Rotary Recognition to Prime Minister Trudeau for Canada's commitment to Ending Polio

Canada has been a champion in the fight to eradicate polio since 1986, when it became the first government to formally fund global polio immunization efforts. Canada has provided over CAD \$750 million in support of a polio-free world, including a \$100 million pledge to global eradication in 2017. Earlier this month, Canada, as host of the G7 summit, was joined by G7 leaders in affirming a commitment to polio eradication.

"Prime Minister Trudeau has committed Canada to remain a strong partner until polio is completely eradicated," said Rotary International President Ian H.S. Riseley. "With the unwavering support of the Prime Minister and the Canadian government and their strong assistance with continued vaccination efforts, I'm confident we will rid the world of polio."

Later this week, Rotary will announce nearly \$50.12 million in support for global polio eradication efforts in countries where polio is a threat. Since 1988, Rotary has contributed more than \$2.3 billion and countless volunteer hours in the fight to end polio, with Rotary clubs in Canada donating more than \$66.6 million towards polio eradication. Rotary members throughout Canada travel regularly to polio-threatened countries to vaccinate children in mass immunization campaigns.

To help create awareness and support for the global effort to protect all children from polio, Rotary's international convention will feature two virtual reality videos that will immerse viewers into the lives of those still impacted by the disease, and what it will take to eradicate it worldwide. Download the Rotary VR app in Google Play or the Apple App Store to view "I Dream of an Empty Ward."

Polio eradication has been Rotary's top priority since 1985. In 1988, Rotary became a leading partner in the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, along with the World Health Organization, UNICEF, the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and later, the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation. Since the initiative launched, the incidence of polio has plummeted by more than 99.9 percent, from about 350,000 cases in 1988 to just 22 confirmed cases in two countries in 2017.

About Rotary: Rotary brings together a global network of community leaders dedicated to tackling the world's most pressing humanitarian challenges. We connect 1.2 million members from more than 35,000 Rotary clubs in almost every country in the world. Their service improves lives both locally and internationally, from helping those in need in their own communities to working toward a polio-free world. Toronto's first Rotary convention took place 94 years ago, with subsequent conventions in 1942, 1964 and 1983.

About the Polio Eradication Champion Award: Rotary established the award in 1995 to honor individuals who have made significant contributions to the global eradication effort. Prime Minister Trudeau is the third Canadian Prime Minister to receive the award, joining Prime Ministers Jean Chrétien and Stephen Harper. Past recipients also include Shinzo Abe, Prime Minister of Japan; Angela Merkel, Chancellor of Germany; Xavier Bettel, Prime Minister of Luxembourg, Muhammadu Buhari, President of Nigeria; Nevin Mimica, European Commissioner for International Cooperation and Development; and Ban Ki-moon, former UN secretary-general.

A giant artificial reef in the shape of a Rotary wheel restores marine life and protects the livelihood of several fishing villages in the Philippines

In the calm blue waters of Lamon Bay lies a source of pride for local fishermen and a submerged salute to Rotary: an artificial reef in the shape of a Rotary wheel. The wheel has helped restore the local fishing industry, which was devastated by large-scale commercial fishing vessels that used dynamite, cyanide, and fine mesh nets from the late 1990s through the early 2000s.

Fishing is considered the lifeblood of the area's coastal villages, including Balubad, Lubi, Talaba, and Kilait, and for years, village fishermen fought to protect the waters that fed their families.

In 2005, the fishermen turned to the Rotary Club of Atimonan, Quezon Province, Philippines, for help. They decided to build an artificial reef.

The club partnered with the Rotary Club of Madera, California, USA, on a Rotary Foundation grant to help fund the project, which would cost more than \$1 million.

They built the reef in the shape of a Rotary wheel, which just happens to have plenty of surface area for coral to grow on and plenty of nooks for fish to shelter in. Made of steel-reinforced concrete, it's 600 meters from the coastline, measures about 4 meters tall and 21 meters wide (13 by 70 feet), and weighs several tons.

Today, the wheel, touted as the biggest artificial reef in the Philippines, is covered with coral and has withstood several typhoons. It attracts fish, including jacks, surgeonfish, mangrove red snappers, groupers, longfin bannerfish, flounders, pompanos, batfish, and barracudas, among other marine creatures.

"Before the reef, the fishermen were barely able to catch a kilo [2.2 pounds] of fish apiece," says Oca Chua, past president of the Rotary Club of Atimonan and the project's chair. "Today they catch fish weighing up to 2 kilos apiece a day."

Protecting the fish has been just one benefit of the effort. The reef also became a tourist attraction that boosted the local economy. Fishermen build bamboo rafts and rent them to tourists who visit the reef to eat, rest, dive, and even feed the fishes.

The venue (Humpy's) was excellent and the meeting was inspiring. They were both awarded with "Rotary Club of Kona" license plate frames for holding a meeting and inviting me to attend.

Rotaract Vs. Interact

I initially asked around the group in hopes to better understand the difference between the Rotaract Clubs and Interact Clubs. In the end, I came to realize that for those I asked; they were just as stumped as I was.

Assuming that Google hasn't failed me yet, the primary difference between Rotaract and Interact are the age groups within the Clubs. Interact Clubs are High School students while Rotaract Clubs are young adults.

The following column from Rotary.org tells the story of what a fellow island Rotaract club is getting involved with.

Rotaract Abroad Kingston, Jamaica

Rotaract Clubs consist of young adults between the ages of 18 and 30 years. They are either institution or community based clubs are required to carry out projects and conduct their affairs similar to that of a Rotary Club.

The Rotary Club of Kingston sponsors two such clubs- The Rotaract Club of Kingston (community based) and the JAGAS club (Jamaica- German Automotive School) which is institution based.

Interact Clubs promote the ideal of Service Above Self amongst students in high schools who are required to complete a project for the school, community, country and international. They are encouraged to interact with students from other clubs. A training seminar for Presidents Elect (PETS) is put on at the beginning of each school year and a club assembly is held in March at which Leadership Skills, Family Relationships, Character values and ideas which make a club successful are expressed. The Rotary Club of Kingston sponsors eight Interact clubs; special amongst these is the Lister Mair Gilby School for the Deaf.

Highlight: The Rotaract Club of Kingston

The Rotaract Club of Kingston is one of the few community based Rotaract clubs in the island, and was in fact the first Rotaract club to be established in Jamaica having received its charter in June 1968. This pride of place, complimented by dedicated members has seen the club grow significantly in membership and service especially in recent years.

Rotaract Kingston members consist of young men and women who are dedicated to making a difference in their communities. The club has been active in assisting in many socially uplifting programs, inclusive of outreach to HIV/AIDS victims as well as informing the public about the effects of the virus.

Promoting literacy in the Jamaican society is another mandate of the Rotaract Club of Kingston and is best highlighted in its annual project- The Inter- Home Spelling Bee competition. This competition is held each year and brings together less fortunate children who compete in a Spelling Bee formatted in similar manner to the National Spelling Bee competition.

Recently the Rotaract Club of Kingston has launched an initiative in promoting the Arts in Kingston, and hosts an Art Competition, geared toward exposure of untrained artists who are given a stage to expose their art and compete for a scholarship or grant to further their skill through formal education.

The club plays a vital role in District activities and is looked upon as the premier Rotaract Club in District 7020. Many Rotarians in the Kingston Club have the pride of place of being past Rotaractors. Of special note is the Past President of the Rotary Club of Kingston (2005- 2006) Rtn. Steve Wedderburn.

School destroyed by lava reopens in new locations

Honolulu Star Advertiser – August 06

A public charter school consumed by lava in July is rising from its ashes to reopen Wednesday in Hilo — barring a visit from Hurricane Hector.

Kua o ka La and its 230 students in preschool through grade 12 were evacuated from the 600-acre campus near Leilani Estates in May, with classes temporarily setting up at several locations.

For Susie Osborne, co-founder and head of school, it was a double blow, as the Kilauea eruption that began May 3 also claimed her home.

But she was upbeat Saturday when providing an update of the school's situation, which she described as a "miracle."

Rotary Clubs in East Hawaii and Maui — "my angels," as Osborne described them donated \$60,000 and provided manpower to enable the school to fix up several facilities at Nani Mau Gardens to accommodate students in grades K to 6. Businesses, parents, and community members also came through with free labor.

Osborne said the 22-acre botanical garden, which remains open to visitors, will provide a beautiful, serene setting for students whose lives have been disrupted.

Middle and high school students will convene at the Boys &Girls Club in Hilo, and Kua o ka La's preschool, which starts Aug. 20, will continue to operate at Pu'ula United Church of Christ in Nanawale.

Meanwhile, the Rotary Club of Pahoa Sunset, which counts Osborne among its members, raised \$4,500 so Kua o ka La students won't have to spend a dime on school supplies.

"This miracle of community came together to make this possible for our children and families. It's extreme generosity of spirit," she said.

Total enrollment for the 2018-2019 academic year had reached 205, with room for more. The school continues to accept applications at its office at 42 Kinoole St. in Hilo.

Osborne said transportation is being provided so students in Puna can continue to attend.

"It's really a challenging time for a lot of people, and the school is an important stability factor for our community," she said.



Rotary International; President's Message Barry Rassin, Rotary International President of 2018-2019

Every Thursday morning, I receive an email from the World Health Organization with an update on the status of polio eradication. It contains a wealth of information, country by country: where and how immunization campaigns are being conducted, how many millions of children are being vaccinated, and where environmental surveillance has found evidence of circulating virus. But every week, when that email appears in my inbox, my heart seems to stop for just a moment until I read the first few lines – and learn whether a child was paralyzed by wild poliovirus that week.

That, my friends, is where we are today in the work of polio eradication. The question on my mind as I open that message isn't how many thousands of cases we might see in a year, as we did not too long ago, or even how many hundreds. Instead, when that WHO email arrives every Thursday, the single, binary question it answers is: Was there a new case this week, or wasn't there?

Thirty years ago, 1,000 children were paralyzed by polio every single day. Since then, we've marked our progress, year by year, week by week. We've celebrated as country after country, region after region has been declared polio-free. As we've come closer and closer to our goal, and the number of cases has dropped further and further, the children those numbers reflect have become less and less of

an abstraction. When I open that Thursday email, I don't wonder what number I'll see. I wonder, was a child paralyzed this week or not?

We are so close to eradication – but there is so much work left to do.

This month, I ask every Rotary club to help End Polio Now by marking World Polio Day on 24 October. Last year, thousands of Rotary clubs around the world held events to raise awareness and funds for polio eradication. This year, we want to see more World Polio Day events registered than ever. If you have an event planned, be sure to register and promote it at endpolio.org so that more people can take part. If you haven't planned one yet, it's not too late – visit endpolio.org to find ideas, information on this year's livestream, and resources to help your club organize a successful event.

World Polio Day is a tremendous opportunity for clubs to highlight Rotary, and our historic work to eradicate polio, in their own communities. It is also a great way to take advantage of the challenge from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation: For every dollar that Rotary raises for polio eradication, the Gates Foundation will give two more. Join me, and Rotarians everywhere, on 24 October for World Polio Day – and Be the Inspiration for a polio-free world.

President's Message

Barry Rassin, International President 2018-2019

In my travels over the past year, I've visited many strong, vibrant clubs and districts that are transforming their communities. When I attend their meetings, I can feel the energy. When I meet their members, I can see they are people of action. And when I look at their communities, I can recognize the impact of their work.

I've also visited communities with Rotary clubs that were hardly more than social clubs. It shouldn't ever be that way. Fortunately, there's a simple approach that I believe can help revitalize any club.

I'd like to challenge every Rotary club to come up with at least one highimpact service project. Each club already has the potential, the resources, to make it happen. It has the power to change people's lives — completely.

It doesn't take millions of dollars. One of the most transformational projects I've been a part of involved providing a Jeep to a group of midwives in Haiti. We had asked the midwives what we could do for them, and they told us they needed a way to reach expectant mothers in a remote part of the country. We supplied a Jeep, painted it pink, and put the Rotary logo on it. Three years later, we went back to see how they were doing. They were excited by the outcomes: They told us that the mortality rate for mothers and infants in that region had dropped by 50 percent.

That's what I call transformational service.

But Jeeps don't last forever, and after eight years on the road, that vehicle was on its last legs. So we bought a pink Land Cruiser. It's still on the road, allowing the midwives to provide prenatal care to women in that remote region.

What makes a project transformational? It doesn't have to involve a lot of money, but it has to reach people and have a major impact in the community. That is the key, and that is where careful planning and thorough research come in. So do your research. Leverage your resources. Seek partnerships that can increase your impact. And then take action

Of course, service is only part of what a strong club must offer. It must also have good speakers, provide leadership development, involve Rotaract and Interact, and bring value to its members and reasons to participate in Rotary events.

If your club is transformational and well-organized, everything else will follow. Members will be engaged, and new members will be eager to join you. Fundraising will be easier: People love to give when they see how their money is making a difference and when they know the organization is accountable. Your club will be vibrant, relevant, and alive — and it will Be the Inspiration to those within its ranks as well as to the community it serves.

One of the things I appreciate most about serving as president of Rotary International is the people I get to meet. Much of my time is spent traveling and visiting Rotary clubs around the world. A Rotarian welcome is something quite special. But let me tell you, there's nothing so warm as the welcomes that have been rolled out for me by Rotaractors. These are young people who are committed to Rotary ideals, who are pouring their hearts into service, and who, in the process, don't forget to have fun.

One of the highlights of my recent travels was a trip to Ghana, where I visited a district that boasts some 60 Rotaract clubs. They aren't satisfied with that number, though - in fact, they're excited about a plan to double it. They'll do it, too.

Rotaractors are vaccinating children against polio. They're donating blood where the supply is dangerously low. They're providing handwashing facilities to schools where children previously had no way to get clean. In short, they're all about transformational service: carrying out projects that make a real difference in their communities.

In Nakivale, Uganda, one special Rotaract club is making a difference in its community — which happens to be a refugee settlement. These young leaders are turning what others might see as disadvantages into opportunities for service, building community and opening up new possibilities to those who are most in need of them.

In Turkey, Rotaractors are visiting children in the hospital every Wednesday to lift their spirits by playing games with them. They also are mentoring new students at their teaching university and them leadership skills.

Rotaractors are blazing the path for Rotary to be more relevant in this new century of service. And World Rotaract Week, which we're celebrating 11-17 March, is the perfect opportunity to get to know your local Rotaractors and talk to them about how your clubs can work together. If your Rotary club doesn't already sponsor a Rotaract club, know that you don't need to be near a college or university to do it: Community-based Rotaract clubs are a great option. And remember that Rotaractors are part of the Rotary family.

When Rotaractors are ready to leave their Rotaract club, we don't want them to leave that Rotary family behind. I'm asking all Rotarians to help them make the transition into a Rotary club or to start a new one: I'm happy to charter as many new clubs as we need to give everyone a place where they feel at home while making the world a little better. Service should be fun, it should be inspirational, and it should be open to all.

If there's one thing Rotary has always excelled at, it's diversity. In the past, that often meant diversity of profession, nationality, and outlook. We've made great strides when it comes to diversity of age and gender, and as we welcome more Rotaractors into our organization, we'll become even stronger.

Rotary is powerful. Together with Rotaract, it is unstoppable. Working side by side, we have the potential to Be the Inspiration in every part of society, to every person we meet.

Last fall, I paid a visit to a hospital in the rown of Jekabpils, in Lateria, Is's a trusterm historial, and the deterors and names there are caring, declotated, and skilled. But despite all their hand work, the material mortality rate at the hospital had remained stubbornly high, due to a factor that was beyond their control a lack of visal diagnostic equiptment and even basic items like inculiators.

The Aloha Diaper Bank was formed to provide the solution. I was privileged to attend Moms On A Mission's Aloha Diaper Bank fundraiser where money was raised to provide a substantial number of diapers. And there will be a continual need.

The people who know me best — my family — know that my passion for Rotary is boundless. They also know that I don't expect them to get involved in Rotary the way I have. It's a choice that's up to them. But I must admit, I can't help smiling when I see them making the right choice.
