Carmelita Villalobos is the Response and Outreach Manager for Ke Kai Ola-The Marine Mammal Center. Ke Kai Ola is the only long-term rehabilitation center for sick and injured Hawaiian monk seals. Carmelita, along with her coworkers and 150 volunteers, works to conserve the population of Hawaiian monk seals that consists of just over 1600 individuals by caring for the animals, educating the public, and tracking the monk seals on Hawai'i Island.

Since 1975, we've rescued more than 26,000 marine mammals along 600 miles of California coastline and the Big Island of Hawai'i.


Mike did not want to have a traditional funeral service, however I will be planning a memorial to celebrate his life later in the year.





At the Podium - Mark Hackney Marine Megafauna Foundation

Mark is a seasoned executive and organizational leader of energy projects in locations around the world. With a lifelong passion for snorkeling and diving he has observed firsthand the decline of numerous pristine reef ecosystems, which has deepened his commitment to marine conservation. Since retiring in 2020, Mark has volunteered his time with the Marine Megafauna Foundation and is



currently serving as Chairman of the Board. Mark has a long history of diving in Kona and after decades of visiting the area, he and his wife Caroline have called Kona "home" for over 5 years.

The Marine Megafauna Foundation was founded in 2009 by renowned marine scientists Dr. Andrea Marshall and Dr. Simon Pierce. Our mission is to enable and inspire protection of threatened marine megafauna through pioneering research that supports community education and sustainable conservation solutions.

Our team has conducted pioneering research on manta rays and whale sharks, which has enabled advancement of these species towards global protection. We have expanded our focus to other iconic and threatened species (including sea turtles, marlin, and others) with over 100 peer-reviewed scientific papers and a track record of collaboration and capacity-building across the world. We have core research areas in the USA (Florida, and now here in Hawaii), Mozambique, Australia and Indonesia, as well as seasonal programs in Tanzania, Oman, Ecuador, and other countries.

Our objective is to carefully and sustainably grow our project breadth and conservation impact, with education and protection initiatives operating synergistically with targeted research activities.



At the Podium - Mike Gleason - Volcano Art Center



Mike grew up on a small family farm in Western Oregon in a family of Educators. After graduation from Western Oregon State University, Mike moved to Pohnpei in Micronesia as an ESL teacher. Our team has conducted pioneering research on manta rays and whale sharks, which has enabled advancement of these species towards global protection. We have expanded our focus to other iconic and threatened species (including sea turtles, marlin, and others) with over 100 peer-reviewed scientific papers and a track record of collaboration and capacity-building across the world. We have core research areas in the USA (Florida, and now here in Hawaii), Mozambique, Australia and Indonesia, as well as seasonal programs in Tanzania, Oman, Ecuador, and other countries. Our objective is to carefully and sustainably grow our project breadth and conservation impact, with education and protection initiatives operating synergistically with targeted research activities.



Finally, Mike accepted the position as CEO for the Volcano Art Center and is extremely happy to be back at home on Hawaii Island.

Volcano Art Center develops and offers ongoing programs for residents, keiki (children) and visitors, including the award-winning Na Mea Hawai'i Hula Kahiko performance series held monthly at the kahua hula in Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park.

12th Hawaii Distiller is the first distillery in Kona since the 1950's and the 12th distiller in the state of Hawaii. Every drop they make is produced right here on the Big Island. Their spirits use locally sourced ingredients and the purest form of sugar on the planet: raw Hawaiian honey. Their purpose is to bring out the best that Hawaii has to offer. Dave Puckett's 3rd-great-grandfather began distilling in the 1800's, and that passion was passed down through generations. Dave started experimenting with whiskey and other spirits in 2010. Six years later, he retired from construction work and traded in his copper nails for copper stills. He's been perfecting his craft ever since.

Ola Shaw is a Hawai'i born entrepreneur, storyteller, and founder of Flight of Aloha — the state's first locally owned and produced flying theater attraction. Now open in Kailua-Kona, the immersive experience blends 8K aerial footage, motion seats, water, wind, and scent effects to transport guests across breathtaking island landscapes, guided by stories rooted in Hawaiian values and history.

Before launching Flight of Aloha, Ola built We Are More Solutions, an electrical and AV contracting company that helped power businesses across the islands. His technical



12th Hawaii Distiller is the first distillery in Kona since the 1950's and the 12th distiller in the state of Hawaii. Every drop they make is produced right here on the Big Island. Their spirits use locally sourced ingredients and the purest form of sugar on the planet: raw Hawaiian honey. Their purpose is to bring out the best that Hawaii has to offer. Dave Puckett's 3rd-great-grandfather began distilling in the 1800's, and that passion was passed down through generations. Dave started experimenting with whiskey and other spirits in 2010. Six years later, he retired from construction work and traded in his copper nails for copper stills. He's been perfecting his craft ever since.

Ola Shaw is a Hawai'i born entrepreneur, storyteller, and founder of Flight of Aloha — the state's first locally owned and produced flying theater attraction. Now open in Kailua-Kona, the immersive experience blends 8K aerial footage, motion seats, water, wind, and scent effects to transport guests across breathtaking island landscapes, guided by stories rooted in Hawaiian values and history.

Before launching Flight of Aloha, Ola built We Are More Solutions, an electrical and AV contracting company that helped power businesses across the islands. His technical

background allowed him to help design and build the very infrastructure behind his attraction.

After leaving the islands to attend school on the mainland, Ola returned home with a greater appreciation for his culture, community, and the responsibility to protect and uplift both. That experience fuels his mission to ensure every visitor leaves with not just stunning visuals but a deeper fun connection to Hawai'i.

At the Podium - Planned medical community 21st century (PMC 21) - Planning committee



This weeks speaker is Ira (Lynn) Walton. Lynn is CEO of Kona Community Hospital and the Chairman of the Planning Committee for PMC21. Lynn is replacing Dr Trauth, who was going to speak on Women's Cancer Month. Unfortunately, she had to cancel at the last minute. A summary of PMC21 follows:

PURPOSE: The objective of the planning committee is to provide an efficient plan to provide tertiary medical service for West Hawaii. PLANNING COMMITTEE MEMBERS: Bill Mielcke (HHSC Board Vice Chair), Dr Deen Wong, Dr. Daryl Kurozawa, Stan Berry (CEO NHCH), Sally Kimura (NHCH Board), Jim Higgins & Phil Reilly, (Kona Hospital

BASIC ASSUMPTIONS: North Hawaii Community Hospital (HCH) will remain a full service community hospital for the population in North and South Kohala. Kona Community Hospital (KCH) will evolve into a LTC/SKN and Psychiatric facility providing urgent care and diagnostic services to the population of South Kona located within 20 minutes travel time of KCH. Sufficient clinical staff will be obtained to provided medical center level services. The facility will operate without any construction debt load.

The planning committee commissioned an economic analysis on the concept of creating a Medical Center in West HI with a target opening date of 2010 based on these assumptions.

STUDY CONCLUSION: The West HI community will support a medical center in five year increments of 2008-113 beds, 2013-128 beds and 2018-142 beds. The recommendation is that we target construction between 2008 and 2013 at the 2018 capacity level of 142 beds.

The forecasted financial data has 85% level of confidence for the period between 2008-2013. The target date for opening is 2010 was validated.

The estimated cost of the proposed 225,000 sq. foot facility and 33,000 sq. foot energy plant, including equipment and furnishings, is \$156 million. Within 3 years of opening the medical center will generate a profit if the proposed clinical services are available and the facility is not responsible for the building debt.

The planning committee is in pursuit of a site located between Palani Street and the airport. When a site is obtained a Certificate of Need will be sought and the planning phases for completion of the project will be finalized.

PMC 21 FOUNDATION: The Foundation's mission is to fund the planning effort and it has received a \$75k donation from the West Hawaii Healthcare Council. The officers of the 8 member 50 lC3 foundation are Chairman Bill Mielcke, Vice Chairman Joe Spencer, Treasurer Pat Ryan and Lynn Walton is the Secretary.



This November, as we celebrate The Rotary Foundation, I invite you to consider not only what we give but why we give. The

give but why we give. The Foundation is more than a fund for projects. It is the beating heart of our promise that service, rooted in trust and friendship, can create lasting change.



This November, as we celebrate The Rotary Foundation, I invite you to consider not only what we give but why we give. The

give but why we give. The Foundation is more than a fund for projects. It is the beating heart of our promise that service, rooted in trust and friendship, can create lasting change.

Our Action Plan calls us to increase our impact, and the Foundation is how we make this vision real. Since 1988, Rotary and our partners have immunized nearly 3 billion children against polio. We have committed more than \$2.6 billion to this cause, and last year alone we directed \$146 million toward the final push for eradication. These numbers are significant, but the true impact is not in statistics — it is in the lives of children who will never again fear polio. It is in the hope restored to families and the peace built in communities once defined by disease.

But polio is only one story among many. Each year, Rotary Peace Centers train new generations of leaders who will transform conflict into dialogue and division into understanding. In 2023-24, nearly 100 new fellows began their studies, continuing a legacy of more than 1,800 peacebuilders from over 140 countries. When we invest in them, we are planting seeds of peace that will bear fruit for decades to come.

The Foundation also touches lives through district and global grants, supporting projects large and small. A clean water well for a rural community, scholarships for young professionals, medical care in the wake of disaster — these are not temporary gestures, but steps toward dignity, resilience, and opportunity. This is how Rotary service becomes lasting impact. And when natural disasters strike, our Foundation allows Rotary to act quickly with disaster response grants.

Our Foundation is not about what we can do alone but what we can do together. Each contribution, no matter its size, joins with others to create a collective act of faith in humanity and in the future.

The last mile of any great journey is always the hardest. We see this in our final steps toward ending polio, in our work for peace, and in every project that seeks to lift people out of despair. Yet every time we give, we declare that our work will continue regardless of the challenge.

This November, let us give with gratitude, with joy, and with hope. Through our Foundation, we Unite for Good, and in doing so, we leave behind not only projects but a legacy of peace, trust, and Service Above Self.

About the Presenter:



Kevin O'Brien is the President and Founder of the Papahānaumokuākea Marine Debris Project (www.pmdphawaii. org). Before founding PMDP, Kevin spent 12 years with the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) in Honolulu, where he led and coordinated ship-based marine research missions throughout the Pacific. His work included planning and executing large-scale marine debris removal

efforts within the Papahānaumokuākea Marine National Monument.

About the Organization:

The PMDP is a Hawaii-based 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization dedicated to protecting the critical wildlife and habitats of the Papahānaumokuākea Marine National Monument through annual large-scale marine debris cleanup missions. Over the past five years, PMDP has removed more than 1 million pounds of

debris from Papahānaumokuākea's remote reefs and shorelines.

President's Position

This month's special issue of Rotary magazine is all about happiness, that most elemental of human yearnings. More than a feeling,

ings. More than a feeling, though, this state of positive well-being, and the conditions necessary to create and sustain it, should be considered a universal right.

December also marks Rotary's Disease Prevention and Treatment Month, when we highlight our members' work to promote health and wellness, including mental wellness. Globally, nearly 1 in 7 people have a mental health disorder, according to a recent World Health Organization report. Yet only 9 percent of people with depression receive adequate treatment.

We are fortunate in Rotary to have a powerful way to support emotional well-being and happiness: friendship. The connections we build in Rotary can be a powerful force for change. I know this from personal experience.

When my fellow members first proposed that I become club president, I demurred. I had a stutter. I was terrified of speaking. But having club members who supported me and surrounded me with affection enabled me to face my fear, and I found a way to stand confidently before a crowd.

Today, I regularly address audiences — some numbering in the thousands — in a language that is not native to me. The Rotary members in my life helped me create lasting change within myself.

That fellowship gives us the courage and means to create lasting change in the world as well, and mental health services are in desperate need of improvement. The WHO reports that governments on average devote only 2 percent of their health budgets to mental health, and only 11 percent of that funding reaches community-based services. In some countries, only one trained mental health professional is available for every 100,000 people. The WHO has called for strategic and urgent action to close the gap.

Rotary can answer that call by championing mental health awareness in our clubs, working with local health systems, funding training for community health workers, and supporting initiatives that bring care to places where none exists. Even small investments in mental health yield enormous returns in productivity, public health, and happiness.

While we are creating lasting change in the world, we cannot forget to take care of each other. Past RI President Gordon McInally wisely reminds us that we must go beyond asking, "How are you?" We owe it to each other to instead ask, "How are you really?"
