Nalani Flinn is a retired credit union executive, who renewed her commitment to service above self in April 1996, when she joined the Waianae Coast Rotary Club. During a 40-year career in the credit union industry, she played an increasingly significant role in improving her community through helping families secure loans to buy cars, start businesses, improve homes and pay for their children's education.

Since her retirement in July 2007, she has been approaching with a sense of urgency a passion to promote the importance of literacy in her community as a volunteer with the nonprofit organization Reading is Fundamental, which enlisted her help to read regularly

to elementary-school students in Waianae. In addition, she is a dedicated assistant pastor at the Gospel of Salvation Church, where she has a leadership role in efforts to strengthen families and deepen their spiritual faith.

As a member of the Waianae Coast Rotary Club, she served two, one-year terms as president in 1999 and again in 2003. She has also been an Assistant District Governor for five years, starting in 2004. Among key achievements for the district was her lead role in humanitarian efforts to help promote world peace in January 2013, when an estimated 900 people gathered in Honolulu to spread



The Office is divided into the following departments: Deputy Prosecutors, Victim Witness Program, Investigation Unit, Crime Prevention Justice Assistance Group (CPJAG), Clerical Support Unit and Administrative Unit

In 1905 Act 39 of the 3rd Legislature provided for the creation of counties in the Territory of Hawai'i. In the election of June 20, 1905 Charles Williams was elected County Attorney for Hawai'i County.

The County Attorney's Office handled both criminal and civil matters until a change in the Hawai'i County Charter abolished the County Attorney position and created two legal offices: the Office of the Prosecuting Attorney to handle criminal matters and the Office of the Corporation Counsel to handle civil cases. The Office of the Prosecuting Attorney was established in 1968

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
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

The Department of Water Supply is a semi-autonomous agency of the County of Hawai'i of which operates by rules and regulations as adopted by the Water Board. As a semiautonomous agency, the Department operates and maintains its water systems with revenues generated wholly through water sales. The primary function of the Department is to provide safe domestic water service through its 23 water systems and 74 sources

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scattered throughout the island. The individual water systems are not interconnected except in the more densely populated districts of South Hilo and Kona.

The Department continually strives to provide dependable, high quality, potable water at a reasonable cost. With the enactment of the Safe Drinking Water Act, certain standards were set for all water purveyors. The Department has also concentrated efforts and directed resources towards providing uninterrupted water service.


Keith Okamoto was selected as the Department's Manager-Chief Engineer by the Water Board, effective July 1, 2015. He had previously served as Deputy since March 2012.

Okamoto joined the Department of Water Supply in December 1996. During his career he has held several positions within the Engineering Division: engineer in the Water Resources and Planning Branch; supervisor of the Water Quality Assurance and Control Branch; and served as the assistant Engineering Division head.

As of September 1, 2017, The Emergency Water Restriction for North Kona remains in effect. ALL residents and customers in North Kona must continue to restrict water use to health and safety needs (drinking, cooking, and hygiene purposes). Due to a significant level of overall compliance, water levels in the tanks have remained stable. The

Department appreciates the community's efforts to restrict water use during this time. Therefore, limited hand watering of precious plants, on occasion, is still acceptable using the following best practices:

- Water at night to reduce evaporation.
- Use of County's free mulch to preserve moisture around plants. Visit the County's website at: http://www.hawaiizerowaste.org/recycle/greenwaste/ for more information.
- Use of recycled water from downspouts, washing machines, washing dishes, and shower "warm up" water is also encouraged.
- Do not over-water is also encou

Some years ago in the Melbourne, Australia, museum where my daughter used to work, an iron lung was on display. For most people my age who remembered the terrifying polio epidemics of the 1950s, that iron lung was a testament to how far vaccination had brought us: to the point where that once-critical piece of medical equipment had literally become a museum piece.

For much of the world, the story of polio is a simple one: After years of fear, a vaccine was developed and a disease was conquered. But for some of the world, the story was different. In so many countries, the vaccine wasn't available, mass vaccination was

too expensive, or children simply couldn't be reached. While the rest of the world relegated polio to its museums, in these countries, the disease continued to rage – until Rotary stepped forward and said that all children, no matter where they lived or what their circumstances, deserved to live free of polio.

In the years since PolioPlus was launched, the combined efforts of Rotary, the governments of the world, and the Global Polio Eradication Initiative have brought the number of cases of polio down from an estimated 350,000 per year to just a few so far in 2017. But we must reach zero cases, and stay there, to achieve eradication. To do that, we need everyone's help.

On 24 October, we will mark World Polio Day. It is a day to celebrate how far we have come and an opportunity for all of us to raise awareness and funds to complete the work of eradication. I ask every Rotary club to participate in some way in World Polio Day activities, and I encourage you to visit endpolio.org for ideas and to register your event. Whether you host a silent auction, a virtual reality viewing, a fundraising walk, or a Purple Pinkie Day, your club can make a real difference.

This year, our World Polio Day livestream event will take place at the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation



headquarters in Seattle; you can watch it on endpolio.org beginning at 2:30 p.m. Pacific time. As many of you know, Rotary has committed to raising \$50 million a year for the next three years. This amount will be matched 2-to-1 by the Gates Foundation – effectively tripling the value of all money Rotary raises on World Polio Day and throughout the year. The University of Hawaii manages lands on Mauna Kea including the Halep?haku mid-level astronomy support facilities at 9,200' elevation (19 acres), a 400-yard corridor along the Summit Access Road (723 acres), and the Maunakea Science Reserve (11,288 acres). The University designated 10,760-acres of the Maunakea Science Reserve as a Natural/Cultural Preservation Area, with no development activity. The remaining 525 acres (5%) of the Science Reserve are designated as an Astronomy Precinct.

The Mauna Kea Science Reserve Master Plan—a policy guide for University management of Mauna Kea, including protection of the cultural, natural, and scientific resources—was adopted by the Board of Regents in June 2000.

In 2009 the University developed the Mauna Kea Comprehensive Management Plan, followed in 2010 by the Natural Resources Management Plan, Cultural Resources Management Plan, Public Access Plan, and Decommissioning Plan. These management plans, approved by the State of Hawai?i Board of Land and Natural Resources, are the State's plans for managing Mauna Kea.

The Office of Mauna Kea Management, together with the Mauna Kea Management Board and Kahu K. Mauna share responsibility for implementing these plans. Since June 2000, management of Mauna Kea requires input and participation from the community regarding daily activities, development of policies and programs, and review of proposed projects.

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I have been hearing about the many different activities clubs are working on to raise awareness of this disease. The Rotary Club of Poipu Beach held a Raise a Glass to End Polio event on October 18th where they donated 100% of the sales from two beer taps at Merriman's Kauai during the culinary market at the Shops at Kukui'ula to The Rotary Foundation Polio Plus fund. The Rotary Club of Honolulu Sunrise held a casual One Day, One Focus, Ending Polio evening under the stars at Bakery and Table for World Polio Day on October 24th. Palettes for Polio will be hosted by the Rotary Club of Kona Mauka at which 40 artists' palettes will be painted and offered at a silent auction at the Rumley Gallery at the King Kamehameha Hotel on November 18th. The Rotary Club of Downtown Honolulu held a Strike Out Polio bowling event, while another club is collecting Pennies for Polio. Share your story with our District Polio Plus Chair Charlene Meyers to post on the website. Let her know how you celebrated World Polio Day.

I received an email from my classmate DG Claudette McWilliams (District 5110) and I quote, "As long as we are bragging, my DRFCC tells me that with the second check for \$536,000 to TRF (the first was \$500K), District 5110 was Number One in the world for giving. Whether that lasted beyond the date that it was reported is unknown, but Number One in the world for even one day is something that I will gladly accept." She reminded me that November is Rotary Foundation Month. I thank the many Rotarians in District 5000 for stepping forward to share their resources in "Making a Difference." Without your generosity, the books we ship, the eye clinics we support, the clean water wells we build would not happen. This is my favorite quote when an individual is recognized for donating \$1,000 or more to Rotary Foundation:

You will build houses in which you will never live You will feed hungry people of every race creed and political philosophy

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This Week's Speaker Stephanie Nagata Director; Office of Mauna Kea Management

The University of Hawaii manages lands on Mauna Kea including the Hale Haku mid-level astronomy support facilities at 9,200' elevation (19 acres), a 400-yard corridor along the Summit Access Road (723 acres), and the Mauna Kea Science Reserve (11,288 acres). The University designated 10,760-acres of the Mauna Kea Science Reserve as a Natural/Cultural Preservation Area, with no development activity. The remaining 525 acres (5%) of the Science Reserve are designated as an Astronomy Precinct.

The Mauna Kea Science Reserve Master Plan—a policy guide for University management of Mauna Kea, including protection of the cultural, natural, and scientific resources—was adopted by the Board of Regents in June 2000.

In 2009 the University developed the Mauna Kea Comprehensive Management Plan, followed in 2010 by the Natural Resources Management Plan, Cultural Resources Management Plan, Public Access Plan, and Decommissioning Plan. These management plans, approved by the State of Hawaii Board of Land and Natural Resources, are the State's plans for managing Mauna Kea.

The Office of Mauna Kea Management, together with the Mauna Kea Management Board and Kahu K Mauna share responsibility for implementing these plans. Since June 2000, management of Mauna Kea requires input and participation from the community regarding daily activities, development of policies and programs, and review of proposed projects.

Seventy-two years ago, the United Nations was founded "to save succeeding generations from the scourge of war ... [and] to practice tolerance and live together in peace with one another as good neighbors." Despite those worthy aspirations, and generations of investment in achieving them, the "scourge of war" is still with us: Last year, more than 102,000 people died in 49 armed conflicts around the world. Some of those conflicts were in their fifth decade or beyond. Terrorism, intolerance, and extremism; the refugee crisis; and environmental degradation are now global challenges.

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For these reasons, we have scheduled a series of six presidential peacebuilding conferences between February and June in Canada, Lebanon, the UK, Australia, Italy, and the United States. These conferences will focus not on peace but on peacebuilding: We will share ways that we can work to build peace through the service of our Rotary clubs and districts. Five of the one-day conferences will illuminate the connections between peace and another area of focus. The first conference, in Vancouver, B.C., will explore the link between peace and another sphere of great concern to us in Rotary: environmental sustainability. You the full schedule can view and register at www.rotary.org/presidential-conferences.

The goals are simple: to help Rotarians find new ways to advance peace through their service, to learn from experts, and to strengthen our abilities to build peace. It is my hope and belief that these conferences will help us move closer to a more peaceful world, through Rotary: Making a Difference.

What is Keiki Vision? How did it come to be?

It used to be that all public school children's eyes were tested by the school nurse or someone with such skills who visited the schools on a regular basis. Then as it periodically does, the state ran into financial difficulties and simply stopped giving these examinations. Dr. Randall Sakamoto then stepped into the breach and created a simplified screening test for near vision, far vision, and stereo vision as well as a check list of readily observable eye conditions which he called "Keiki Vision". The screening is simple enough that volunteers can be trained to do it readily especially if they are paired with experienced volunteers.

There are several ways to do the screenings, with some clubs pairing the screenings with the Dictionary Project so that both are done the same morning, and other clubs focusing only on the Keiki Vision itself. If there aren't enough volunteers for a given school, other clubs can be involved such as in the above picture where the Rotary Clubs of Hilo and Hilo Bay worked together at E. B. De Silva Elementary School. Clubs also have involved spouses, Rotaractors and Lions Club members in these activities. A suggested order of operations is listed at the top of the Download section for your convenience.

The various downloads associated with this page both give examples of the types of screening forms as well as parental permission forms and forms to go home to the parents after the screening. We suggest that it is important to have the parental permission form request that the screening results be shared with the teachers and health aide. In this way, these two groups can combine the results with their own observations and possibly discuss the results during parent conferences.

Unlike the Dictionary Project, not all Rotary Clubs engage in Keiki Vision screening. To further complicate things, the Lions Clubs have come up with their own vision screening test which is somewhat more modern and which lends itself to statistical analysis. Dr. Cedric Mitsui of RC Hilo Bay has told us that since Rotarians generally screen only third grade students, that there is a general consensus that the Lions Clubs will screen first and fifth graders. If no Rotary Club is screening the third graders in a given school and does not intend to, then it is possible that the local Lions Clubs will step in to make sure that the children do get a screening regardless of who does it.



The idea behind it was simple: that a club with members who had a wide variety of backgrounds and abilities would be capable of better service than one without.

In the years since, the idea of diversity in Rotary has come to be defined more broadly. We have discovered that a club that truly represents its community is far better able to serve that community effectively. Looking ahead, it is clear how essential diversity will remain in Rotary: not only to strong service today, but to a strong organization in the future.

One of the most pressing aspects of diversity to address in our membership is the age of our members. When you look around at almost any Rotary event, it becomes immediately obvious that the age range in the room does not promise a sustainable future for our organization. Our membership is near a record high, and we are bringing in new members all the time – yet only a small minority of those members are young enough to have decades of Rotary service ahead of them. To ensure a strong and capable Rotary leadership tomorrow, we need to bring in young and capable members today.

We also cannot discuss diversity in Rotary without addressing the issue of gender. It is difficult to imagine that just three decades ago, women could not join Rotary. Although we have come a long way since then, the legacy of that misguided policy is still with us. Far too many people continue to think of Rotary as an organization only for men, and that idea has had a detrimental effect on both our public image and our membership growth. Today, women make up just over 21 percent of Rotary's membership. While this is certainly a great improvement, we have a long way to go to meet what should be the goal of every club: a gender balance that matches the balance of our world, with as many women in Rotary as men.

Whatever brought each of us to Rotary, we stay because we find value in Rotary membership and believe that our service has value to the world. By building clubs that reflect that world in all its diversity, we will build even more enduring value in Rotary: Making a Difference.

TMT's THINK Fund Helping Hawaii Island Students and Parents

The Hawaii Island New Knowledge (THINK) Fund was initiated in 2014 prior to the initial start of construction with a commitment of \$1 million per year for Hawaii Island STEM endeavors. The Hawaii Community Foundation (HCF) and the Pauahi Foundation administer the Fund with scholarship, classroom, student and STEM programming initiatives with Pauahi focusing on Native Hawaiians recipients.

In spite of many setbacks TMT has continued to its commitment to the THINK Fund. Within the next few weeks TMT will have funded \$4 million to the THINK Fund initiative for Hawaii Island students.

THINK Fund at Hawaii Community Foundation The THINK Fund at HCF has benefitted 26,000 students and 1,000 teachers on Hawai'i Island. Grants and scholarships seek to provide high-quality, careerconnected STEM education and experiences to Hawai'i Island's most underserved youth.

College scholarships totaling over \$325,000 have been awarded to 54 Hawai'i Island students with financial need.

Scholarships support students pursuing careers in STEM and future STEM educators who intend to teach in Hawai'i Island schools.

THINK Fund at HCF provided more than \$685,000 in grants that leveraged an additional \$1.5 million from other funders to support innovative STEM programs and activities. \$300,000 is committed to the applications currently in process.

Programs receiving support must demonstrate success recruiting and addressing the needs of groups underrepresented in STEM fields, which includes students in rural communities, Native Hawaiians, and those disengaged in school.

\$250,000 has been committed to providing immediate funding for high-quality, ready-to-go STEM projects in Hawai'i Island classrooms.

39 out of 55 public and public charter schools on Hawai'i Island have received grants, schools with high

need students receiving 78% of the funding.

Hawaii Community Foundation will solicit proposals to fund programs serving this target group for at least \$5,000 per year, beginning this year.

Applications are also open for Career Connected Learning - this is the new name for the redesigned STEM Learning Partnership. HCF is encouraging all previous STEM Learning Partnership grantees to review the request for proposals and apply if they have great programs that fit the parameters. The parameters are very similar to the previous parameters, with a stronger emphasis on how the STEM education activities help participants explore and move into local STEM careers.

The TMT THINK Fund at Pauahi has funded thirtythree college scholarships to date, with all students funded for their entire academic career. Total of \$568,000. Fifteen scholarships are planned for 2018.

Twenty-three students had full scholarships to Science Camps of America totaling \$55,000. Fourteen more Science Camp scholarships will be awarded in 2018.

All students were Native Hawaiian.

Preserving & Protecting Cultural Resources Mauna Kea Office of Management

"Maunakea is the astonishing mountain that stands in the calm" is an 'olele no'eau or wise saying that expresses the sentiment that Maunakea is a source of awe and inspiration. Maunakea is a recognized Hawaiian cultural site. It is a storied place of cultural, spiritual and archaeological significance where appropriate and respectful behavior are expected." (Maunakea Heritage and Natural Resources Guide).

Covered with physical expressions of its cultural significance be it shrines, ahu, or burials, protecting and preserving these sites are major components of the mission of the Office of Mauna Kea Management (OMKM). OMKM is tasked by the University with managing approximately 12,000 acres including the summit area, access road and mid-level parcel at Halepōhaku.

A total of 263 sites were identified in the survey. Most of the sites found were shrines. Experts speculate the adze quarry, located in the adjacent Maunakea Ice Age Natural Area Reserve, was in use about 500 to 700 years, and the complex of adze quarries and workshops comprised the next most common sites. The Mauna Kea Adze Quarry is a National Historic Landmark and is under the jurisdiction of the State Department of Land & Natural Resources (DLNR).

The survey identified burials or possible burials most of which are located in remote areas in the Science Reserve. Other site types include markers/memorials, temporary shelters and a camp occupied by the 1926 USGS survey party.

The archaeological survey also included test excavations at two sites to determine the presence or absence of cultural deposits. Radiocarbon dating from a single piece of charcoal in the Pohakuloa Gulch area produced a date of 1420-1480 AD.

The data collected contributes to a greater understanding of the cultural significance of Maunakea. The large number and scattering of sites provide evidence of the presence, activities and uses associated with Maunakea. DLNR's commissioned archaeological survey of the adze quarry combined with OMKM's survey provide a view into the past of the various routes and corridors used to and from the quarry. Data supports the theory that the adze makers were from different parts of the island and used different routes to get there.

Burial Treatment Plans are normally done in the context of development. While development is not OMKM's role, it formulated and implemented a Burial Treatment Plan as one of its management responsibilities.

The development of the Burial Treatment Plan was done in consultation with Kahu Ku Mauna, the native Hawaiian council that advises OMKM, and the Hawaii Island Burial Council. The plan which calls for preserving in place all known burials was approved by the State of Hawaii Historic Preservation Division (SHPD).

In 2012, OMKM initiated a long term monitoring program of all the archaeological sites found on UH's managed lands. The program is a five-year cycle with sites close to roads and human activity monitored annually, and the more remote sites assessed every three or five years. This program was formalized in 2014 when SHPD approved OMKM's Long Term Historic Property Monitoring Plan.

OMKM was recently honored with a Historic Preservation Award from Historic Hawaii Foundation, citing "the preparation of this plan and implementation of regular, annual monitoring without a statutory requirement demonstrates the Office of Maunakea Management's commitment to stewardship and best practices in cultural resource understanding, protection and preservation. We congratulate you on your exemplary preservation efforts." OMKM was also honored by the Kona-Kohala Chamber of Commerce's Pualu Award for Culture and Heritage for its long term monitoring plan.

While much has been done, there is still much left to do. As OMKM continues to move forward to preserve and protect the cultural resources on Maunakea, it continues to be guided by Kahu Ku Mauna. It is hopeful that OMKM's actions and deeds will lead to a better understanding of stewardship efforts to achieve balance, harmony and trust on Maunakea.

A Rich Legacy

Hawai'i Community College is celebrating its 75th anniversary during the 2015-2016 academic year. From its start in 1941 as the Hawai'i Vocational School, the college has provided access to higher education opportunities, trained a skilled workforce and supported the economic development of the County of Hawai'i. With the advancement in technology and expansion of educational opportunities into broader fields of technical training, the institution was renamed the Hawai'i Technical School in 1956.

In May 1970, the institution joined the University of Hawai'i as a comprehensive community college with the name Hawai'i Community College. Other significant developments for the college were the offering of college degree classes in Kona beginning in 1982, and the establishment of the continuing education programs throughout the island of Hawai'i in 1992.

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A Past President's Message Richard King, Rotary International President

Rotary always benefits two people. The child who is sick, who is hungry, who is thirsty, who has no clothes. No shelter, no education, no future, no hope...that child is beneficiary of Rotary's outreach. That child is Rotary's business. But another benefit comes to the Rotarian-the one actually performing the service. That person grows and fulfills the real reason for his or her existence, which is to serve others.

Community Service Time – Treasure - Talent

Community Service, along with Youth Service, is probably what most Rotarians have in mind when they join Rotary to be of service. Members, willing to donate their time, treasure and talents, are doing it for a reason. There must be a personal benefit else it would not be worth doing. Therefore it is important that we are selective in the projects that clubs undertake and make them meaningful, not only for the community served, but also for those that are serving, eg the Rotarian. Here are some keys to creating successful projects:

1) Find a need...then ask yourself

Is this worthy of the commitment of time, treasure and talent (more complex projects may equate to greater value)?

Does this meet the expectations of my fellow Rotarians? Does this build my team?

Perhaps the best way to select a project is to engage club members in discussion ...

2) Project Planning

Identify resources; human, physical and financial

Human resources may include club members, district members, those being served and Rotary Community Corps

3) Quality vs quantity...remember you will be known by the work you do.

4) Document, document, document.

Many projects can be replicated, documentation will help others be successful

Lessons learned are easier to identify when documented Publicity is easier when the project has been documented (Who, what, when, where and how much)

A picture says a thousand words and video tells the tale....

5) Share the victory

All too often we do a project and then neglect or underplay the significance of the work done. After completing a project make it a club program. Share the results, the challenges and the lessons learned. By doing this we have the opportunity to be inclusive with members that, for whatever reason, were not a part of the project (next time around they will want to be there).

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SELECTING A PROJECT

After a Rotaty club has completed an assessment of its community, it faces the diallenge of selecting a service project. This decision is usually based on the relevant community concerns, available resources, and club service interests identified in the assessment.

Selecting a project can be a difficult decision. One project can't possibly address all the issues a community faces, and clubs must determine where their work will have the greatest impact. Some clubs use a consensatbuilding process to determine which projects to pursue, others debute and vote on issues, and still others allow their service committees to select appropriate projects. Regardless of how the decision is made, there are some common concerns clubs should consider before selecting a project.

Disaster relief and recovery

Rotarians have a keig history of aiding victims of natural desasters. Through local club and district efforts, Rotarans donate to milef funds; send stripments of food, clothing, and meticine; collaborate with local organizations that offer emergiancy relief; and provide ongoing assistance during loog-term reconstruction projects.

To provide immediate disaster relief, clubs are encouraged to work with well-established international relet agencies that are equipped to quickly and effectively allocate aid.

Consider Retary's areas of focus

Rotary International and The Rotary Foundation have adopted six areas of focus as organizational priorities.

- Peace and conflict prevention/hesolution
- Disease prevention and treatment
- Water and samilation
- Matemail and child health.
- Basic education and Heracy
- Contract and community development

There are countless ways that Rotary clubs can address these assess both locally and internationally. For ideas, consult the publication *Bulary's Annual of Focus* (965).

Sustainability

Sustainable projects build a community's capacity to address issues without relying on external support. When selecting a project, think carefully about both the shortterm and long-term impact. For example, building a modern well and water pump for a neighborhood without access to clean drinking water might solve a community's immediate water problems. But if the community cannot maintain the well, the people's water problems will quickly return. The same might be said for a community beautification project. A club could build a park, clean up litter, or paint over graffiti in an impoverished neighborhood, but if people from the neighborhood aten't invested in the project, the graffitt and litter will almost certainly reappear. Sustainable projects take these issues into account and provide long-term solutions to chronic problems.

Achievable based on a realistic assessment of materials, resources, and filme	We have secured the backing of project spornors – local businesses that, will hep supply the food and warehouse space – and beneficiaries – local charities and outreach centers that will deliver the food to people who need it. Our members, working with our sponsored Interact club. and Rotary Community Corps, will provide the volunteer hours.
Measurable – having a tangible, quantitable point to pursue	Once operational, the food bank will provide 10 pounds of nonperishable food to 100 families weekly
Time specific - having a specific deadline or time trame for completion	The food bank will be fully operational within 12 months, all which time we will turn over autorinistration to a local charitable organization. Our members will continue to support the food bank indefinitely through advocacy; fundraising, and volunteering.

Crime Stoppers is a volunteer program run by ordinary citizens who want to keep their community safe.

A Brief Summary of Rotary in Ethiopia

The Rotary Club of Addis Ababa was established by the Royal Decree at the time of Emperor Haile Selassie, in 1955. It was the second oldest club in Africa after the Nairobi Club in District 9200. At its best time the Club had some 130 members composed of a wide variety of nationalities, including an Armenian, an Austrian, a Belgian, an Egyptian and a German, to name only a few. Initially the Club used to meet in a restaurant at "Janhoy Meda" but after a short while it changed its venue to the Ghion Hotel and stayed there until 1975. Since then the Club has been meeting regularly at the Hilton Hotel.

RCAA is part of Rotarian District 9212, which comprises Ethiopia, Kenya, Eritrea and South Sudan.


The tree planting does not have to be part of a specific event/program/service. If you plant a tree in your backyard, then we can get credit for it. If you plant two, even better.

At the 1990 Rotary International Convention in Portland, Oregon, then President-elect Paulo Costa told the gathered Rotarians, "The hour has come for Rotary to raise its voice, to claim its leadership, and to rouse all Rotarians to an honorable crusade to protect our natural resources." He declared a Rotary initiative to "Preserve Planet Earth," asking Rotarians to make environmental issues part of their service agenda: to plant trees, to work to keep our air and water clean, and to protect the planet for future generations.

President Costa asked that one tree be planted for each of the 1.1 million members that Rotary had at the time. We Rotarians, as is our wont, did better, planting nearly 35 million trees by the end of the Rotary year. Many of those trees are likely still flourishing today, absorbing carbon from the environment, releasing oxygen, cooling the air, improving soil quality, providing habitat and food for birds, animals, and insects, and yielding a host of other benefits. Unfortunately, while those trees have kept on doing good for the environment, Rotary as a whole has not carried its environmental commitment forward.

That is why, at the start of this year, I followed Paulo Costa's example and asked Rotary to plant at least one tree for every Rotary member. My goal was to achieve a good beyond the considerable benefits that those 1.2 million (or more!) trees would themselves bring. It is my hope that by planting trees, Rotarians will renew their interest in, and attention to, an issue that we must put back on the Rotary agenda: the state of our planet.

Environmental issues are deeply entwined in every one of our areas of focus and cannot be dismissed as not Rotary's concern. Pollution is affecting health across the globe: More than 80 percent of people in urban areas breathe unsafe air, a number that rises to 98 percent in low- and middle-income countries. If current trends continue, by 2050 the oceans are expected to contain more plastics by weight than fish. And rising temperatures are welldocumented: Global annual average temperatures increased by about 2 degrees F (1.1 degrees C) from 1880 through 2015. That this change was caused by humans is not a subject of scientific debate, nor is the likelihood of vast economic and human disruption if the trend continues unchecked. The need for action is greater than ever – and so is our ability to have a real impact.

As past UN Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon put it, "There can be no Plan B, because there is no Planet B." Our planet belongs to all of us, and to our children, and to their children. It is for all of us to protect, and for all of us in Rotary to make a difference. Aloha Fellow Rotarians,

01. Trees combat climate change

Excess carbon dioxide (CO2) is building up in our atmosphere, contributing to climate change. Trees absorb CO2, removing and storing the carbon while releasing oxygen back into the air. Trees absorb odors and pollutant gases (nitrogen oxides, ammonia, sulfur dioxide and ozone) and filter particulates out of the air by trapping them on their leaves and bark.

03. Trees provide oxygen

In one year an acre of mature trees can provide enough oxygen for 18 people.

04. Trees cool the streets and the city

Average temperatures in Los Angeles have risen 6°F in the last 50 years as tree coverage has declined and the number of heat-absorbing roads and buildings has increased.

Trees cool the city by up to 10°F, by shading our homes and streets, breaking up urban "heat islands" and releasing water vapor into the air through their leaves.

05. Trees conserve energy

Three trees placed strategically around a single-family home can cut summer air conditioning needs by up to 50 percent. By reducing the energy demand for cooling our houses, we reduce carbon dioxide and other pollution emissions from power plants.

06. Trees save water

Shade from trees slows water evaporation from thirsty lawns. Most newly planted trees need only fifteen gallons of water a week. As trees transpire, they increase atmospheric moisture.

07. Trees help prevent water pollution

Trees reduce runoff by breaking rainfall thus allowing the water to flow down the trunk and into the earth below the tree. This prevents storm water from carrying pollutants to the ocean. When mulched, trees act like a sponge that filters this water naturally and uses it to recharge groundwater supplies.

08. Trees help prevent soil erosion

On hillsides or stream slopes, trees slow runoff and hold soil in place.

09. Trees shield children from ultra-violet rays

Skin cancer is the most common form of cancer in the United States. Trees reduce UV-B exposure by about 50 percent, thus providing protection to children on school campuses and playgrounds - where children spend hours outdoors.

10. Trees provide food

An apple tree can yield up to 15-20 bushels of fruit per year and can be planted on the tiniest urban lot. Aside from fruit for humans, trees provide food for birds and wildlife.

11. Trees heal

Studies have shown that patients with views of trees out their windows heal faster and with less complications. Children with ADHD show fewer symptoms when they have access to nature. Exposure to trees and nature aids concentration by reducing mental fatigue.

12. Trees reduce violence

Neighborhoods and homes that are barren have shown to have a greater incidence of violence in and out of the home than their greener counterparts. Trees and landscaping help to reduce the level of fear.

13. Trees mark the seasons

Is it winter, spring, summer or fall? Look at the trees.

14. Trees create economic opportunities

Fruit harvested from community orchards can be sold, thus providing income. Small business opportunities in green waste management and landscaping arise when cities value mulching and its water-saving qualities. Vocational training for youth interested in green jobs is also a great way to develop economic opportunities from trees.

15. Trees are teachers and playmates

Whether as houses for children or creative and spiritual inspiration for adults, trees have provided the space for human retreat throughout the ages.

16. Trees bring diverse groups of people together

Tree plantings provide an opportunity for community involvement and empowerment that improves the quality of life in our neighborhoods. All cultures, ages, and genders have an important role to play at a tree planting or tree care event.

17. Trees add unity

Trees as landmarks can give a neighborhood a new identity and encourage civic pride.

18. Trees provide a canopy and habitat for wildlife

Sycamore and oak are among the many urban species that provide excellent urban homes for birds, bees, possums and squirrels.

19. Trees block things... You know, like your neighbors

Trees can mask concrete walls or parking lots, and unsightly views. They muffle sound from nearby streets and freeways, and create an eye-soothing canopy of green. Trees absorb dust and wind and reduce glare.

20. Trees provide wood

In suburban and rural areas, trees can be selectively harvested for fuel and craft wood.

21. Trees increase property values

The beauty of a well-planted property and its surrounding street and neighborhood can raise property values by as much as 15 percent.

22. Trees increase business traffic

Studies show that the more trees and landscaping a business district has, the more business will flow in. A treelined street will also slow traffic – enough to allow the drivers to look at the store fronts instead of whizzing by.

At the 1990 Rotary International Convention in Portland, Oregon, then President-elect Paulo Costa told the gathered Rotarians, "The hour has come for Rotary to raise its voice, to claim its leadership, and to rouse all Rotarians to an honorable crusade to protect our natural resources." He declared a Rotary initiative to "Preserve Planet Earth," asking Rotarians to make environmental issues part of their service agenda: to plant trees, to work to keep our air and water clean, and to protect the planet for future generations.

President Costa asked that one tree be planted for each of the 1.1 million members that Rotary had at the time. We Rotarians, as is our wont, did better, planting nearly 35 million trees by the end of the Rotary year. Many of those trees are likely still flourishing today, absorbing carbon from the environment, releasing oxygen, cooling the air, improving soil quality, providing habitat and food for birds, animals, and insects, and yielding a host of other benefits. Unfortunately, while those trees have kept on doing good for the environment, Rotary as a whole has not carried its environmental commitment forward.

That is why, at the start of this year, I followed Paulo Costa's example and asked Rotary to plant at least one tree for every Rotary member. My goal was to achieve a good beyond the considerable benefits that those 1.2 million (or more!) trees would themselves bring. It is my hope that by planting trees, Rotarians will renew their interest in, and attention to, an issue that we must put back on the Rotary agenda: the state of our planet.

Environmental issues are deeply entwined in every one of our areas of focus and cannot be dismissed as not Rotary's concern. Pollution is affecting health across the globe: More than 80 percent of people in urban areas breathe unsafe air, a number that rises to 98 percent in low- and middle-income countries. If current trends continue, by 2050 the oceans are expected to contain more plastics by weight than fish. And rising temperatures are welldocumented: Global annual average temperatures increased by about 2 degrees F (1.1 degrees C) from 1880 through 2015. That this change was caused by humans is not a subject of scientific debate, nor is the likelihood of vast economic and human disruption if the trend continues unchecked. The need for action is greater than ever – and so is our ability to have a real impact.

As past UN Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon put it, "There can be no Plan B, because there is no Planet B." Our planet belongs to all of us, and to our children, and to their children. It is for all of us to protect, and for all of us in Rotary to make a difference. Aloha Fellow Rotarians,





They found a good donor match for my stem cell transplant. Things happened fast - I'm at Stanford Cancer Hospital in Palo Alto, CA receiving more chemo in preparation for the stem cell transport on May 30th, then 2-3 months recuperating while the stem cells are accepted by my body.

Right now if I do nothing, there is a 70% chance the leukemia coming back in two to five years. Once the stem cell transplant is successful - I will be declared cured according to doctor. (I'm already healed - but if things line up, which they are I will go thru.) I actually had 5 donor matches, 3 looked good. Doc chose one that matched best and also has my blood type.

I expect to be back home to Hawaii end of July or mid-August.
