# At Rotary International

ROTARY ANNOUNCES US\$100 MILLION TO ERADICATE POLIO - EVANSTON, Ill - June 10, 2019

Rotary is giving US\$100 million in grants to support the global effort to end polio, a vaccine-preventable disease that once paralyzed hundreds of thousands of children each year.

The funding comes as Rotary and its partners in the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI) address the final—and most pressing—challenges to ending poliovirus transmission, and as Nigeria approaches three years without any reported cases of wild poliovirus, bringing the Africa region closer to polio-free status.

"We have the wild poliovirus cornered in the smallest geographic area in history, and now there are just two countries that continue to report cases of the wild virus," said Michael K. McGovern, chair of Rotary's International PolioPlus Committee. "As we work with our partners to apply innovative new strategies to reach more children, and embrace lessons learned thus far, Rotary is doubling down on our commitment to end polio for good. I'm optimistic that the end of polio is within our grasp, but we must remain vigilant in rallying global political and financial support as we push towards a polio-free world."

While there were only 33 cases of wild poliovirus reported in 2018, the last mile of eradication has proven to be the most difficult. Barriers to eradication--like weak health systems, insecurity, and mobile and remote populations--must be overcome. As long as a single child has polio, all children are at risk, which underscores the need for continued funding and commitment to eradication.

To support polio eradication efforts in endemic countries, Rotary is allocating half the funds it announced today to: Afghanistan (\$16.3 million), Nigeria (\$10.2 million), and Pakistan (\$25.2million). Additional funding will support efforts to keep other vulnerable countries polio-free.

#### Alexandra Ruff & Kea Clebsch - Winners: Kealakehe - 2019 West Hawaii Science Fair



The 'Alala or Hawaian Crow can live up to 20 years or more. They're endemic to the Island of Hawaii and have been extinct in the wild. Their population began dwindling due to habitat loss and feral predators in the 1900's, and. by "2002, the last wild individuals, a single pair, occupied less than 20 square kilometers of habitat on the western slope of Mauno Loa. Numerous organizations have been working over the years to reintroduce the

'Alala into the wild by breeding them in captivity, and restoring areas of their natural habitat. There are current reintroductions to the wild currently taking place in Pu'u Maka'ala. However, 'Alala rehabilitation organizations have been trying to find new places to release the 'Alala that is more within the birds' historical range of living. We hope to contribute to this cause by figuring out if Kaloko is a suitable place for the 'Alala to be released.

Mark Daniel Maloney is a principal in the law firm of Blackburn, Maloney, and Schuppert LLC, with a focus

# At Rotary International

Rotary International announced on 3 June a three-year partnership renewal with its disaster relief project partner, ShelterBox. For almost 20 years, this unique humanitarian alliance has supported families with a place to call home after disaster.

Rotary is a global network whose members take action to make a lasting difference in their communities - and worldwide. ShelterBox provides emergency shelters and other essential items to support families who have lost their homes in disaster.

What began as a local connection with one Cornish Rotary Club has led to an international movement that's provided 140,000 ShelterBox family tents or 390,000 ShelterKits worldwide to date (a value of over £54 million).

First adopted as a millennium project by the Rotary Club of Helston-Lizard in 2000, the support of Rotary members and clubs around the world saw ShelterBox become Rotary's Project Partner in Disaster Relief in 2012. Since then, the partnership has helped transform Shelter-Box into an internationally recognized disaster relief charity, supporting families with emergency shelter after disaster.

The partnership extends far beyond financial support. Around 1,000 Rotary members are involved in ShelterBox as volunteers, staff or response team members. And clubs worldwide offer valuable, practical assistance to help ShelterBox reach more families fleeing disaster or conflict.

This has recently included support for families in Malawi flooded from their homes by Cyclone Idai and communities in Lombok devastated by the 2018 earthquake and tsunami (quotes and details at the end of this release).

"ShelterBox has been Rotary's Project Partner in Disaster Relief since 2012, and we are excited to renew the partnership for another three years," says Rotary International General Secretary John Hewko.

# President's Position



Eric Kaler D5000 District Governor

Eric was first introduced to Rotary in 2000 upon moving to Bali, Indonesia. There he joined the Rotary Club of Bali Nusa Dua. As with most of us, Eric saw the connections and network of Rotary as a way to build trust and relationships with the prominent business people in the area. He naturally also became involved in both the community service and international service projects that the club was engaged with.

In late 2002, when the Bali Bombing attacks occurred, Rotarians in Bali stepped in to help. Through this tragedy, Eric saw first-hand the ability for Rotary, as a volunteer and humanitarian organization, to help in ways that the local Government wasn't able to. Local Rotarians started a coordination website for people from around the world who wanted to help the Balinese people in their greatest time of need. The funds raised were enough to back several short- and long-term projects for humanitarian aid to the Bali community. It was in this environment that Eric became Treasurer, President Elect, and President for the Rotary Club of Bali Nusa Dua in RY 2004-05.

# At Rotary International – What's all the Buzz about Bees?



Recently, Rotaract clubs throughout Germany were looking for a signature project and decided to concentrate on the environment. After watching a Swiss documentary on bees, "More than honey," one Rotaractor became passionate about focusing our attention on protecting these little superheroes. Did you know, for instance, that wild bees are responsible for pollinating more than 80 percent of our crops and wild plants? We can't survive without them.

Most of the dangers to bees are man-made. Climate change, monotonous agricultural landscapes, and pesticides are just a few of the many reasons why our little yellow friends are dying in ever-increasing numbers.

With the project "BeeAlive" German Rotaractors began to support wild bees by building bee hotels, educating people about the threat to the bee population, and sowing wildflower meadows. All German Rotaract clubs participated, starting with the most northern club of Flensburg, which visited a beekeeper with their sponsor Rotary club. The southern-most Rotaract club in Germany, Kempten Allgäu, planted a meadow of more than 32,000 square feet for bees to pollinate.

# From the Archives - July 27, 2001




As the Internet revolution gains momentum, Rotarians are preparing to make the most of cutting edge technology. Rotary founder, Paul Harris, often pondered the impact of technology on society in general, and this organization in particular. Writing in the 1940s, he described how "great steamships bridged the seas to advance understanding and good-will sponsored by Rotary." He looked ahead to predict that Rotary conventions soon would assemble under "skies full of planes from all the cities of the world."

"Nothing but good can come of such meetings of men united in the common ideal of service," he observed of the enhanced communication opportunities made possible by technology.

If only Paul Harris had lived long enough to see the advent of e-mail, the Internet and the World Wide Web — there's little doubt he quickly would have recognized their potential to help Rotarians more effectively carry out RI's humanitarian mission.

# Profiles in Rotary – Janice Gustin



I was born and mostly raised in Long Beach, California. So beach and ocean have always been my special place. At the end of my first year in High School, my Father was transferred to Santa Barbara, California. I wasn't thrilled with the move because I was finally enjoying school, but the move turned out to be life changing for me.

My size has been a major part in defining who I am today through the good and the bad. As a kid, I was doted on by a Grandmother who felt I shouldn't be allowed to do things because I was too small. That

naturally meant I had to prove that I could do things despite being small. One example would be mowing the lawn. In those days the only lawn mowers were push mowers, and it was big as me, but I proved I could do it and regularly mowed the lawn!

I stopped growing around 10 or 11 years old. The biggest negative of my size were the kids who taunted me as "skinny" all through elementary and junior high school. Because of the negative attention I was a very shy withdrawn child.

So, when I say I was finally enjoying school, what it really means is that my size, once I reached high school age, was finally looked at as unique and fun.

My parents, in their many attempts to "draw me out" of my shy shell, enrolled my sister and I in the Rainbow Girls Masonic organization. Once we transferred to the Santa Barbara chapters, this was the organization that totally changed my life. Since my size was now fun, it drew positive attention from my peers and their parents and I made lots of friends. Rainbow girls drew me out of my shell, helped me develop confidence in myself and as I moved up the "ranks" to "president" it taught me leadership skills.

Santa Barbara is a beautiful town with hills and oceans much as we have here, and I found peace and contentment along with my new found confidence. And more importantly, I found Jim and we married in Santa Barbara in 1970 after I graduated from Santa Barbara City College.

To continue our college educations we moved back to the Long Beach area after we got married. I enrolled at Long Beach State College. After living in the small community of Santa Barbara, a big state college was too overwhelming and the teaching degree I was looking for, was "a dime a dozen" in those days. So I had to figure out Plan B.

I was interested in the dental field because I had spent most of my life in dental chairs with dentists and orthodontists trying to figure out how to get my very overcrowded teeth to line up and look good. Note – another side effect of my petite size that I had to overcome. In the 70's licensing dental assistants was developing as a new field. If you got a certificate in a 2 year course, you could perform some of the dentist's duties on the patient. This was my Plan B.

I graduated from the dental program at Long Beach City College in 1972, and worked in a dental office for 3 years before we decided we'd had enough of the big city. My Father had been transferred to Sacramento, so we moved as well.

I found a small dental office to work for in the suburbs of Sacramento. I was the only staff for a while, so assisted and managed the reception desk. I worked with this dentist for 5 years before moving to another dental office in Sacramento. I worked and managed Dr. Schauer's dental office for 10 years. I left only because we went cruising on our sailboat. Computers were rare in dental offices at this time, but Dr. Schauer wanted me to set the office up on computer before I left to go cruising. This learning experience, of setting up computers, was valuable to me many times over in the years to follow. I still have a great relationship with Dr. Schauer and his family today.





# Profiles in Rotary - Janice Gustin (cont)

For our first retirement, Jim and I left San Francisco in October of 1990 and began our 6 year adventure of sailing all around the Pacific, which is a long story in itself. On Christmas Eve of 1996, we sailed into Guam's harbor to return to work and refill the dwindled coffers. Thus ended our first retirement!

On Guam I worked for the Seventh Day Adventist Medical Clinic in their dental department. I was hired to set them up with computers to allow that department to become independent from the rest of the clinic. They wanted to be able to do their own collections, bill insurance, make appointments and begin changing to paperless patient records. This took me 2 years to find software, get the computers, hire and train the staff. It was really rewarding to see it all come together. Since experienced dental assistants were hard to find, I also taught dental assisting and managed the staff of 30 until we left in 2003 and moved to the Big Island.

After the stress of managing the large dental clinic on Guam, I was ready for something simpler and less stressful and nothing dental! For about 9 months, I worked for the residential lending department at Bank Of Hawaii but the position was eliminated. In my search for something else, I interviewed with Century 21 All Islands for a manager position but did not initially get the job. When I saw the broker in Wal Mart one evening, he mentioned the person he hired didn't work out. He also said he did not hire me because of my size (there it is again). He said I would need to be able to move printers and copiers to take them out for repairs and he didn't think I could manage. Jim asked him if he could lift his own weight, he said no, and Jim told him I could lift my own weight. He laughed and liked the spunk and I got the job.

I worked for Century 21 All Islands for 9 years. By then Jim's fitness repair business had grown so much, I retired to help Jim with his business. He was the only one on island installing and repairing fitness equipment, so he had a nice niche. We sold the business to our nephew and on January 1, 2017, and we are now officially retired (our 2nd retirement,) and now focusing on giving back to the community.


# From the Archives - August 2, 2001

## Profiles in Rotary -



I was born in Melrose Park, Illinois in 1945. My father had severe arthritis and it was recommended that he move to a warmer climate. So when I was 3, we moved to Tucson, Arizona.

At the age of 5 I developed polio and thus began lots of rehab and lots of missed school. But I was lucky in the extent of my polio and through all the rehab and hard work, I was thrilled to be able to be a pole vaulter and a long jumper in my senior year of high school, and I won the award for the most fit non lettering student.

My father worked at the YMCA and some of my rehab was through the YMCA, so it flowed naturally that I would become involved with YMCA as a counselor for camps and I taught archery, swimming, rifle range, and crafts as an all around staff member. After one semester at university, I knew I needed to do something else. I went down to the recruiting offices and met with the different services branches, and decided to join the Marine Corps.

I entered boot camp in January 1965, and if boot camp wasn't hard enough, my Mother passed away during that time, making it really hard because you are never given time to grief. In the later part of my 3 years in the Marines, I would also lose my Dad. After boot camp, I was sent to Kaneohe Marine Base for pre Vietnam training. My time at Kaneohe Bay counted as overseas time, so I only had to do 9 months in Vietnam. I entered Vietnam by dropping from a helicopter, and would later be very sorry for showing off how well I could swim. Since my superiors knew I could swim well, I had to lead and move equipment across a river while being shot at. I was lucky that my time on the front ended up being short. The fact that I had typing in high school was that unforeseen piece of luck. My Sargent, who was transferred to the supply station, took me with him because of that typing class.

My strong interest was photography, so after serving my time in the Marines, I used the GI bill and went to Brooks Institute of Photography in Santa Barbara, California and earned my BA of Fine Arts. During those years in Santa Barbara, Janice and I met and married in 1970 and moved to Long Beach, CA. In 1971 I went to work in a local camera store, in Long Beach. I managed their photo lab, processing all aspects black and white film. My photography interest was focused around commercial photography, not portrait or wedding photography. When the opportunity came in 1972, I went to work for a company that produced slide presentations for TV commercials, lectures, and training programs for large corporations. It was a fun job, but computers were changing the photography world. Corporations were turning to Powerpoint instead of slide presentations. To stay in this field, I would need to live in San Francisco or New York and we decided we did not want to live in a "big city".

We moved to Sacramento 1975 and I began my search for a job in something other than photography. I am mechanically inclined so, initially went to work for the U-Haul company. My job was to establish new dealers and to service the equipment at the dealers I represented.

In 1979 I went to work in the parts department, for a Mazda and Volkswagen dealership. I spent some of my time at the parts counter in the dealership, and some time outside the office doing sales to establish new accounts for the parts department. I was employed there for 10 years until the business sold.

At that time Janice and I lived on our boat in the San Francisco Bay, so I took a one year job at the parts department of an auto dealership in San Francisco. At the end of the one year time, Janice and I left on our boat to cruise the South Pacific Ocean for 6 years. We ended our cruise on December 24th, 1996 on Guam. During our 6 years on Guam, I returned to working auto parts. I worked at a dealership for a couple years, then switched

to a company that did wholesale tires and batteries. I represented several facilities on island selling and maintaining their supply of batteries and tires. The most enjoyable and biggest account was keeping the Navy Commissary supplied with batteries and tires.

We moved to the Big Island in March 2003, where I completed my courses to become a Personal Trainer and went to work for Gold's Gym. My mechanical abilities also helped with repairing the fitness equipment at Gold's Gym. Occasionally people and resorts would call Gold's Gym for someone who could look at their fitness equipment and I would agree to go look. I started looking at resort equipment in 2004 and the Fairmont was my first client.

When Gold's Gym went away, I went to work for Lex Brodie's and did Personal Training for clients in their homes. The fitness repair business continued to grow and I established contracts with manufactures to install equipment and do their warranty work. Since I was the only person on island repairing and installing fitness equipment, the business steadily grew and I was able to leave Lex Brodie's to go completely on my own. I would see personal training clients early in the morning and repair equipment the rest of the day. Eventually Janice would leave her employment to help me as well. I was an avid cyclist, but have been hit by cars twice, once in 2010 and then again in December 2014. Due to those accidents it was challenging for me to continue to work, so my nephew and his Air Force buddy purchased the business and took over January 1, 2018.

I am now officially retired from the fitness repair business, but still do a bit of Personal Training. Now I have time to give back to the community that has served me well. I do still enjoy hearing about my old business and sharing with my nephew. I think it will always be a part of me.

# At Rotary International -

WATER PROJECT UNITES LEBANON CLUBS ACROSS ALL DIVIDES



A project to provide clean water to all of Lebanon's schools is uniting leaders from many of the country's diverse religious, cultural, and political divisions.

In 2011, Rotary members in northern Lebanon decided to install new tanks and water filters in a few nearby schools with the help of a Rotary Foundation grant. The idea caught on and a few other clubs followed suit.

Two years later, District 2452 Governor Jamil Mouawad and other district leaders saw the potential of creating one giant water project that could reach every school and involve all 24 of the country's Rotary clubs. They formed a committee to handle publicity and gather technical knowledge, while each club was asked to provide volunteers, contribute funds, apply for grants, and secure contributions from outside organizations.

"Every student has the right to drink clean water. It goes without saying that clean drinking water leads to less diseases, healthier students, and consequently, better education," says Mouawad. "The bigger the challenge, the greater its positive impact on humanity."

While clean water is the main objective, the leaders also saw the effort as a means of helping heal Lebanon's long history of sectarian strife. A civil war divided the country from 1975 to 1990, leaving an estimated 120,000 people dead. In recent years, Lebanon's government is a shifting coalition of religions, political parties, and sects.

Lina Shehayeb, president of the Rotary Club of Aley, is a Druze by faith. Shehayeb says working alongside club members who are Catholic, Maronite, Greek Orthodox, Armenian Orthodox, and Muslim to promote the project has deepened her understanding of those with different religious or political views.

"We are building peace and understanding," she says. "There has never been anything quite like this in our country."

# Just for Fun - Doing Business in Hawaii



I moved to Hawaii 18 years ago fully intending to retire, or at least semi-retire. The plan was to spend my days relaxing in paradise. I looked forward to leisurely days of sipping mai-tais on the lanai and reading all the books I'd never had time for. I eagerly anticipated dabbling in the workshop, on fun projects previously abandoned or not yet begun. I envisioned Saturdays on the tennis court and Sundays at the beach. It was a good plan, structured yet flexible, designed to stimulate mind and body yet avoid anxiety and stress. And it would have worked except for one minor glitch: reality. It turns out, that as wonderful a

place as Hawaii is to live, affordable it is not. My nest egg turned out to be not much nest and even less egg. My retirement plans were shelved; I went back to work; and having been self-employed for over 25 years and thus completely unemployable, I started a business (actually more than one).

The first of many businesses was a snorkel and beach gear rental shop. Off the beaten path, with little money for marketing and lots of competition, the shop lasted about a year. I like to think of the experience as an \$80,000, 12 month, non-credit (pardon the pun), postgraduate course entitled "How Not To Do Business in Hawaii." It was proof of the popular Hawaiian adage, which we all seem destined to learn the hard way: "the way to make a small fortune in Hawaii is to start with a large one."

The second business, a faltering attempt to salvage the first business, was a modest visitor magazine about the beaches and activities available on the Big Island, named in a moment of inspiration, The Beach and Activity Guide to the Big Island. A surprisingly popular publication, our first print run, which we could afford, lasted about three days. Our next print run, which we couldn't, lasted nearly five times as long. The BAG, as we affectionately called it, was our introduction to the all-too-common and universally dreaded Hawaii phenomenon, "the almost-success." Unlike real success, which can provide a living, if not fame and fortune, and unlike dismal failure, which provides a valuable lesson and allows one to move on, almost-success is a cunning creature that resembles real success, yet at the end of the day, or year, or decade, leaves you with little cash, little confidence, and little else.

Many businesses followed. A larger visitor magazine, twice expanded and once reinvented, was a real success. Eventually it was sold, unfortunately to an unscrupulous investor who had neither much cash nor the least hint of a clue. The business was a success; the sale was a dismal failure. We learned our lesson and moved on. A restaurant-and-shops discount program, complete with colorful brochure and embossed plastic membership card, was an almost-success: three rounds, three draws, no harm, no foul, no cigar. A luxury vacation rental property had it all. Real success for a while, admittedly a short while, almost-success for a while longer, and eventually, dismal failure. Another postgraduate course completed (you don't want to know the tuition), another lesson learned, another opportunity for onward moving.

Today my business is marketing. Coupled with graphic design and publishing, it has all the markings of success. With lots of hard work, a little help from friends and family, and a little upturn in the economy, I might be able to retire, or semi-retire, in just a few more years, only 20 years or so behind schedule. I shouldn't feel bad: unofficial statistics indicate that of all the people who move to Hawaii and start a business, 50% to 60% give up and leave the islands within a year, usually having been very successful in making a "small fortune in Hawaii."

With this in mind, and for all those who move to Hawaii with such dreams, my marketing company makes this amazing offer: "We guarantee to save you 75% of your first-year startup costs in any new business." Normally our methodology is a closely held secret, but I will divulge it here for the very first time. First we prepare for you a thoroughly researched and meticulously delineated business plan for the first year, carefully calculating all costs associated with the first-year operation, including a specific exit strategy. Then we implement the exit strategy. You cut us a check for 25% of those calculated costs, and we buy you a ticket home.

# At Rotary International - Right at Home



In December 2002, after 25 years of homelessness, drug addiction, and time in prison, Alan Evans was desperate. Alan Evans is a member of the Rotary Club of Seaside, Oregon. He had been contemplating suicide. Instead, he decided to get arrested again. So he made some fake checks on his computer and tried to cash them at a grocery store in Seaside, on the Oregon coast. When Evans got caught, Sergeant Mark Whistler of the Clatsop County Sheriff's Department recognized the crime for what it was: a cry for help.

Whistler told him, "You're not a bad person. You're just sick." He urged Evans to get help. Evans took the advice and got clean. In 2004, Evans started anonprofit called Thugz Off Drugz that offered services to other ex-con-victs who were struggling with homelessness and addiction. But after the economic crash in 2008, he started to see a new group of people — people who had never been in trouble with the law or involved with drugs. "The face of homelessness changed then," Evans says. "Average people were falling out of the system."

Evans realized that he needed to make some changes to the program. For one thing, the name didn't fit anymore - not with senior citizens and moms and children in need of help. And it needed to serve more people. In 2004, the organization ran one shelter with eight beds. Today, it's called Helping Hands and it operates 11 facilities with more than 200 beds in four Oregon counties.

One of the members of the Helping Hands board, Mike Caruso, was a Rotarian, and in 2008, Caruso invited Evans to a District 5100 conference to try to persuade Rotary to help his organization. At the conference, Evans saw a video about polio eradication and decided to join Rotary.

"I wanted to be like that," he says. "I had spent my life surviving and wanting to change, and I didn't realize that change happens when we give." Evans joined the club in 2010. This June, he finished a stint as club president.

"When I first joined Rotary, I was scared to death. I didn't ever think I would be accepted by this group of people," Evans says. "But I was wrong. I was welcomed with open arms, and this is my family now.

MAUNA KEA ASTRONOMY EDUCATION CENTER George Jacob is the Project Director of the \$28 million Mauna Kea Astronomy Education Center being planned at the University of Hawaii in Hilo. Mr. Jacob was educated at the University of Toronto and the Birla Institute of Technology & Science with degrees in Physics, Museum Studies

and Industrial Design. He has over 16 years of museum planning and design experience, having worked on assignment in 11 countries. He trained at the Smithsonian Institution and has held many senior positions including the Directorship of a Planetarium and Science museum complex and most recently as the Vice President of Exhibits and Design

at the Oregon Museum of Science and Industry. He has served on the Board of Commonwealth Association of Museums, UNESCO affiliate, under the aegis of the Commonwealth Foundation in London, UK and is one of the leading museum professionals of our times. The final campus plan will of course depend on the conceptual plan which is still under development. In general terms, however, it is very likely to include a planetarium, theater, exhibits, class rooms, offices, a restaurant and gift shop.

# Profiles in Rotary - George Francis Collins, 1921 - 2004

EARLY DAYS - Excerpt from The Manoa Gang, published 12/15/2014



Our first house was on Lanihuli Drive at the top of Punahou Street in Mänoa. I remember a large bank of Mexican creepers (flowers) on the street side of the house. On the other side of the house was a lane with the Mänoa tennis courts just beyond. The Mexican creepers were full of bees, so of course I learned at an early age that bees sting!

My first recollection of a happening, even before I went to Miss Maxwell's preschool on Kewalo Street, was my being

thrown out of a car, through the windshield, as the result of an accident on the corner of Punahou and Wilder Streets. I was in my mother's lap, my father driving, when Dick razier's sister, who was intoxicated, drove across the street and banged into us. No safety glass or seat belts in those days. Dr. Alsup picked glass out of my head and wrapped the whole top of it up in gauze. The accident occurred at night and I could hardly wait for the

next day to go out and show off my bandaged head to the neighbor17 hood.

Our neighbors next door were Auntie Alice and Uncle Emil Waterman. Uncle Emil ran a tobacco store downtown. After 1932, and the repeal of prohibition, Mr. Waterman opened a liquor store. My dad used to get his straw-wrapped Perrier water, Poland-brand gin, and Pilsner Urquell beer from him. Being an only child, I had to develop fun and games on my own sometimes. I remember one day I was fooling around with a sprinkler on the front lawn while my mother played bridge on the länai with some lady friends. One of the women asked, "Georgie wouldn't throw that thing in here, would he'?" My mother replied, "Oh, no; he would never do a thing like that." Of course I did just that. Wet the ladies good! Hard shot, too, because you had to get whatever you were throwing over the lower lanai railing and between some huge baskets of maidenhair fern which were dangling from above.

Speaking of maidenhair fern, my mother was noted for her beautiful ferns, for which I was largely responsible. She used to mix my wee wee with water and sprinkle the ferns with it. Something to do with urine from a virgin. An old wives' tale, I'm sure. While living on Lanihuli Drive, we had a Japanese maid by the name of Misae. She tried to discipline me for something by rubbing Hawaiian red pepper in my eyes. I didn't like Misae very much. When I was about to enter the first grade, the family moved farther up in Mänoa Valley to a new home on Kahawai Street. It was a beautiful place on a hill overlooking taro patches and rice fields that grew all the way up the valley. No houses or streets to mar the view.

By 1930 the rice was almost all gone, and taro was all but eliminated a short time later. When I was a little older, the dried-up ditches provided great trenches for our World War I 'over the top' war games. We actually used Daisy BB guns (Benjamin pumps were not allowed), but quit when one boy was hit in the eye with a BB. Fortunately not too seriously. Then we discovered another game for BB guns. There were a lot of kids who lived near us on lower Mänoa Road and so we declared war on them. We used to get them on the run, we with our guns and they with rocks. Of course, we felt we were the winners because of our superior firepower. Some of the older boys in the neighborhood also played war with BB guns. Johnny Nash and I were spies for both sides. We were double agents, don't you know. Finally we got caught and were "shot!"

George was a long time Rotarian and good friend. He is sorely missed.



# At Rotary International – Nigeria Reaches Polio Milestone



It's been three years since health officials last reported a case of polio caused by the wild poliovirus in Nigeria. The milestone, reached on 21 August, means that it's possible for the entire World Health Organization (WHO) African region to be certified wild poliovirus-free next year. Nigeria's success is the result of several sustained efforts, including domestic and international financing, the commitment of thousands of health workers, and strategies to immunize children who previously couldn't be reached because of a lack

of security in the country's northern states.

"Rotary, its Global Polio Eradication Initiative partners, and the Nigerian government have strengthened immunization and disease detection systems," says Michael K. McGovern, chair of Rotary's International PolioPlus Committee. He adds: "We are now reaching more children than ever in some of the hardest-to-reach places in Nigeria." McGovern says Rotary members in Nigeria play an important role in ridding the country of the disease. "Rotarians have been hard at work raising awareness for polio eradication, advocating with the government, and addressing other basic health needs to complement polio eradication efforts, like providing clean water to vulnerable communities"

Nigeria is the last country in Africa where polio is endemic. Once Africa is certified as free of the wild poliovirus, five of the WHO's six regions will be free of wild polio. Polio remains endemic in Afghanistan and Pakistan, which means transmission of the virus has never been stopped. Dr. Tunji Funsho, chair of Rotary's Nigeria National PolioPlus Committee, acknowledges the milestone but cautions Rotary members about celebrating too soon. He cites the challenge of making certain that routine immunizations reach every child in Nigeria. "It's paramount that we ensure all doors are locked to the re-entry of the wild poliovirus into our country," says Funsho.

Funsho says to achieve this, Rotary needs to maintain strong advocacy efforts, continue to increase awareness of immunization campaigns, and ensure members raise necessary funds. Rotary has contributed \$268 million to fight polio in Nigeria. "As the first organization to dream of a polio-free world, Rotary is committed to fulfilling our promise," says McGovern. "Our progress in Nigeria is a big step toward that goal, but we need to maintain momentum so that Pakistan and Afghanistan see the same level of progress."

### Just for Fun - Moving to Hawaii



I visited Hawaii eight times before deciding to move here. I visited four times with my first wife, three times with my second wife, and once with my third wife. Eight times to Oahu, three times to Maui, once to Kauai, and twice to the Big Island, where I decided to make my home 18 years ago. Life here has been always interesting, sometimes challenging, occasionally sad, and for the most part fun.

Arriving with third wife, minimal clothing (it was Hawaii after all), no furniture, nor anyplace to put any, and little cash; we booked an "affordable, private, rustic, time-honored" hotel for our first few days in paradise. We knew the Kona Surf was on Alii Drive; we didn't know where. We crept along the Drive for hours discovering that every other hotel and condo was named Kona this or Kona that or Kona Alii something or Kona Kai something else. We were sure we had finally arrived when we came to the Kona Surf and Racquet; we hadn't. Of course the Kona Surf was the very last hotel on the strip. Affordable, it turned out, meant not very. Rustic, it turned out, meant, literally, lots of rust. Private, it turned out, meant not near anything, and time-honored, it turned out, meant old and weathered and weary; not just the hotel, but also the staff.

Fortunately, about a week and a few pizzas later (the pizza guy, coincidentally, became an employee years later, but that's another story), we found a house to rent. The gated community was impressive, the lot was pretty, if a bit neglected, the view was magnificent. The house was a disaster. It had been vacant, but not unoccupied, for several months after being vacated by a family who were, shall we say, not very tidy. The new occupants included a mongoose, one or two feral cats, one or two dozen geckos, a few transient turkeys, and a plethora of assorted and various insects and spiders. We were convinced the network of spider webs was designed to trap large rodents and small children. The spiders (harmless cane spiders, we later learned) looked big enough to devour toddlers, if not all at once then leisurely, perhaps "with some fava beans and a nice bottle of chianti."

We nearly didn't rent the "spider house," at first. Deciding that the house was just too trashed and too expensive, we told the owners, a lovely couple who lived in Florida and had built the house to live in, but never did, that we needed to keep looking. A few hours of looking at houses that were even more expensive and rather trashy, if not trashed, convinced us of the potential of "Casa de la Spider." Unfortunately, by the time we got back to them, the owners had agreed to rent the house to a family that had been living on the beach (a family, coincidentally, that we met years later and found to be very weird; but that's another story). It took nearly an hour of compelling reasoning and brilliant negotiation to convince them that we would be better tenants. Or it may have been my promise to fix up the house for free and my agreement to forward a deposit and first month's rent by electronic transfer; that turned the trick.

Having successfully obtained our new home in paradise, we moved into "Hale Spider" the very next day. The first order of business being a careful analysis of the work to be done, I soon realized that the majority was cleaning and painting. Most of the basic systems and appliances were, if not new or clean, at least in working order. Some hardware needed replacing and some trim, having been omitted from the initial construction, needed placing (I suspect that when the intended owners left for Florida, the punch list got real short). I did discover, however, that the heating system in the house was not of any type with which I was familiar. Recently retired from several years of being an architect and builder in Vermont, I found it odd that none of the conventional systems that I had utilized for years were being utilized here. After an extensive search of the house and property, I finally concluded that the heating had to be a radiant system, with electric coils buried in the concrete slab. It was the only thing that made sense. It still bothered me, however, that I couldn't locate the thermostat.

# At Rotary International – Women's Leadership Skills



Kathleen Rose: I attended the Rotary International Convention in Hamburg, Germany, in June, to widen my own leadership experience as I prepare to serve as club president next year. I was asked to present a breakout session entitled Women's Leadership Skills: Strengthening Our Rotary Legacy. What an experience! Although I have been a scholar of leadership for many years, have written on the subject often, and have had the opportunity to speak nationally, it was a thrill to present to an international audience of Rotary leaders who are clearly motivated change agents.

If ever there were a time to focus on the work of leadership, the development of leadership skills, and the debate around qualified leadership, it is now. Especially for women. It's time to deepen our commitment to Rotary's values through service, innovation, and setting priorities that reflect the needs of our communities. We need to build new relationships that will strengthen the impact of Rotary worldwide.

I have found that women leaders today who are ready to do the thoughtful work around change share the following attributes:

- They understand the importance of human connection away from technology and keep it as a priority.
- They are curious and creative and ask questions that lead to comprehension.
- They look beyond the obvious and provide solutions by using a systems-based ideology that help others stay engaged.
- They are unafraid of transparency in voice and action, and are willing to care for others with authenticity.
- They share their personal growth stories...but in alignment with the growth they experience in the workplace. Les sons are real and meaningful.
- They take purposeful actions and show emotional intelligence in practice, rarely apologizing for showing both strength and emotion in making key decisions.

There are many examples of this type of leadership in the Rotary world. One of my favorite examples is Stephanie Woollard, founder and CEO of Seven Women. In 2006, Stephanie met with seven disabled women working in a tin shed in Kathmandu, and with the last \$200 in her possession, paid for a trainer to teach the women how to produce products for sale locally and abroad. Her potential and leadership was recognized by Rotary in 2016 when she was accepted into the Rotary Peace Fellowship program. Stephanie took purposeful action based upon recognizing a need, and developed a solution that was sustainable with a supportable system that gained strength and momentum over time

# Profiles in Rotary - David C. Rees-Thomas



#### David with a Prospective New Member.

I was born in Wellington, New Zealand, premature but feisty - a war baby whose father was a training officer for the Army (artillery). For the first seven years my growing family lived with our grandparents and although we often had an absent dad, my grandfather was an excellent mentor for this very active little boy. He taught me the value of being generous but frugal, a love for reading and a curiosity to expand my knowl-

edge of the world. Also, the importance of speaking simply but well. He paid for my tuition at a private school where I learned leadership skills and good manners. Although I was weak on the academic side of my education I excelled in the athletic world: cross country running champion; 100, 220, 440 yards sprint champion; boxing and last but not least rugby. My greatest thrill was playing a curtain raiser as a school boy, representing the north Island vs the South Island, before the All Blacks played South Africa.

As a child I always had faith and loved to attend church. At thirteen I experienced a call to enter the ministry. In my formative years I never deviated from this goal that burned within my heart. I wanted to serve God and people.

In 1959 at age 19, I left New Zealand on an Italian immigrant ship for England. All I had was \$100 in my pocket but an assurance that somehow God would provide. I had been accepted at a training college in London for pastors. A five-year course that was academic and yet very practical. It was there I met my wife Eliane Olivetti, from Switzerland. What struck me about her, was her gentleness and strength. (She was also a devoted student having studied in Paris gaining a degree in education.) Three years later we were married in Geneva, Switzerland.

It was the journey of a life time. We will never forget the kindness and generosity of the American people. The abundance and variety of food, hamburger stands, milk shakes and French fries. Open hearts, homes and hospitality. We met the rich and the poor. We felt the heartbeat of a changing nation. It was the land of the free. After nearly seven years living in England the contrast of life was starkly amazing.


#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

# At Rotary International – Rotarian Rides Aqain



On his way from his home in California to the Rotary International Convention in Hamburg, Germany, Edwin Velarde took an unusual detour. Edwin Velarde is a member of the Rotary Club of Westlake Village, California. In an effort to raise awareness of diabetes, Velarde, 57, rode a bicycle for the last leg of his trip, cycling 525 miles from London to Hamburg. After making stops along the way to visit Rotary clubs and talk about the impact of diabetes, he arrived on 31 May after 13 days of riding. He spoke to clubs in the United Kingdom, France, Belgium, the Netherlands, and Germany.

This was not the first time Velarde, a board member of the Rotarian Action Group for Diabetes, had cycled to a convention. "I thought I could create awareness by riding to conventions," says Velarde, who was diagnosed with type 1 diabetes when he was 29. He biked from Busan to Seoul, Korea, in 2016, from Chicago to Atlanta in 2017, and from Rotary headquarters in Evanston, Illinois, to Toronto in 2018. This year, the journey had added meaning; Velarde dedicated this ride to his son Davis Edwin Velarde, who died at 22 of lymphoma in April.

Diabetes is a chronic illness that occurs either when the pancreas does not produce insulin (type 1) or when the body cannot effectively use insulin (type 2). When diabetes is not controlled, it can result in severe damage to the eyes, kidneys, and nerves and can double a person's risk of heart attack and stroke. The World Health Organization estimates that the number of people with diabetes rose from 108 million in 1980 to 422 million in 2014.

Several years ago, when Velarde was feeling fatigued and depressed about his illness, a friend gave him a bike. He took it out for a spin. "That ride woke me up to the fact that I was not fit," he recalls. "I realized I wanted to become a cyclist, and not just someone who rides a bike." Velarde's goal is to rally support among Rotarians to find a cure for diabetes, and to spread the word that a healthy lifestyle can help people who have type 2 diabetes better control the illness. "We have what it takes to conquer the diabetes epidemic," he says. "Imagine the 422 million people we could help."

#### President's Position Mark Daniel Maloney RI President



Rotary's long-term, sustained battle against polio has defined our organization for decades. We have a right to be proud of all that we have accomplished through the years.

Our progress is real and noteworthy. In 1988, polio was endemic in 125 countries, with more than 350,000 new cases a year worldwide. Since then, Rotary and our Global Polio Eradication Initiative partners have reduced the incidence of polio by more than 99.9 percent, vaccinated more than 2.5 billion children against the virus, and prevented 18 million cases of paralysis. Over the years, Rotary has helped country after country move into the polio-free column. This includes India, which some considered impossible not long ago. Of the three types of poliovirus, type 2 has been eradicated and type 3 could soon be certified as eradicated. Nigeria has not reported a case of wild poliovirus in nearly three years. If this trend holds, we will be down to just one type of wild poliovirus in only one section of the world, Afghanistan and Pakistan.

There are major challenges in that region. But it is crucial that we remain optimistic. Look at all that we have accomplished so far. This is no time to get discouraged or to think that the task is impossible. We will end polio forever, but only if we remain steadfast and vigilant. World Polio Day is a time for Rotarians from all over the globe to come together, recognize the progress we have made in our fight against polio, and plan the action we must take to end polio forever. The key word is action, because we still have important work to do.

This year, we want to see as many Rotary clubs as possible holding World Polio Day events around the world. Need some ideas? How about organizing a viewing party for friends and club members to watch Rotary's Online Global Update? You could also dedicate a club meeting to World Polio Day or create a fundraising event. Remember, every dollar raised is matched 2-to-1 by the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation.

Once you have created an event, register it at endpolio.org/register-your-event. Then promote it using the World Polio Day toolkit, available at endpolio.org/world-polio-day.

Mark your calendar to tune in to Rotary's World Polio Day Online Global Update on 24 October. This year we will stream our program on Facebook in multiple time zones around the world. Visit the Rotary International Facebook page to RSVP to your region's program. And do not forget to follow the event on social media and share it with your network.

When we reach our goal, polio will become only the second human disease eradicated on the planet, and Rotary will receive international acclaim. But what matters most is the children who will never again have to face this terrible, disabling virus. Rotary must continue to connect the world in the effort toward polio eradication. It is up to us. Let us finish the job.

### Just for Fun - Make Mine Wine



Make no mistake: I am not a connoisseur of fine wine. That is not to say I know nothing about wine. I know most wines are fermented from grapes, except for some specialty wines, which are not, including one wine I know of made in Hawaii, from pineapples. I live in Hawaii, and I like wine, and I like pineapples, so I was confident that I would like pineapple wine. I was wrong. As I remember, it had a pleasant fruity "nose," but a less pleasant, reminiscent-of-tur-

pentine "finish."

I also know that wines are classified as red or white, depending on the color of the grapes from which they are fermented, except not necessarily, because red grapes can be, and often are, made into white wines. Red, of course, isn't necessarily red red. It might also be Rose (pink to us non-connoisseurs), or amber, or Burgundy, or Oxblood, or Sangria, or even gray. White, of course, isn't ever white, as in white like milk. It isn't even ever white, as in clear like water. It's usually yellow, but may be orange, or straw, or vin Rose, or juane, or even gray.

I know that wine usually comes in bottles: Glass bottles, not plastic bottles, although I don't know why not plastic bottles, as wine also comes in boxes, with plastic liners. I don't think fine wine comes in boxes, although I once had a box of Zinfandel that tasted just fine to me. I'm pretty sure wine doesn't come in cans, but it should if for no other reason than allowing us Hawaii dwellers to bring wine to the beach. Bottles being disallowed on Hawaii public beaches, an ice-cold can of Chardonnay would be a perfect complement to a snack of spam musubi.

Yes, Chardonnay is my wine of choice: always served very cold, preferably with lots of ice, and in an insulated plastic cup. Winery and vintage are optional; temperature is not. You might say that my preference confirms that I am less than a connoisseur, but I contend that wine is to be enjoyed, not judged, and I thoroughly enjoy a big glass of Chardonnay, icy cold, served in a cup guaranteed to keep it icy cold until the very last icy drop.

Fortunately, as much as I enjoy my Chardonnay, I never overindulge: not so much by conviction as physiology. One glass of wine and I'm cheerful. Two glasses and I'm conversational; some would say obnoxious, but I prefer conversational. Three glasses and I'm asleep. So unless I start to take my Chardonnay intravenously, three glasses will always be my limit. Granted three, or even two, glasses of wine might make it inadvisable to drive after a night out, but as I have no friends to night out with, it isn't really a problem.

At one time, I fancied myself a wine collector. Being a bit of a computer nerd, I created an elaborate database to track the qualities of the Chardonnay labels and vintages I might try over the years. I had several rating categories, with a 10-point scale for each category. I've since forgotten what the categories were, though I'm sure "nose" and "finish" were among them. It didn't really matter, as whenever I would decide to rate a particular selection, I would fail to do so. Always with the best of intentions, I would drink one glass of the subject wine, only to determine that one glass was not sufficient to reach any conclusions. Therefore, I would drink another glass, reach several conclusions, and expound on them at length. # At Rotary International – The Plus in Polio Plus



Musa Muhammed Ali, a farmer in Borno state, Nigeria, has had to deal with the many ways polio has affected his life. For instance, he used to have to pay for transportation when he needed to buy feed for his animals. But after receiving a hand-operated tricycle funded through Rotary's PolioPlus grants, Ali (pictured above) can now spend that money on other necessities. His life was changed by the plus" in PolioPlus.

When we talk about PolioPlus, we know we are eradicating polio, but do we realize how many added benefits the program brings? The "plus" is something else that is provided as a part of the polio eradication campaign. It might be a hand-operated tricycle or access to water. It might be additional medical treatment, bed nets, or soap. A 2010 study estimates that vitamin A drops given to children at the same time as the polio vaccine have prevented 1.25 million deaths by decreasing susceptibility to infectious diseases.

Polio vaccination campaigns are difficult to carry out in northern Nigeria, where the Boko Haram insurgency has displaced millions of people, leading to malnutrition and spikes in disease. When security allows, health workers diligently work to bring the polio vaccine and other health services to every child, including going tent to tent in camps for displaced people. The health workers pictured here are in Maiduguri, the capital of Borno, where the insurgency began 10 years ago.

Rotary's long-term, sustained battle against polio has defined our organization for decades. We have a right to be proud of all that we have accomplished through the years.

Our progress is real and noteworthy. In 1988, polio was endemic in 125 countries, with more than 350,000 new cases a year worldwide. Since then, Rotary and our Global Polio Eradication Initiative partners have reduced the incidence of polio by more than 99.9 percent, vaccinated more than 2.5 billion children against the virus, and prevented 18 million cases of paralysis. Over the years, Rotary has helped country after country move into the polio-free column. This includes India, which some considered impossible not long ago. Of the three types of poliovirus, type 2 has been eradicated and type 3 could soon be certified as eradicated. Nigeria has not reported a case of wild poliovirus in nearly three years. If this trend holds, we will be down to just one type of wild poliovirus in only one section of the world, Afghanistan and Pakistan.

# Just for Fun - Putting in the Pool



Having lived in Hawaii for about five years and having finally accepted that the weather was indeed "practically perfect year-round," I decided it was time to put in a pool. There was plenty of room in the backyard. The grass had never really come in, and my feeling that "if it's green, it's ground cover" was rapidly waning in popularity. I had a little extra money from the sale of some property in Vermont; the timing seemed right.

A perusal of the yellow pages resulted in the phone numbers of three companies that installed fiberglass pools (I had heard too many horror stories about poured-in-place pools). One number was "no longer in service," and another remained unanswered for several dozen rings. I considered it a good sign when an answering machine of the third installer took my call. After leaving several messages over several days (the answering machine and I were becoming quite close), I finally got a return call from Paul Puaai of Pomohai Pools (the names have been changed to protect the guilty). Paul was a really big guy, with a really big smile, and a passion for hyperbole. I must admit I liked Paul from the start, but I should have taken the hint when all my questions were answered with "well, it depends." As it turned out, "depends" ran about \$2000 extra and two weeks of additional construction time per each.

Things didn't start out well. The "excavator guy" didn't show up on the day construction was to begin, and after several more days of no-show, Paul decided to hire someone else to dig the hole. I should have been suspicious when the new guy arrived with a brand new backhoe in tow--all the warning stickers still affixed--and an Owner's Operating Manual in his back pocket. Needless to say, the final size of the excavation bore little resemblance to the original size of the pool. Nonetheless, the pool sat very nicely in the hole: sitting level, we later learned, not so much. After the pool was full of water, it had to be drained and "adjusted" and refilled. The adjustment was successful, more or less. That is to say, the less water in the pool, the more successful it appeared.

The pool was finally set firmly in the ground, and the pool deck area was prepared for the pouring of concrete. The preparation was uneventful; the pouring was an event worthy of ticket sales. On the day the deck was to be poured, the concrete trucks didn't arrive until nearly 4:00 pm. It was summer, and sunset wasn't until nearly 7:00 pm, but there was definitely not enough time to pour and correctly finish the concrete before darkness fell. This fact escaped Paul, and so pouring commenced. It was about 7:30 pm when Paul asked if I had any high-intensity nighttime construction lights available. Surprisingly, I didn't. # At Rotary International – The WOW Factor



The women virtually float down the runway at the "Fall into Fabulous" fashion show. As they smile and twirl, Secily Wilson sits in the back, relishing her role as fairy godmother. Secily Wilson is a member of the Rotary Club of Lake Buena Vista, Florida.

'When you see before-and-after shots of these women, you can feel the empowerment," she says. "They're like, 'I got this." They aren't models, and their stylish clothes and makeup aren't the main point of the event. The women are graduates

of a six-month program that aims to lift them out of challenging life situations, whether as a result of domestic violence, a bad relationship, or a financial catastrophe.

The nonprofit Wilson founded, called WOW, or Women Overcoming with Willpower, provides a range of sessions that include mental health counseling, job interview preparation, and résumé-writing advice. Since she founded WOW in 2012, the organization has benefited nearly 1,000 women and children through the empowerment program.



In the women she helps, Wilson also sees herself. Not long ago, she was a

well-known local TV news anchor dreaming of a big-time network job. But that was before she had a stroke, on air, just before her 40th birthday. It was the first of a series of misfortunes that hit the mother of two: She was laid off. Her marriage broke up. Her home was foreclosed on. Then she had a second minor stroke.



'Why me?" she remembers thinking. "I lived very silently in this pit of depression and despair, thinking my life was over." Eventually, a friend told her: "Snap out of it, girlfriend. Enough of this pity party." A "trained survivor" and "closet party planner," Wilson set out to teach resilience to others who were in similar situations but lacked the advantages she had. She rallied friends and sponsors to organize the first fashion show and luncheon, but soon realized she needed to offer more. WOW is now a registered 501(c)(3) organization that serves 15 to 20 women a year, assisted by a range of corporate and other supporters.

# Profiles in Rotary – Alan Clark



I was born in Louisville Kentucky in1948 to Irish Catholic parents, Tom and Josephine Clark. My father worked for Southern Bell Telephone and my mother was an RN. There were eight children in the family so mom stayed home with the kids until the youngest was in school.

On October 31st 1954, my dad came and took me out of school and to the hospital. I had not been diagnosed but I was losing blood through my urine. It wasn't until Christmas that year that an intern, Dr. Richard Greathouse diagnosed me with acute phnephritas. Interestingly, later in his career as the Jef-

ferson county coroner, he was commissioned to exhume Zachary Taylor's body and determine, if he had been poisoned. He had not but can honestly say, I had the same doctor as Zachary Taylor.

For High School, I attended the Carmelite Jr. Seminary in Niagara Falls, Ontario and Hamilton Mass. I played high school basketball and had the privilege of playing in Boston Gardens finishing 4th in Class B in Mass. After high school, I changed course and attended Bellermine College for one year before joining the Navy to avoid having to go into the Army. The Navy sent me to Electronics Sonar School for two years after which, I learned that I didn't like computer work.

During this time, I married my first wife Susan and we had two children Ed and Connie. Ed has two daughters who each have one son. Connie is the proud mother of three boys and one girl ages 7 to 21.

After the Navy, I became a Real Estate Broker, Insurance Broker and Mortgage Banker for Midwest Realty/Mortgage Co. Susan and I divorced in 1975. I moved to California in 1977 with less than \$20 by the time I arrived, looking to start over. In California, it took at least a year to take the classes and get licensed as a Realtor. While working on this, I started selling cars (a free demo was my incentive). By the time I had my Real Estate License, I had risen to Finance Mgr. Used Car Manager and then Sales Manager by 1979.

While this was evolving, I met and married my Wife Wendy, in Yosemite in 1980. We have two children, both girls, Jodie and Aimee. Working for a Toyota Dealer had its advantages as well. From 1979 to 1985, I was fortunate enough to win 6 incentive trips 5 to Hawaii, 1 to Tahiti. In 1991, I was recruited to come to Hawaii to be General Manager for Kona Coast Jeep Eagle Mazda. (No one called me from Tahiti). After less than a year, I resigned because of issues with the owner. I was hired as General Manager of Hawaii Motors in Kona, then over both Hilo and Kona in 1998. In 2001, I purchased the dealership which became Island Chevrolet. In 2009, I was encouraged to retire and closed the business.

I joined Rotary in 1993 and we have lived here happily ever since.



# At Rotary International – 2021–22 RI President

SHEKHAR MEHTA OF INDIA SELECTED TO BE 2021-22 ROTARY INTERNATIONAL PRESIDENT



Shekhar Mehta, of the Rotary Club of Calcutta-Mahanagar, West Bengal, India, is the selection of the Nominating Committee for President of Rotary International for 2021-22. He will be declared the president-nominee on 1 October if no challenging candidates have been suggested. Mehta acknowledges that current membership trends are a challenge and says that membership development should be Rotary's highest priority. He believes that focusing on regional plans, successfully transitioning Rotaractors into Rotary clubs, and increasing diversity and female members could yield a 5 percent net growth in membership each year.

"A major brainstorming is needed to find effective solutions suited to different areas of the world," says Mehta. He adds that regional ethos and culture have to be taken into account to find localized solutions, as "one size does not fit all." He believes Rotary can extend to new geographical areas and countries. As a strong proponent of Rotary's strategic plan, Mehta says he will encourage clubs to use action plans and reinforce the core values of Rotary.

Mehta says Rotary needs to become more contemporary and adaptable by focusing on partnerships with governments and corporations, expanding partnerships with organizations that specialize in Rotary's areas of focus, and investing in technology. Mehta, an accountant, is chair of the Skyline Group, a real estate development company he founded. He is also a director of Operation Eyesight Universal (India), a Canada-based organization.

Mehta has been actively involved in disaster response and is a trustee of ShelterBox, UK. After the 2004 Indian Ocean tsunami, he helped build nearly 500 homes for families affected by the disaster. Mehta pioneered a program that has performed more than 1,500 life-changing heart surgeries in South Asia. He is also the architect of the TEACH Program, which promotes literacy throughout India and has reached thousands of schools.

A Rotary member since 1984, Mehta has served Rotary as director, member or chair of several committees, zone coordinator, training leader, member of The Rotary Foundation Cadre of Technical Advisers, and district governor. He is also the chair of Rotary Foundation (India).

Mehta has received Rotary's Service Above Self Award and The Rotary Foundation's Citation for Meritorious Service and Distinguished Service Awards. He and his wife, Rashi, are Major Donors and members of the Bequest Society.


Corrie Gulsrud, Vacation Rental Laws - What You Really Need To Know!



A few months back the County enacted a Bill dramactically reducing the number of properties on the Big Island that can legally be offered as vacation rentals. Specifically those properties not in designated "Resort" areas had to cease vacation rental operations by September 31 of this year. The only exceptions being those that applied for a non-conforming use and could meet all the criteria for same. As it turns out the criteria are so onerous as to be, in most cases, unattainable.

By some estimates the number of properties offered in the past approached 7000 Island wide, the vast majority of those outside of "Resort" areas. To date only a handful of properties have received non-conforming use permits and it is likely the total of non-conforming permits will be just a few hundred, if that, when all is said and done.

Hawaii County Bill 108, which was passed in November 2018, is in effect under Ordinance 18-114. Ordinance 18-114 limits the continuance and creation of short-term vacation rentals effective April 1, 2019.

#### President's Position Mark Daniel Maloney **RI** President



Rotary's long-term, sustained battle against polio has defined our organiza-tion for decades. We have a right to be proud of all that we have accomplished through the years.

Our progress is real and noteworthy. In 1988, polio was endemic in 125 countries, with more than 350,000 new cases a year worldwide. Since then, Rotary and our Global Polio Eradication Initiative partners have reduced the incidence of polio by more than 99.9 percent, vaccinated more than 2.5 billion children against the virus, and prevented 18 million cases of paralysis. Over the years, Ro-tary has helped country after country move into the polio-free column. This includes India, which some considered impossible not long ago. Of the three types of poliovirus, type 2 has been eradicated and type 3 could soon be certified as eradicated. Nigeria has not reported a case of wild poliovirus in nearly three years. If this trend holds, we will be down to just one type of wild poliovirus in only one section of the world, Afghanistan and Pakistan.

There are major challenges in that region. But it is crucial that we remain optimistic. Look at all that we have accomplished so far. This is no time to get discouraged or to think that the task is impossible. We will end polio forever, but only if we remain steadfast and vigilant. World Polio Day is a time for Rotarians from all over the globe to come together, recognize the progress we have made in our fight against polio, and plan the action we must take to end polio forever. The key word is action, because we still have important work to do.

This year, we want to see as many Rotary clubs as possible holding World Polio Day events around the world. Need some ideas? How about organizing a viewing party for friends and club members to watch Rotary's Online Global Update? You could also dedicate a club meeting to World Polio Day or create a fundraising event. Remember, every dollar raised is matched 2-to-1 by the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation.

Once you have created an event, register it at endpolio.org/register-your-event. Then promote it using the World Polio Day toolkit, available at endpolio.org/world-polio-day.

## Profiles in Rotary – Tom Daniel



I was born and grew up in Rochester, NY, with three younger sisters. Dad was an engineer/manager at Kodak, and our mom was very active in community activities. We all attended public schools through high school. We did more things together as a family than most of our friends, including travelling across the country and back in our old Chevy station wagon, and sailing from NY to Europe on the Queen Mary.

I started out majoring in Electrical Engineering at MIT, but finally got my BS in Humanities and Engineering in 1964. My father had died of leukemia in 1963 (age 49 - shortly after becoming VP/Pres Elect of the Rochester Rotary Club). I spent two years teaching physics (and everything else!) for the Peace Corps in Cameroon, before I returned to teach at a suburban Rochester high school. After walking to school in February 1967 through Rochester's usual 6 ft of snow, I saw a teachers' room bulletin board notice: "Interviews this afternoon for teaching jobs on Maui." I and my new wife taught on Maui from September 1967 to June 1969. We then moved to O'ahu were we both had NSF Science Teaching Fellowships at UH, and our daughter Sara was born in June 1970.

I spent 9 years in grad school at Mānoa, getting an MS in 1972 and PhD in 1978 - both in Physical Oceanography, specializing in acoustics and electric field measurements of deep ocean water motions.

After my divorce was finalized in 1978, I met Alice at a New Year's Eve party, and we were married the following year. We spent 3.5 years in Santa Clara, where I worked on many interesting projects at Lockheed Ocean Systems. I worked briefly off Keahole Point on Mini-OTEC, the first at-sea demonstration that produced net power (50 kW) using Ocean Thermal Energy Conversion. I also spent the summer of 1981 in London working on a project to reduce manning levels on Shell UK platforms in the North Sea.

In June 1982 I began as Lab Director of the new Natural Energy Laboratory of Hawai'i at Keahole Point. Our son Michael was born in early October. At NELH (later NELHA), among many other projects, I oversaw the installation of the NELH 18-in cold water pipeline in 1986; the execution of several OTEC feasibility and demonstration projects; the 1997 "closing-in" of the original HGP-A geothermal well; and the installation of NELHA's 55-in seawater supply system, still the deepest and largest in the world.

In 1995, at the invitation of my longtime friend, Alan Clark, I joined the Rotary Club of Kona, and became active as Community Service Chair and International Service Chair, before being asked to become VP/President Elect in 2000 – 37 years after my father had held that position in the Rochester club. I served as Club President in 2001-02 – a year during which we grew from 60 to 80 members and won the District Membership Growth Award.

In Feb 2003 – after almost 21 years– I was abruptly fired from NELHA; the Board of Directors and new Executive Director felt that my strong support of continuing scientific research projects interfered with their new goal of turning NELHA into a commercial source of revenue for the State. Rotarian Lynn Walton, then CEO of Kona Community Hospital, established a new position for me as the Facility Engineer for West Hawai'i hospitals, allowing me to retire within the state system 3.5 years later with full credit for 25 years of service.

Our son Michael graduated from Kealakehe HS in 2001 and went on to get a degree in film scoring from the Berklee College of Music in Boston.

After retirement in Dec 2005, I substitute taught (almost every subject!) at Kealakehe HS. In 2008, I joined a start-up company from Silicon Valley, Liquid Robotics, Inc., that was developing a new wave-powered open-ocean surface vessel, the "The Wave Glider," in Kawaihae. As Staff Scientist, I was in a good position to assist LRI with grant proposals, due to my experience as a proposal reviewer and Technical Advisory Board Member for CEROS, the Center of Excellence for Research in Ocean Sciences, which provided grant funding to Hawai'i companies for innovative ideas for new ocean technology.

I've been retired since Dec 2010, with the exception of a few small consulting contracts for Deep Cold Seawater Applications projects at South Point, the Maldives, Reunion Island and Mauritius. I've remained active in Rotary, the Kona Choral Society, the Friends of NELHA, and ham radio (which I've enjoyed since High School).

Our daughter, Sara, works as webmaster for the public school system in Arlington, VA. Our grandson Mac was born in January 2014. Our son Michael and his wife, Gina Reynolds, live near Anaheim, where Michael pursues an elusive music composing career in Hollywood. My wife Alice succumbed to recurring metastatic breast cancer in December 2018. Family members were able to come together to celebrate an early Christmas with her, and were gathered around her hospice bed when she died peacefully on the evening of December 22nd.

Adjusting to life alone has been difficult. My youngest sister Susie has been a big support, staying with me in Kona off and on, and serving as a travel companion on trips to the mainland, New Zealand, and the coast of Spain and Portugal on a sailing ship. I'm currently working on cleaning out our home of 32 years, contemplating building an 'Ohana on our lot, figuring out how to stay in Kona as long as I'm physically able, and looking forward to a big family reunion here in Kona this Christmas.

## From the Archives - November 09, 2000

#### Rotary Club of Kona Employer of the Year Award - Body Glove Cruises



Body Glove Cruises is a small ocean tourism business based in Kailua-Kona that takes visitors and residents out on the boat, the Body Glove, for snorkel cruises so that they are able to enjoy the coral, fish and other marine life in a pristine and safe environment. Scotty and Maggie Bell are well known in the community and beloved by employees and residents alike. When we went to the Body Glove Cruises office to announce to Maggie and Scotty that they had been

chosen for Rotary of Kona's Employer of the Year, we couldn't even get near Maggie's desk. It was her birthday and her desk was piled high with flowers, balloons and other decorations. She was wearing several leis, and while we were meeting with her an employee came in and presented her with yet another lei. It was obvious that she was highly regarded.

Service to Employees: Body Glove Cruises offers paid vacation and full medical and dental benefits. Matching funds are provided for contributions to the employee retirement plan. Maggie and Scotty have a policy to offer advancement from within. For example, the company pays for half of the \$1200 cost when an employee wishes to advance by studying for a boat captain's license. If the employee qualifies, the company pays the entire \$1200 fee. They pay for CPR and life guard training and send selected employees to marketing and sales seminars. They give special recognition to employee birthdays and anniversaries. At a recent team building party, they recognized an employee's 10- year anniversary with the company by surprising him with a new pick-up truck, a company truck that he can also have for personal use. They further recognize employee efforts with quarterly bonuses. Employees are included in the hiring process. After a prospective employee has been screened, he goes out on a cruise where the crew rates him. A positive rating is essential to hiring. Body Glove Cruises is a Drug Free Workplace. All employees are informed of this policy before applying for any position. The policy is strictly enforced including random drug testing.

#### Service to the Industry:

Scotty and Maggie are active in trade organizations. Scotty helped found the Ocean Tourism Coalition, which has four 4) representatives, one each from Hawaii, Maui, Kauai and Oahu. The purpose is to provide community input and enhance communication with state agencies such as DLNR for the benefit of the entire boating and ocean tourism industry. They are active members of the Kona-Kohala Chamber of Commerce and Destination Kona Coast. They are the only visitor activity that belongs to the Big Island Group, a networking and long-range planning group composed mostly of the large hotels and resorts from the Big Island. In addition, Scotty has been working hard with the State for the last 18 months to have the Kailua Pier repaired. A large section has been closed as it has been undermined by wave action and is unsafe. It is an eyesore and curtails commercial activity. Repairs will be completed in 2003.

### At the Podium – Jose and Raghel Santiago – Salvation Army



**The Salvation Army's Kona Corps Community Center** serves the people residing on the west end of the Big Island of Hawaii. In addition to its function as a church, its services include the provision of emergency assistance to families needing help, as well as the maintenance of a preschool.

#### President's Position Mark Daniel Maloney RI President



Rotary's long-term, sustained battle against polio has defined our organization for decades. We have a right to be proud of all that we have accomplished through the years.

Our progress is real and noteworthy. In 1988, polio was endemic in 125 countries, with more than 350,000 new cases a year worldwide. Since then, Rotary and our Global Polio Eradication Initiative partners have reduced the incidence of polio by more than 99.9 percent, vaccinated more than 2.5 billion children against the virus, and prevented 18 million cases of paralysis. Over the years, Rotary has helped country after country move into the polio-free column. This includes India, which some considered impossible not long ago. Of the three types of poliovirus, type 2 has been eradicated and type 3 could soon be certified as eradicated. Nigeria has not reported a case of wild poliovirus in nearly three years. If this trend holds, we will be down to just one type of wild poliovirus in only one section of the world, Afghanistan and Pakistan.

There are major challenges in that region. But it is crucial that we remain optimistic. Look at all that we have accomplished so far. This is no time to get discouraged or to think that the task is impossible. We will end polio forever, but only if we remain steadfast and vigilant. World Polio Day is a time for Rotarians from all over the globe to come together, recognize the progress we have made in our fight against polio, and plan the action we must take to end polio forever. The key word is action, because we still have important work to do.

This year, we want to see as many Rotary clubs as possible holding World Polio Day events around the world. Need some ideas? How about organizing a viewing party for friends and club members to watch Rotary's Online Global Update? You could also dedicate a club meeting to World Polio Day or create a fundraising event. Remember, every dollar raised is matched 2-to-1 by the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation.

Once you have created an event, register it at endpolio.org/register-your-event. Then promote it using the World Polio Day toolkit, available at endpolio.org/world-polio-day.

Mark your calendar to tune in to Rotary's World Polio Day Online Global Update on 24 October. This year we will stream our program on Facebook in multiple time zones around the world. Visit the Rotary International Facebook page to RSVP to your region's program. And do not forget to follow the event on social media and share it with your network.

When we reach our goal, polio will become only the second human disease eradicated on the planet, and Rotary will receive international acclaim. But what matters most is the children who will never again have to face this terrible, disabling virus. Rotary must continue to connect the world in the effort toward polio eradication. It is up to us. Let us finish the job.



Being Proudly Rotarian is not just an empty accolade and status symbol. Rather, it is a call for service and commitment to hold true the driving motive of Rotary. It's a call to give of yourself to the world community in giving to support and strengthen the Rotary Foundation's humanitarian efforts around the globe. It's a call to build strong clubs and use our skills, professional knowledge, and technical know how to bring happiness to people in our communities.

#### ComBridges founder and president Jon Leland is a leading communication expert who has been an innovator for over 25 years.

In the seventies, Mr. Leland founded one of the first narrowcast radio networks. In the eighties, he was a cable and pay-TV pioneer who founded the onair promotion department at cable's USA Network. And, in the nineties, Leland has written and produced original video programs, leading edge web sites and interactive TV prototypes.

Corporate projects have included two interactive TV "future vision" videos for Pacific Bell and an interactive TV prototype application for Oracle Corporation which was displayed at Disney World's Epcot Center. Corporate clients include AT&T, Dolch Computers, HBO, Hooked on Phonics, Lifetime Cable Television, Madison Square Garden Network, NEC America, New York Telephone, Paramount Home Video, Silicon Graphics, Simon & Schuster Video, TEN-TV, Viacom, VDOnet and Xerox, among others.

An evangelist for low cost video production tools, in 1994, Leland wrote, produced and directed "The Digital Video-Video," a half-hour overview of new technologies for video professionals which received sponsorship support from eight companies including Adobe, Avid Technologies, Media 100, Specular International and Videograhy magazine.

Jon is also a contributing editor to Videography magazine with a monthly column "The Video Web", and is a contributor to Computer Graphics World, Publish and TV-Broadcast magazines. Jon has also published a series of online articles about how businesses can use the World Wide Web to gain a strategic advantage. It's called "The Web Edge" and it appears on ComBridges' own Media Mall web site. (Writing samples are available via this link.)

Mr. Leland has led workshops at the Inc. 500, Inc. Growing the Company, Mac-World, Image Expos, Corporate Computing Expo and other conferences. He has also served as the conference director of the Rocky Mountain Film & Video Expo and as the West Coast on-camera correspondent for the American Business Journal TV series. Articles about Mr. Leland and his work have been published in Business Week, Presentations, Electronic Media, MPC World, PC Today, San Francisco Business Times and Videomaker magazines, among others.

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

My parents, may they rest in peace, loved to tell the tale of how I came into the world kicking and screaming, unlike my older brother who arrived with a wink in his eye and a smile on his face. Eventually I will re-enter that world of regimen, carefully controlled activities, and little excitement. I won't be doing a whole lot except lying around and sleeping, and will again require constant attention and round-the-clock care. When even round-the-clock care is not enough, it is my fondest hope that I will depart this world as I came in, kicking and screaming.

career. When I was a new attorney starting out in Alabama, Gay and I became partners in her father's firm. He instilled in us the value of joining Rotary as a way to build relationships and demonstrate to potential clients that we were serious professionals who held firm to values even more robust than what our profession required.

Rotary's commitment to vocational service is built on the highest ethical standards in business and professions, the recognition of the worthiness of all useful work, and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society. That last point is so important. No matter our profession, we all contribute mightily to the world when we conduct our work with integrity and always adhere to The Four-Way Test.

I have made balancing the demands of Rotary with professional and family commitments one of my priorities as president. No Rotarian should feel pressured to put in more time than a volunteer position should ever demand. This is true for several reasons, one of them being that the work we do in our day jobs is just as important to Rotary as the work we do in the organization. We carry our Rotary values everywhere, and our professional success helps build a case for Rotary every day we go into the office.

This is particularly important in our efforts to reach younger new members. We want to see a Rotary where no one is ever asked to choose between being a good Rotarian and being a good parent, business owner, manager, or employee. When we ask busy young people to join us, we should not be asking them to give up their time and freedom. We should be rewarding them with an experience that makes everything they already do even more inspiring.

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Throughout the world, Rotary is admired for its vocational service and for the time-honored values we instill in all business relationships. As we continue our work to grow Rotary, let us remember that vocational service remains a crucial selling point to potential members.



Her bio: I went from the 4th grade to the 6th grade and from the 8th grade to the 10th grade. I graduated from high school at age 15 and from Mount Union College (now University) at age 18. I worked as a research chemist at Standard Oil in Cleveland. Ohio and figured out a way to make acrylonitrile,

a basic ingredient of all kinds of plastics and textiles. From there I went to John Carroll University two years part time while I received my Master's degree. I then attended the University of Hawaii where I received my Ph.D. From there I went on to medical school at the University of Texas Southwestern in Dallas, Texas. After becoming a medical doctor, I traveled all over the world. I served on several ships (primarily the Anastasis) assisting in surgery. The only place I have not been is the heart of the Antarctic. I am 78 years old but certainly do not feel it.

February 2020 Happy 115th birthday, fellow Rotarians and members of the family of Rotary!

Much has changed in the world since 1905. Then,

the global population was roughly 1.7 billion. Today, it is 7.7 billion. There were 5 telephones per 100 people in the United States 115 years ago. In 2020, it is estimated that 96 percent of the U.S. population has a cellphone — and both China and India have more than a billion cellphones in use.

In the 115 years since Rotary was founded, seemingly everything has changed except Rotary values. We began, and remain, com-mitted to fellowship, integrity, diversity, service, and leadership. While our Service Above Self motto dates to 1911, the ethos behind those words had already been ingrained by Rotary's founders.

As the pace of change worldwide continues to accelerate, the need for Rotary service is greater than ever. It's one thing to read about service projects, quite another to see them in action and to see the grateful faces of people who have benefited from them. Rotary projects change lives and connect the world. And over the past year, I have seen some amazing Rotary projects in action.

Gay and I visited Japan's Fukushima prefecture last year. Few places in the world have had to deal with the kind of devastation that visited Fukushima in March 2011, when a tsunami touched off by an earthquake led to disaster at a nuclear power plant. But the story of Fukushima today is not one of destruction; it is one of hope and renewal. Rotary grants have helped improve access to medical and mental health care for victims of the disaster and reduced the isolation of these communities by sharing the experiences of people from other parts of the world who have also recovered from disasters. Our grants have also helped to foster self-motivation and encourage sustainable long-term community recovery across the region.

In Shanghai, I learned about the Careers in Care program. This helps migrant workers fill the need for skilled professionals in elder care facilities. After taking a course, trainees receive certification to boost their employment prospects, while the care industry benefits from an expanded talent pool. Rotary projects like this are successful because they address a local need, and they have the potential to attract local government funding to sustain their impact.

And in Guatemala, Gay and I went to Sumpango. Global grants there provide mechanical cows to produce soy milk; an improved water distribution system; water filters; clean compost latrines; family gardens; support for income generation; and training in WASH and literacy programs. The food items sold there not only provide nutrition to women and children, but also create a source of income for local women.

In every area of focus, and in every part of the world, Rotary projects are improving lives and helping communities adapt in a time of rapid change. As we celebrate another great year for Rotary, let us rededicate ourselves to strengthening the connections that make our service so impactful. We will make lives better as Rotary Connects the World.

ROTARY AND THE BILL & MELINDA GATES FOUNDATION EXTEND-ING FUNDRAISING PARTNERSHIP TO ERADICATE POLIO

Partnership will infuse an additional US\$450 million into global polio eradication effort

EVANSTON, Il. (January 22, 2020) - Rotary and the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation are renewing their longstanding partnership to end polio, an-

nouncing a joint commitment of up to \$450 million to support the global polio eradication effort.

"Because of the efforts of Rotary and its partners, almost 19 million people are walking today who would have otherwise been paralyzed," said John Germ, Past President of Rotary International who leads Rotary's polio fundraising efforts. "By partnering with the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, we're ensuring that children in polio-affected countries get the lifesaving vaccines they need to be protected from polio for life. As the first organization to envision a polio-free world, Rotary is more committed than ever to delivering on our promise that one day, no child will ever again be paralyzed by polio."

To an audience of Rotary volunteer leaders from around the world, Bill Gates, co-chair of the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation delivered a video message announcing the extension of a funding partnership forged more than a decade ago. Rotary is committed to raising \$50 million per year over the next three years, with every dollar to be matched with two additional dollars from the Gates Foundation. This expanded agreement will translate into up to \$450 million for polio eradication activities.

"The Gates Foundation's longstanding partnership with Rotary has been vital to fighting polio," said Mr. Gates in today's message to Rotary volunteers. "That's why we're extending our funding match, so every dollar that Rotary raises is met with two more. I believe that together, we can make eradication a reality."

In addition to the extended funding partnership with the Gates Foundation, Rotary is also announcing US\$45 million in funding for polio eradication efforts in countries throughout Africa (Angola, Ethiopia, Mali, Nigeria, Somalia and South Sudan), and Asia (Afghanistan, Pakistan, Papua New Guinea, Pakistan and the Philippines). The funding will help support crucial polio eradication activities such as immunization and disease detection, research, and community mobilization.

Polio—a paralyzing and sometimes deadly disease—is on the verge of becoming the second human disease in history to be eradicated. This critical funding helps ensure that children in at-risk countries are protected from polio, and that the wild poliovirus is eliminated in the last two countries that continue to report cases.

While only Afghanistan and Pakistan continue to report cases of wild poliovirus, the remaining challenges to global eradication—like difficulty reaching children amid insecurity and conflict and weak health systems—have proven to be the most difficult. In order to meet these roadblocks head on and ensure the continuation of program efforts, funding and support from donors and world governments is imperative.

Rotary has contributed more than \$2 billion to fight polio, including matching funds from the Gates Foundation, and countless volunteer hours since launching its polio eradication program, PolioPlus, in 1985. In 1988, Rotary formed the Global Polio Eradication Initiative with the World Health Organization, UNICEF, and the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. The Gates Foundation and Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance later joined. When the initiative launched, there were 350,000 cases of polio every year. Today the incidence of polio has plummeted by more than 99.9 percent.





## Just for Fun - Modern Tedhnology, Computers

My first computer was an I-Omega Super Brain. It contained a super-size, six-inch (diagonally measured) monitor that displayed "brilliant white letters on a jet black screen." An obese (or perhaps just big-boned) beauty, it boasted a whopping 64 kilobytes of internal memory and two (not just one, but two) external drive bays that accepted floppy disks up to 48 kilobytes each. A floppy disk was a plastic, magnetic coating, recording device. Think of an anorexic CD that's bendy and hides in a paper sleeve; 48 kilobytes of data on something you could hold in your hand was very impressive at the time.

By comparison, today's flash drive (or thumb drive, or jump drive, or pocket disk or san disc, pick a generic name already), those cute little gadgets about the size of your pinky that plug into a USB port (Universal Serial Bus, in case you cared), hold up to 264 gigabytes of data. That's more than a million times more information. One pinky-sized thumb drive (pinky drive, perhaps) can hold all the information in the Encyclopedia Britannica including pictures, Roget's Thesaurus, and your Funk and Wagnalls, unabridged edition. By the way, if these book titles don't ring a bell, you probably won't get this article. If the term "book" doesn't ring a bell, you're probably my youngest son.

Today's computers are true wonders of modern technology. They allow us to do things we've never done, and do things we've always done, better and faster. They help us learn and to teach what we have learned. They have changed the way we gather information and the information available to gather. They have changed the way we get the news, the good news we enjoy, the bad news we need to hear, and even the very bad news we'd rather not. They have changed the way we are entertained, the way we shop, even the way we pay our bills, or not (the electronic transfer has been e-mailed, really).

As wonderful as computers are, at times, not so much. At times, they are incredible time-wasters and can steal time needed for work or study. Addictive video games, cyber bullying, and, worse, cyber stalking, can steal time and self-esteem and innocence. Just trying to keep up with the technology - the hardware, the software, the accessories, the add-ons, the strap-ons (sorry, different technology) - can steal our money and our resources. Not keeping up is not an option because the software keeps changing and the old hardware won't run the new software. Sometimes the new hardware won't run the new software because the new software has been replaced with the newer software which is needed to be compatible with new operating system which was developed to be compatible with the newest processor.

And then there's the age-old question, what to do with the old hardware? You can't give it away; schools can't teach today's children with yesterday's technology. You can't sell it; nobody wants hand-me-down electronics. You can't even throw it away unless you can find an authorized electronics disposal facility (open only on alternate Thursdays between 12:00 and 1:00, please call ahead, we may be at lunch). Computers; we love them, we hate them. We can't live without them, can't live with them, and can't bring them to the dump.



#### President's Position Mark Daniel Maloney -RI President

#### March 2020



March is the month we celebrate Rotaract — and this has been quite a year for our young partners in service.

Last spring, the Council on Legislation elevated Rotaract in our constitution: Rotary International is now the association of both Rotary clubs and Rotaract clubs. Then in October, the Rotary Board of Directors eliminated the artificial Rotaract age limit and took other steps to break down barriers that were preventing Rotaract from growing in some parts of the world.

These steps were long overdue, because Rotaract is a vision of what Rotary must become. Not only do we need to open our doors to our young colleagues, but we also have to open our ears and minds to the Rotary experience they find most engaging. That is one of the best ways we will meaningfully grow Rotary.

When I say grow Rotary, I mean it in many ways. We need to grow our service and to grow the impact of our projects. Most importantly, however, we need to grow our membership, so that we can achieve more. Rotaractors provide this opportunity, not only because they can transition to Rotary at the time that is right for them, but also because they understand what it will take to attract others like them.

Business as usual will not work for us anymore. Bringing in more members to replace the ones we lose is not the answer. It is like pouring more water into a bucket full of holes. We need to address the root causes of member loss in many parts of the world: member engagement that is not what it should be, and our member demographic that skews steadily older.

It is time to make some fundamental changes. We already know what the barriers are to an engaged and diverse membership. It is time to act on what we know: creating new membership models, opening new paths to Rotary membership, and building new Rotary and Rotaract clubs where the existing clubs do not meet a current need.

New club models represent an opportunity to connect with a more diverse group of individuals — particularly those who are unable or unwilling to join our traditional clubs. While new club models have been emerging for some time, it is up to district governors to make them a reality. In January at the International Assembly, our incoming district governors took part in an exercise called Build Your Own Club Model. It was a wonderful experience that put them in the right frame of mind for the work ahead.

Ultimately, however, it will be up to Rotaractors and young Rotarians to create new club models that are most meaningful to the next generation. We may think we know what young people want from Rotary clubs in the future, but I am confident that what young people say will surprise us. It will be our job to support their innovation, for it will help us grow Rotary as Rotary Connects the World.

Dear Rotarians,



My name is Elena Budanova. I am from Russia. I am a founding member of Ekaterinburg Rotary Club in Russia in 1998. We organized our Rotary Club with the group of the CCI PEP fellows- the alumni of the training program which was held and organized by the Center for Citizen Initiatives, San Francisco based NGO with generous support of American Rotary clubs. This program was created by a great lady from your country – Sharon Tennison. She held the program (Productivity Enhancement Program) with the help of the American Government -USAID. She shared her program and blessed her Russian partner for 18 years – NGO-BSI Business School International, formerly CCI, to continue and run this program.

We have been administrating the program for more than 18 years and know all the nuances of it. We have the professional staff and all the necessary resources to continue PEP. But unfortunately, now the American Government doesn't subsidize the program any more, though sees a big need in it. We have to help small business in Russia as the economic basis of the country. There is a need for Russian entrepreneurs to study the best experience from the developed small business of the developed countries. Everyone, who will come from Russia, has their own small business in Russia: real estate company, restaurant, construction company, etc.

We would like to ask you and your Club :

1. To invite our group of (6 - 10 people) to visit your meeting any Wednesday and allow them to share about Russia and its economy, small business development in Russia and receive information about Rotary and its mission and about your club.

2. Our big request- Can you please, share your business ideas with Russian delegates and invite them into your business and tell about your business in the USA.

Thank you very much in advance. The importance of this program for Rotary is in growing the numbers of the Rotarians. The majority of the PEP fellows learn about Rotary Clubs and after their American visit- join Rotary clubs or even organize new Rotary clubs in their towns of Russia.

### At RI – Rotary Leaders Visit Pakistan in Support of Poilio Fradication

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan. (February 6, 2020) – A delegation of Rotary International leaders from around the world traveled to Pakistan this week to meet with government leaders including Prime Minister Imran Khan, Minister of Health Dr. Zafar Mirza, Army Chief of Staff General Qamar Javed Bajwa and Dr. Rana Safdar, head of Pakistan's Polio National Emergency Operations Centre. The Rotary delegation included Holger Knaack, Rotary International President 2020-21; K.R. "Ravi" Ravindran, Trustee Chair of the Rotary Foundation 2020-21; and Michael K. McGovern, Chair of Rotary's International PolioPlus Committee. The group was accompanied by incoming Rotary Foundation Trustee Aziz Memon, who leads efforts for Rotary's Pakistan PolioPlus program.

The government leaders praised Rotary for its prominent role in polio eradication and for providing vital financial support to Pakistan and other polio-threatened countries. Rotary members have contributed more than \$2.1 billion dollars and countless volunteer hours to ending polio. Rotary is the organization credited with initiating the global effort to eradicate polio. When Rotary formed the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI) in 1988, there were more than 350,000 cases of polio annually around the world. Today, due to the efforts of Rotary, its partners and world governments, the incidence of polio has plummeted by more than 99.9 percent.

In this week's meetings, the Prime Minister acknowledged recent challenges in the effort to rid Pakistan of polio, and confirmed that Pakistan considers polio eradication among its highest priorities. The Government of Pakistan has already taken a series of highly effective organizational steps to manage the polio vaccination program and provide much-needed resources to ensure the resurgence of polio in Pakistan is put to an end. General Bajwa assured the Rotary delegation of the unwavering support and cooperation of both the Army and the civil forces to ensure that every child in every community throughout Pakistan is reached with the lifesaving polio vaccine.

Dr. Zafar Mirza, Minister of Health of Pakistan confirmed the country's improved efforts to eradicate polio, noting that during the last round of national polio immunizations, approximately 40 million children were vaccinated. Mr. Holger Knaack expressed his satisfaction with the visit and efforts by the Government of Pakistan to eliminate polio, stating, "We are grateful to have had the opportunity to meet with key leaders in Pakistan to learn about renewed efforts to eradicate the disease once and for all. We're confident that with the support of the government and the Army, that Pakistan will get the job done." Mr. KR "Ravi" Ravindran agreed, stating, "Polio eradication is a massive effort that will require all elements of society to band together and work towards our ultimate goal of ensuring no child ever again is paralyzed by polio."

During their visit, the Rotary delegation met with local Rotary leaders from Pakistan, which is home to more than 230 Rotary clubs and nearly 3400 Rotary members. They engaged with some of the major donors of the GPEI, and visited the National Emergency Operations Centre, where a high-tech data collection system monitored progress in real time. While only Afghanistan and Pakistan continue to report cases of wild poliovirus, the remaining challenges to global eradication—such as difficulty reaching children amid insecurity and conflict and weak health systems—have proven to be the most difficult. In order to meet these roadblocks head on and ensure the continuation of program efforts, funding and support from donors and world governments is imperative.

I admit I have been gravity challenged much of my life. I was not a chubby baby, as was my brother. He was so rotund as a baby that Mom and Dad nicknamed him "Pumpkin." "Pumpkin" soon became "Punky," and unfortunately the nickname, as nicknames are prone to do, stuck. I suspect it was a good part of the reason he left home at 17 to join the Navy. I'm pretty sure he wasn't thereafter known as "Seaman Punky."

My gravity problem began when I was about seven years old. I was, in fact, a slim and healthy seven-year-old until the aforementioned Mom

and Dad decided that slim and healthy were mutually exclusive. They were both a bit "bigboned," as were most of their friends, so their conclusion was probably predictable. In any case, I was put on a regimen of vitamin B7 to cure my weight deficiency. Or was it B12, or perhaps B14, or perhaps B22? BINGO! But I digress.

Fortunately (or maybe not), the regimen worked. By the time I became eight, I was a virtual chubby cherub. And a relatively happy cherub I remained all through grade school. It was in high school that I began dieting.

#### March 2020



March is the month we celebrate Rotaract — and this has been quite a year for our young partners in service.

Last spring, the Council on Legislation elevated Rotaract in our constitution: Rotary International is now the association of both Rotary clubs and Rotaract clubs. Then in October, the Rotary Board of Directors eliminated the artificial Rotaract age limit and took other steps to break down barriers that were preventing Rotaract from growing in some parts of the world.

These steps were long overdue, because Rotaract is a vision of what Rotary must become. Not only do we need to open our doors to our young colleagues, but we also have to open our ears and minds to the Rotary experience they find most engaging. That is one of the best ways we will meaningfully grow Rotary.

When I say grow Rotary, I mean it in many ways. We need to grow our service and to grow the impact of our projects. Most importantly, however, we need to grow our membership, so that we can achieve more. Rotaractors provide this opportunity, not only because they can transition to Rotary at the time that is right for them, but also because they understand what it will take to attract others like them.

Business as usual will not work for us anymore. Bringing in more members to replace the ones we lose is not the answer. It is like pouring more water into a bucket full of holes. We need to address the root causes of member loss in many parts of the world: member engagement that is not what it should be, and our member demographic that skews steadily older.

It is time to make some fundamental changes. We already know what the barriers are to an engaged and diverse membership. It is time to act on what we know: creating new membership models, opening new paths to Rotary membership, and building new Rotary and Rotaract clubs where the existing clubs do not meet a current need.

New club models represent an opportunity to connect with a more diverse group of individuals — particularly those who are unable or unwilling to join our traditional clubs. While new club models have been emerging for some time, it is up to district governors to make them a reality. In January at the International Assembly, our incoming district governors took part in an exercise called Build Your Own Club Model. It was a wonderful experience that put them in the right frame of mind for the work ahead.

Ultimately, however, it will be up to Rotaractors and young Rotarians to create new club models that are most meaningful to the next generation. We may think we know what young people want from Rotary clubs in the future, but I am confident that what young people say will surprise us. It will be our job to support their innovation, for it will help us grow Rotary as Rotary Connects the World.

Growing up in Duncan, Okla., USA, I took it for granted that everyone could read. In my own elementary school, not only were we expected to be reading by the age of seven or eight, we were expected to read upside down. We each took turns reading books to the entire class, and of course, if you want to read out loud to a group while you show them the pictures, you can't do it the right way up. All the way through elementary school, we did that every week, until it didn't really matter to us which way we were holding the book.

I never thought too much about that skill at the time. But a few months ago, on a visit to a Rotary project in Decatur, Ala., I walked into a first-grade classroom and was asked if I would read a book to a class of six-year-olds. Naturally, I was happy to oblige. I sat down, opened the book they had chosen, and started reading to about 30 little kids - upside down, just the way I did it back in second grade. In a sense, I was doing exactly what I'd learned to do more than half a century earlier. But as an adult, and especially as a Rotarian, I saw that experience in a different way. I was reading to a group of children who were well on their way to literacy themselves. We were sitting in their classroom, in a school where Rotarians came every week to read one-on-one with children who needed a little extra help. There wasn't any question that every child in that room would grow up to be a literate adult. And all of them took

that completely for granted - as they took it for granted that adults would care enough to read them a book while showing them the pictures, even if that meant reading upside down.

We all know that millions of children all over the world aren't that lucky. That's why we make basic education and literacy a priority in our Rotary service. As we mark Literacy Month in Rotary, we remind ourselves what a gift we are giving when we help a child to read - whether it's a child on the other side of the world or right in our own hometown.

March is literacy month in Rotary. Most of you take for granted the fact that you can read this sentence but literacy is not universal either in the United States or in the world. Currently fourteen percent of adults in the USA cannot read while twenty-one percent read below the fifth grade level. World wide over seven hundred million adults are illiterate, sixty-six percent of whom are female.

Rotary has long been a champion of literacy and many clubs use their annual Foundation allotments to buy dictionaries for third graders

including most clubs in Hawai'i. Read aloud programs to encourage literacy are also very prevalent both in the USA and in other countries. The Andy and Elmer's Rotary Literacy Project has been developed to promote the Four Way test and reading in general among young children and is being used in our district.

Recently there has been more emphasis on adult literacy facilitated by modern teaching methods including the use of electronic note pads. District 5000 has been approached about this type of learning and will be participating in an initiative launched by a Rotary scholar in New Zealand. Information about other Rotary literacy projects world wide for both adults and children is available in the publication Literacy Project Guide available for download on the Rotary International website.

Mark Twain once wrote: "Travel is fatal to prejudice, bigotry and narrow mindedness.." The same can be said of literacy which is the key to opening the door to the vast universe of ideas, persons and places that leads to greater understanding and acceptance of the differences and similarities among the peoples of the world.

## Just for Fun - Green Thumbs



I do not have a green thumb. That is NOT to say that either of the short thick digits on my hands, next to the index finger and opposable to each of the other four digits, is green, although it isn't. That IS to say that I am congenitally incapable of creating, supporting, or even sustaining plant life. In my care, cut flowers wilt in minutes as opposed to days. Oddly, anthuriums seem to last for weeks. I suspect they have low self- esteem and thrive on neglect. Potted plants do not fare much better. Plants that are healthy and full of color at Lowe's Garden Center, inevitably become pale and sickly in Richard's Living Room. The tasteful, if sparsely attended, funeral soon follows. Even artificial plants, to which I invariably resort, start within a faw months of taking up residence at my house.

My attempts at gardening have been, at best, disappointing. I love corn-on-the-cob. My effort to grow it resulted in neither corn, nor cob. I thoroughly enjoyed the one cucumber I coaxed from the soil, but failed completely to grow green beans, or peas, or carrots, or squash, or even radishes (yes, I admit it, I failed to grow radishes). My tomatoes, on the other hand, thrived. I was feeling quite proud of myself until I discovered that the tiny tomato roots had found their way to the cesspool. Needless to say, my plans to put by some home-canned tomatoes for winter, were dashed by the discovery. I was pleased that my plans for personally surviving the winter after eating copious amounts of naturally fertilized fruit (yes, tomatoes are a fruit), were not.

If my attempts at gardening were disappointing, my attempt at farming was a disaster. In Kona, Hawaii, everybody (well almost everybody) grows Kona Coffee. I was told it was essentially a weed and would grow despite my best efforts to sustain it. I planted 100 plants on my quarter acre. Properly interred, properly fertilized, properly watered and suitable spaced from each other (and the adjacent cesspool), 70 plants didn't last the week. The rest struggled on. I planted 70 more plants, 10 survived, the rest were laid to rest in the growing green waste pile (I don't know why it's called green waste, it isn't green, at least not anymore). I planted 60 more plants, 5 survived, and so I decided I really preferred a 45-plant orchard anyway. 40 plants survive to this day and produce occasional coffee beans. Probably enough for several cups of coffee if I had the energy or inclination to pick, process, and roast them. I don't.

My friend Bob DOES have a green thumb. His biggest problem is controlling the lush jungle that surrounds his house. My hibiscus hedge looks like a tank ran through it repeatedly. His is a work of art in green, white, and red. My ground cover is heavy on the ground, light on the cover. His ground cover is a carpet of undulating green with sparkling accents of red and yellow. His fruit trees bear voluminous amounts of delicious fruit every year. My remaining fruit tree (don't ask, I don't like to talk about it) will bring forth a few morsels every few years.

I don't know why my thumbs are so un-green. I care for my plants. I water them on occasion, and I've been known to fertilize them on rare occasion, but then I put on lots of fertilizer to make up for it. It may be because I don't talk to them, although I have been known to utter a mild expletive over a newly discovered plant corpse. I don't read to them, or play music for them, or gently wash their little leaves and petals. I don't even spritz them on a regular basis as advised in my Plant Care for Dummies.

I suspect my plants know I don't really, really care about them. I like the idea of having plants, but I'm just not willing to make the commitment. Sure, I purchase them with the best of intentions, and I try, I really do, but my plants just don't understand me. It's all about their wants, their needs. It doesn't matter that I work hard every day so they can have a pot to live in. And then a newer, younger, prettier plant comes along and I admit it, I want it. Hmm, I wonder if my plants aren't just dying from lack of care and attention. I wonder if they are committing suicide.

I'm pleased to report that your board voted unanimously a week ago Tuesday to make a major effort to help our community during these difficult times.

As you know, under the best of circumstances many Kona residents are challenged every day to put enough food on their tables to feed their children and themselves. Our club has addressed this challenge in part through our Meet N' Eat efforts and our support for the Kona Salvation Army.

On Tuesday we voted to expand that effort. We looked at our budget to find funds to help. Maverick identified \$3,500 available in his Community

Service budget. Our Treasurer, Janice, suggested we use the funds allocated for travel to PETS and the International Convention (\$9,000) that we are not going to spend this Rotary year.

\$2,500 will be spent immediately to purchase food and supplies for the programs. The remaining \$10,000 is earmarked as matching funds from which we will match donations from our members and the community to reach a goal of \$25,500 in total. Our hope is to quickly make the money available to meet the nutritional needs of the less fortunate in our Kona ohana.

To give you some perspective on the magnitude of the need, the Kona Salvation Army was serving 80 to 100 families from their food bank prior to the outbreak. Last week they fed 280 families, nearly three times their normal capacity. That number will doubtless increase as the pandemic continues.

When our schools were closed the administrators began working to feed their hungry students Monday through Friday. Meet N' Eat is now focusing on feeding our underserved youth and families on Saturdays. That program also needs additional funds and resources to make that happen.

Along with our Board of Directors, I encourage all of us to consider donating an amount that approximates what each of us would spend every month attending our lunch meetings, \$125. Donating is easy. Go to our website https://www.rotaryclubofkona.com and click on the word "Donate."

We are also reaching out to other West Hawai'i clubs to explore further opportunities to collaborate and serve our community. We will report soon in that regard.

**UPDATE:** I was talking to Rachel the other day and she informed me that not only do they need clamshell boxes, which I think we have a resource on, but thay actually ran out of food for their homeless residents. This is a major problem because the homeless' other sources of food are drying up, including other meal programs and food banks. Her feeding program has gone from 100 to 203 in two weeks and they are currently turning people away. Even when the homeless collect bottles and try to purchase a hamburger at McDonald's, they are turned away because they do not have a car and people are not allowed to use the traffic lanes.

We must keep in mind that the homeless have problems most of the rest of us do not have. It's not only a lack of food, they also do not have the ability to constantly wash their hands and they do not, as a rule, maintain social distancing

I spend a lot of time thinking of family, not just my own or the extended family of Rotary, but also the families we are helping

in the communities we serve. In many parts of the world, mothers and children face challenges to survive that most of us will never comprehend. According to the World Health Organization, the risk of a woman in a low-income country dying during pregnancy or childbirth, or from related causes, is about 120 times higher than that of a woman living in a high-income country. It is encouraging that infant mortality rates are declining globally, yet 4 million babies annually still die within the first year of life.

In April, Rotary turns its attention to maternal and child health. And when we think of what we can do to help, we can look to clubs like the Rotaract Club of Calabar South-CB, Nigeria, for inspiration. It teamed up with the Rotaract Club of Canaan City (CB) in a program focused on educating mothers on best practices to prevent infant mortality and promote postnatal health for themselves and their babies. In Bangladesh, the Rotary Club of Dhaka North provides free surgeries and medicine to pregnant women who cannot afford the hospital costs associated with giving birth. I encourage you and your club to go to ideas.rotary.org to find projects like these that are helping to save mothers and children.

We also have witnessed how millions of people — families and entire communities - have been ripped away from their homes because of conflict, poverty, and disasters during the past decade. But Rotary has not stood idly by during the global refugee crisis.

During Rotary Day at the United Nations last November, we honored a Rotary Peace Fellow and five Rotarians who are taking action to help refugee communities. Among them was Ilge Karancak-Splane of the Rotary Club of Monterey Cannery Row, California. After visiting several tent camps in Turkey, she led a Rotary project that collected 1,000 pairs of children's shoes and socks for families in the camps and, later, led a global grant project to help educate refugee children. In March, Gay and I had the privilege of visiting a tent camp in Torbalı and seeing firsthand the good work that Rotarians from Turkey and California were accomplishing with Syrian refugees.

The challenges faced by mothers, their children, and refugee communities around the world are daunting. But when we remember our greatest strength — how Rotary Connects the World - we can begin to find solutions. Through our creativity, our resources, our dedication, and our networks, Rotary can and will open opportunities to face these challenges.





Our goal centers on helping feed those in need during this Pandemic.

Due to school closures, we have modified our Meet N' Eat program rather than closing it. We are providing take out lunches and a bag of groceries on Saturday's at 2 schools - Kahakai Elementary and Kealakehe Intermediate. These drive through distributions are from 11:00am to 11:30am on Saturday's.

Secondly, Salvation Army's food supply is quickly dwindling with the large increase of those needing meals. # Around Town - Letter from Bank of Hawaii's Roberta Chu

Subject: SBA guidance/communication on payments for SBA guaranteed loans per CARES

I have sent direct communication to our Senators and Representatives at the US Congress. I am sending this email to all of you because I know you are deeply involved with the COVID-19 impact to Hawaii Island. I hope you will send communication to the national offices of SBA and the US Treasury with my request below to get the process and guidance to the financial institutions on SBA guaranteed loans.

I work for Bank of Hawaii (BOH) as manager of the Commercial Banking Center on Hawaii Island. Because of the pandemic and CARES Act which created the Paycheck Protection Program through the SBA, BOH has been mobilized to receive, process and fund thousands of applications with limited guidance from SBA and US Treasury. What I see as very problematic is the lack of any communication regarding payments to be made by SBA for SBA guaranteed loans per the CARES Act. US Treasury and SBA have been silent on any direction to financial institutions.

These payments are for loans made to the smallest of business which are most vulnerable to the negative impact to the Hawaii economy. As you know, Hawaii has the largest number of small businesses per state in the country. Because of no clear direction on how funds will be received as well as timing of these funds, Banks are having to tell customers to keep making payments because of no guidance. Once a loan becomes delinquent, the negative consequences to the Banks and the Borrowers are problematic. I urge you to push the US Treasury and SBA to focus on this matter because the support to these smaller businesses is critical.

Thank you for allowing me to express my concern.


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

Rotary Club of Kona wishes to draw attention to the hardships that threaten the health and well-being of some of our most

vulnerable local residents with the spread of the Covid-19 pandemic.

Food supplies, in particular, are becoming increasingly scarce because many of the resources which the needy once had at their disposal are no longer available. For example, Salvation Army resources have diminished significantly since the organization had to close its thrift store and daycare facilities due to the crisis; at the same time, the demand on its resources has experienced an extreme increase due to the growing needs of the homeless and other underserved residents. The Salvation Army hot meal programs have gone from serving out 100 meals a week to 460-500, largely because they have added a weekend component to their program. Their demand for food baskets - which include an average of 30 meals per basket - has gone from 80-100 to 500.

As for the Rotary Club, our Meatand-Eat program, which once served 50-100 meals per week, is now providing 400 weekend lunches plus food baskets, and many of our own members have donated both money and manpower to the cause. Rotary is also providing lunches for a county housing program for the homeless in which the Holiday Inn provides 40 rooms for the homeless during this crisis.

Not surprisingly, the increase in such services comes at a cost – it is estimated that the price to properly provide these services for ten weeks will be \$140,000. We have raised \$30,000 so far, leaving us well short and in desperate need of an infusion of funds to support these programs. # At the Qub - Harold Metlzer Obituary



Harold "Happy Hal" Meltzer of Kailua-Kona, passed away on April 21, 2020 at the age of 79, sadly just short of his predicted "happy healthy 111 years," at Hospice of Kona's Nakamaru Hale.

Harold was born January 10, 1941 and raised just outside of Boston in Winthrop, Massachusetts. Harold graduated from Lawrence Academy Prep School in Groton, MA in 1958 and went on to receive his Bachelor's degree from The University of Rochester in 1967 and was fond of saying, "it only took me 9 years". Harold was married and divorced 3 times to; Virginia (m. 1967-1977), Gale (m. 1980-1982), and Deborah (m. 1993-1994). He lived in Massachusetts, New York, Cali-

fornia, and ultimately in Hawaii for just short of 40 years, though he refused to let go of his Boston accent and whenever he encountered someone else with a similar accent he'd say "it's nice to hear someone else speaking prahpahly". He always said of living in Hawaii, "everyone owes themselves the best, and this is the best."

As a young man, Harold sold paint brushes for the Fuller Brush Company, was in the Army Reserves, worked for McGraw-Hill Publishing, and sold mobile homes before finding his true calling in real estate. Harold was head broker, owner, and "big cheese" at Real Estate Consultant of Kona for nearly 40 years until his death. He bought and sold wholesale text books on the side and enjoyed regularly calling on and interacting with college professors who he described as "some of the greatest minds". He took great pride in being a member of the Rotary Club for more than 50 years and being instrumental in starting an over 40 basketball league in Kona. Harold was well known for his eccentric loud shirts (when complimented on them he often replied, "Thanks, I just got new batteries for this one"), his greeting of "do you have time for a joke?" and his trademark sign off "ta-ta". Harold believed the purpose of life was "to feel good, and to help others do the same" and he lived his life accordingly.

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## At the Club - A Message from Brian Riley



Today I had my truck worked on at Toyota and took an hour or so to go to Hope Services (HS) to find out what was really happening. I spoke to the ONLY employee around, Lisa, a staff psychologist and social worker, and Auntie Carrie Lynn, who is sort of the Kapuna. Carrie Lynn was formerly homeless and spends most of her days volunteering. She actually looks homeless so she really has a lay of the land.

I asked them if there was one thing we could do for them what would it be. The resounding answer was "toilet facilities." As I had noted before there are facilities inside and outside the gates of HS. The ones inside have shown themselves to be a little more reliable. The ones outside simply don't make the cut, due to capacity issues or desirability. Either way they are "outsiders".

Inside the compound is a shower house and bathroom building. BUT, as it turns out, the open hours are 8:30A to 11:30A, Monday though Friday only. WTH???? I asked why they weren't open all the time and was told that due to various issues they had to be monitored, and currently MANY HS employees aren't coming in due to health concerns. WTH2??? As so they are closed.

We all know that due to Covid-19 all public restrooms at supermarkets, gas stations, etc are currently closed. This leaves the homeless no other choice but to urinate and deficate in the surrounding neighborhood. We have all heard that he Pier and a couple of other places are now open, BUT, when you have to go, you have to go! No one's doing the Reverse Ironman and sprinting back to the Pier, etc.

I saw this evening that many neighbors want this whole facility shut done and moved. In my opinion it's with good reason as HS has basically pushed these people into their neighborhood making it dirtier and more dangerous. I believe that we need to push HS and our elected officials to get that shower and bathroom facility open, at least until the homeless have other

options that currently aren't in place. I think if local business's actually knew the facts they would be more understanding of why the homeless are doing what they are doing and absolutely irate with HS.

#### Anyway, as for feedings:

Prior to the pandemic, Starbucks saved all of their pastries and foodstuffs at the end of the day and prepared them for early morning pickup by HS, to allow them to feed breakfast every morning. Currently, with Starbucks closed, HS (Lisa in particular) is left scrambling to come up with day old pastries, etc from KTA and Poi Dog Deli. Not very nourishing but a little something every morning to ALL inside and outside the gate.

#### Lunches are currently being served as follows:

Mon - By a single individual parishioner of St. Michaels who has taken this upon themself. Tue - St Michaels Church and United Methodist are switching off.

Wed - Hope Services.

Thu - Living Stones Church.

Fri - 1st and Last Fri, Phillipino Club at St Michales Church • 2nd and 3rd Fri, Hope Services. SAT AND SUNDAY NO BREAKFAST OR LUNCH

#### Dinners are currently being served as follows:

Thu & Sat - Salvation Army.

Sun - Auntie Carrie Lynn is scraping together food around town and cooking in the kitchen which is attached to the shower house/toilet building. Evidently, Carrie Lynn is the only non-staff member allowed to use that kitchen. She LOVES to cook and said that during this time she would do it EVERYDAY if she had supplies to cook with. She said, hamburger meat, roasts, chilli, etc would all be hits and could be versatile products.

In Total about 60 people need to be fed EVERYDAY, some days more.

#### In conclusion, fact and my opinion intertwined:

I don't care how these people got to where they are, be it mental illness, drugs, etc. They are currently in a bad spot as they are now cooped up (as there is safety in numbers) and can't roam around like before. No one is allowing them to use their restroom facilities, etc. The neighborhood all this is taking place in will continue to go down and neighboring businesses with grow more frustrated by the issues. They don't realize that a significant number of people are being locked out of HS and no restroom facilities are being made available.

Firstly, WE NEED TO GET THE RESTROOMS OPEN AT HS.

Secondly, we need to consider trying to provide dinner preparation groceries or on sight cooking Mon, Tue, Wed, Fri, Sun assuming HS will allow it. If they won't, we really need to know why. If they agree, perhaps we can get other churches or organizations to fill in the gaps with assistance.

I believe that taking these two steps should greatly help the cause.

I look forward to others feedback.

How we are using those funds:

Firstly: Due to school closures, we have modified our Meet N' Eat program rather than closing it. We are providing 400 take out lunches and a bag of groceries on each Saturday at 2 schools – Kahakai Elementary and Kealakehe Intermediate.

Secondly: Salvation Army's food supply was quickly dwindling with the large increase of those needing meals., and their sources of obtaining food have dwindled as well. Salvation Army is providing take away dinners on Thursday and Saturdays and at this time that is about 490 meals and the numbers are increasing. They are also distributing at least 650 baskets of groceries each week that last 5 days. We are trying to keep their food pantry stocked so they can continue the feedings and grocery giveaways. For April Salvation Army Kona served 2801 hot meals, gave out 4111 Baskets of food, gave out 2457 snacks, and 3222 beverages.

Thirdly: Some of the homeless are being sheltered in a hotel and we are providing a weekly bag of lunch items which is about 287 lunches per week.

And last but certainly NOT least: A BIG thank you to all our members and the members of Rotary Club of Kona Sunrise who are putting themselves at risk, and putting in the time and the labor needed for this cause.

He suggested that the official count may be low as it appears that up to 80% of those infected have few, if any, symptoms.

Rotary Club of Kona wishes to draw attention to the hardships that threaten the health and well-being of some of our

most vulnerable local residents with the spread of the Covid-19 pandemic.

Food supplies, in particular, are becoming increasingly scarce because many of the resources which the needy once had at their disposal are no longer available. For example, Salvation Army resources have diminished significantly since the organization had to close its thrift store and daycare facilities due to the crisis; at the same time, the demand on its resources has experienced an extreme increase due to the growing needs of the homeless and other underserved residents.

As of late May, the Rotary Club of Kona is providing about 75% of food that is distributed by the Salvation Army. About 7200 meals a week are being provided including 640 school food baskets and 280 hotel lunches.

Not surprisingly, the increase in such services comes at a cost – it is estimated that the price to properly provide these services for ten weeks will be \$140,000. We have raised \$30,000 so far, leaving us well short and in desperate need of an infusion of funds to support these programs.

# At RI - Non Invasive Bubble Helmuts are Saving Lives



Rotarians in Lithuania and the United States promote the use of bubble helmets to help patients avoid mechanical ventilators

Rotarians in Lithuania and Chicago, Illinois, USA, are using their influence to promote the use of "bubble helmets" and potentially lessen the need for mechanical ventilators for COVID-19 patients who struggle to breathe on their own.

The Rotary Club of Vilnius Lituanica International, Lithuania, participated in Hack the Crisis, an online event in March that brought together innovators in science and tech-nology to "hack," or develop solutions to, issues caused by the COVID-19 pandemic. Members of the Lithuanian club,

along with members of the Rotary Clubs of Chicago and Chicagoland Lithuanians (Westmont), joined a team to brainstorm ways to help COVID-19 patients breathe without using mechanical ventilators.

Bubble helmets come in various designs and are noninvasive, supplying oxygen without the need for intubation.


"Traditional ventilators used with intubation are a painful intervention into the body and require trained medical staff," says Viktorija Trimbel, a member of the Vilnius Lituanica club, who was a mentor during Hack the Crisis. "There's also a shortage of the drugs used for sedation. But you don't have to be sedated with helmets."

Bubble helmets are noninvasive and supply oxygen without the need for intubation, a procedure where a tube is inserted down a patient's throat. A helmet fits over a patient's head with a rubber collar that can be adjusted around the neck. The collar has ports that can deliver oxygen and air.

But some critical care physicians are becoming concerned that intubation and mechanical ventilators are being used unnecessarily on COVID-19 patients and suggest that more patients could benefit by remaining longer on simpler, noninvasive respiratory support.

Helmetbasedventilation.com connects researchers, manufacturers, medical professionals, and funding sources to increase the supply of bubble helmets.

She works tirelessly in an effort to feed, care for, and teach our children living in extreme poverty. Her passion is driven from her own personal understanding of what it means to grow up with an unstable home life. She was displaced as a youth

living unsheltered and knows all too well the feeling of having to go without food. "Personally I have been told that "it wont work" or "that's not how to make things happen." All while I am doing what was said can't be done and winning awards for making things happen.

The mission of Project Hawai'i Inc. is to help our islands keiki (children in Hawaiian) break the cycle of poverty. Since 2003, our dedicated volunteers strive to enhance their lives by providing year round supportive services that help to build their self-esteem and learn the proper life and social skills to succeed. We are able to change their lives by providing a sense of stability through our holiday events, school support, educational training and monthly outreach. Our award winning summer educational program has allowed our homeless children to be first generation to graduate high school and attend college. We provide our services and outreach to over 1,600 individual homeless children throughout the year.

Our nonprofit organization is run 100% by volunteers and solely supported by public donations.

• He recently returned from a business trip and was greeted at the ariport by the National Guard. He needed to fill out lots of paperwork and then had to be quaranteed at home for 14 days. At least 3 phones will be made to verify that he is respecting the quarantine.

• Despite the Pandemic the real estate market is surprisingly healthy.

Despite a somewhat reduced number of buyers, the inventory is very low and can't keep up with the demand. Also historically low interest rates are making mortages easier to obtain. As a result, prices are actually increasing, contrary to what common sense might dictate.

• For the demographic referenced, sales in April were 42. Sales in May jumped to 72, an 80% increase. Surprising!

For the Rotary Club of Kona presentation, Magin gave a bit of the history and workings of their very popular summer camp program for homeless keiki. Nearly abandoned when the first summer camp didn't anticipate the degree to which the campers needed support, subsequent camps now provide needed clothing and gear in addition to healthy meals and snacks, workshops, mentorship and leadership training, and fun activities. Additionally keiki are provided with new outfits and school supplies for the

Now an well established institution, the camps provide the keiki with an escape from what is often a very stressful and negative situation. Camp gives the keiki a chance to have fun, eat well, learn coping and success skills, and feel loved and appreciated, perhaps for the first time in their young lives.

The nonprofit organization is run 100% by volunteers and solely supported by public donations.


# Just Last Week - Stephanie Nagata - Office of Mauna Kea Mgmt

#### President's Position John Spicer - President, Rotary Club of Kona

#### May 21, 2020 - UPDATE



Rotary Club of Kona wishes to draw attention to the hardships that threaten the health and well-being of some of our

most vulnerable local residents with the spread of the Covid-19 pandemic.

Food supplies, in particular, are becoming increasingly scarce because many of the resources which the needy once had at their disposal are no longer available. For example, Salvation Army resources have diminished significantly since the organization had to close its thrift store and daycare facilities due to the crisis; at the same time, the demand on its resources has experienced an extreme increase due to the growing needs of the homeless and other underserved residents.

As of late May, the Rotary Club of Kona is providing about 75% of food that is distributed by the Salvation Army. About 7200 meals a week are being provided including 640 school food baskets and 280 hotel lunches.

Not surprisingly, the increase in such services comes at a cost – it is estimated that the price to properly provide these services for ten weeks will be \$140,000. We have raised \$30,000 so far, leaving us well short and in desperate need of an infusion of funds to support these programs.

Several members of the community and many of our own members have donated both money and manpower to the cause. # At The Club - Kona Community Foundation - 2019/2020

It's been a year of ups and downs for the Rotary Club of Kona Community Foundation. The first half of our fiscal year we were showing great returns on our investments. Then the COVID-19 hit and the economy took a hit. The stock market was volatile to say the least. We must acknowledge our financial advisor and member of our Board of Directors, Lori Burgoon. While our investments took a slight hit, they are slowly recovering and we still have the cash we need to fund the scholarships.

This year the Rotary Club provided additional funds to the foundation and we were able to provide a grant of \$35,000.00 to the Hawaii Community College Palamanui campus for furniture, fixtures and equipment (FF&E) for a classroom for the physics lab. Our club was able to visit the campus and see where the funds would be used. We learned last year that the campus had a classroom and staff available for the physics lab but the State would not fund FF&E. After the many years Past President Jim Lightner stood up and talked about a new campus and the great opportunities it could provide to the students in our community, we could not just stand by and let this space stand idle.

We also noticed that the scholarships that were earmarked for Palamanui students were continually going unused by those students and were being reallocated to other deserving students in our community. Accordingly, we decided the Rotary Club of Kona Community Foundation provided \$10,000.00 for the scholarship program for the Palamanui Campus. These scholarships are administered by community college scholarship program staff and they work with the at-risk students.

This spring when we were participating in our annual scholarship interviews, President Ken brought up to the group that we could setup a new 4-year scholarship in the name of James (Jim) Lightner. When Jim was with our club he was the prime example of a true Rotarian. The interview committee and the subsequent motion and vote by the Board of Directors of the Rotary Club of Kona Community Foundation unanimously approved the addition of a scholarship in Jim's name.

Jim was not only a dedicated Rotarian and Past president of the Rotary Club of Kona, but he also had a great influence and steadfast and unwavering determination to get a quality community college campus in Kona. He was so excited to have the campus move out of the "Old Foodland" space in Kealakekua to its very own University campus – Palamanui. The newly created and ongoing James Lightner scholarship is for \$4,000.00 and is payable to the students and their college at \$1,000.00 annually for 4 years. In addition, we increased the Jim & Sis Bedingfield Scholarship from \$4,000 to \$6,000 with it being paid to the student and their college at \$1,500/year.

When Ken Kjer called Jim to let him know what the Foundation has done he told him "... thank you, Jim, for what you have done for the lives of so many students through an affordable opportunity to obtain a quality education and promising future here in Kona".

This year the scholarship interviewers were in Ken's conference room where we social distanced and wore our masks when the students arrived. We had two in-person interviews and six phone interviews

Most of the applicants were the usual AMAZING students with great futures ahead of them. This year we awarded the following scholarships:

Ken & Marge Clewett - \$8,000 (\$2,000/year) - Makena Becker Jim & Sis Bedingfield \$6,000 (\$1,500/year) - Vyas Hale James Lightner \$4,000 (\$1,000/year) – Breeze Chinen Ron & Kathy Hawkes \$2,000 (\$1,000/year for 2 years) - Tanner Nakamoto We also awarded a 1 time \$1,000 special award- Joyce Rosabia

For a total of \$21,000 in scholarships. Thank you Rotary Club of Kona for your amazing work in the community and for your fundraising efforts managing the volunteers for the Senior PGA golf tournament each year. Thank you to Kelly Flear for his continues support of our club and foundation's programs.
