The Rotary Club of Kona Community Foundation

The Rotary Club of Kona Community Foundation is separate from the Rotary Foundation (of Rotary International). Our club's community foundation was established as a way for our club to fund projects and scholarships with funds that are donated under the 501(3)c provision of the IRS code.

The Board of Directors are entrusted to manage the investment funds of nearly \$500,000 for the benefit of scholarships for high school graduates and community college students of our community. The interest generated from the principle balance of this fund is used to fund the scholarships. As funds are added to the endowment (corpus) it provides the foundation the ability to raise it's annual fund for scholarships.

In addition the community foundation can be a conduit for funding other local and international projects as determined by the club membership. In the past funds have been generated to fund shelter boxes for the tsunami in Japan, medical support for our local hospital and enhancement of youth activities such as improving the soccer field and the Makaeo walking path for the community residents.

This foundation is in addition to the Rotary International Foundation and is utilized to immediately respond to not only community but international needs.

The new board members are composed of President Brian Asbjornson, Vice President Alan Clark, Secretary Renee Kraft, Treasure Jim Lightner, Board Member (officers of the Rotary Club of Kona) James Resor, Past President, Lori Burgoon, President, Hermann Heimgartner, President Elect

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Other projects include helping Rotary clubs around the world fund projects with matching funds for projects that include clean water, soy milk machines (mechanical cows), schools and on and on.

Wild poliovirus caused only 74 cases of polio in 2015, all of them in Afghanistan and Pakistan. As we continue to work tirelessly toward our goal of eradication, we must also look beyond it: preparing to leverage our success into even greater successes to come.

It is tremendously important to Rotary's future that our role in the eradication of polio be recognized. The more

we are known for what we've achieved, the more we'll be able to attract the partners, the funding, and, most important, the members to achieve even more. We're working hard at RI headquarters to be sure that Rotary gets that recognition. But it



can't all happen in Evanston. We need you to get the word out through your clubs and in your communities about what Rotary is and what we do. We need to be sure that our clubs are ready for the moment when polio is finally eradicated – so that when people who want to do good see that Rotary is a place where they can change the world, every Rotary club is ready to give them that opportunity.

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NEW MAUNAKEA HERITAGE AND NATURAL RESOURCE GUIDE NOW AVAILABLE

The new "Maunakea Heritage and Natural Resources Guide," brochure featuring valuable information for visiting this storied place of cultural, archaeological, natural and scientific resources is now available and free for those visiting Maunakea.

Designed as an in-hand resource by the Office of Maunakea Management (OMKM), the guide brings to life the cultural references of the pu'u (cinder cones), significance of the summit areas, the natural history and historical origins of Maunakea. Maps of the mountain, including the Astronomy Precinct, are featured. The guide stresses exploring the mountain in a safe manner.

The guide is a product of the many hands and hours of work that led to the 2009 Comprehensive Management Plan. Members of the Kahu Ku Mauna Council, Environment Committee, Sustainable Resources Group Intn'l, Ena Media Hawaii, and many others assisted OMKM in developing and revising brochure content and style. Former OMKM intern and now employee Amber Stillman led the team in its preparation.

The principle themes of the guide are Malama 'Aina (take care of the land), be respectful of this storied place, and safety.

"Whether traveling to the summit area of Maunakea for culture, research or simply to watch the sunset,

to watch the sunset, we designed this new heritage and natural resources guide to detail the remarkable natural and cultural landscape in a way that is helpful and educational to all who journey to Maunakea and want to learn more about this special place," said OMKM's Director Stephanie Nagata.

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

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This Week at The Rotary Club of Kona Laura Mallery-Sayre

Daniel R. Sayre Memorial Foundation "In the memory of one lost life, others have been saved."



In 1997, 25-year-old Danny Sayre hiked to the back of Pololu Valley on the Big Island, near Kapaloa Falls, to visit the place he called his "cathedral." Tragically, that visit was Danny's last.

His devastated parents, Frank Sayre and Laura Mallery-Sayre, could only watch helplessly, as multiple attempts to rescue their son's body from a 500-foot fall to the valley floor below, failed. "That's when three men from the Fire Department volunteered to move forward with the mission, knowing that they were putting their own lives in danger," recalls Laura. The rescue occurred in such a narrow and densely forested location that tree limbs were shredded by the helicopter's rotors as two firefighters courageously plumetted into the canyon to retrieve Daniel's body, steps from Kapaloa.

"We decided that a memorial fund honoring the Hawaii County Fire Department was the best way to show our gratitude," says Frank. Seventeen years later, Frank and Laura have organized sixteen annual ceremonies that honor heroes within the department, like the men who personified bravery and compassion in one of their darkest hours. The community has valiantly supported their cause with donations exceeding 1 million dollars, which are used exclusively to purchase rescue equipment required by the Fire Department. In the memory of one lost life, others have been saved.


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
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This Week at The Rotary Club of Kona Alan Clark / Tom Daniel The Rotary Foundation

The mission of The Rotary Foundation is to enable Rotarians to advance world understanding, goodwill, and peace through the improvement of health, the support of education, and the alleviation of poverty.

The Rotary Foundation helps fund our humanitarian activities, from local service projects to global initiatives. Your club or district can apply for grants from the Foundation to invest in projects and provide scholarships. The Foundation also leads the charge on worldwide Rotary campaigns such as <u>eradicating polio</u> and <u>promoting peace</u>. Rotarians and friends of Rotary support the Foundation's work through voluntary <u>contributions</u>.

HISTORY OF THE ROTARY FOUNDATION At the 1917 convention, outgoing Rotary President Arch Klumph proposed to set up an endowment "for the purpose of doing good in the world." In 1928, it was renamed The Rotary Foundation, and it became a distinct entity within Rotary International.

EVOLUTION OF FOUNDATION PROGRAMS

1947: The Foundation established its first program, Fellowships for Advance Study, later known as Ambassadorial Scholarships.



Forty years ago, a man named George Campbell, the owner of the company I worked for, invited me to join Rotary. Back then, that was a common practice in the United States. Your boss invited you to join Rotary because he thought it would be good for business and good for the community, and you said yes. It's not surprising that our membership surged during that period,

George warned me not to use Rotary as an excuse to slack off at work. Even so, I always had lime to attend lunch meetings and serve on committees. I never had to worry that taking a long lunch once a week would hurt my advancement, or what my boss would think about the occasional Rotary phone call at work.

Today, things are different. Companies are less generous about time, and not every manager locks favorably on community service. It's hard to enjoy a Rotary meeting when you've got emails piling up on your phone. It's harder than

ever to balance work with Rotary - and the model that gave us so much growth a few decades ago is part of what's holding back our growth now.

That's why the recent Council on Legislation adopted some innovative measures that allow clubs to vary their meeting times and expapand their pool of prospective members. Clubs have more flaxibility now to respond to the needs of their members and to clear away as many barriers to membership as they can. But there's one barrier to membership that only you can remove, one thing that every prospective member needs to become a Rotarian: an invitation to join a Rotary club.

Whenever I tell a group of Rotarians that we need more willing hands, more caring hearts, and more bright minds to move our work forward, everyone applauds. But those hands, hearts, and minds won't magically appear in our clubs. We have to ask them to join. And an invitation to Rotary is something that only you can give. An invitation is a gift. It's saying to someone, "I think you have the skills, the talent, and the character to make our community better, and I want you to join me in doing that."

I'm the president of Rotary International, but the only club I can invite someone to join is the Rotary Club of Chattanooga, Tenn, I can't make your club or your community stronger. Only you can do that - by inviting the qualified people you know to join you in Rotary Serving Humanify



In 1969, the Foundation unveiled the first Paul Harris Fellow medallion at the RI Convention in Honolulu, Hawaii, USA. Japanese metal artist Fiju Tsuda created the piece under the direction of then-past Foundation Trustee Kyozo Yuasa. Today, Paul Harris Fellows receive a certificate and pin. They are also eligible to purchase a Paul Harris Fellow medallion.

Rotarians have a tradition of supporting the Foundation by honoring others. Ida LeTulle Taylor became a Paul Rarris Fellow in 1978 when her husband, then-District Governor Vann Taylor, made a donation in her name in honor of their 34th wedding anniversary. The gift also made her the 25,000th Paul Harris Fellow.

At the International Assembly in 1979, then-RI President-elect James Bomar challenged each Rotary club to make one non-Rotarian a Paul Harris Fellow. The Rotary Club of Pikesville, Maryland, USA, responded by making a donation in the name of Mother Teresa in 1980. The entertainer Pearl Bailey also became a Paul Harris Fellow through a joint effort of the Rotary clubs in Cape Cod, Massachusetts.

Many other notable figures have been named as Paul Harris Fellows, including U.S. President Jimmy Carter, Russian President Boris Yeltsin, U.S. astronaut James Lovell, UN Secretary-General Javier Perez de Cuellar, and Jonas Salk. The number of Paul Harris Fellows reached the one million mark in 2006.





In the summer of 1917, only a few months after the United States entered the first world war. Rotary held its eighth annual convention in Atlanta. Although many Rotarians at the time thought the convention should be canceled, the Board of Directors ultimately agreed with Paul Harris that it should continue as planned. In the midst of such uncertainty and fear, Harris penned, as part of his convention greeting, some of the most-quoted words in Rotary.



It was a combination that has proved unstoppable and has been behind so much of Rotary's work for the last 100 years. Today, it is difficult to imagine Rotary without its Foundation. It was the Foundation that turned Rotary from an organization of local clubs into an international force for good with the power to change the world.

In this Rotary year, we are marking the centennial of our Rotary Foundation in the city where it all began: Atlanta, Our 108th Rotary International Convention promises to be one of the most exciting yet, with inspiring speakers, great entertainment, and a wide array of breakout sessions to help you move your Rotary service forward. 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

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
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This Week at The Rotary Club of Kona Brian Kispert Kealakehe High School Life Plan Youth Mentorship

SEPTEMBER 2016: BASIC EDUCATION & LITERACY MONTH

Why is literacy so important?

Today, many children are classified as 'digital natives' - just as comfortable online as they are offline. The internet enables endless educational possibilities, with constantly evolving information streams, however, the vastness of the web can be a hindrance to those children who cannot adequately sift through and interpret the material presented. Strong literacy skills are a critical tool used when children discern and understand information, enabling them to utilize the internet to its full potential and making sure that the inevitable 'digital footprint' that children will leave is one that is safe, appropriate, and reflective of their true self.

Ways to support a child's literacy development

Studies have shown that children's motivation and achievement improve when adult mentors and parents are involved in their education. There are many everyday things you can do to encourage literacy learning. This includes:

1.Sharing your knowledge and explaining how you use literacy in your daily life

- Encouraging children to read and view a variety of texts such as newspapers, novels, comics, magazines, websites, email and timetables
- 3. Encouraging children to write and design for a variety of purposes using different mediums
- 4.Discussing how texts look different depending on the purpose and audience for example, text messaging uses different spelling from school projects
- 5 Taking about things that you have read or viewed that were amusing, interesting or useful
- 6 Discussing favourite authors, producers, directors or illustrators and what you like about them
- 7 Presenting new and unusual words or phrases and exploring these through print and electronic dictionaries - Just like the ones we give every year?
- 8 Playing games that develop knowledge and enjoyment of words
- 9 Making use of community resources for information, local and school libraries



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

JOHN GERM, ROTARY INTERNATIONAL PRESIDENT 2016-2017 OCTOBER 2016

In 1979, James Bomar Jr., the president of Rotary at the time, traveled to the Philippines as part of Rotary's earliest work to immunize children against polio. After he had put drops of vaccine into one baby's mouth, he felt a child's hand tugging on his trouser leg to get his attention. Bomar looked down and saw the baby's brother looking up at him, saying earnestly, "Thank you, thank you, Rotary."

Before Rotary took on the task of polio eradication, 350,000 people – nearly all of them children – were paralyzed by polio every year. That child in the Philippines knew exactly what polio was and understood exactly what Rotary had just done for his baby brother. Today, 31 years after the launch of PolioPlus, the children of the Philippines – and of nearly every other country in the world – are growing up without that knowledge, and that fear, of polio. Instead of

1,000 new cases of polio every day, we are averaging less than one per week. But as the fear of polio wanes, so does awareness of the disease. Now more than ever, it is vitally important to keep that awareness high and to push polio eradication to the top of the public agenda and our governments' priorities. We need to make sure the world knows that our work to eradicate polio isn't over yet, but that Rotary is in it to end it.

On 24 October, Rotary will mark World Polio Day to help raise the awareness and the funding we need to reach full eradication. I ask all of you to take part by holding an event in your club, in your community, or online. Ideas and materials are available for download in all Rotary languages at endpolio.org/worldpolioday, and you can register your event with Rotary at the same link. You can also join me and tens of thousands of your fellow Rotarians for a live-streamed global status update at 6 p.m. Eastern time at the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention in Atlanta. I'll be there along with CDC Director Tom Frieden, other experts, and inspirational presenters, sharing an inside look at the science, partnerships, and human stories of polio eradication.

It is an incredibly exciting time to be a Rotarian. We are gathering momentum for the final race to the finish: to the end of PolioPlus and the beginning of a polio-free world. It is truly a once-in-a-lifetime chance to End Polio Now, through Rotary Serving Humanity.

THIS WEEK AT THE ROTARY CLUB OF KONA Mary Mikalka NEAR VISION: A LEARNED SKILL -- MUCH MORE THAN 20/201

Sight is the mere ability to see (i.e., Snellen Chart acuity), but true vision is the result of a person's ability to understand and interpret (get meaning from) the visual information that comes to him through the eyes. Only when a person has efficient visual understanding abilities does he/she possess the "readiness skills" needed to fully benefit from classroom instruction. These visual foundations are critical!

Near vision is a learned phenomenon and educators are generally unaware of the potential problems that stem from poorly developed visual skills. Most educators have not received training in this field, but they need to be able to make the distinction between eyesight and near vision.

October 13 2016

The word vision is usually equated with the health of the eye, and it is assumed that "seeing" is the same as visual perception. It is also assumed, by a majority of educators and parents, that children and young adults with healthy eyes

NEAR VISION-A LEARNED SKILL

(20/20 eye sight) have no visual or perceptual problems and therefore, if material is presented to them, there is nothing to prevent their "seeing" it correctly and learning the material rapidly. This assumption is false!

Poor vision can send conflicting messages to the brain and cause untold problems for the child afflicted with poor near vision skills. A child's eyesight may be good but his/her vision may be poor at best. Children with near vision problems often think everyone sees the way they do. We have found that many educators think their students "see" as they do. It is safer to assume all students have different levels of vision and this affects their learning styles and potential.

Visual functions occupy a large portion of the brain. As the brain develops, so does vision and perception. In both cases, experience (i.e. Eyes on Track activities or vision therapy) can enhance the level of development because eyes are extensions of the brain. Poor near visual skills usually result in frustration or anger being expressed by teachers, parents and children. If they are unaware of the effects of poor eye-tracking and vision perception skills.

The consequences of failure when basic learning abilities are not developed are well known:

"I'm damb" (low self-esteem and guilt)

The teacher and other kids don't like me" (assumed feelings of inadequacy)

"I hate school" (I'm a failure; I don't like to be where I fail)

These feetings can result from a failure to learn and can cause serious emotional or social problems in otherwise inteltigent people. These are the students who are "smart in everything except school". This behavior can be prevented if sufficient "madiness abilities" are developed so that successful learning can take place.

A NEW DEFINITION OF VISION

Vision is our leading sense and our behavior is affected by our vision perception of the world. Classroom requirements demand good near vision skills that include eye tracking, focusing, eye-teaming and visual processing. Students are struggling and we need to find additional ways to promote classroom success.

A complex process like vision, upon which we constantly depend, should not be tested in 2 -3 minutes by an eye chart invented in 1862!

VISION problems are not the only cause of learning difficulties. However, poorly developed near vision skills can profoundly affect learning and hinder remedial efforts. It's much like trying to build a house on sand. This causes frustration for all professionals working to help these students. Good near vision skills, on the other hand, can provide a solid foundation for learning.





Looking back at the momentous 1917 Rotary Convention in Atlanta, it is difficult to see what could have been contentious about the words of then-President Arch C. Klumph: "It seems eminently proper that we should accept endowments for the purpose of doing good in the world." Yet, at the time, support for the idea was far from unanimous. Some thought an endowment fund would create more trouble than it was worth. But Klumph's idea received the support it most needed in the form of an initial donation of \$26.50 from the Rotary Club of Kansas City, Mo.

Nearly 100 years later, we recognize Klumph's idea as not only visionary, but revolutionary: It set in place the mechanism that allowed Rotary to become the vast force for "doing good in the world" that it is today.

In many ways, our Rotary Foundation is the foundation of Rotary as we know it. It has created a mechanism for cooperation and partnership among clubs and between Rotary and other organizations; it has enabled us to be ever more ambitious in our work and to reach for goals of historic proportions, such as the eradication of polio. It is impossible to quantify the good that has been done over the last century as a result of The Rotary Foundation. All we can know for sure is that Arch Klumph, if he could see it, would be proud.

I am looking forward to seeing many of you at our international convention in Atlanta: the city where our Foundation was born. I hope a record number of Rotarians will be there to celebrate the centennial of our Foundation. In the meantime, there are plenty of other ways to celebrate! I encourage you to read more about the Foundation centennial at centennial.rotary.org. There, you'll learn about the history of our Foundation and find ideas for events and projects in your clubs and your community.



One of the most important ways we are celebrating the Foundation centennial is with a fundraising goal of \$300 million. Your gift to your Foundation is the best way of ensuring a strong second century for Rotarians Doing Good in the World and for Rotary Serving Humanity.



HISTORY OF THE RED KETTLES

Where would the money come from, he wondered. He lay awake nights, worrying, thinking, praying about how he could find the funds to fulfill his commitment of feeding 1,000 of the city's poorest individuals on Christmas Day. As he pondered the issue, his thoughts drifted back to his sailor days in Liverpool, England. He remembered how at Stage Landing, where the boats came in, there was a large, iron kettle called "Simpson's Pot" into which passers-by tossed a coin or two to help the poor.

The next day Captain McFee placed a similar pot at the Oakland Ferry Landing at the foot of Market Street. Beside the pot, he placed a sign that read, "Keep the Pot Boiling." He soon had the money to see that the needy people were properly fed at Christmas.

Six years later, the kettle idea spread from the west coast to the Boston area. That year, the combined effort nationwide resulted in 150,000 Christmas dinners for the needy. In 1901, kettle contributions in New York City provided funds for the first mammoth sit-down dinner in Madison Square Garden, a custom that continued for many years. Today in the U.S., The Salvation Army assists more than four-and-a-half million people during the Thanksgiving and Christmas time periods.

Captain McFee's kettle idea launched a tradition that has spread not only throughout the United States, but all across the world. Kettles are now used in such distant lands as Korea, Japan, Chile and many European countries. Everywhere, public contributions to Salvation Army kettles enable the organization to continue its year-round efforts at helping those who would otherwise be forgotten

This Thursday we will be viewing "The Final Inch", an academy award-nominated documentary about polio in India . UNICEF India assisted with the making of the film.

The HBO web site provides the following summary: Nearly 50 years after a vaccine for polio was developed in the U.S., the polio virus still finds refuge in some of the world's most vulnerable places. This 2008 Academy Award® nominee for Best Documentary Short Subject follows health workers into India's most

impoverished neighborhoods for a look at the massive and highly personal mission that is under way to eradicate one of history's most feared diseases, now largely a disease of the world's poor.

UNICEF Executive Director Ann Veneman and Dr. Larry Brilliant, Chief Philanthropy Evangelist of google.org, recently attended a screening of the film and both spoke on a panel about how global polio eradication is within reach.

Kampachi Farms was founded in 2011 by Neil Sims and Michael Bullock, former executives of the pioneering Hawaiian open ocean aquaculture company Kona Blue Water Farms, with the goal of continuing the innovative research that was ongoing at KBWF and leveraging scientific discoveries to advance commercial Kampachi production. In addition to continuing and building upon the research programs initiated by KBWF at our Kona, HI research facility, planning is under-

way for a new commercial growout site in Bahia de La Paz, MX. This site will allow efficient, scale-able, commercial production of high-value sashimi-grade Kampachi in close proximity to the product's primary markets.

Kampachi Farms remains committed to advancing the cause of safe, responsible and sustainable mariculture in the U.S.A. Having sucessfully conducted the first-ever trial of open-ocean aquaculture in U.S. Federal Waters with the Velella Project, Kampachi Farms aims to further develop offshore technologies that will facilitate the expansion of

responsible mariculture in the U.S. and globally, such as deepwater mooring and farmsite automation capabilities. Ongoing research into alternative feeds is focused on reducing mariculture's reliance on wildcaught fishmeal and fish oil, replacing them with more sustainable American-grown agricultural products.



Aspire to high ethical standards in their occupation;

•Recognize the worthiness of all useful occupations, and;

- •Contribute their vocational talents to the problems and needs of society.
- •Rotarians, clubs, and districts should implement the following strategies in their support of Vocational Service:
- •Strengthen the emphasis on vocation and classification in new member recruitment and induction.
- •Identify means of emphasizing vocation in club activities.
- •Create a stronger emphasis on business networking with integrity in Rotary at the club and district level.
- Focus more attention on business networking with integrity as a means of attracting and mentoring the new generation.
 Emphasize the connection between the Four Way Test and the Rotary Code of Conduct (formerly called: Declaration of Rotarians in Business and Professions) and their importance to the values of Rotary.
- •When professionals join a Rotary club, they do so as a representative of their classification their particular business or profession.

Rotarians have the dual responsibility of representing their vocation within the club and exemplifying the ideals of Rotary within the workplace. One of the central goals of Vocational Service is to promote and advance Rotary's high ethical standards. Two useful tools Rotarians have to assess these standards are The Four-Way Test and The Rotary Code of Conduct.

- •Strengthen the emphasis on vocation and classification in new member recruitment and induction.
- Identify means of emphasizing vocation in club activities.
- •Create a stronger emphasis on business networking with integrity in Rotary at the club and district level.
- Focus more attention on business networking with integrity as a means of attracting and mentoring the new generation.
 Emphasize the connection between the Four Way Test and the Rotary Code of Conduct (formerly called: Declaration of Rotarians in Business and Professions) and their importance to the values of Rotary.
- •When professionals join a Rotary club, they do so as a representative of their classification their particular business or profession.

One of the central goals of Vocational Service is to promote and advance Rotary's high ethical standards. Two useful tools Rotarians have to assess these standards are The Four-Way Test and The Rotary Code of Conduct.

As we enter 2017, we also enter the second year of the initiative known as the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals. These goals, usually referred to as the SDGs, pertain to a list of 17 areas where the people of the world can come together to address our most pressing economic, political, and social challenges. It is a hugely ambitious list, and it has to be. The ultimate aim of these goals is nothing less than peace, prosperity, security, and equality for all of humanity.

How do you even begin to tackle such a project? At Rotary, our answer is simple: one step at a time. These goals are nothing new for Rotary: They're already reflected in our areas of focus. We also understand that all of these 17 goals, just like our six areas of focus, are interrelated. You can't have good health without clean water. You can't have clean water without good sanitation. Good sanitation in turn helps keep children in school, which improves education, which improves economic prosperity and health. When you are talking about the advancement of an entire planet, no one indicator, no one goal, no one country, exists in isolation. To make real and lasting progress, we must all move forward together.

The idea of sustainability is key to the SDGs – and to our service in Rotary. Sustainability simply means making progress that will endure. It means not just digging a well, but being sure that a community can maintain it. It means not just running a health camp for a week, but training local health workers. It means empowering families and communities to take charge of their own futures by giving them the tools they need to succeed.

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Sustainability has always been at the heart of our thinking in Rotary. We've been around for nearly 112 years and intend to be around for many more. We've already seen the difference our work has made: in health, in education, in water and sanitation, and of course in our efforts to end polio.

Polio eradication is the ultimate in sustainable service: a project that, once completed, will benefit the world forever. And those benefits will go far beyond the eradication of a single human disease. The estimated cost savings we will see once polio is eradicated are about \$1 billion per year. That is money that can be returned to public health budgets and directed to other pressing needs, carrying the good work of today forward for many healthier tomorrows.



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

Author Jeffrey L. Gross' "Waipi'o Valley: A Polynesian Journey from Eden to Eden" (published by Xlibris) is a groundbreaking book that is packed with information and knowledge. It describes the amazing journey of the Polynesians, the "nomads of the sea", across a third of the circumference of the earth. Many voyages covering thousands of

miles across the world's largest ocean in double-hull canoes constructed from hollowed-out logs and built with Stone Age technology—tools of stone, bone and shell and navigating by the stars of the night sky.

"Waipi'o Valley" will embark readers on an amazing journey from Kalana i Hau'ola, the biblical "Garden of Eden" located in Sumer, Mesopotamia, along the shore of the Persian Gulf, to the Indus River Valley of ancient Vedic India, to Egypt where some of the ancestors of the Polynesians were on the Israelite Exodus, through Island Southeast Asia and across the vast Pacific Ocean where the Polynesians resided on numerous tropical island paradises such as Ra'iatea Island, Tahiti, home of the Taputapuatea Marae, the most holy temple in Polynesia before reaching Hawai'i Island and Waipi'o Valley; the last Polynesian "Garden of Eden".

Due to their isolation on the islands of the Pacific Ocean, Polynesian religious and cultural beliefs preserved elements from mankind's past nearer the beginning of human history. Polynesian mythology includes genealogical records of their divine ancestors extending back to Kahiki, the land of their origin; epic tales of gods and heroes preserving records of their ancient voyages, oral chants such as the Kumulipo containing evolutionary creation theories reflecting modern scientific thought, and the belief in a Supreme Creator God.

"Waipi'o Valley" is a clear historical account that follows the story of the Polynesians on their amazing journey through time and space from their ancient origins to their "discovery" by western civilization. Those interested in mankind's ancient past and in Polynesian history will find this book a source of valuable information as it provides enlightenment about these significant voyages, where they can learn more about the Polynesian way of life, beliefs and influence to the modern world.


District Governor—Clint Schroeder February 2017: Creating Peace & Preventing Conflict





What's next for TMT ?



Four months after it began, and after 44 days of oral testimony involving 71 witnesses, the hearings regarding the TMT CDUA Contested Case officially concluded on March 2.

The conclusion of the evidentiary portion now moves to the next phase in this quasi-judicial process. The parties have March deadlines to move their exhibits into evidence and to make objections. Hearings Officer Riki May Amano will close the documentary portion of the earng on March 23.

All documented testimony, exhibits and court reporter's transcripts will be compiled in an official record of the case. Based on the compiled testimony, both sides of the TMT case will be allowed to make final arguments on why a state Conservation District Use Permit should or should not be issued to allow TMT construction on Maunakea.

Judge Amano is estimating that the court reporter's transcripts of the hearings will take 5 to 6 weeks to produce. Once the transcripts are completed, the parties will have 30 days to produce their draft Decisions and Order, Findings of Fact and Conclusions of Law. At this stage, estimated to be sometime in June, the Hearings Officer can finalize her Decision and Order and Recommendations to the Board of Land and Natural Resources.

All parties will be given the opportunity to agree with or take exception to individual findings for the conclusion of Amano's recommendation and would be allowed to file their reasoning with the Land Board.

Once the state Land Board has reviewed Amano's finding and recommendation it will hold a hearing on the matter and ultimately decide whether to approve or deny the issuance of a CDUP to lessee University of Hawaii to allow TMT construction on Maunakea. TMT remains hopeful that construction can begin by its pro-

ject-driven April 2018 deadline. Should the deadline not be achievable in Hawaii, TMT has previously stated its intention to build the next -generaion telescope at a backup site in the Canary Islands.

Forty years ago, the Rotary Club of Duarte, Calif., admitted three women members, in violation of the Rotary International Constitution. As a result, the club's charter was terminated by RI.

Undeterred, the club's members continued to meet. They put an X over their Rotary insignia, made themselves new pins, and dubbed themselves the Ex-Rotary Club of Duarte as they continued to fight for the right of women to serve as Rotarians. Ten years later, a restored Rotary Club of Duarte sent Sylvia Whitlock, Rotary's first female club president, to a presidents-elect training seminar. Not long after that, in 1989, Rotary's Council on Legislation permanently ended Rotary's status as a men-only organization.



Today, with more than 240,000 women in our clubs, Rotary is stronger than ever. We are women and men from nearly every country of the world, serving our communities in more than 35,000 clubs. At the club level, we need men and women of all backgrounds, ages, cultures, and professions; internationally, we need clubs in every city, country, and region of the world. The better our clubs reflect their communities, the better we can serve them. Our diversity is our strength.

It is difficult for most of us to imagine today why anyone argued so strongly against the idea of women in Rotary. Looking back, I think that opposition came from a simple resistance to change. Rotarians loved Rotary the way it was and couldn't imagine it any other way.

We still love Rotary as much as we ever did. We love the friendships and connections we make there, and the ability Rotary provides us to serve humanity. We believe Rotary has tremendous value in our own lives and in the world at large. And we recognize, more than ever, that for Rotary to continue to grow, it needs to embrace the world it serves - in all of its diversity, all of its variety, and all of its evolving needs for service.

The Rotarians of today owe a debt of gratitude to the Rotarians of Duarte 40 years ago. Their determination, persistence, and enduring goodwill set the stage for the organization we have become: Rotary Serving Humanity. Mar



Globally, in developed as well as in developing countries, child mortality is on the decline and life expectancy on the rise. In 1960, 182 of every 1,000 children born died before turning five; today, that number is down to 43. A child born in 1960 could expect to live an average of just 52 years; by contrast, a child born this year can expect to live to 71.

Then as now, the factors most likely to determine a child's fate are set at birth: where he or she is born, the educational and economic condition of the family, the availability of medical care. Yet one of the most important advances in public health has reached every country and must now reach every child: immunization.


The use of vaccines has, in many parts of the world, nearly eliminated diseases that once were widespread. such as diphtheria, tetanus, and rubella. Thanks to vaccines, 20 million lives have been saved from measles since 2000. Smallpox has been eradicated - and polio is next.

Thirty years ago, there were an estimated 350,000 cases of polio per year worldwide. As this issue of The Rotarian went to press, only 37 cases of polio had been recorded in 2016 - the lowest number in history. All of the other cases, and the paralysis and death they would have brought, were prevented through the widespread use of a safe, reliable, and inexpensive vaccine.

Overall, the World Health Organization estimates that immunization prevents an estimated 2 million to 3 million deaths every year. It also averts a tremendous burden of disability and economic loss. Yet we could be doing so much better: An additional 1.5 million deaths could be avoided by improving vaccine coverage worldwide.

This month, from 24 to 30 April, we join WHO, UNICEF, and the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention in celebrating World Immunization Week, raising awareness of the incredible impact that vaccines have had on global health. This year's theme is "Vaccines Work" - and they do. Increased use of vaccines has broader repercussions for public health: controlling viral hepatitis, reducing both the need for antibiotics and the development of antibiotic-resistant microbes, and reaching more children and adolescents with essential health interventions. In every part of the world, routine immunization is as crucial as ever to ensure that all children have the best chance at a healthy future.

In an uncertain world, vaccines offer something remarkable: a way to protect our children throughout their lives. By working together to safeguard all children against polio and other preventable diseases, Rotary is truly Serving Humanity – now and for generations to come.

so they can live longer and grow stronger. We expand access to quality care, so mothers and children everywhere can have the same opportunities for a healthy future. An estimated 5.9 million children under the age of five die each year because of malnutrition, inadequate health care, and poor sanitation all of which can be prevented.

HOW ROTARY MAKES HELP HAPPEN

Rotary provides education, immunizations, birth kits, and mobile health clinics. Women are taught how to prevent mother-to-infant HIV transmission, how to breastfeed, and how to protect themselves and their children from disease.

OUR IMPACT ON THE LIVES OF MOTHERS AND CHILDREN

The Rotary Foundation reaches mothers and children in need by giving communities the help and training they need to take control of their own maternal and infant health care.

Rotary makes amazing things happen, like:

Mobile prenatal clinics: Haiti has the highest maternal and infant mortality rate of any country in the western hemisphere. Rotary provided a fully equipped medical Jeep to volunteers and midwives to reach mothers and children in remote areas.

Cancer screening: Rotarians provided a mobile cancer screening unit and awareness training around Chennai, India, where there is a high mortality rate of women with breast and cervical cancer due to late diagnosis. Preventing injuries and deaths: Rotary members launched a \$3 million, five-year pilot to children during home deliveries in Nigeria. Since 2005, they have also repaired 1,500 obstetric fistulas - 500 more than their initial goal - restoring dignity and hope to vulnerable mothers.

Science with a 30-Meter Telescope

A 30-meter telescope, operating in wavelengths ranging from the ultraviolet to the mid-infrared, is an essential tool to address questions in astronomy ranging from understanding star and planet formation to unraveling the history of galaxies and the development of large-scale structure in the universe.

The 30-meter aperture permits the telescope to focus more sharply than smaller telescopes by using the power of diffraction of light. The large aperture also collects more light than smaller scopes, allowing images of fainter objects. TMT will therefore reach further and see more clearly than previous telescopes by a factor of 10 to 100 depending on the observation.

In addition to providing nine times the collecting area of the current largest optical/ infrared telescopes (the 10-meter Keck Telescopes), TMT will be used with adaptive optics systems to allow diffraction-limited performance, i.e., the best that the optics of the system can theoretically provide. This will provide unparalleled high-sensitivity spatial resolution more than 12 times sharper than what is achieved by the Hubble Space Telescope. For many applications, diffraction-limited observations give gains in sensitivity that scale like the diameter of the mirror to the fourth power, so this increase in size has major implications.

TMT will provide new observational opportunities in essentially every field of astronomy and astrophysics. Because of the decades-long lifetime of TMT and the often-rapid advancement of astronomy into new areas, broadly useful capabilities have been emphasized, while maintaining specific capabilities needed to address key programs that are known now. TMT will be a fundamental tool for investigating a very wide range of topics, including

Spectroscopic exploration of the "dark ages" when the first sources of light and the first heavy elements in the universe formed and when the universe, which had recombined

Exploration of galaxies and large-scale structure in the young universe, including the era in which most of the stars and heavy elements were formed and the galaxies in today's universe were assembled. TMT will allow detailed spectroscopic analysis of galaxies and subgalactic fragments during the epoch of galaxy assembly. Observations with TMT will help answer questions about the early production and dispersal of the chemical elements, the distribution of baryons within dark matter halos and the processes of hierarchical merging of subgalactic fragments.

The early epoch of the formation and development of the large-scale structures that dominate the universe today should also be observable with the TMT. Studies of the matter power spectrum on small spatial scales, using direct observations of distant galaxies and the intergalactic medium (IGM), provide information on the physics of the early universe and the nature of dark matter that are inaccessible using any other techniques.

Investigations of massive black holes throughout cosmic time. The recently-discovered tight correlation between central black hole mass and stellar bulge velocity dispersion strongly implies that black hole formation and growth is closely tied to the processes that form galaxies. This result also suggests that super massive black holes are at the centers of most or all large galaxies. The TMT combination of high spatial resolution and moderate-to-high spectral resolution will extend our capability to detect and investigate central black holes to cosmological distances. In addi-



tion to investigations designed to understand the black hole-galaxy growth issue, nearby supermassive black holes can be analyzed with very high physical resolution. This will allow us to measure general relativistic effects at the center of the Galaxy and to spatially resolve the accretion disks for active black holes in the centers of galaxies to the distance of the Virgo cluster.

Exploration of planet-formation processes and the characterization of extra-solar planets. Two of the most exciting challenges to astrophysics in the next decades are to understand the physical processes that lead to star and planet formation and to characterize the properties of extra-solar planets. TMT will have a very important role to play in many aspects of this endeavor.

Spectroscopic discovery observations that push into the terrestrial-planet regime, the kinematics of protoplanetary disks, spectroscopic detection and analysis of extra-solar planet atmospheres and the direct detection of extra-solar planets in reflected and emitted light are all goals that are driving the TMT design requirements.

Furthermore, as has been the case for every previous increase in capability of this magnitude, it is very likely that the scientific impact of TMT will go far beyond what we envision today and TMT will enable discoveries that we cannot anticipate.

UH Hilo Associate Professor of Astronomy. Dr. Takamiya obtained her B.Sc. in Physics and M.Sc. in Astronomy from the Universidad de Chile



in 1990 and 1991, respectively, and her M.Sc. and Ph.D. in Astronomy and Astrophysics, from the University of Chicago, in 1992 and 1998, respectively.

She carried out post-doctoral research as a Gemini Science Fellow at Gemini Observatory and subsequently as a Research Associate, with the Dept. of Physics and Astronomy, at UH Hilo.

Her teaching responsibilities at UH Hilo are General Physics, General Astronomy, and Stellar Astronomy.

The UH Hilo astronomy program aims to (a) develop the science knowledge and analytic skills of students, whether they be majors or not, through a focus on the field of astronomy; and (b) instill an appreciation of science, particularly astronomy, in students.

The program provides the students with transferable skills so they can excel in a wide range of STEM-related fields. Through the study of astronomy, graduates will also learn to appreciate and understand science more broadly, enabling them to be more informed citizens.

The B.S. degree program, taking advantage of our access to Mauna Kea Observatories, provides the training needed for students seeking careers in astronomy---as professional astronomers, observatory technical staff, and educators. Our program supports the liberal arts mission of the University by providing general education courses in a field of major importance to the State of Hawai`i.



How long do exchanges last?

Long-term exchanges last a full academic year, and students attend local schools and live with multiple host families. Short-term exchanges last from several days to three months and are often structured as camps, tours, or homestays that take place when school is not in session.

What are the costs? Room and board are provided, as well as any school fees. Each program varies, but students are usually responsible for:

Round-trip airfare Travel insurance

Travel documents (such as passports and visas)

Spending money and any additional travel or tours

How can I apply? Candidates are 15-19 years old and are leaders in their schools and communities. Contact your local Rotary club to see what exchange opportunities are available and what the application process involves.

Can I host an exchange student? Hosting an exchange student can be incredibly rewarding for your family, bringing an international experience directly into your home. Host families provide room and board and share their lives with exchange students, involving them in family, community, and cultural activities. All host families are screened and trained.

Importance of Genetics & Nutrition in choosing and raising pets-

In the 1960s, Scarr studied identical and fraternal twins' aptitude and school achievement scores. The study revealed that intellectual development was heavily influenced by genetic ability, especially among more advantaged children. It also showed that on average, black children demonstrated less genetic and more environmental influence on their intelligence than white children. Scarr also collaborated with Margaret Williams on a clinical study which demonstrated that premature birth infants who receive stimulation gain weight faster and recover faster than babies left in isolation (the practice at that time).

Scarr served as President of the Society for Research in Child Development, the Association for Psychological Science, the Council of Graduate Departments of Psychology, and the Behavior Genetics Association. She was elected to the American Psychological Association's Board of Directors in 1988, but resigned in 1990. Scarr was also a founding member of the American Psychological Society (now the Association for Psychological Science) and was chief executive officer of KinderCare Learning Centers from 1995 to 1997.[5]

Scarr was honored by her colleagues with research awards: Distinguished Contributions to Research on Public Policy (American Psychological Association), James McKeen Cattell Award (Association for Psychological Science), and the Dobzhansky Award for Lifetime Achievement (Behavior Genetics Association). She was elected a Fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, American Association for the Advancement of Science, and other scientific societies. Scarr retired to Hawaii in 1997, where she learned scuba diving, even obtaining a rescue diver certification.
