poverty.

But we can also define peace by what it is, and by what it can be. Peace can mean freedom of thought and of speech, freedom of opinion and of choice, and the ability for self-determination. It can mean security, confidence in the future – a life and home in a stable society. On a more abstract level, peace can mean a sense of happiness, of inner serenity, of calm.

However we use the word, however we understand peace, Rotary can help us to achieve it. Rotary helps us to meet the basic needs of others – to provide health care, sanitation, food, and education when and where they are most needed. It helps to meet the inner needs as well, for friendship, connection, and caring. And Rotary helps us to build peace in its most traditional sense, by reducing the causes of conflict. It builds bridges of friendship and tolerance among people and nations. It helps us to understand one another.

However we define peace, whatever peace means to us, we can bring it closer through service. Peace, in all of the ways that we can understand it, is a real goal, and a realistic goal for Rotary. Peace is not something that can only be achieved through treaties, by governments, or through heroic struggles. It is something that we can find, and that we can achieve – every day, and in many simple ways.

And so I thank you for your commitment to Peace Through Service - and to a Rotary goal of a more peaceful

Hulihee Palace Announces New Museum Hours, Fees

Hulihee Palace in Historic Kailua Village is expanding its museum hours to be open on most Mondays, with hours of operation from 9am until 4pm Mondays through Saturdays. The only exception is on the Monday following the monthly Kokua Kailua event, when the palace is closed in the morning and open 1 until 4pm.Beginning May 1, admission fees for adult, kamaaina, military and seniors increased by \$2. Options include docent-guided or self-guided tours and rates vary. Built in 1838, the two-story Hulihee Palace houses a collection of ancient Hawaiian (pre-Western contact) artifacts and personal memorabilia of 19th century Hawaiian royalty. The palace structure has been painstakingly restored to circa 1885, a period known in Hawaiian his-



tory as the Kalakaua Era. It is on the National Register of Historic Places. Caretakers of Hulihee Palace are the Daughters of Hawaii, founded in 1903. Learn more at <u>www.daughtersofhawaii.org</u>.
